### Northside District Elects Two, April 6

In a relatively heavy vote totalling 644, voters of Northside Independent School District on April 6 gave Place 3 to Walter Sorenson by 380 defeating long-time incumbent Henry Howell, well-known newscaster, who had served on the school board for many years.

Place 4, which had three candidates in the race, went to William J. Thornton with 304 to defeat Ballant (Dick) Dixon, 261, and Jerry Varnon, 72.

The coronation ceremony open to the public and slated to take place in the party room upstairs at the new Park Plaza annex will

Entries were accepted until April 24. To be eligible contestants needed a parent's signature. They will model a street dress and formal. Talent and poise will also be considered. The coronation committee includes Mrs. Wilma Hyatt, Mrs. Ophelia Spruce, and Mrs. Mary Wynn.

The 1968 Queen will, of course, be featured in the downtown parade on Saturday morning, May 4. She will also reign over all festivities including the street dance at the Plaza. Her court of honor will be chosen also.

### Big Show On Way

### Artists to Have Outdoor Show

More than 200 artists have indicated they will show their works in the two-day Outdoor Art Show sponsored by the Art Guild as their part of the Helotes Spring Festival. Publicity Chairman Ruby Rizzo reports.

To be held from 10 a.m. until dark on Saturday, May 4, and Sunday, May 5, this is a real crowd pleaser. More than 15,000 attended the event last year.

Artists are coming this year from as far away as Kansas and many of the local area artists also will be here to show and sell their works. They will be located on the grounds of the local gallery on Bandera Road.

A juried show is open to all artists in this area, according to Lillian Hurlbut, chairman. Entries must be in by 1:30 p.m. Saturday, May 4, and a fee of one dollar will be charged for each entry in this section. A panel of

judges includes Mrs. Margaret Peavey and John Champion, San Antonio College faculty members, and Miss Martha Moud national-ly-known Helotes artist. This part of the show will be located inside the Gallery. Ribbons in the following categories—painting, dawning, and crafts—will be given. A "Best in Show" ribbon and trophy will also be awarded.

The presentation of ribbons will be made on Sunday at 1 p.m. at the Gallery.

### Firemen Set Annual Ball

Following the Battle of Flowers Parade, the big event is the Helotes Volunteer Fire Department's dance Friday, April 26, at 8 p.m. at John Floore Country Store. Clarence Galm is dance chairman and he extends an invitation to everyone to put over this fireman's ball—the chief

fund-raising event of the year. The Texas Top Hands will play.

This dance follows by one week that great fundraiser for the Helotes Spring Festival, with Mrs. Fred Anderson, chairman with Mrs. Peter LeBoutillier, reporting that it was a success financially as well as being a ball.

### April 6 Elections Return Mayors Here

Elections were held in two nearby towns April 6, returning incumbent mayors to office in uncontested races in Grey Forest and Leon Valley.

In the Grey Forest election Mayor Jack Nottingham received 83 votes of 95 cast. For aldermen, incumbents Richard T. Miller received 85, and Rimon Ham, who was filling an unexpired term garnered 91 votes. Running as a newcomer, J. G. McCoy was given 87 votes.

The turn-out was about double that of last year and could be considered good. Grey Forest citizens also approved three referendums: Prohibiting permanent

house trailers as residences, 72 for to 22 against. Closing the city dump and substituting pick-up service for a fee, 75 for to 20 against. Establishing a municipal central water system, 86 for to 7 against.

In the Leon Valley election Mayor William Kinman was returned to office by 43 of 44 votes cast. For Place 1, incumbent Vernon Schuhardt won 43 votes; Place 2, incumbent Don Fryer, received 39; and Place 4 Ray Brown tallied 43. This vote was light, with more than 300 potential voters in the area, and tallied about 20 per cent of those who voted in 1967.
