Ranch Town Seeks Park Aid

The San Antonio Ranch New Town at Helotes has announced plans to develop a 52-acre park, including a dam and 31-acre lake, swimming pool, tennis courts, picnic area, playground, fishing and boating facilities, pedestrian walkway, parking areas, and support facilities.

To be called Wildlake District Park, the total cost will be \$982,350.

The New Town planned to make application to the U.S. Bureau of Outdoor Recreation for half of the cost, but changed the request to about \$250,000 in federal funds at the request of the Alamo Area Council of Governments. This reduction was asked because San Antonio and Boerne also are seeking park funds from the same source.

The San Antonio Ranch New Town is an 8,000-acre project about two miles west of Helotes on Bandera Highway. Streets are now being built in the first unit and construction of homes is expected to begin this winter.

Medina Lake Chapel Reaches Half-Century

Sitting in a high clearing overlooking the waters of Medina Lake about two miles north of the dam is the uniquely attractive country church known as St. Francis of Assisi Mission Chapel, which this year is celebrating its golden anniversary. The small church is built of native stone and has round-arch doors and windows.

The people of Mico, the community in which the church is located, marked the fiftieth anniversary with a concelebrated mass led by Archbishop Francis J. Furey and a barbecue attended by 300 people.

Assisting the Archbishop in the mass were Rev. Lawrence Steubben of St. Louis Parish, Castroville; Rev. James Vanderholdt, president of Assumption Seminary; Rev. Charles Neumann, St. Mary's University; and Rev. Alton Rudolph, St. John's Church, Hondo. Rev. Victor Schmidtinsky of Holy Cross Church, D'Hanis, also attended.

First prize in a drawing held during the celebration went to Donald Biedeger of Mico. Second prize went to Mrs. S.A. Haass, Route 4, and third prize to Mrs. C.M. Haegelin, Mico.

A former pastor of the chapel was Rev. Cyril M. Kuehne, author of the book "Ripples From Medina Lake." Construction of the chapel was sponsored by the Knights of Columbus Council No. 786 of San Antonio, Fr. Kuehne writes in his book. It was completed in 1926—"and was dedicated to the saint who is honored as a great lover of all God's creatures—human as well as those of the animal kingdom." Priests of St. Mary's University provided weekly services.

With the advent of the Second World War, Fr. Kuehne wrote, services at the Medina Lake

Chapel were held with less regularity, partly because of the war effort, with local residents away in active service, and the gasoline rationing.

"After the war there was a resurgence of interest in the lake and St. Francis Chapel, and this resulted in considerable improvement in the chapel building," he said.

In 1946 with a program of better roads in effect, the chapel was transferred to the Castroville parish and the priests of St. Mary's University relinquished their care of it after twenty years of regular service.

Miss Tagliarino Injured In Wreck

Mary Beth Tagliarino, 21-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Tagliarino, was seriously injured last Friday, Sept. 24, when her automobile was struck by another vehicle at the corner of IH 10 and Loop 1604. The impact, according to witnesses, carried her vehicle 70 feet when the other driver apparently failed to observe a stop sign at the intersection.

Miss Tagliarino has remained in

a coma as of Thursday at Bexar County Hospital where she is in intensive care. She is a Marshall graduate and an upperclassman at Texas A & M University.

At the time of the accident she was returning from College Station to Helotes for a week-end visit to her family, who reside in McNeel Park.

The prayers of the community are being offered on her behalf.

Edmund Krueger Dies Sept 26 At 71

Edmund Charles Krueger, Sr. of Route 17 died Sunday, Sept. 26, 1976 in a hospital at the age of 71 years. Well-known here, he was a member of Zion Lutheran Church in Helotes, Texas Hermann Sons Lodge No. 76 and the Elks Lodge.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Ada K. Krueger; sons, Lester C. Krueger and Edmund C. Krueger, Jr.; and daughter, Mrs. Harold (Dolly) Langfield. He also leaves eight grandchildren.

Among his survivors also are his brother, Milton C. Krueger, and his sister, Mrs. Sulima Moos, in addition to numerous nieces and nephews.

Prayer service was held at Roy Akers Chapel in San Antonio on Monday evening with many sorrowing friends and neighbors present.

Services were held Tuesday, Sept. 28, at Zion Lutheran Church here with Rev. Paul Probst, pastor, officiating.

Interment was in the Helotes Zion Lutheran Cemetery.

Serving as pallbearers were Curtis Krueger, Earl Moos, O.J. Steubing, James Hand, and William Tietze. Honorary pallbearers were Gerald Nickel and Garnet Steubing.

Sympathy is extended to his family in their loss.

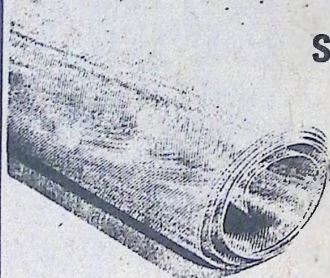

With the final quarter of 1976 ahead, the Bi-Centennial Year in Helotes will be known in history as above average in rainfall. By the final day of September, records kept by Henry Brauchle, local weather observer, show 1976 is now about 10 inches above average and far ahead of 1975 when it took the final months to tally an average amount.

Heavy rains in September were over seven inches bringing the tally to 37.5 inches for the rainfall tally of the year. Since local records have been kept—more than 80 years—the average rainfall here is some 27.83 inches.

All diabetics have been urged by the San Antonio Chapter of the American Diabetes Association to take advantage of the national swine flu immunization now available in Bexar county. Because of their susceptibility to infections and because influenza could disturb control of their disease, diabetics are considered a high risk group for getting swine flu.

School Lunches Are Available

Application forms are now going to parents from Northside Independent School District campuses, for students desiring to receive free or reduced-price lunches and free breakfast at those schools where breakfast is served.

Eligibility depends on family income and number of children in the family. Guidelines this year allow families to be earning more this year and still qualify for the lunch benefits. Special consideration will also be given to families who have incurred considerable medical expenses during the year.

Forms are available at the schools for families whose income levels change during the year, in cases where students not now eligible may become eligible at a later date.

Before the Christmas holidays have passed, plan at least one reunion and record it so that living history can be handed as a heritage more valuable than wealth to those who are young now and those who will look back to this great year in America's history.

History Meet Set For Oct. 9-10

The Bexar County Historical Commission will sponsor its first annual history appreciation conference in San Antonio, October 9-10, Maj. Gen. William A. Harris, USA (ret.), commission chairman, has announced. Prominent historians and representatives of civic and history-related organizations will participate. The conference theme is "Two Days in October," and is open to the public.

Dr. Dorman H. Winfrey, director of the Texas State Library, will deliver the keynote address, "Texas' Legacy to Future Generations." Dr. Gilbert R. Cruz, Pan American University in Edinburg, and Ramon G. Sanchez, of the Gutierrez de Lara Historical Society, will present formal papers on colonial experience in Spanish Texas. Dr. Cruz will speak on the evolution of town government in San Antonio de Bexar, followed by Sanchez' commentary on the role of Bexar in the Mexican independence movement in 1811.

Other participants include Dr. Robert J. Mullen and Dr. Lionel V. Patenaude, The University of Texas at San Antonio; Dr. Josephine H. Schulte, St. Mary's University of San Antonio; Miss Adela M. Navarro, Hispanic Institute of Texas; Anastacio Bueno, Jr., Harlandale High School; Mrs. H. Fred Staacke, San Antonio Conservation Society; and James P. McGuire, San Antonio Historical Association.

The conference will begin on Saturday, October 9, at 1 p.m. in the lower level of the Institute of Texan Cultures, HemisFair Plaza in San Antonio.

The Sunday afternoon program will feature a concert by the in-

ternationally renowned El Curro and his flamenco troupe at the U.T. Health Science Center Auditorium, 7703 Floyd Curl Drive. The concert will begin at 2 p.m.

All sessions of the "Two Days in October" conference are free and open to the public. Dr. Felix D. Almaraz, Jr., conference director, announced. Interested persons may pre-register for the conference by calling the office of the Bexar County Historical Commission at the county courthouse during regular business hours. The telephone is 220-2657.

Also the Social Security Administration should be notified by students who are paid by their employer for attending school. In 1976 and later, a student may have gross earnings of \$2760 in a year without losing benefits due to work.

If earnings exceed \$2760 in a year, \$1.00 of every \$2.00 above \$2760 would be lost. For example, if a student earned \$3000, he would lose \$120 in benefits, according to Gilbert G. Gonzalez, Social Security district manager in San Antonio.
