On the eve of V-Day for Helotes, most of the big action includes tourists on their way to the Texas Folklife Festival down by the river in San Antonio. Voting will take place all day Saturday, and some 95 absentee votes have been tallied cast through August 4. Presumably everyone in the 2.8 area will go to the polls if eligible and another era will be marked in the long history of Helotes.

The 47th annual session of the Texas State Grange will be in progress this week-end at McDowell Middle School in Hondo, Texas Aug. 5th-8th. National representatives are Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hall. Bill Maskew, Leon Valley Grange Master, and State Secretary Ruth Lampman will participate as well as many Helotes area residents, according to Mr. and Mrs. Clifton Lampman, membership chairmen of the local grange.

Meanwhile they are preparing for the Womanless Marriage to be held next week-end by the local Granges at Converse, Texas.

For St. Louis Day

34,000 To Answer Bell In District



Barbecued beef is cooked by numerous experienced barbecuers for the annual St. Louis Day celebration in Castroville, to be held this year on Sunday, Aug. 23. It will be the 99th St. Louis Day celebration there. Meal serving will

begin at 11 a.m. and continue to 3 p.m., followed by a dance from 3 to 7 p.m. with music by the Kustoms. Last year's celebration attracted 11,000 visitors. In the nearly 100-year series, good cooking has become legendary.

Registration for most of Northside School District's 34,000 students was completed last Spring and names and courses are "in the computers," making Wednesday, Aug. 26, the first day of school.

High school students in Clark, Holmes, Jay and Marshall, however, will return Aug. 17 or 18 for forms and lines and meeting staff members and fellow students. A typical high school student might need a parking permit (complete with auto license number and insurance company name) or voter registration certificate. During "pre-registration," students can indicate whether or not they want their telephone number listed in the school directory, and everyone may have yearbook pictures taken.

Although high schools want to see all students according to schedules posted for Aug. 17 and 18, middle schools only need to register students new to the school who were not in the "feeder system" last year (5th graders in the attendance area also registered last year).

Elementary school students new to the neighborhood need to register, arrange for transfer of records from previous

Incorporation Election To Be Saturday

The long-awaited election on whether or not to incorporate Helotes will take place Saturday, Aug. 8. The polls will open at 7 a.m. in the Helotes Hills United Methodist Church, and will close at 7 p.m.

Ninety-five absentee ballots were cast in the absentee voting which ended Tuesday, said Barbara Galland, election judge.

The area proposed for incorporation is 2.8 square miles that include chiefly Helotes Park Estates, Downtown Helotes and Helotes Ranch Acres and has a population of a little more than 2,000 residents.

If the majority of the registered voters within this area vote in favor of incorporation Saturday, another election will be held soon afterward to choose a mayor and city council.

An after-the-election party will be held at the PARC building on the Methodist church grounds Saturday night beginning at 7:30 p.m.

F & J Wins Trophy In Softball League

The Helotes Hill Country Softball League ended summer season play Thursday, July 24, in a season extended three weeks because of two rainouts and a post-season playoff. McDonough Brothers started the evening by winning an earlier protested game 9-7 over Welders Supply.

McDonough Brothers finished the season 6-4 and shared the league tri-championship with Grey Moss Inn and F & J Construction.

Trophy awards were determined by a playoff because in regular season play F & J had beaten Grey Moss Inn twice, but McDonough had beaten F & J twice, and Grey Moss Inn had beaten McDonough twice. Therefore, no tie-breakers except a playoff were possible. The captains met at home plate and decided to play a round-robin tournament.

Grey Moss Inn and F & J took the field first and played an extra-inning-eight innings game. The fierce struggle was one of the most exciting of the year. Grey

Moss Inn batted first and led 2-0 after one inning, but were tied 2-2 after two, 4-4 after three and 5-5 after four. After five innings, Grey Moss Inn was ahead 7-5, but behind 7-8 after six, and tied 9-9 at the end of regulation play. After Grey Moss Inn went scoreless in the top of

It Could Be Warmer Here!

The first week of August has been rainless with an average temperature ranging from the mid 70's to upwards of 98. So far a 100 degree mark has not been reached for 1981.

Rainfall for July goes down here officially as only 1.5 inches, according to Henry Brauche's records, although some spot rains reached 3 inches early in the month.

Mr. Brauchle, longtime

rancher and weather observer, has knowledge of rainfall tallied before the turn of the century by his father, and he reports that Helotes has 37.7 inches so far for the year—well above the annual average. Much of the amount was gathered in June when 16.7 inches fell here, setting an all-time record for one month. Last year had 33 days which reached 99 degrees by August.

Safe Hunting Course Set

The Grey Forest Youth Club will sponsor a Texas Hunter Safety Training Program, Aug. 22 and 29, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. at the Scenic Loop Playground. Paul Bass will be the instructor. Those attending should bring a sack lunch.

The program on Aug. 22 will cover registration, introduction, purpose and goals of firearms, archery, shooting

technique and hunters' responsibility.

The program on Aug. 29 will cover identification of wild life, survival, first aid and a review.

The \$1 registration fee includes a booklet, shoulder patch, and certificate for completion of the course. Certificate cards are awarded to those 12 years old and older. Certificates of attendance are given to those under 12.

Many states, such as Colorado, require proof of this course having been taken before the state will issue a hunting license.

All ages are welcome to take the course, and not only hunters but others who keep guns for protection will benefit from learning about the handling and safety of guns.

Dies At 82

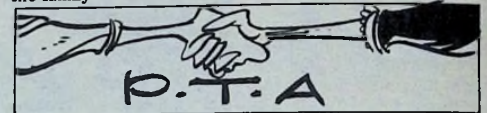

Mike Bonney, captain of the Holmes High School 1981 tennis team, and Scott McKay III, captain of the Roosevelt team, will play tennis with the team at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

Mike was graduated this year from Holmes, where he was a member of the varsity tennis team for four years. He placed third in district singles competition for 1981.

In high school he maintained a B average and was a member of Future Business Leaders of America.

He is the son of Jerry and Pam Bonney of 4909 Hodges Drive.

Scott McKay III, district winner for 1981 tennis singles, has held Texas state rankings since he was 14 years old. He won the 18-year-olds doubles competition in Texas sectionals in

June. He was captain of the Roosevelt tennis team his senior year and was on the varsity team four years. McKay graduated this year from Roosevelt, where he was a member of the National Honor Society and the Spanish Honor Society.

McKay is the son of Scott and Janene McKay of 429 Fenwick.

Shown here are Amalia (Mollie) Benke Gugger and her husband Arnold Gugger who according to family records were married in 1879 and about that time purchased 250 acres from Dr. Marnoch's Ranch where the trail to Bandera was being heavily used, and they operated the first store in downtown Helotes—now the Helotes General Store, the tavern, now the Helotes Beef Barn, the post office in their new home—now the property of Marie Conley, and a blacksmith shop. This is near Floore Country Store. Earlier stagecoach stops were active civic centers as well for a much longer time.

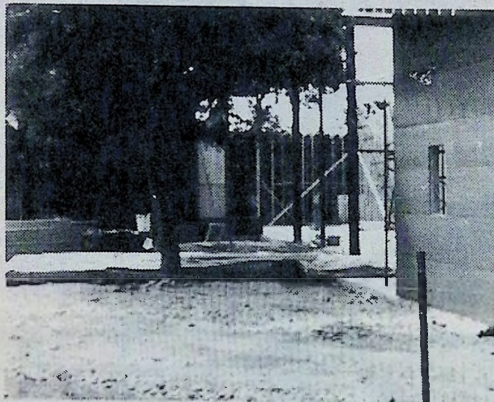

Trinity Plans Varied New

Drama Season

Music, anguish, effrontery and high spirits will engulf the theaters of Trinity University when the speech and drama department presents its 16th season, beginning in October.

Season tickets for the four shows produced in Ruth Taylor Theatre One may be reserved by visiting or calling the theatre box office, 736-8515. Curtain time for productions is 8 p.m., with one 2:30 p.m. Sunday matinee per show.

"Happy End," a musical by Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill, will open the season Oct. 8-11 and 14-17. Set in Chicago on Christmas Eve of 1912, this charming musical comedy pits a group of gangsters against the Salvation Army.

A drama of tense confrontations in the desert Southwest, "When you Comin' Back, Red Ryder?" will be directed by Dr. James Symons, chairman of the speech and drama department, Oct. 29-Nov. 1, and Nov. 4-7. "Red Ryder" is an early play by Mark Medoff, author of "Children of a Lesser God."

Shakespeare's famous line "All the world's a stage..." will issue forth when Diana White directs the pastoral comedy "As You Like It," Nov. 19-22 and 25-28. This high romance will be familiar to theatregoers as the banished Rosaline disguises

herself as a man in order to pursue her father and her beloved Orlando, in the forest haven of Arden.

The awesome, award-winning drama "Whose Life Is It, Anyway?" will be directed by Mary Ann Colias, Feb. 4-7 and 10-13. The protagonist, played on Broadway first by Tom Conte (who won a Tony for best actor in the role), must struggle for control over his life when an accident puts a halt to his vigorous pace.

Continuing a new feature of the Trinity theater season, John Skinner will direct a chamber theater production, Feb. 11-14 and 17-20. This year he tentatively plans to stage two stories by Southern writer Eudora Welty—"Why I Live at the P.O." and "Petrified Man." The first will transport the audience to a back yard in the Deep South; the second to a Mississippi beauty salon, replete with the most injurious sort of gossip.

The final full-length production of the year will be Sophocles' "Electra," directed by Diana White, March 25-28 and March 31-April 3. The Greek tragedy, written in the 5th century B.C., deals with the vengeance of Electra and her brother, Orestes, against their murderous mother, Clytemnestra.

Athletes Get Association

The University of Texas at San Antonio has been named a member of the Association for Intercollegiate Athletics for Women. The university will have women's teams in basketball, tennis, cross country and track.

Head women's basketball coach Ginny DeHaven said UTSA's membership in AIAW is important because AIAW is the only governing body for university women's sports.

The philosophy of AIAW is that women's sports participants are considered both students and athletes. The organization has been in the forefront in the drive to assure equal opportunity for all student athletes, female and male, in collegiate programs though Title IX of the 1972 Education Act amendments.

Before AIAW was founded in 1971, women's intercollegiate national championships were not held. During the organization's first year of existence it held seven open national championships for women. This year AIAW will offer 41 national championships in 19 sports.

Texas Folklife Festival

At the tenth annual Texas Folklife Festival, August 6 through 9, you can take home a lot more than a souvenir, you can take home a skill.

The 15-acre grounds of the University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures in downtown San Antonio becomes a giant, open-air schoolhouse as craftsmen become teachers and visitors, students. Each "class" teaches the how-to's of pioneer living, many with a distinctive ethnic flavor, from making your own lye soap to building a home of

adobe.

Each of the 6000 participants from around the state enjoy the Festival because it is their chance to teach interested visitors about their craft. And many of these skills help save money as well as being enjoyable past-times.

For example, you can save money on food by preparing staples at home. The San Antonio-Houston Loafers will show you how to bake "Depression" bread, made in a coffee can. And while the bread is hot, spread it with

peanut butter or jelly that is all homemade.

O. T. Baker will demonstrate how to smoke meats and sausage at his smokehouse located on the "Back Forty" and Barbara Stall, a German descendent from Cuero will teach pickling and preserving vegetables. Sauerkraut and wine-making will be taught by a group of Germans, noodle-making by the Wends, and tortilla-making in the Mexican Market. Most of the participants have been making their specialites for

as long as they can remember, using methods and recipes passed down through the generations.

Not only can you learn to sew your own clothes and make quilts at the Festival, you can even learn to make your own fabric from the shearing of the sheep, to the spinning of the wool, to the dyeing of the yarn with natural dyes to finally weaving the yarn into fabric on a loom. It may take a while to learn, but it's free and it's fun.

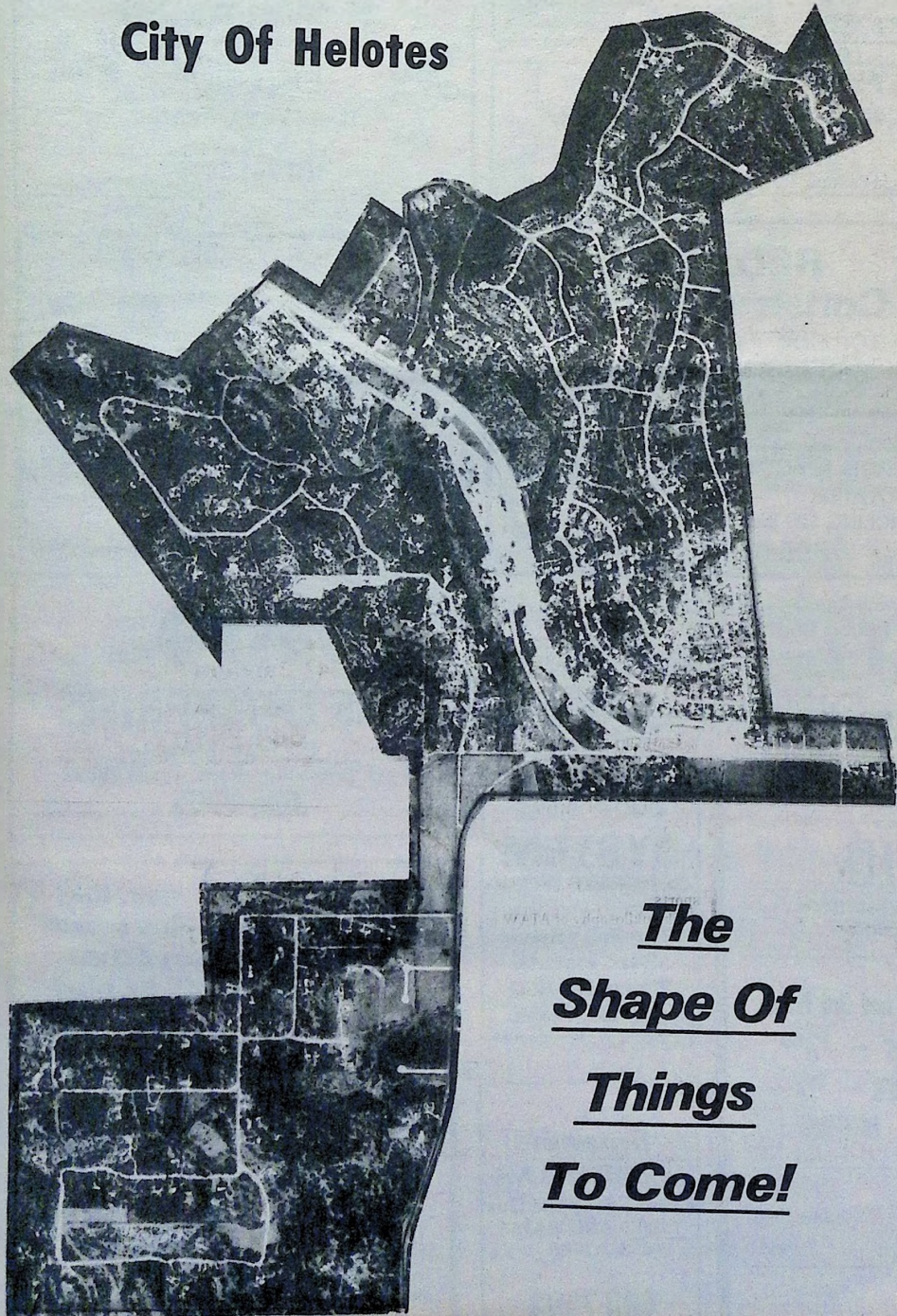
Another useful skill in these days of high-priced housing is the technique of homebuilding. The dog-run, log cabin and the one-room

schoolhouse on The Institute's grounds were built during previous Festivals with the help of visitors. This year, craftsmen will complete the log cabin's kitchen and in the process, demonstrate sawing logs and making mud mortar.

Adobe is another mud based homebuilding material

and visitors can learn to make adobe bricks of clay, straw, manure, sand and gravel. A chimney-maker from Kountze will be constructing chimneys of cypress poles and bluejack Hardin County mud and a participant from Laredo will be teaching the art of roof thatching.

Local Bases Get Millions

Congressman Tom Loeffler has announced that the House Appropriations Committee approved more than \$26.7 million in military construction funds for Air Force and Army components in San Angelo, San Antonio, and Del Rio.

The funds were part of an overall \$6.9 billion military construction package approved by the House committee for fiscal year 1982.

The bases and projects receiving funding approval include \$3.5 million for an unaccompanied enlisted personnel housing facility at Kelly Air Force Base; and \$6.7 million for enlisted housing at Lackland AFB, as well as \$2.2 million for a marksmanship training building.

Brooks AFB won approval

for \$3.1 million for cooling/heating/air-conditioning projects, while Randolph AFB received \$2.3 million for improvements at its Seguin auxiliary field and \$999,000 for data processing improvements.

In addition, the Committee approved \$1.7 million for "composite squad operations" for the Air National Guard at Kelly; \$1.7 million for an aeromedical evacuation training facility for the Air Force Reserve at Kelly and \$2.3 million for a fuel systems maintenance dock.

The Army Reserve in San Antonio received \$1.3 million to upgrade its maintenance shop operations.

New Hours To Sell Cans

Reynolds Aluminum Recycling Company has announced a change in the hours of operation for its San Antonio service center. Effective Aug. 3, the Reynolds recycling service center, located at 267 Old Highway 90 West, is open Tuesday through Saturday from 9:00 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.

Reynolds pays 30 cents per pound for all-aluminum cans and other clean household aluminum products. This price includes the national price of 23 cents per pound plus a 7 cent per pound bonus.

12th Ranch Joins Rodeo

The 50,000-acre Moorhouse Ranch near Benjamin, Texas, is the twelfth and final ranch to enter the Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup, it was announced by Mike McAfee, roundup coordinator and general manager, Falls Distributing.

The Moorhouse will join 11 other legendary Texas ranches at the Roundup Aug. 21-22 in Wichita Falls to determine for the first time ever which of the tremendous spreads owns bragging rights as the best all-around ranch in Texas.

The other participating ranches include the R.A. Brown Ranch, Cowan & Son Circle Bar Ranch, Lewis

Ranches, Pitchfork Land & Cattle Co., Scharbauer Cattle Co., Renderbrook-Spade Ranch, Swenson Ranches, Tongue River Ranch, U Lazy S Ranch, U U Hereford Ranch and W.T. Waggoner Estate, all in North Texas.

Co-sponsored by Budweiser and three Texas charities, the Budweiser Texas Ranch Roundup will pit real working cowboys against each other in a variety of competitive rodeo-style events, including wild cow milking, saddle bronc riding and team branding, among others. Ranches will also compete in a chili-cook-off and talent and ranch queen contests. Country/western dances each evening cap off the day's activities.

Bonus Set For Guard

The Air National Guard has initiated a bonus program to encourage military people who are leaving active duty to join the Guard.

To be eligible, persons must have recently separated or will soon separate from active duty, be eligible for re-enlistment and have an obligation to serve on inactive reserve status. When they join the Air Guard, they must remain in

it for one, three or six years, whichever period includes the balance of their original military service obligation.

Eligible persons may receive their total bonus upon joining the Air Guard if their service obligation is 18 months or less. If it is longer than 18 months, they will receive one half of the bonus after joining and the other half on the fifth anniversary of the date of the beginning of their original service obligation.

Lake Gets First Coach

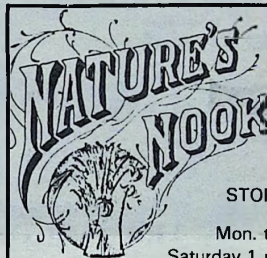
