

Fires Destroy 3 Homes Here



This house on Wagner Road which burned last Friday was in full bloom when the equipment from the volunteer fire department arrived. Although walls collapsed in all except one room, the firefighters prevented spread of flames to nearby structures. Residents here lost all furnishings and practically all clothing. They had purchased the home last year.

Three residential fires in the Helotes area this month which resulted in nearly total loss to the property owners have sparked a drive for better equipment for the volunteer fire departments which serve Helotes and Grey Forest.

A fire spotted about 12:30 a.m. Jan. 2 on the Bandera Road resulted in loss of a newly constructed home which was 90 per cent complete at the time. Cause of the fire has not been determined and arson is being investigated. No one was present inside the home on the occasion.

A fire last week destroyed a home on Farm Road 37 near Bandera road. Damage was extensive.

A fire on the Wagner Road, Jan. 13, which was spotted by



Firefighters from Helotes and Grey Forest answered the call after a child at home at the time reported it to neighbors about 4 p.m., who turned in the alarm. Although it was too late to save the structure due to a stiff breeze which fed the flames, the volunteers were able to prevent additional damage to the area. The fire smouldered for about three hours. Cause of the fire is under investigation.

neighbors about 4 p.m. drew the fire fighting equipment from Grey Forest as well as the Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Department. A child was the only person home at the time of the outbreak, and he was uninjured. Neighbors and firefighters were hampered by a shortage of water in combatting the blaze, one witness reported. 
A 50-cent donation is expected per person for those participating in the games party.

Atty. Gen. John Hill Seeks To Prove Hughes A Texan

AUSTIN — Howard Hughes' death last year left Attorney General John Hill with an unprecedented challenge. In order to reap the largest inheritance tax collection in the State's history,

collection in the State's history, he would have to penetrate one of the modern world's most successful conspiracies of secrecy.

The amount at stake is anywhere from \$25 million to \$150 million in inheritance taxes.

The issue at stake is whether Texas was Hughes' legal residence.

residence.

A jury in Houston has been hearing evidence in the case since early December. Estimates of the

early December. Estimates of the duration of the trial before Probate Judge Pat Gregory range up to several months. The legal manuevering in the courtroom gives little hint of the maze of crisscrossing, disappearing and usually roadblocked trails followed by Hill's staff in 18

months of accumulating evidence for the trial.

"Hughes spent the last 30 years of his life dedicated to obscuring

of his life dedicated to obscuring the footprints a person in his position would normally leave in his business and private activities," Hill said. "When he died, we faced a blank wall." Hill's investigation of the Hughes case began shortly after Hughes died April 5, 1976. Information received by Hill's office indicated Hughes had annually paid his personal income taxes to an IRS office in Texas and had paid poll taxes in Texas while he was living in other states. states

Those reports were quickly confirmed, and Hill placed an assistant on the case full-time. He assistant on the case full-time. He gave notice to Judge Gregory in June 1976 that he would seek to prove Texas was Hughes' legal residence and that Texas' 16 percent inheritance tax could be applied to the Hughes estate.

"Our staff asked themselves the Hughes was where had he

"Our staff asked themselves who Hughes was, where had he gone, and what had he done. Once they answered these questions—and the answers were not always available—they could look at his tax returns, his draft board registration, his passport applications, his pilot's licenses, and his radio licenses from the FCC for evidence of Hughes' bond with Texas. sources mushroomed." Hill said. Despite his staff's success in tying Hughes to Texas through numerous documents, Hill knew his case could be weakened by

numerous documents, Hill knew his case could be weakened by unfavorable testimony from Hughes' former aides. With Nevada's tas laws providing no inheritance tax, it was obvious the Hughes family and aides would prefer a finding that his legal residence was Nevada instead of Texas.

"Hughes had employed dozens of lawyers during the last 30 years to fend off lawsuits. Every lawyer who had ever sued Hughes had come away empty handed because they didn't know enough about Hughes' operations to ask the right questions. We were about to find ourselves in the same boat," Hill said.

However, an unexpected key to the Hughes inner sanctum surfaced shortly after he died. learned that Mexican government officers had raided Hughes' apartment in Acapulco the day he died. They walked in on Hughes' aides busily shredding Hughes' personal papers which had been carted with him for 10 years from California to Boston, Las Vegas, the Bahamas, and finally to Mexico.

The Mexicans allowed the IRS to microfilm the 10,000 documents confiscated in the Hughes raid, contiscated in the Highes raid, and Hill turned to the IRS for access. With the help of U. S. Treasuury Secretary William Simon, the IRS's reluctance was overcome in December 1976 after months of touch-and-go

"If Howard Hughes were alive

today, it is clear that that if he were asked 'What is your legal residence?' he would answer

'Houston, Texas.' That's where he was born and raised, that's where he made his fortune, that's where he paid his federal taxes, that's where he registered for the draft, and that's where he died and is buried. He made movies in California he bought hatels in California, he bought hotels in Las Vegas, and he lived in a number of different places, but Texas was always his legal residence," Hill said.

Though he admits he always has been interested in art, Kazuya Sakai never thought he'd

become a painter.
Today his works are included in

Today his works are included in many United States private collections, and as a visiting professor at UTSA he teaches painting and art history.
His silk screen prints (his latest interest) will be displayed through Jan 27 in the UTSA Arts

Sakai joined UTSA in the fall after serving as the Tinker Foundation artist-in-residence at UT Austin. He taught painting and lectured on Latin American

An Argentine of Japanese descent, Sakai characterizes himself as a twentieth century painter. He describes his acrylic paintings as abstract and geometric.

paintings as abstract and geometric.

"I'm not conscious of an oriental influence in my work," said the Japan-educated artist, "but many peopie say elements of my pieces reflect that influence."

Sakai said that in his works he tries to take into account the values of traditional Japanese and contemporary painting.
"Though I'm not consciously trying to combine the traditional and the new," he explained, "I think my works, though contemporary, express the feeling of our time and reflect my cultural background"

Sakai, whose career has taken him throughout the United States, Mexico and Argentina, has written and published on Latin American art and artists. He also was one of the forerunners in the field of Japanology in Latin America and has translated field of Japanology in Latin America and has translated books on Japanese literature and

books on Japanese literature and art. He also has translated and studied oriental philosophy, mainly Zen Buddhism.

While in Mexico City Sakai was editor-in-chief of the literary magazine, "Plural." He now is a member of the board of directors of "Vuelta" magazine.

In addition he has a radio program on jazz which he tapes and sends to Mexico City. The program is aired weekly on a public hroadcasting station.



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
