Cornyval '83 Ready To Sparkle April 27-May 1

Plans for Cornyval '83, to be held April 27 to May 1, are complete and this year's celebration—the 18th annual—should be better than ever, said the association president, Jim Benke, this week.

The opening event will be the Miss Helotes competition and coronation on Wednesday, April 27, in the Community Activity Center of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church. Admission will be \$1

for adults and children 12 and over. Children under 12 will be admitted free.

Free street dances will be held Friday and Saturday nights and Sunday afternoon. The Cornyval Parade will begin to roll at 11 a.m. on Saturday, April 30, along Bandera Road from Loop 1604 to Scenic Loop Road.

The Astro carnival will be set up next to the Helotes Inn on Thursday and continue through Sunday. Food and games booths will be in operation from Friday night through Sunday.

Numerous special events have been scheduled for Saturday and Sunday, including performances by the Bexar County Gunslingers, Indian dancers and Die Deutschen Adler German Band. The Heiotes Art Guild will have an outdoor show on the Helotes Inn patio.

All Council Members Win Again

The new Helotes mayor, Frank Thompson, will be sworn in at a special city council meeting Friday night at 7 p.m. at the PARC Building.

Thompson defeated the incumbent mayor, Tom Beatty, in the city election held Saturday, April 2. Thompson received 251 votes (or 54%) to Beatty's 213 (or 46%).

Also to be sworn in Friday night are the five councilmen, who were all reelected. Only two had opponents. They were Reudy Loeffler, who defeated Phil Pittman, Jr., by 297 votes to 152, and Pat Wootton, who defeated Pete Cantu, 278 to 175. The other three incumbents, Guy Burnett, Leonard Hill and Verna Thompson, had no opposition.

Mayor Pro Tem Guy Burnett will preside during the first part of the meeting when the council canvasses the votes and certifies the election. Then Thompson will be sworn in and take the mayor's chair.

The new Municipal Court judge, Barbara Galland, who has yet to preside at a court session, also has to be reappointed and sworn in again, since the Helotes judge's term runs concurrently with the mayor's. With Beatty's defeat her "term" ended. Judge Galland will hold the first session of the Helotes Municipal Court on April 12.

GREY FOREST

Precinct 2 Justice of Peace Larry Noll on Tuesday April 5 administered the oath of office to the three incumbents of the Grey Forest City Council who were returned to office in uncontested races April 2 to serve two-year terms. As was expected, a low voter turnout provided no write-in opposition.

Mayor Manuel Vara presided as Gil Smith, Jeanine Normand, and Margaret Sassaman were sworn in. A regular session followed.



FEVER BLISTERS-A FORM OF HERPES

This single word-herpes-is becoming one of the most misunderstood in our language. It is a cause for alarm to some people, while others minimize or ignore the potential of a herpes infection.

First, there are several kinds of herpes infections. Besides the common fever blister or cold sore and the much-publicized genital herpes, there is herpes zoster, the well-known "shingles." A herpes peculiar to the eye bears the ponderous title of herpetic keratonconjunc-

Newborn infants can develop a very serious herpes infection. There's even a herpes meningitis. So herpes can range all the way from a mild nuisance to a social problem and on to a fatal disorder, depending upon which type is encountered.

The herpes simplex virus, closely related to the chicken pox virus, has two separate strains commonly referred to as HSV-1 and HSV-2. Type 1 is the cause of fever blisters and also of the eye problems. HSV-2 is usually genital and is transmitted by direct contact with lesions. Once established, either virus remains dormant in the skin or in nerve roots until reactivated. Recurrences can be precipitated by high fever, over-exposure to sunlight, physical exhaustion, or by emotional stress. Certain foods and drugs seem to be responsible for some outbreaks. Exactly what triggers a relapse is most often unknown

The common fever blister is an HSV-1 infection. The sufferer experiences a short period of tingling or itching in the lips and then small tense blisters appear on a reddened base. These may join to form a single ulcer which then begins to dry and form a crust. Healing usually begins a week or so after onset and is complete in about three weeks. Recurrences at varying intervals may take place for many years or even decades., These can be reduced in frequency by using a sun screen lotion or cream before and during sun exposure. A lot of other things have been tried such as megadoses of vitamin C and other vitamins, lysine tablets and topical application. However, none of these have provided consistent

The only effective treatment now available consists of Zovirax, an ointment. It's expensive, running \$18 to \$25 for a one-half ounce tube, but it's good for a hundred or more applications. The generic name is acyclovir but it is so new it can't be purchased on the generic drug market. This is the best thing that has ever come along for the fever blister patient. While it is not a cure-recurrences are going to take place just like they always have—the amount of pain, disfigurement and duration of

How does one get oral herpes? The primary HSV-1 is seen from infancy on up, presumably due to contact with an adult having a fever blister. Once established, the recurrence rate is up to the individual Perhaps surprisingly, most people don't get fever blisters at all; this is due to individual immunity. Simply, some folks are susceptible but most are not. At any rate, anybody with a fever blister would be well advised to avoid kissing a



Texas Relays In Austin Draw UTSA Track Men

Several key members of the UT San Antonio track team will be in Austin this weekend for the running of the Texas Relays, April 8-9 (Friday and Saturday) at Memorial Stadium.

Entered in the meet are Roger Soler, who is running in the prestigious Jerry Thompson mile run. Also, Tomm Wisloff is entered in the long jump, Bill Bochat in the 400 meter hurdles and the UTSA sprint medley relay team of Tomm Wisloff, Mike LaBay, Danny Spivey and Andrew Johnson will be running. John Quinlan is the alternate on the relay.

Soler, a UTSA junior who is redshirting from intercollegiate competition this spring, will run in the Jerry Thompson mile, along with other runners from club teams across the country. Soler recently won the Capitol 10,000 in Austin, finishing ahead of some 20,000 runners. To qualify for the Thompson Mile, runners had to have a qualifying time of 4:05 in the mile.

The Texas Relays has attracted a field of some 1,750 runners representing 175 schools in seven different divisions.

\$400,000 Purse For Del Rio Run

A total purse of more than \$400,000 will be at stake at Val Verde Downs in Del Rio during the April 10 running of the Graham Farms Futurity, now the richest non-parimutuel race in the country.



State To Build New South Campus Entry

Work has begun on improvements to UTSA Boulevard—Spur 53.

The project will construct a four-lane roadway from the south campus of the University of Texas at San Antonio to Interstate Highway 10. From I-10 to Leon Creek it will be built on new location providing a direct connection to the Hausman Road bridge. A high water bridge will be built across Leon Creek.

The project will provide safer, more direct access for UTSA students, faculty and area residents. Completion of the new spur is expected by November 1983. Cost is \$769.000.

300 Take Tours Of Northside Schools

When the buses pulled up in front of schools recently, those passengers were not school children. They were parents, friends, neighbors, realtors, college students, community leaders and media representatives. For four days during Texas Public Schools Week, March 7-11, Northside School District welcomed nearly 300 visitors on guided bus tours of schools.

Visitors were picked up at the Northside Stadium, where they left their cars and boarded buses to take them to at least one elementary, one middle school, one high school and a special education school. Guides aboard the buses used portable loud speakers to tell about the district while enroute to schools.

At each school, administrator-guides gave general information about their schools and elaborated about special programs available at a particular grade level. Special facilities also were toured, including the Aquatic Center, which features an olympic-size, solar-heated pool where third graders are "drown-proofed" in special swim classes.

Visitors were especially impressed by the extensive computer education classes at all grade levels, vocational "shops" like cosmetology

and diesel mechanics, and middle school food service programs whose classrooms resemble restaurant dining rooms

They saw reading teachers huddled with elementary school children reading a story and children making POSITIVELY NORTHSIDE posters. POSITIVELY NOR-THSIDE is a District-wide vandalism prevention project. They saw handicapped children in wheelchairs mainstreamed with nonhandicapped children, and they saw high school cafeterias in action as cooks served more than 1,000 meals at lunchtime.

And they saw basic instruction going on--reading, writing, spelling, math. They saw physical education students learning rules in a classroom and learning sportsmanship on the field or in the gym.

The last stop on the tours was a foods service class whose students had prepared a 3-course meal for visitors. The last hour of the tour gives the visitors a chance to relax and think about what they have been observing. They filled out a report card to tell what they were most surprised to learn about and the most interesting Cing they saw. Those answers ranged from learning about marine biology classes and elementary gifted and talented pro-

grams to middle school string classes and high school print shops. They also have the opportunity to write in suggestions on how to make a good school system even better.

According to the responses, 100% of the people indicated the tours are well worth the time off from work, are useful and informative, and believe that tours should continue every year. Some indicated that tours should be offered more than once a year.

"It's a two-way avenue of learning," said Supt. Jack Jordan. "We find out what people are thinking about, what their concerns are about education, and they find out all the good things that are happening in the schools in the '80's."





Home Buyers Find New Types of Mortgages

There's good news for home buyers who have been waiting out the slump in housing to purchase or refinance a home. Lower interest rates have breathed life into a market that had seen little movement in three years.

But buyers will find the market a little different from the one they were used to, says the National Association of Home Builders. The traditional 30-year, fixed-rate loan that housed four generations of Americans is still there to be sure, but it has been joined by a number of alternatives.

These loans answer to any number of names, but whatever the label, they usually boil down to one of the types discussed below

'Adjustable Rate Mortgage' (ARM): Also called a variable rate mortgage or a rollover mortgage, an ARM is usually a 30-year loan with an interest rate that rises or falls at regular intervals along with rates in the money markets. This loan was intended to shift some of the risk involved with long-term loans from the lender to the

The interest rate on an ARM may be adjusted at intervals ranging anywhere from six months to five years. Currently the most popular plan calls for changes in the interest rate and monthly payments every five years based on the going rate for 5-year Treasury

These loans may carry an interest rate as much as one or two percentage points below the interest rate on a 30-year mortgage. The decision as to which is the better deal depends on the buyer's circumstances.

A young buyer just starting out or a buyer on a fixed income might be willing to accept a higher interest rate in exchange for certainty of monthly payments down the road. Someone who has a solid financial foundation or someone who moves every few years might be willing to take a chance on higher interest rates in the future in exchange for lower rates

For buyers in the upper end of the market - those who will need a loan that exceeds \$108,300 - an adjustable rate mortgage may be easier to obtain. This is because lenders find it more difficult to sell these larger loans and must, therefore, hold them in their portfolios.

Graduated Payment Mortgages' (GPM): A GPM is a

fixed interest rate mortgage that allows buyers to gualify for a mortgage with a lower income by providing lower monthly payments in the early years of the loan. The lower payments are possible because a part of the interest is deferred until later years.

The most popular plan calls for monthly payments to increase at a rate of 712 percent each year for the first five years. Thereafter, payments remain fixed for the life of the loan. Both FHA and VA offer graduated payment plans. Because GPMs involve deferred interest, the buyer will ultimately pay more for the loan, but the lower initial payments allow many young buyers to own homes earlier than they could otherwise.

'15-Year Fixed-Rate Mortgage:' Few among today's home buyers remember, but the 30-year loan is a fairly recent development. In the days' when mortgages typically ran for 15 or 20 years and mortgage interest rates were 4, 412 or 5 percent, the housing industry pushed for longer loan maturities to help more buyers qualify for loans. But as interest rates rise the advantage of stret-

ching out payments diminishes. For instance. with a 15-year loan, the monthly payments on a \$50,000 mortgage with a 13.5 percent interest rate are \$649. This is only \$77 more than the \$572 monthly payments required for a 30-year loan at the same rate

With the 15-year loan, the buyer accumulates equity in home at a much more rapid clip and total interest payments over the life of the loan are much lower. The buyer should keep in mind, however, that because the interest portion of payments is lower, tax deductions will also be lower

'Graduated Payment Adjustable Rate Mortgage (GPARM): The GPARM is a hybrid combining the features of the Graduated Payment Mortgage and the Adjustable Rate Mortgage. As with the GPM Payments start out at a lower level and increase gradually for a number of years. The dif-ference is that the interest rate will be adjusted periodically, usually every three or five years. With that the buyer is faced with an adjustment in the interest rate. In some cases, the buyer has

the option of extending the graduated payments coincide with an increase in the interest rate. These loans may involve a slightly higher interest rate.

'Land Leases:' Another method used to make homeownership more affordable in the early years of the loan is to buy the home and lease the lot it is sitting on. At present this type of financing is only available in a few areas of the country. Land leases usually require a lower down payment since only the home and not the land is financed. Generally land leases run for a longer term than the mortgage, and in most cases the homeowner will have the option of buying the land after a certain initial period. One point to

remember, since the rental payment involves no interest.

it is not tax deductible.
'Buydowns:' Mo Monthly payments may also be reduced by the use of a buydown an upfront payment of part of the interest on the loan. This payment may be made by the builder or seller of the home. by the buyer, or by a parent or employer. One of the most common types of buydown is one that reduced the monthly payments by 3 percentage points the first year, 2 points the second year and 1 point the third.

'Balloon Mortgages:' Balloon Mortgages are shortterm loans, usually on the order of three to five years. Monthly payments are usually comparable to those for a 25 to 30-year loan.




