### Rains in May Above Average

### Ordinance On Zoning Postponed

The public is invited to attend the next regular meeting of the Helotes City Council at PARC Building set for Thursday, June 10, at 7 p.m., Mayor Tom Beatty said at Thursday's meeting. Legal Counsel for the City Council of Helotes will be invited also to explain the procedure for establishing a Municipal Court to prosecute violators of the local ordinances. Regulations are set up for general law cities in Texas—the classification applying to incorporated Helotes—by the State Legislature. Larger cities often operate under special charters, which is confusing to the average person in moving to smaller cities.

At the June 3 meeting, the City Council passed an ordinance allowing the Mayor and Councilmen to borrow \$250,000 from University National Bank to be held in a Certificate of Deposit. The borrowing rate of interest will be 10 percent and the money will be loaned out at 13 percent, it was explained. The principal can only be used for repaying the Certificate of Deposit, which will engender 3 percent revenue to be used by the City of Helotes, according to information presented at two Council meetings. FDIC will insure \$100,000 against loss.

Planning and Zoning restrictions were also discussed. One citizen explained that her property in downtown Helotes next to a possible B-3 zoned business has been a real estate office for more than 30 years and she requested a business zoning.

Discussion of Riggs Road zoning came in for attention with pros and cons of usage debated by the citizens. No action on this was taken.

About 20 citizens and interested persons attended with all council members present.

## Vitamins Can Be Poisonous

Some vitamins can be poisonous if consumed in large amounts, says Dr. Cass Ryan-Crowe, a food and nutrition specialist on the home economics staff of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas

A&M University System.

Fat-soluble vitamins are of particular concern because these nutrients are stored in the body when excess amounts are ingested, the specialist explains.

Therefore, if a megadose, or an amount several times the recommended daily allowance, is taken over a long period of time, toxic side effects may show up, she warns.

## Program To Aid Businesses

Business Executives and professionals looking for specific answers to their organizational problems can now turn to the University of Texas at San Antonio.

Dr. James Wagener, president of the university, recently announced the creation of the Executive and Professional Development Program in the College of Business aimed at assisting upper levels of organizational management. This new program will be under the direction of Dr. William Mitchell, associate professor of marketing at UTSA.

Dr. Mitchell has been active in management training and consulting work for a number of local and national businesses. Prior to joining UTSA in 1976, he was employed with Carson Pirie Scott and Co., the Chicago based retail department store, as the senior vice president for administration.

Dr. Mitchell believes San Antonio has a definite need for the kind of professional programs being planned at the university. Utilizing the wide areas of expertise available among the faculty in the College of Business, programs will be designed and presented that focus on the knowledge, skills, processes and tasks essential for achieving organizational excellence and high levels of performance in the years ahead.

"We can help organizations identify gaps in their executive development

efforts and design programs to meet changing organizational needs," Dr. Mitchell said. "We can help translate theories into strategies for executives and professionals."

Dr. Mitchell noted the thrust of executive and professional development is long range planning.

"You should always be two to five years ahead in developing people," he said. "If you don't have people in-house now, you'll have no one to fill upper management positions next year or the year after and will miss growth opportunities as a result."

Dr. Mitchell said many people in organizations today are to some extent limited by functional perspective or orientation.

"They are engineers,

accountants and marketing people," he said. "But as they grow in the organization they have to think of the general management view and less of their own specialty."

He plans to develop programs to help these functional managers better understand the roles and responsibilities of the general manager. He believes the Executive and Professional Development Program will be an important addition to the UTSA College of Business as well.

"We feel this program will be an important bridge for our faculty to meet and work with practitioners in the community," Dr. Mitchell said. "We want to help organizations help themselves in an increasingly competitive market place."

He said he expects to see the program begin the mid-summer and be in full swing in the fall. For more information call Dr. Mitchell, 691-4317.

### TEEX rescue course booked into 1984

**COLLEGE STATION**—Industrial accidents can happen at even the safest plants, and rescue teams may only get one chance to do their job right in a life-or-death situation.

That's why more companies are sending employees to the Texas Engineering Extension Service's week-long industrial rescue course to receive training in first-aid and removing unconscious victims from buildings and steel tanks.

Classes are taught at Brayton Fireman Training Field, a 60-acre facility located southwest of the main Texas A&M University campus.

The rescue course, taught more than a dozen times a year, is already scheduled into 1984, said John Hubacek, a rescue training specialist.

## Gill Opens Helotes Branch

## Wildfires Cause Great Damage

In 1980, 155,659 wildfires burned over three million acres in the United States Department of Agriculture Forest Service has announced. Ninety-two percent of those fires were caused by people: unattended brush fires, arson, camp fires, flicked cigarette butts, debris burning, playing with matches, and accidents.

What else causes forest fires other than man? Only lightning.

Forest fires cost the American people close to \$400 million last year, in direct-costs alone. Destruction of property, environmental damage, recreation values lost, and wasted forest resources surely increased the toll to half a billion dollars.

Fighting forest fires requires massive support activities such as radio

communications, logistics, air and ground transportation and other physical aids. A large fire may require 3,000 to 5,000 firefighters over 2 or 3 days. More important yet is the prompt rehabilitation work required to protect fire-damaged areas against soil erosion, so they will regreen as soon as possible.

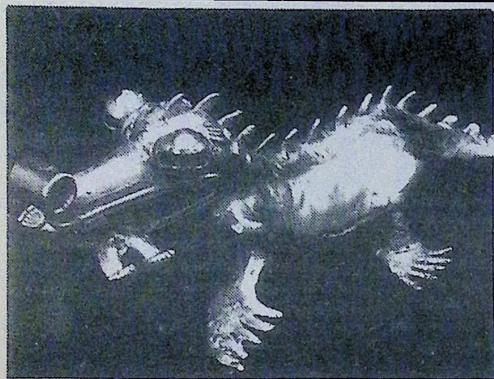

## Gill Shows Profit

The Safety Fair will focus on on-the-job and home safety techniques and a special presentation will be the proper use of fire extinguishers, conducted by the San Antonio Fire Department.

"The Fair will help increase everyone's awareness of the safety precautions which must be taken whether we're at home, at work or on the road," says Mary Faye Yarbrough, Mental Health Clinic Supervisor at the Brady/Green and program coordinator.

Projects on display will include posters, displays and demonstrations featuring health and safety tips from 25 departments at the Brady/Green, including safety devices in the home for the handicapped, child safety and how to properly store flammable liquids.

Other areas to be presented include how to select children's toys from a safety standpoint, child proofing the home and a display on fetal alcohol syndrome.

## Reports from Washington

The Administration's decision to begin negotiations on strategic arms reductions is a crucial element in the nation's comprehensive policy framework for arms control.

In November, the United States launched an entirely new area of arms control involving intermediate-range nuclear forces. More recently, our nation began to participate in efforts within the 40-member U.N. Committee on Disarmament to elaborate a total ban on chemical weapons. We are also engaged in discussions in that forum on nuclear testing. In Vienna, negotiations on reductions in conventional forces in Europe are underway. In the coming months, meeting in Geneva, the United States will renew efforts to make progress there. Those talks will likely be announced in the next several weeks.

Each of these negotiations is important in its own right. Together they present an opportunity to strengthen deterrence and to reduce the risk of war at all levels. But it is important to remember that arms control is a means to an end, not an end in itself.

Our objective is to sustain our national security in a changing international environment and in the face of an expanding Soviet force. Arms control can play a very important part in strengthening our security and restraining the growth of Soviet power through mutually beneficial agreements. But arms control can succeed in this task only if it is coordinated in a strategy that employs the other diplomatic, political and economic assets at our disposal. This means that, among other things, we must demonstrate our will and capacity to maintain military balance. It means that we should consult closely with our allies. And it also means that we should seek balanced, equal, and verifiable agreements that reduce the risk of war by reinforcing deterrence.

To meet our objectives, the United States seeks to achieve significant reductions in the most destabilizing nuclear systems, especially intercontinental ballistic missiles, thereby strengthening deterrence and stability both for ourselves and for our allies and friends. To achieve this, our negotiators will propose a practical plan for phased reductions of strategic weapons by numbers, warheads and destructive potential.

In Geneva, the United States will propose that at the end of the first stage of the strategic arms reductions, ballistic missile warheads be reduced to equal levels at least one third below current numbers and no more than half will be deployed on land-based missiles. We will also insist on verification procedures to insure compliance with any agreement.

These proposals represent a very serious and determined undertaking. The sheer physical task of reducing U.S. and Soviet strategic forces and reshaping them to enhance stability will undoubtedly take years of concentrated effort. It is possible, however, that the United States and the Soviet Union together can remove the instabilities that now exist and reduce nuclear forces on both sides significantly.

Our ability to achieve these goals depends on the Soviets' willingness to negotiate. If we fail to adopt the President's military modernization program, we will reduce the chances of reaching an arms control agreement on strategic forces. Also, the need to maintain the Soviet incentive to negotiate reductions in destabilizing systems would be undercut by endorsement of many of the nuclear freeze proposals before us.

The discussions and debates on nuclear policy in the Congress and the country reflect both public concern and our capacity as a democracy to address the great issues of the day. The incentives for real arms control exist and we have both the means and the duty to supply them. Above all, we must remember that our national security is based on the unalterable principle of peace through strength.

## To Get A Job, Be Positive, Communicate

A positive attitude ranks highest of all the attributes employers look for in selecting employees, a St. Mary's University researcher says.

Next most important to employers is an applicant's ability to communicate, both orally and in writing, Dr. Edward P. Shaw found in a survey of 66 San Antonio firms.

Disposition and personality are also high on the list of attributes employers consider when hiring personnel, Shaw's study found.

He says that less important to employers are the prestige of schools applicants have attended, their social and economic background, and their recommendations.

"This group of attributes was given more or less neutral responses with rating in the middle ranges—neither very high nor very low," Shaw said.

Items employers ranked the lowest of three groups were academic achievement, skills required on the job, poise, social graces, appearance, physical health and social orientation.

"I should point out that these attributes are not unimportant to employers," Shaw said.

"The items were simply rated lower than those in the first two groups, probably because employers take them for granted in applicants."

Shaw's study showed that employers consider the personal interview to be twice as valuable as written resumes in evaluating an applicant.

"This reinforces the significance that employers seem to place on an applicant's ability to communicate," Shaw said.

"The personal interview is clearly nothing more than an exercise in oral communication as well as exhibition of

certain personality characteristics."

Shaw found that college students' ideas of what employers want in employees mostly coincide with employers' views.

Variations were that students at four-year academic universities ranked oral skills above attitude, and vocational college students rated skills required on the job higher than employers did.

"Not surprisingly students from the trade and technical school programs rated job skills as the highest factor," Shaw said.

"Though employers and university students rated job skills as 'important,' they did not place them at the top of the list, perhaps taking into the account that on-the-job training would be provided for college graduates at the job-entry level."

The students in the survey comprised 65 percent business majors, 15 percent other college majors, and 20 percent community college vocational students.

Employers surveyed included local and national firms ranging from construction to financial enterprises. Their labor forces ranged from under 500 employees to more than 5,000.

Shaw believes one of the main lessons to be learned from his study is that interpersonal relationships seem to be as significant to employers as technical or professional skills.

"This finding implies," he says, "that colleges and universities probably should take on the task of informing students of their responsibility to develop interpersonal skills such as effective oral and written communication and a positive attitude toward their work."

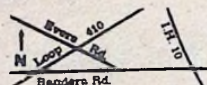

National Flag Day, June 14, which concludes Fraternal Week, is a day when

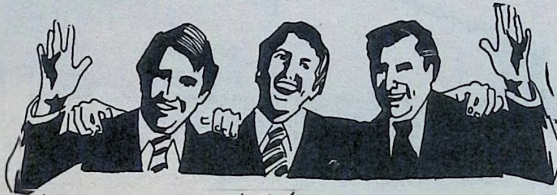
fraternal benefit societies throughout the nation encourage their members to display "Old Glory" and plan special observances of the birthday of our nation's flag 205 years ago.

## Child Abuse Week Set

Child abuse is quickly becoming a national tragedy.

Over one and one-half million children are abused in the United States each year leaving behind not only crippling physical injuries but devastating psychological and emotional scars as well.

To help combat the effects of abuse and neglect, the Bexar County Hospital District has joined several other local organizations as Wellness Resource Participants during Child Abuse Prevention and Awareness Week, June 6-11.

Physicians including Dr. Valerie Ostrower, Pediatrics at the Brady/Green Community Health Center and Dr. Paul Weinberg, Family Practice and Obstetrics/Gynecology at the Brady/Green, are acting as contact persons to provide information to the public, media and medical agencies.

In giving her medical perspective of child abuse, Dr. Ostrower says that physicians must suspect child abuse in order to detect the cause of injuries.

"The physician must establish a mental attitude that any child may be a victim," she added.

The spectrum of child abuse and neglect is broad, says Dr. Ostrower.

"The abuse may be in the form of physical abuse, physical neglect, sexual abuse or emotional and

psychological abuse," she stated.

Besides offering its full complement of medical facilities to combat child abuse, the Bexar County Hospital District also has a Child Protection Team which meets approximately once a week to review suspected cases.

On the team are physicians, nurses, a social worker and a member of the Texas Department of Human Resources, as well as supporting departments and services when necessary.

The BCHD Social Work Department also helps in providing counseling to the parents of suspected abused child.

All child abuse cases in the BCHD are documented for possible court action through medical records kept by physicians, nurses, and social workers and through photographic evidence obtained by the Department of Community Relations.

# Kazen In Washington

By Abraham (Chick) Kazen, Jr.

Like most of us, I often complain that we have enough laws and that we should spend more time getting rid of some of those we have instead of passing new ones. I have also been known to complain about the red tape that works to separate the people from their own government.

The along comes a situation like that of our South Texas River Riders, a classic example of government working the way it should, and I remind myself that for all its flaws, our system is the best in the world has seen or is likely to see for a long time.

In this case, I was proud to play a role in the process, although it began-- as it should-- at the local level.

## THE PROCESS WORKS

My concern was that people from other areas of the country might not appreciate the hardships and dangers faced by the River Riders, but from the beginning my bill to authorize weapons for them was met with support from all sides. This was due in large part to the inspectors themselves, who came to Washington and testified in plain Texas language that they needed support from the federal government.

As I said in my own testimony, these men are law enforcement officers who work for alone in a harsh, dangerous environment, and they must have means to protect themselves. The House Agriculture Committee was in total agreement and the Administration, after clearing up a few technicalities, threw its support behind my bill.

Last week, in a proud day

for all of us, the House of Representatives approved my legislation, H. R. 2035. The next step is in the Senate, where Senator Lloyd Bentsen has agreed to handle the legislation.

## LAW NEEDED

It is my hope that the Senate will act promptly and send the bill to the President for his signature. As a bonus, the Agriculture Committee has asked the Department of Agriculture to provide the inspectors with two-way radios, another obvious need for these men who are often far from assistance.

The need for legislation has existed for a long time and I know of little or no opposition, but red tape had interfered until the River Riders decided to use our system of government. As you know, the system sometimes breaks down and occasionally churns out laws we don't want, but as we see here it can also be used for improvements.

I'm not giving up on it until something better comes along.

## THE REAL COWBOYS

Few people in the country even knew that the Department of Agriculture employs a hundred or so men to patrol the Rio Grande River to guard against the outbreak of tick fever in our cattle industry. Although an outbreak in Texas and the southern states might mean damages of \$1 billion in lost cattle, the inspectors on horseback went about their jobs with little fanfare. They told us they enjoyed cowboy-ing along the river, for the most part.

The exception to their enjoyment was the increasing amount of gunfire in their direction, and the knowledge that the border has been made dangerous by drug

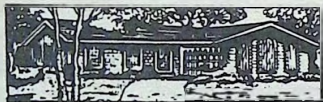
