Incorporation Hearing Set For May 21

Helotes Bill Advances To Texas House

A bill to permit Helotes to incorporate without permission of San Antonio, in whose extrajurisdiction the Helotes area now lies, was reported favorably out of the intergovernmental affairs committee of the Texas House of Representatives Wednesday.

After a brief hearing the bill was sent to the full House with a recommendation that it pass.

The bill, introduced by Rep. Don Rains last January, had not been acted upon while Helotes negotiated with the City of San Antonio for permission to call an incorporation election.

The San Antonio city council countered Thursday with a motion to start the annexation procedure for Helotes. The motion set a public hearing for May 21 on possible annexation. The council believes this will give it jurisdiction over the question regardless of whether the bill in the Texas Legislature passes or not.

The bill must be passed by the full House and then by the Texas Senate.

A spokesman for Helotes pointed out that no living person can remember when Helotes was not considered a town in Bexar County with a history of frontier living before more western areas of the state were settled. The identity of Helotes sets it apart from commercially developed growth, and its fight for continued independence is a test case for historical towns of the state.

Oil Wells Worry Board

At a meeting in San Antonio on May 12, directors of the five-county Edwards Underground Water District will consider a resolution requesting that the Texas Railroad Commission require surface casing or a superior, approved method for all oil and gas wells drilled over the aquifer to protect ground water quality and urging that no exceptions to RRC rules be granted in the area of the Edwards Aquifer.

The agenda, also will include staff presentations concerning activities dealing with water conservation.

UTSA Field Course Set

The UTSA Division of Social Sciences will offer an archaeological field course during the first summer session, June 1-July 3.

Open to both graduate and undergraduate students, the course will provide training in a variety of archaeological techniques, including excavation, site survey methods, topographic mapping, data recording and laboratory analysis.

To be investigated are sites 80 miles south of San Antonio. The stratified Late Prehistoric and Late Archaic open occupation site near the Frio River and the town of Three Rivers lies within

the basin of the Choke Canyon Reservoir and will eventually be inundated by the waters of the reservoir. UTSA has conducted a research program in the area for the Water and Power Resources Service since 1977 and will continue through 1984.

The cost of the course will include UTSA tuition and fees for the first summer session.

Deadline for applications is April 25. Application forms may be requested from the director of the field course, Dr. Thomas R. Hester, at the Center for Archaeological Research, UTSA, San Antonio 78285.

May 19 Is Voting Date On Bonds

Helotes School will be one of seven polling places for Northside District's \$48½-million bond issue election to be held Tuesday, May 19.

Voters in Bexar County Precincts 244, 245 and 246, Medina County Precinct 5 and Bandera County Precinct 2 will vote at Helotes School. Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Other district voting places will be Northside Opportunity Center (former Locke Hill School) Mackey Elementary (former Leon Valley School), Pat Neff Middle School, Colonies North School, Sul Ross Middle School and John Jay High School.

Absentee voting is now underway and will continue through May 15 at Northside District's central office, 5900 Evers Road.

The Northside District board of trustees recently unanimously accepted proposals by a 14-member Citizens Bond Advisory Committee to call the bond election.

The single question on the May 19 ballot authorizes the district to issue the bonds to build four new schools and renovate existing ones during the next four years.

The need for the new schools and the renovations is said to be a direct result of the wave of commercial and residential development sweeping Northwest Bexar County. Northside District, with 34,000 students, is the fastest growing school district in Bexar County.

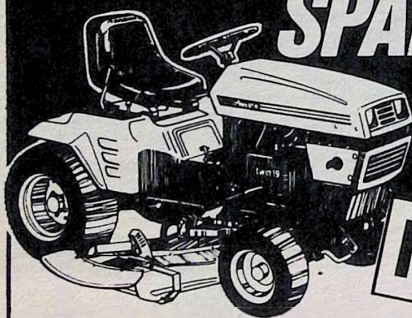

Well Levels Rise Slightly

Water well levels throughout most of the Edwards Underground Water District showed a slight increase at the end of March, the EUWD general manager, Tom Fox, has announced.

The district's index well at Kyle in Hays County was down one-tenth of a foot from February's reading, and San Marcos Springs declined 6.3 cubic feet per second to a flow of 130.1 cfs. But other index wells were up, and Comal Springs in New Braunfels increased 8.0 cfs to a flow of 294 cfs.

The longterm average flow at New Braunfels is 285 cfs and at San Marcos 166 cfs.

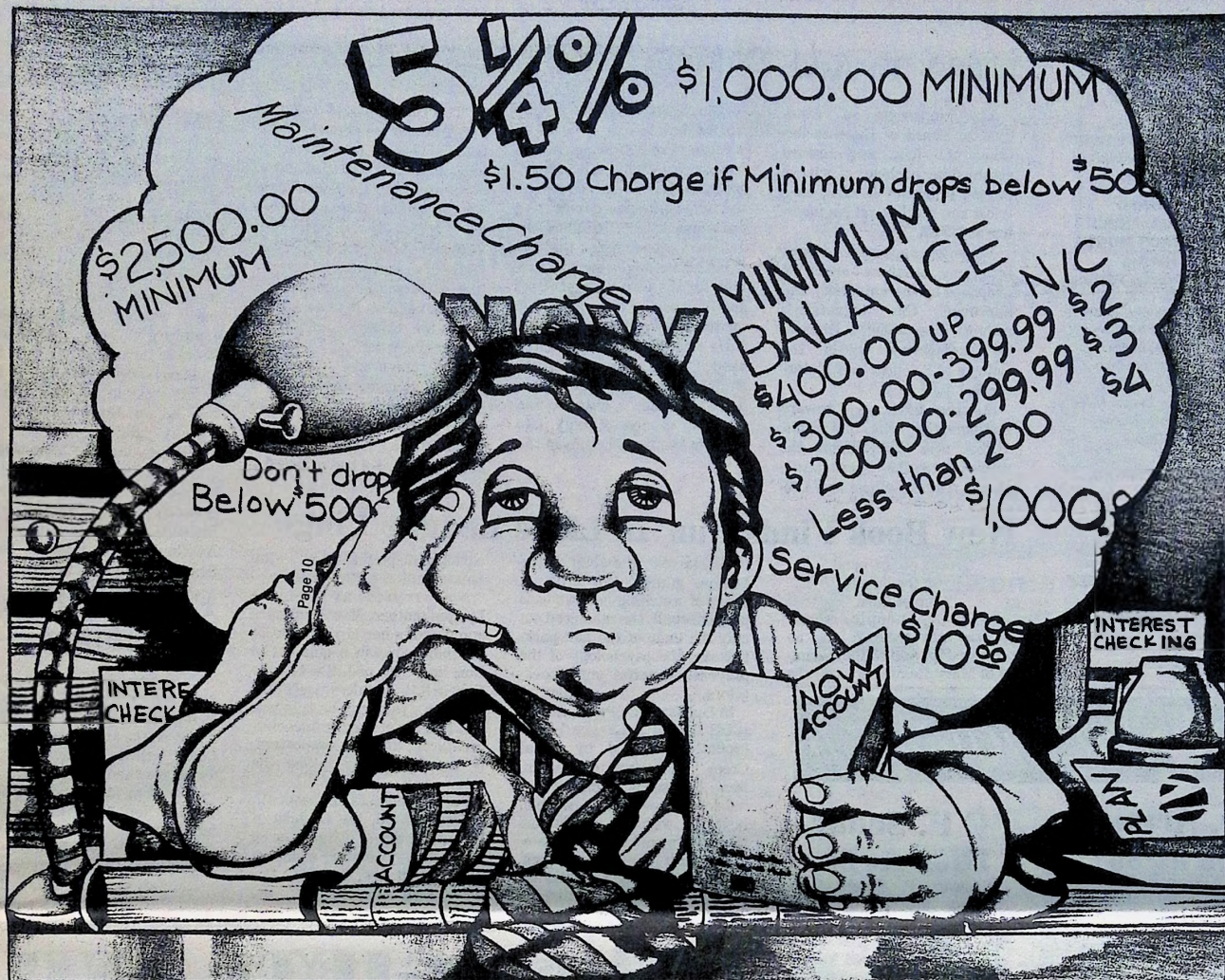
Following are the end-of-March water well levels shown in altitude above mean sea level with the recorded highs in parentheses: Uvalde: 868.6 feet, up 0.3 feet (886.3); Sabinal: 776.3 feet, up 3.3 feet (835.4); Castroville: 700.4 feet, up 1.6 feet (737.8); Hondo: 727.6 feet, up 1.4 feet (773.8); San Antonio: 670.0 feet, up 0.8 feet (696.5); New Braunfels: 625.9 feet, up 0.1 feet (630.2); Kyle: 566.7 feet, down 0.1 feet (593.8).

UTSA To Add Engineering Programs

The University of Texas System Board of Regents has taken the first step toward establishing bachelor of science degree programs in civil, electrical and mechanical engineering at UTSA.

Regents approved degree programs in these areas as proposed by the university and approved the university's request to establish a Division of Engineering within the College of Sciences and Mathematics.

As the next step toward implementing the programs, UTSA now will submit the proposal to the Coordinating Board, Texas College and Uni-

versity System, for its review and action.

More than 100 pre-engineering students currently are enrolled at UTSA. In requesting the undergraduate engineering programs, UTSA President Dr. James Wagener noted that the demand for engineers has been high for the past several years and is expected to remain high for the foreseeable future.

He said that a demonstrated need for undergraduate engineering programs exists in San Antonio, citing San Antonio as one of only two cities in the top 40 cities in the

"The University of Texas at San Antonio is uniquely situated to play a major role in expanding the participation of minorities from the South Texas area in engineering and other high technology fields," Dr. Wagener commented. "San Antonio's cultural, demographic, economic and geographic situation equips it to be a focal point for bringing minorities into engineering."

The university president noted that community leaders see engineering as crucial to San Antonio's future with United San Antonio listing engineering as a top priority.

Art Institute Plans Classes

The San Antonio Art Institute will begin its summer semester of art classes on Saturday, June 6. The courses, which will run for six weeks, are to be offered on weekdays, Saturdays, and evenings for both beginning and advanced students. The program has studio classes in painting, drawing, design, printmaking, sculpture and ceramics. Courses are also offered for children and youth from 6 to 17.

Registration at the school will be on June 1, 2 and 3. Faculty and staff will be available for counseling students. The school is located behind the museum on the grounds of the McNay Art Institute at the corner of Austin Hwy. and North New Braunfels.

Rainfall Fine In Helotes

To many people, these phrases may seem to have no relationship. And so they seemed to Mary Remmers when she

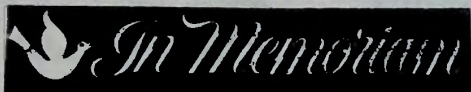

Dizzy Dean Got Start In Baseball At Ft. Sam

Dizzy Dean may be gone physically, but he is definitely alive spiritually in the memories of SFC Robert Brought of Fort Sam Houston. Part of his family tree is deeply rooted in the Military, and the great Dizzy Dean.

Back in the 1920s, Dean was a member of the 3rd Wagon Company, in the U.S. Army, and stationed in San Antonio at Fort Sam Houston. He had the opportunity to work for SFC Brought's father, Sgt. Mjr. James K. Brought of the Twelfth Field Artillery.

Sgt. Maj. Brought was a much decorated soldier with talents, which included pitching with amazing control.

He had been asked by several National League scouts to quit the Army and work for them. But as always, he decided to stay with his first love, the Army, his son said.

Sgt. Maj. Brought first noticed Pvt. Jay Hanna Dean throwing "hard and wild" for the laundry team, so he arranged to have Dean transferred to his battery for additional training.

Sgt. Maj. Brought struck-out with training Dean as a soldier. But as a baseball pitcher, he had spectacular success.

Brought is also credited for putting the "Dizzy" on Dean. While on permanent KP, Brought walked in to catch Dean throwing potatoes at a garbage can lid. Spotting this, Brought is quoted as saying "Why you dizzy (expletive deleted)." So started the legend of Dizzy Dean.

Dean gave Brought a lot of trouble by sneaking out of camp to pitch with the civilians of San Antonio. So to keep Dean out of trouble, Brought kept Dean in the guardhouse a full day before each game Dean was scheduled to pitch.

Seeing Dean improve in his ability to throw the Ball, Brought got in contact with the Saint Louis Cardinals.

Some days later, Dean was bought out of the Army for \$120; in those days a man could buy a discharge from the service.

Dizzy Dean went on to become the National League's Most Valuable Player in 1934

while pitching the Saint Louis Cardinals to the pennant, and the World Series title.

Some years later Dizzy Dean had to give up baseball at the top of his career because of a toe injury. Turning to broadcasting, he again achieved fame; this time as one of the top men on the microphone.

Throughout Dean's baseball and broadcasting career, he never missed a chance to come back to Fort Sam Houston to see his old friends, especially the man that got him started in baseball, Sgt. Maj. Brought.

During one of Dizzy's many visits to Ft. Sam, he was quoted as saying, "No doubt about it,

the Army gave me my start in baseball."

SFC Brought, one of Sgt. Maj. Brought's four sons, is fond of the knowledge that his father "paved the way" for Dizzy's introduction into the National League, and possibly, Dizzy's personality.

Dizzy died at the age of 64, but his memory made possible the Dizzy Dean Museum, opened April 17, 1977, in Jackson, Mississippi.

Dizzy Dean is one of two famous baseball players who has played on the diamonds of Fort Sam Houston. The other is Christy Matthewson.

SFC Brought is maintaining

books, clippings from old newspapers, pictures, an autographed baseball, and even a couple of Dizzy Dean uniforms. His plans are to collect enough items of importance to open, in San Antonio, something similar to the Dizzy Dean Museum.

The bride's sister-in-law, Mrs. Floyd E. Scroggin, Jr. of

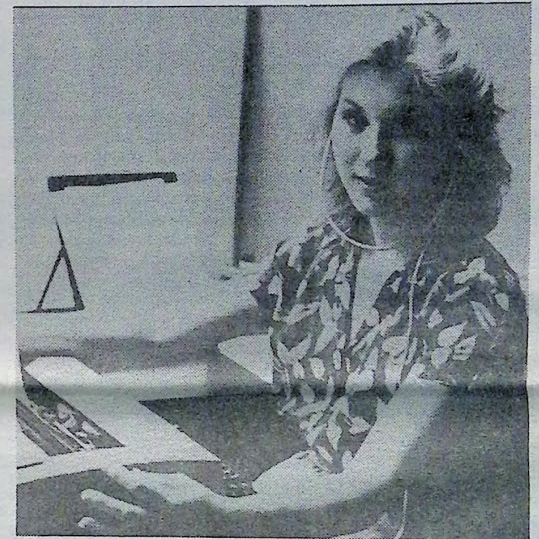

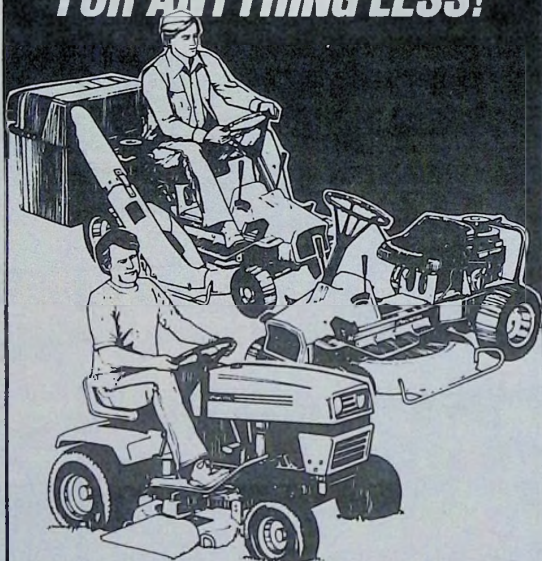

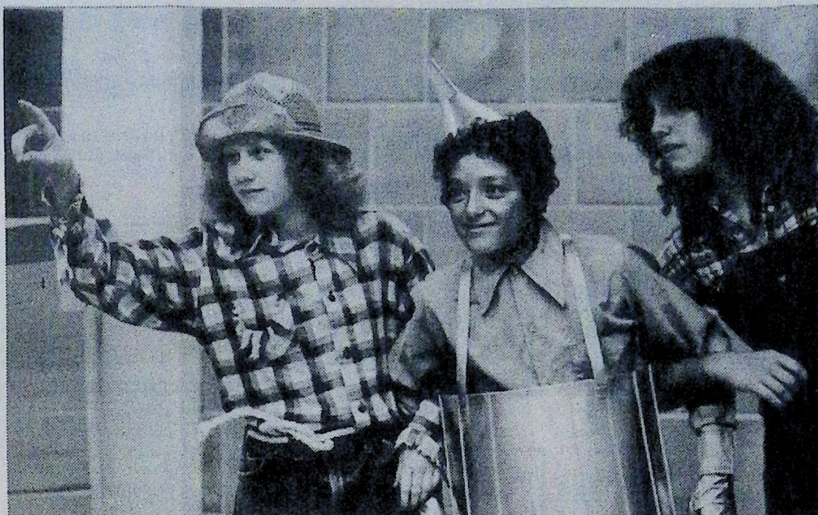
Two From California, Michigan Join Squad

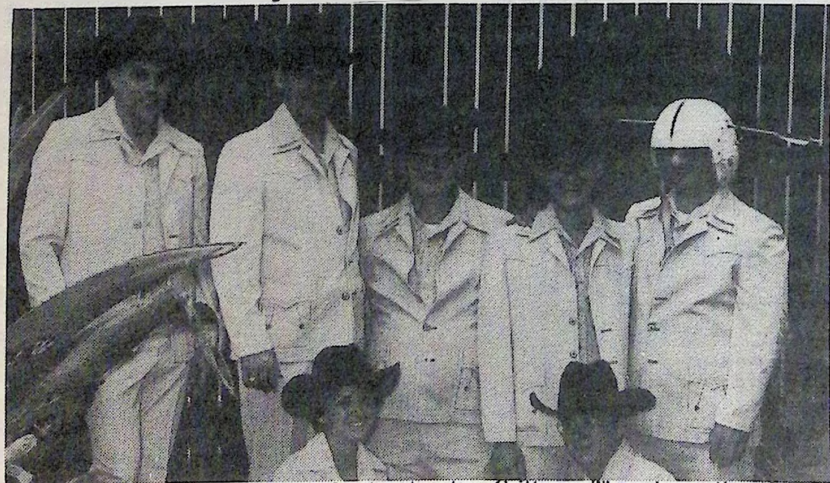

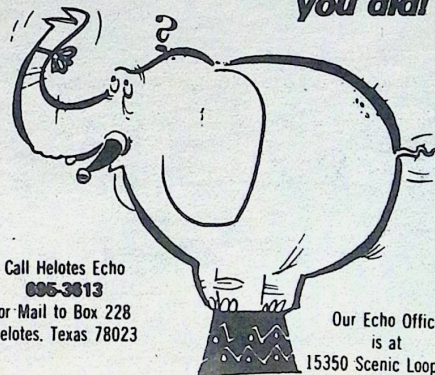

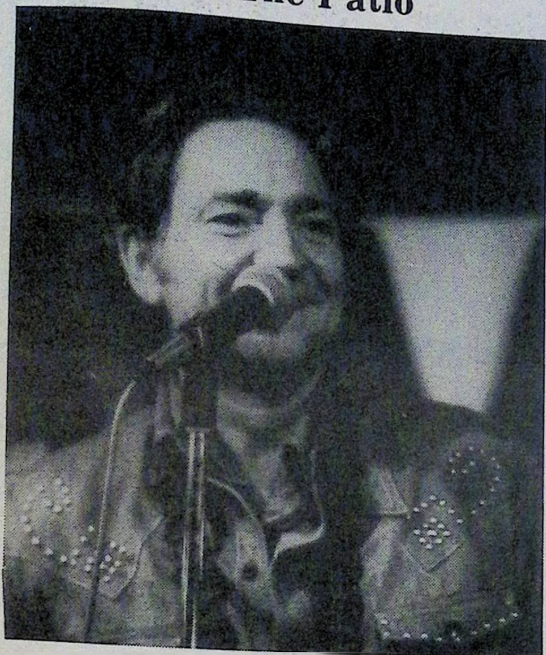

The graduating class includes 389 students receiving

bachelor's degrees and 164 awarded master's.

A separate ceremony will be held for St. Mary's 207 law graduates at 3 p.m. Saturday, May 16, in the Alzafar Shrine (Huebner at IH-10).

St. Mary's graduation ceremonies will be preceded Saturday, May 9, by a campus academic procession at 4 p.m. culminating in a sung Mass in Holy Rosary Church. St. Mary's president, the Rev. James A. Young, S.M., will deliver the baccalaureate sermon.

After the Mass, graduating students and their families will be guests at a reception in the school's Pecan Grove.

St. Mary's will also hold a commissioning ceremony for 14 R.O.T.C. graduates becoming second lieutenants at noon Sunday, May 10, in the university's

Continuing Education Center auditorium.

DeBakey is chancellor of Baylor College of Medicine and chairman of Baylor's department of surgery. He is also director of the National Heart and Blood Vessel Research and Demonstration Center in Houston.

He is internationally celebrated for break-through treatment of diseases of the heart and arteries.

He is the inventor of a device which made open-heart surgery possible and he was the first physician to successfully replace diseased sections of heart arteries.

After 10 years as a member of the civil engineer faculty at Texas A&M University, Dr. Nedderman went to the Arlington campus in 1959 as first dean of engineering. He became vice president for academic affairs in 1968 and four years later assumed the presidency. 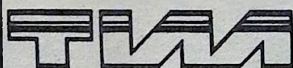

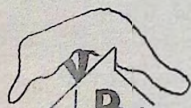
