Complex to Cost \$50 Million

Office Center, Due on 410

A \$50 million office building complex to be known as the San Antonio Executive Center, is now under construction on an 88-acre tract, it was announced Nov. 25 by Mr. Wallace Kienast, President of O. P. Woodcock Co., Inc. builders and owners of the project.

Rains Raise Water Levels

Rainfall for December through Rainfall for December through the 17th totalled one-quarter inch for this area. Rainfall in Novem-ber totalled 3.45 inches, accord-ing to Mr. Ross Barham, local weather observer. Or for those who keep records from the last Echo report, rain from Nov. 12 to Dec. 12 was about 3.7 inches in the central Helotes area. Rain-fall for the year through Dec. 17 fall for the year through Dec. 17 totalled 37.8 inches.

The observer wells were checked by the government on Dec. 17 and the water stood 89.92 feet below the surface, or 960.08 feet above sea level.

Mr. Barham said that the low Mr. Barham said that the low for the year was 93.10 feet be-low the surface on Sept. 4. The high for the year, recorded on March 11, was 81.98 feet below the surface. The water has re-covered to the present by 3.18 feet. The average level was 87.54 for the year so far-which is a very good year, he explained.

The new business complex will The new business complex with be managed and leased by the O. P. Woodcock concern. OPW employs local labor, buys from local firms, and uses local suppliers and specialists, officials caid. said.

As the Center grows, it will contribute a great deal to the contribute a great deal to the local economy, the announcement said. Some 1,200,000 square feet of office space will be available. Its tenants will employ approximately 7,500 people with an annual payroll in the neighborhood of \$37,500,000.

The first structure now under The first structure now under construction, is the Royal Building, a two-story unit containing 20,000 square feet of office area, and will have parking spaces for 175 cars. When completed in February of 1969, a second floor tenant will be on a level with the observation platform of the Tower of the American Tower of the Americas.

Helotes' first human heart transplant patient and the world's transplant patient and the world's 24th, George Henry DeBord, died Thanksgiving day in the Houston hospital where 149 days earlier he had been given the heart of a former Lufkin resident.

He had enjoyed several weeks of normal activity during the period he was out of the hospital. He went fishing and opening day of the hunting season had shot two deer.

Doctors at St. Luke's Episcopal Hospital in Houston said cause of death was rejection of trans-planted heart. He had been re-admitted to the hospital 2 week before his death.

Mr. DeBord, 46, is survived by his wife, Mrs. Jessie DeBord, two daughters, Mrs. Cynthia Waters and Miss Lynette DeBord, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. J. I. Mason; and a brother, Donald DeBord.

Mr. DeBord lived on a ranch on Bandera Highway about two miles beyond Helotes. He had been a resident of Helotes for 22 years, and was a deacon of the Oak Hills Church of Christ. He was buried in the Fort Sam



From Mary, With Love

Among the lessons to be learned from the story of the first Christmas is this: that Mary truly was one of the vigorous women.

The slow trip to Bethlehem by donkey in winter, being turned away from the inn because it was full, finding accommodations in an unheated manger, giving birth to her son alone and unattended—these she experienced with composure and an unfailing sense of destiny.

Even if, as some historians believe, she was attended at the birth by her mother, St. Ann, who probably with her husband had to make the same trip to Bethlehem to register for the government's census, Mary's demonstration of strength is not lessened.

And after that first Christmas, Mary made an even longer journey into the desert country of Asia Minor on behalf of her family.

To face life with vigor, to make-do with what resources you have rather than to fret uselessly for what you don't have, to look always ahead and not back, these are qualities of character of the highest value.

The first Christmas star shone on a land much like that of our own Hill Country. We have built upon our land a newer civilization. But in a hundred ways our lives require frequent demonstrations of strength and vigor in progressing toward the fulfillment that we and God desire for each of us.

Women, particularly, can take comfort at those moments in recelling how Many demonstrated that, though appearing to be frail and young, she was eternally a vigorous woman.

'Equality' Means Safety
