## Hills and Dales Loses Appeal

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in New Orleans on July 5 affirmed San Antonio's action in annexing the campus of the University of Texas-SA and adjoining Hills and Dales. The decision of U. S. Dist. Judge John H. Wood upholding the annexation — which was based on spoke annexation of Loop 1604 — was rendered here in January.

Attorney for Hills and Dales, Earle Cobb, Jr., filed the appeal. It is not known whether further action will be taken to bring the case to a higher court. Hills and Dales is a subdivision here which has been renamed University Hills, Inc. by a redeveloper. The local citizens contend that they have had no vote on the annexation question.

## Two Die In One-Car Turn-Over Wreck

A one-car accident claimed two lives here about 8 p.m., Sunday, July 9, and injured three others.

A small auto carrying five persons failed to descend a hill on the first paved road north of Scenic Loop and Bandera, resulting in the death of one young woman and her infant son. The road which intersects Scenic Loop is paved, but the vehicle apparently struck loose gravel on the shoulder, causing it to roll over several times — throwing all its occupants from the car. The road is about three-quarters of a mile from the Highway 16 at Scenic Loop.

Officers investigating the accident said that the two victims were apparently killed instantly. They were pronounced dead on arrival at Bexar County Hospital. They were identified as Berlinda Camacho, 18 years old, of Kentucky Avenue and her 5-month-old son, Henry.

Also injured were Sylvia Silvas, 15, who is in critical condition, Linda Ybarra, 17, who is making satisfactory progress, and Laura Trevino who has been released from the hospital. They were all residents of San Antonio with homes in the Woodlawn Lake area or near North side.

## Ranch Town Gets Approval Of Plans

The proposed new Ranch Town here to be located on the former Lytle Ranch has moved a step closer to actuality following a series of meetings where proponents for the town explained their plans in detail.

The Water Quality Board at a meeting in Austin on June 28, passed an order stating that based on the conclusions reached and provisions made by the experts — who had been called in by the new town developers, that the construction of the town would not

endanger the ground water supplies if the actions proposed were carried out by the developers.

The press and experts were given a full presentation in San Antonio.

To be known as San Antonio Ranch (New Town) the proposed 80,000 population will be diversified and somewhat self-sustaining with ecology fully considered, projections show. The area is adjacent to Helotes on the Northwest side and contains some 8400 acres.

## UTSA To Get Makings Of 'Drag'

A 2,000-acre site at Babcock Road and Farm Road 1604 — directly North of the University of Texas-SA campus — has been platted for a town-and-country-type off-campus shopping center with all the facilities common to this type of development. There will be a hotel-motel unit, a savings and loan firm and rental units of all classes — such as town houses, garden apartments, and single and multi-family homes, according to plans which have been announced.

The land is the property of Charles Kuper and Gibraltar Savings and Loan of Houston. Developer is Ralph Bender who obtained permission of the San Antonio City Council to zone the first 270 acres for development at a regular meeting on June 8.

Mr. Bender said some shopping

and some housing will be completed in time for the 1973 opening of the campus. He projected that area would have at least 8,000 dwelling units upon completion in the next fifteen or so years of development.

## San Antonio Man Dies In Wreck

Leandro Torres of Saunders Street in San Antonio was killed in a one-car accident at the first curve beyond Scenic Loop and Bandera Road when his vehicle went out of control about 3:30 a.m. June 25. He was pronounced dead on arrival at the Bexar County Hospital.

Sheriff's investigators said that the car was traveling North when it skidded for a distance of some 125 feet before overturning. The victim was thrown from the car.

## Civil Complaints Filed By Sessions

United States Attorney William S. Sessions has announced that he has filed a civil complaint in United States District Court in Waco against Dale L. Adkins of Waco for two violations of the Federal Aviation Regulations.

The suit alleges that on November 23, 1971, Adkins acted as pilot-in-command on a flight in air commerce with a passenger aboard without having a current pilot certificate or an appropriate current medical certificate.

The suit seeks a civil judgment against Adkins in the amount of \$2,000, the maximum civil penalty which can be assessed for the two alleged violations.

The ceremony will take place at 3 p.m. with the reception following at the home of Dr. Harrison on Scenic Loop Road.

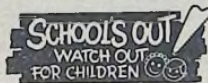
## Griffin-Shoaf Set August Date

## Northside Studies 'Systems' Program

A special grant of \$27,123 has been received by Education Service Center, Region 20, to work with personnel teams from four school districts on use of the "systems" approach to improve classroom instruction for students. Northside Independent School District is one of the four.

The approach involves a step-by-step plan for problem solving. Emphasized are problems a school district may be having in classroom instruction and finding solutions.

Included besides Northside are Edgewood School District of San Antonio, and the Crystal City and Eagle Pass School Districts. Some private school teachers of the San Antonio area will also participate in one session.

Developed and tested over a two-year period by a group of four universities, the program represents a validated training plan with 42 hours of instruction designed to provide school teams with the skill needed to apply the systems approach to classroom instructional improvement. School teams will be made up of teachers, school administrators, policy makers and specialists.

Region 20 staff members will first train the school teams and later work with school personnel

involved during the school year. "The basic goal of the IDI program is to help school systems with limited resources and a substantial number of academically deprived students find innovative and effective approaches to improving classroom instruction," explained Dr. Dwain M. Estes, Region 20 executive director.

Center staff members involved include Justo Guajardo, chief consultant of the Region 20 Migrant Education Project; Isaura Barrera, special education consultant; James Taylor, director of the Region 20 Instructional Media Center; Felipe Garcia, drug and crime prevention education consultant; and Virginia Mannie, Region 20 guidance and counseling consultant.

The first Region 20 IDI program for school personnel will be held August 17-25 at the Eagle Pass School District. Other district staffs will be trained after beginning of the new school year.

## Mrs. Galm Dies At Age 87

Mrs. Elizabeth Morgan Galm, wife of Otto Galm, died Saturday, June 10, in a San Antonio hospital after a year's illness at the age of 87. She was active in community affairs of Helotes for many years.

She was born September 7, 1884, in Belview, Rusk County, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Harrison Morgan. Her father had come to East Texas from Georgia and married a Texas girl, Tempa Ann Eaton, Mrs. Galm's mother. He moved his family to booming Shelby County to supervise building of the courthouse in Center. After the railroad came to East Texas, they moved to Timpson, fastest growing town in the county.

Mrs. Galm was the first of a family that included two younger sisters and a brother. She completed high school in Timpson. Then, when she was 18, her father died. Before her mother's death three years later, Mrs. Galm was able to complete a business course and go to work as an accountant.

After seeing that their real estate holdings were sufficient, she left her brother and sisters with the guardian provided for them by her parents, and entered Baptist Memorial Hospital in Houston to study nursing. She graduated in 1911. She saw service in World War I with the Italian Army—with Unit 102, organized in New Orleans and sent to Vicenza, Italy. After returning to Texas, she was with the Texas State Board of Health for some time, and then was Director of Nursing Education for the Baptist Memorial Hospital in Houston until a short time before coming to Helotes.

In 1935, she was married to Otto Galm—a native of Helotes who was born on the Galm Ranch. They lived on a historic ranch—located on the Galm Road—which Mr. Galm purchased from his great aunt. This was the famed Stagecoach Inn Ranch, known also as the Boegal Ranch—where the first post office of Helotes was located. It was afterwards the Antonio Ranch. It was later partitioned to form the Helotes Ranch Acres, although some of it was kept as a ranch by Mrs. Kathryn Antonio and later sold.

Mr. and Mrs. Galm worked cattle on the ranch—and her nursing experience was cheerfully put to use, when needed, on sick cows, according to one of her accounts.

In 1946, Mr. and Mrs. Galm moved to Anderson County in East Texas where Mr. Galm operated a large dairy farm for 11 years. In 1956, Mr. and Mrs. Galm returned to Helotes, and since have resided

Mrs. Galm's sisters, Mrs. Mayme Moore and Mrs. Ila (Baby) Fisk, and her brother, Clyde Otto Morgan, preceded her in death. She is survived by two nephews, Dr. Clyde Otto Morgan, Jr., and Henry Louis Morgan, who attended her funeral.

About 20 years ago, Mrs. Galm began researching her family history, tracing the family to the American Revolution. 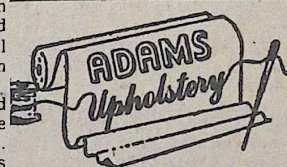

## Foundation Re-opens Student Aid Library

The Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation has announced the re-opening of its Student Aid Library at a new location, 201 North St. Mary's Street. During the summer, it will be open from 8:30 to 4:30 (except at lunch time) Monday through Friday.

## Grey Forest Wins Suit

The City of Grey Forest was awarded a judgment June 23 entitling it to collect \$11,747.50 as cost for relocating a gas line owned by the Grey Forest Utilities which apparently was laid on property now owned by Villa Rosa. The line was to go along the Babcock right-of-way and the mistake was discovered when Villa Rosa was built.

Judge Richard Woods entered the judgment against B. L. Nelson and Associates, Inc., as the engineering consultants and Sub-Surface Construction Co., Inc., the contractor, who placed lines for the Utility Company here a few years ago.

Grey Forest had already moved the lines and paid a contractor, but sought recovery of the costs.

## Labor Department Aids Re-employment

The U.S. Department of Labor, Manpower Administration, is funding a Technology Mobilization and Reemployment Program to help highly skilled professionals, laid off from aerospace and defense industries, find employment that will put their technical talents to work in new occupations.

All employers, public and private, profit and non-profit, are eligible for the new program. Eligible applicants are those who have been employed twelve of the last twenty-four months or twenty-four months of the last five years by aerospace or defense companies.

Unemployed professional and technical workers may receive special employment services including grants for out-of-town job interview expenses up to \$500. Applicants who must relocate to accept suitable employment may have 80 per cent of their relocation expenses paid by the program, up to \$1,200. All grants must be approved in advance.

Employers may receive up to \$2,000 for use in on-the-job retraining of each worker hired under the program. Up to \$2,500 is allowed to cover pre-employment

institutional training (26 weeks or less) for an applicant with an employer commitment.

To be eligible for the program employers must be willing to pay a salary of at least \$8,000 annually for scientists and engineers and at least \$6,000 annually for technicians.

David Frank Rosow has been retained by the Texas Employment Commission as staff consultant for the program. For information, employers and applicants may contact Mr. Rosow at 222-8484, Ext. 357.

## San Antonio Goes Home

San Antonio which had come to Helotes on May 25 went home again on June 15.

On May 25, San Antonio added more than 30 per cent to its territory at City Council. Then it had second thoughts, and on June 15 by unanimous action the City Council voted to de-annex the newly taken land.

This is prohibited by State law.

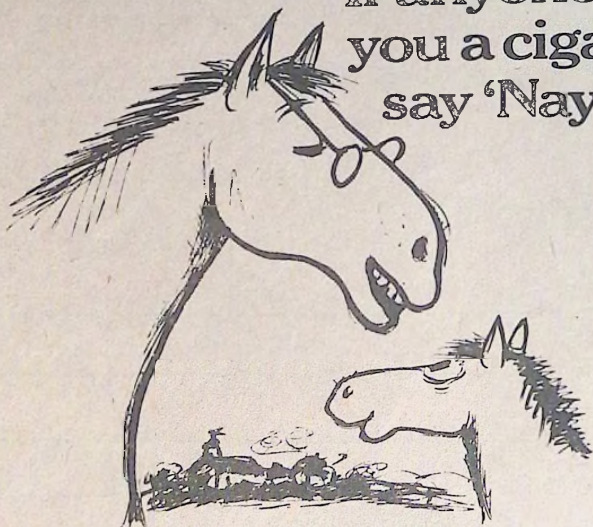

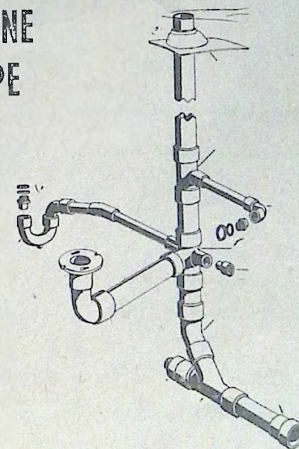
