## Grey Forest To Vote On Taxes

A referendum election on whether to have taxes imposed in Grey Forest on property will be held from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the City Hall Saturday, July 28. The vote is limited to qualified voters who own property in Grey Forest who may declare whether they are for or against an ad valorem tax. The date was set at a special meeting July 2 of the City Council.

City Judge Robert Duty announced that he had deleted the word "binding" from the referendum and that no limit to taxation will appear in the referendum to be voted upon this month.

At the regular meeting June 20—from which Judge Duty was absent—the City Council had voted to have a binding election and to set a time limit after which the people would be allowed to vote again if they wished to continue taxes. No rate of taxation or limit will appear in the question either, he ruled.

Councilman Clarence "Buddy" Burris suggested a two-year limitation as requested in a citizen's petition signed by more than 100 voters out of a town with a population well under 400. However, the Council approved the wording of the referendum as read by Judge Duty, and no limitation will be imposed. The July 28 election will be publicized in the July 13 Commercial Recorder, Judge Duty said. He said also that absentee voting will be at the City Hall July 5-24.

He also obtained the Council's permission to have distributed to voters at the election a notice of a public hearing to follow the election, regardless of the outcome, on the City budget.

At a special meeting, Mrs. Virgil Cifers—former Grey Forest

Utilities secretary—was appointed City Secretary-Treasurer, and Mayor Sam Terry administered the oath of office. Mrs. Cifers will also fill in as Court Clerk, a position now held by Mrs. Kitty Fischer, and will also continue some duties with the Grey Forest Utilities.

The City Council had previously voted to impose taxes beginning

## NORTHSIDE UPS SCHOOL TAXES

Northside School District property will be assessed at 15 per cent higher than at present according to action taken at a recent meeting of the Trustees, with the tax rate to be set later, Superintendent Ed Cody has announced. The Trustees voted to change the ratio of assessment for school tax purposes from 60 per cent to 75 per cent of fair market value. The tax rate will be set at budget hearings this Fall.

## Injured In Accident

In the Bexar County Hospital after being injured in an accident on a rain-slick Bandera Highway within the city limits of San Antonio Saturday, June 22, are Bobby Kraft, driver of the car, who is listed in critical condition, and Douglas Poor, who received multiple injuries but is listed in satisfactory condition.

Both young men grew up in Helotes and their many friends have expressed concern. The accident occurred, according to witnesses, when an automobile pulled out in front of them causing them to strike a pole in avoiding a collision.

In regular session June 25, the Northside Independent School District also approved the appointment of Ralph Rhodes as basketball coach for John Jay High School. Rhodes has been an assistant basketball coach in Clear Creek, Texas.

Phelps and Simmons Architects were authorized by the Board to advertise for bids for the construction of a new middle school on Hunt Lane near Potranco Road.

National Bank of Commerce, San Antonio was awarded the District's Bank Depository bid for 1973-75. A budget holdback item, \$2400 for summer curriculum development salaries, was reinstated.

Official Trustee approval committed Northside to participation in federal "free and reduced price lunches" for needy families, authorized expenditure for special education materials and consultant services for Plan A Special Education implementation, and purchase of District lawnmowers, vehicles and equipment for the building trades program which will go into a new vocational building at Holmes High School.

next January. The rate was announced to be \$1.20 per \$100 on 60 per cent of fair market value—about two-thirds of the present Northside School District tax.

After a petition signed by more than half of the registered voters of the City of Grey Forest was presented to the City Council at a regular meeting June 20 by Councilman Clarence "Buddy" Burris, Councilmen split three-to-two to take the problem to the citizens. Many of whom opposed the previous council action on

several counts.

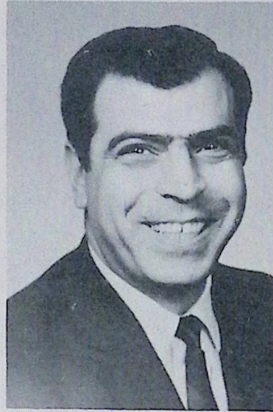
Voting in favor of giving the citizen's a voice in the tax question were Councilmen Burris, Buddy Hartman, and Dorothy Parrott. Opposing the people's referendum were Councilmen Sherwood Nelson and Mike Mikel.

Before the Council voted, several citizens voiced opposition to the tax, and to the burden it would impose on those with fixed incomes. The city is almost without industry or business, except for an eating establishment and the Grey Forest Utilities. Revenues from the utilities company are expected to make the collecting of property taxes unnecessary to meet the needs of the City after the company expands in the near future. At the time the Company was formed, it was anticipated that revenues

would be sufficient by this date.

In anticipation of the growth of the utilities demand, the citizens also asked in the petition accepted by the Council to have a time-limit set for taxation after which they would be allowed to vote again should they want the taxes to continue.

Sympathy is extended to the family in their great loss.

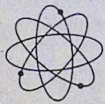
## First Aid Class

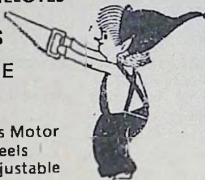

## Summer School Largest So Far

The largest student enrollment since Northside began summer school in 1965 is now recorded by the District at Holmes High School. According to Summer School Principal, Paul Fleming, 1250 students are enrolled in the tuition summer school, compared to 297 during the first year of operation.

Students from 27 high schools and 13 junior high schools from as

far away as Devine, Hondo and Medina Valley are enrolled for regular credit courses which include English and mathematics, history, business, physical education and drivers education.

Classes range from seventh grade requirements through high school senior courses. One full year's credit in a single course can be earned. Fleming is supervising a staff of 47 teachers.

Registration is now closed for summer school, to run through August 2.

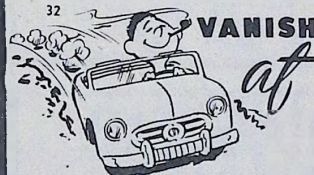

## Safe Boat Week Is Every Week

After Governor Dolph Briscoe proclaimed July 1-7 Safe Boating Week in Texas, Mr. Ray Wangler, President of the Greater San Antonio Safety Council, urged all boaters to observe safe boating practices at all times.

Going boating without the proper equipment is not just foolish—it is also against the law, he said.

While each boatman must

comply with the specialized safety requirements for his particular boat and the way he uses it, the Greater San Antonio Safety Council suggests a group of basics that make up the "Golden Rules of Boating."

1. Know your boat
2. Don't overload.
3. Keep a good lookout.
4. Operate at a safe speed.
5. Respect the weather.
6. Take sufficient fuel.
7. Keep your boat in shape.
8. Carry necessary equipment.
9. Secure your boat properly.
10. Obey the law.

An ever increasing number of Texans spend time in recreational boating, with some 400,000 boats now registered in the State. Mr. Wangler said, "Common sense dictates that you carry: anchor,

line, paddle, first aid kit, flashlight, tool kit, and an extra can of fuel.

"If you trailer your boat, safety begins in your driveway. Check your trailer to see that your tires are properly inflated; the winch is locked, that the boat is properly secured to the trailer, and that gears stored inside the boat are properly balanced and secured," he added.

## You Can Get Your Money Back

More than six million dollars were restored to potential victims of mail frauds—nationally speaking—during a recent nine-month period, Helotes Postmaster Vi Swift reported she has been advised.

Chief Postal Inspector and Assistant Postmaster General William J. Cotter in a report covering 1973 through March—the first three-quarters of the year—affirmed that enforcement by Postal Inspection Service resulted in restitution of \$6,222,660 to those victimized by mail frauds.

Restitutions ordered by courts totaled \$2,853,528. "Voluntary" restitutions totaled \$2,009,708, and \$1,359,426 resulted from other recoveries. These included 3,630 promotions discontinued largely on Inspection Service action.

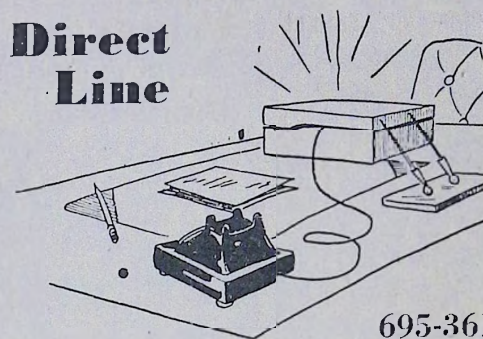
Postmaster Swift said these results show that it is worthwhile to report the facts to the post office for those who have good reason to conclude they have been the victim of a scheme-to-defraud in which the mails were used.

Not all failures or broken promises indicate a scheme-to-defraud, Mrs. Swift said, but may be merely the result of poor business practices.

There are 12,000 mail fraud investigations completed each year by Postal Inspectors. Postmaster Swift said these include complaints from postal customers who allege failure to receive merchandise or promised refunds from mail order firms.

Return of the customer's money is possible in some cases, she said. If a postal customer cannot obtain satisfaction through his own efforts, she concluded, he should not just write his transaction off as a loss.

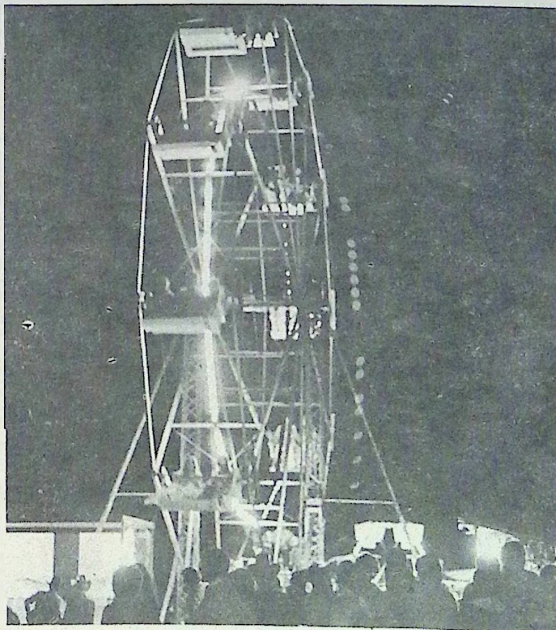

## Northside Gets Bi-Lingual Grant

"Ayudandonos Paras Agadar," (Help them Help Themselves) the NISD bi-lingual, bi-cultural education program has been funded by the federal government for the 1973-74 school year.

The District will receive \$148,390

## UTSA Receives Work - Study Grant

UTSA President Peter T. Flawn has announced that the University has been awarded a College Work Study Program Grant for \$87,960 for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 1973.

Dr. Flawn said that CWSP is one of the few federally funded financial aid programs available to graduate students.

As many as 66 students could qualify for the UTSA work study program. Employment hopefully will be made available in state, federal and municipal government offices.

"It is the intent of the program to provide students with work experience related to their area of educational interest as well as with a source of income," Dr. Flawn said.

Students participating in the program will be paid at an hourly rate of \$1.60. Most students will work between 15 and 20 hours per week in the program.

Salvador Gomez, Director of Financial Aid and Placement at UTSA, said that work study applications will be considered on the basis of a student's financial need. Individual grants are awarded to students on an annual basis. In most cases students will work from September through

May although some students may work in the summer, depending on the availability of funds. Students are eligible for the program in succeeding years.

## Leadership Teams Convene In July

An all-Utah training cycle for 12 Utah communities will be conducted July 9-18 by the U. S. Office of Education Southwest region training center based at Trinity University, San Antonio, Texas.

The ten-day cycle will take place at the Trinity Center's training camp near Bandera, Texas, under the nationwide "Help Communities Help Themselves" drug abuse prevention project.
