Free Heat Machine To Be Shown At Helotes Plaza

Prompted by fuel shortages and the skyrocketing cost of heating a home, technologists are seeking to improve the common fireplace which until now has been noted more for beauty and ornamentation than for its warmth.

The latest attempt to increase fireplace heating efficiency is a California invention known as the Free Heat Machine, which will be demonstrated on the parking lot of Helotes Park Plaza shopping center from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m., Saturday June 30.


The device, which converts an ordinary masonry fireplace into a home heating system, consists mainly of two built-in blowers that force cool air through 12 C-shaped tubes located under, behind and over the fire. A normal three-log fire in the unit is said to produce up to 38,000 BTU's, enough useable heat to heat from 1,300 to 1,500 square feet of living area.

The Helotes demonstration will be conducted by Kent Anderson, president of Anderson Engineering Company, who recently founded a second company,

N.R.G. Savers, Inc., for the specific purpose of researching and developing alternate energy sources that can replace or supplement gas and electricity

Anderson said any fuel-

wood, coal or paper logs—can be used to fuel the fire in the machine. The fire is enclosed with glass doors to prevent heated room air from being drawn into the fireplace and wasted up the chimney.

Following the burial service, the family and friends gathered at Floore Country Store, where a bountiful lunch was provided by Joe and Stella Algueseva, members of the Altar Society of Our Lady of Guadalupe, and other friends.

Jesse was born in Boerne but lived most of his life in the family home on Menchaca-Wagner Road. He was a large, strong man of many skills and high standards, and much in demand by property owners here. He was very helpful to the Helotes Echo during the past ten years, not only in overseeing various conserva-tion projects for the Echo building and grounds but also as a friend and advisor and source of much lore and information about the Helotes area and its people.

The Algueseva family was well-known in the Helotes-

Boerne-Bandera area in the early 1900's. In J. Marvin Hunter's book, "100 years in Bandera," there is a picture of Jesse's father, Ray, and uncles, Cal and Jesse, with the first threshing power-driven machine brought into the area. That was in 1912. The thresher was driven by a big steam engine which resembled an early-day steam locomotive. Water for the steam engine had to be brought from a nearby creek in a large tank on a wagon pulled by two horses.

Jesse had been very active and still working hard until last winter, when he suffered a massive heart attack. He was in and out of the hospital for several months, but his heart had been so severely damaged that he could only grow weaker. He had been staying at the home of his son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Wilbur Davis, but the Saturday before he died he went to Von Ormy to be with his son, Reynolds.

There he died quietly two days later during the early hours of Monday, June 11. He will be missed by his family and many longtime friends in this community.





School Tax Forms Due

According to Northside School District Tax Assessor John White, about 20 percent of the eligible taxpayers have not returned their homestead tax exemption forms to his office. White is appealing to citizens who own their homes to mail the forms they received in March and earn the \$5,000 tax exemption this tax year.

Residential Homestead Exemption Forms require the taxpayer to verify he or she is living in the house at the time. Of the nearly 35,000 forms mailed this spring, about 80 percent have been returned to the district's tax office.

Taxpayers who did not receive the form can obtain copies at the tax office, 5900 Evers Road. Citizens can verify whether or not the office received their completed forms by calling 681-0330.

Northside's tax office began preparing exemption credit forms last winter when voters approved the Texas Tax Relief Amendment just now signed into law by Governor Bill Clements. As an example of savings homeowners will incur if they complete the form, a homeowner whose house has a market value of \$30,000 and would normally pay \$360 in taxes, but by taking advantage of the exemption, would pay only \$300 in school taxes.

Senior citizens (over 65) also qualify for an additional \$10,000 exemption in Northside School District.





Local 'Hams' To Compete In National Field Test

Datapoint Corporation's amateur radio club— the Datapoint
Amateurs & Technicians
Association—will man
Association in Helotes during this weekend.

The Datapoint 'hams' will be taking part in the annual national test of emergency preparedness known as Field Day. For twenty-four hours during the June 23-24 weekend, U.S. radio amateurs will compete for the largest number of completed two-way communications made using emergency equipment under field conditions.

The competition prepares them to furnish authorities a full range of emergency communications in the event of flood, storm, or other civil disasters.

For the hams employed by Datapoint Corporation, the San Antonio manufacturer of business computers, this year's Field Day contest will begin Saturday at noon. They will raise emergency antennas, start a large, propane-burning motor generator (to avoid reliance upon commercial power which might be disabled in a disaster), and set up transmitters and receivers on all authorized frequency bands.

The D.A.T.A. hams will take

turns operating this emergency equipment until mid-aftertoon Sunday. They expect to exchange messages with more than 2,000 other radio amateurs throughout the U.S. and Canada, as well as around the globe.

Being Datapointers, the D.A.T.A. group will employ a DATASHARE (R) timesharing computer system to keep running logs of the number of successful contest contracts, avoid duplicate contacts, and make contest scoring simple.

Site of the D.A.T.A. Field Day will be the home of Associate Member Charley Becker, 14507 Circle A Trail. The club will also use Becker's call, K5CB, because it is short and easy to send.

Visitors to the site will see Datapoint hams sitting in folding chairs under tarpaulins, earnestly listening to radios and hoarsely calling: "See-Queue Field Day, from Kilo Five Charlie Brown in Beautiful South Texas!" or pounding out the equivalent signals with telegraph keys.

In between their stints at the key or microphone, D.A.T.A. members may be found eating, chatting, getting sunburned, or even catching forty winks, in spite of the tradition that calls

nationwide winner. Win or lose, they will have a good time, and spend eleven months planning a bigger and more successful Field Day for 1980.


Col. Martin Dies At 67
