AREA-WIDE SEWER SYSTEM UNDER STUDY

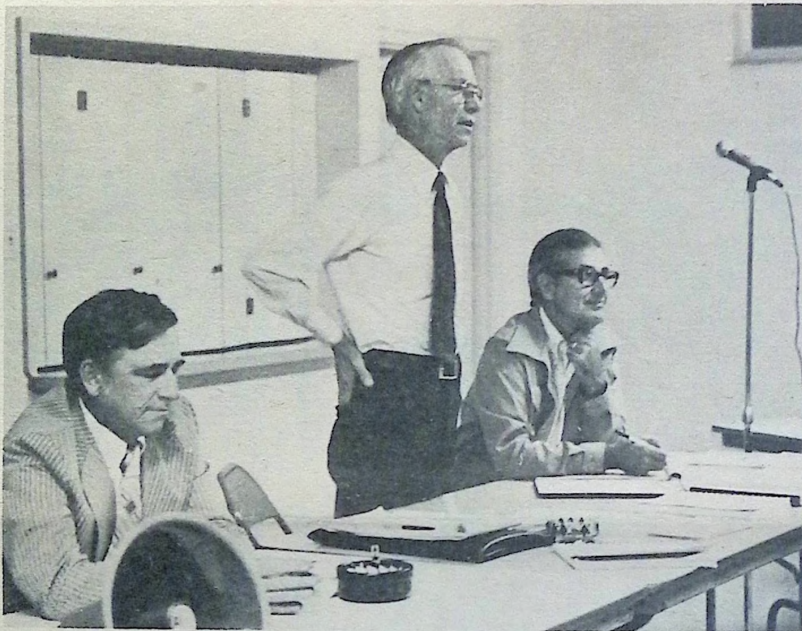

An area wide sewer system is under study for Helotes, and a Municipal Utility District to implement it is being considered. The \$4.4 million facility will be, if obtained, financed by a 75 percent grant from the federal government.

The first step in application has been completed and William Mullins, project engineer, has completed an environmental and feasibility study.

Following several public hearings on the project, citizens of the area will be given a vote on accepting or rejecting.

An official public hearing on the environmental effect of the proposed Helotes Creek Sanitary Sewer System was held Monday evening, May 17, at the C.C.D. Bldg., Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church. Statements were made by William Mullins, project engineer, and Robert Matthews of Edwards Underground Water District. Several citizens from Grey Forest and Helotes also made statements at the hearing. About 50 persons were in attendance.

The area to be served by the proposed sewer project includes from Babcock Road and Scenic Loop Road down Helotes Creek through the Helotes area and 1604 and Bandera Highway; from Riebe's corner down Los Reyes Creek and Bandera Highway to 1604 and Bandera; from Hwy. 1560 and Beverly Hills subdivisions along 1560 to 1604 and Bandera. The sewerage would then be transported down Bandera Highway to Leon Creek and connect up to San Antonio Sewer System for treatment.

The average cost per month per connection, as projected by the engineer, would be \$12.05 per month which includes interest and principal payments on the bonds and maintenance and operating cost.

Construction costs are estimated to be \$4,379,100, of which a grant has been applied for from the Environmental Protection Agency through the Texas Water Quality Board to pay for 75 percent of the project. The local community would pay for 25 percent of the cost.

According to spokesmen, it is proposed a Municipal Utility District, (MUD), be formed to carry out the construction and operation of the sewer system. The MUD would encompass the general areas to be served by the

High school seniors from John Jay, Marshall, and Holmes high schools—1,794 in all—will graduate in three ceremonies at Northside Stadium.

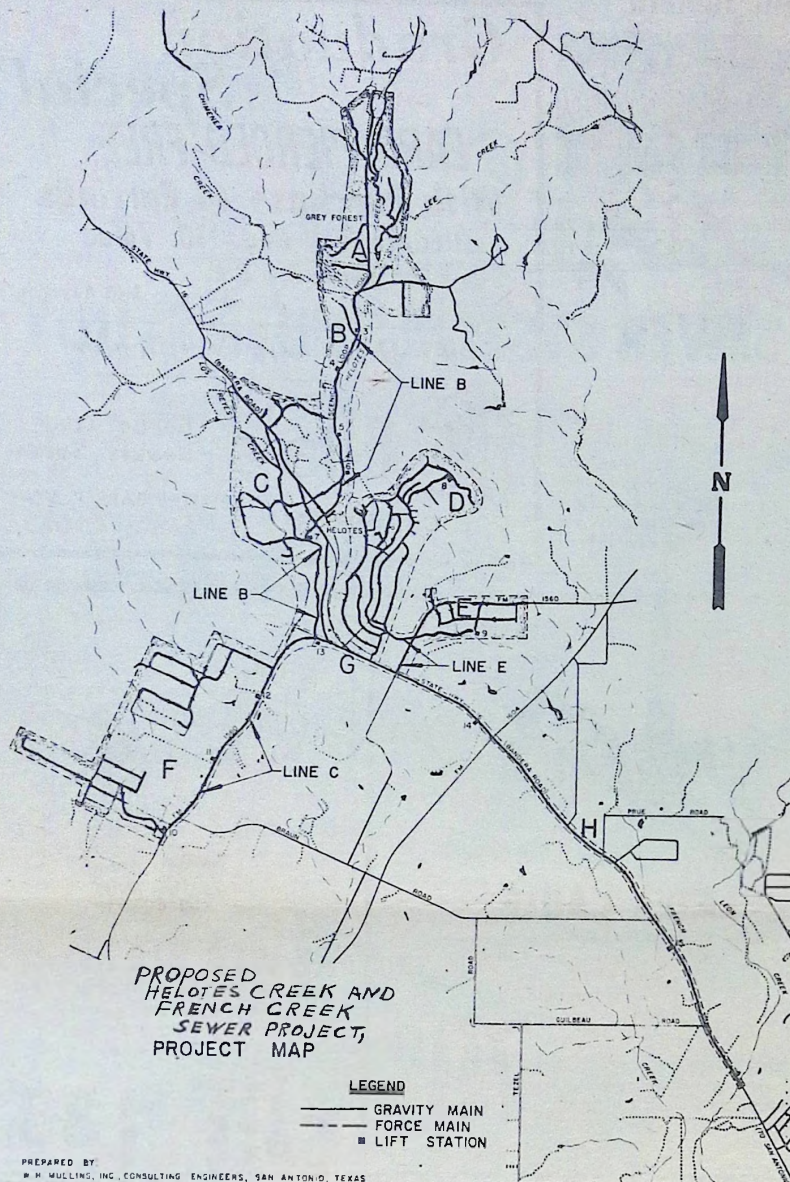
Holmes seniors will graduate Wednesday, May 26, at 8 p.m., led by Valedictorian Eileen Roper and Salutatorian Richard Matye.

Step II which is the actual system design has been applied for by the City of Grey Forest, but cannot be accepted until an election is held to consider forming a Municipal Utility District.

The Facility plan and engineer report will be available at the Grey Forest City Hall for interested citizens to review. Additional information can be obtained from Mayor Ed Faust or Chairman of the Temporary Board of the proposed MUD, Ralph Swift.

The minimum design and construction time required is two years after the MUD is formed.

Mrs. Harrison passed away Friday, May 14.

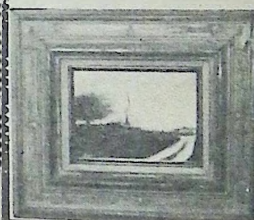

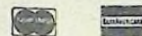

New student orientation at the University of Texas will be held Tuesday, May 25—the first time freshmen and sophomores will attend orientation at the new university.

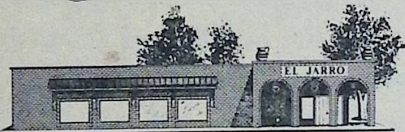
Among the highlights will be a simultaneous program for parents of new students.

Orientation for parents will feature a tour, coffee with administrators and small group sessions on counseling, health

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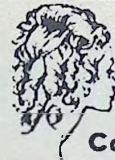
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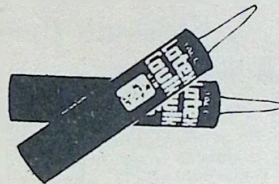
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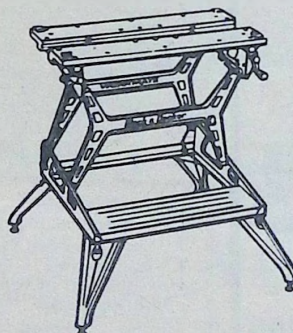

SAN ANTONIO—Spl.—The partially-free Hermann Sons Youth Summer Camp in the Hill Country near Comfort, Tex., will open for its 23rd consecutive season May 30, Henry Riemer, grand president of the state-wide Sons of Hermann Order, has reported.

Well over 25,000 junior Hermann Sons members have been provided with a week of camping since the inception of the camp as a fringe benefit of membership beginning with the summer season of 1954, Riemer noted.

The camp is for children 9 through 13 years of age. There will be 11 weekly sessions this summer, the first six weeks being exclusively for girls and the last five weeks exclusively for boys.

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German Pioneers Honored In Song

Residents of Texas cities whose ancestors were of German descent salute the nation's Bicentennial with two days of song in San Antonio May 22-23.

The celebration is being sponsored by the Volksfest Association of Texas, assisted by the Deutsch Texanischer Saengerbund and the Texanischer Gebirgs Saengerbund.

The observance will honor German pioneers of the nation and the state, starting with Baron Frederick William von Steuben, a military genius who served as a volunteer in George Washington's Continental Army and who helped Washington instill the military science, tactics and discipline needed to win America's freedom;

and continuing on to the German settlers who in the state's first century contributed stability to the Texas frontier.

The public is especially invited to the Sunday event, which will be in Villita Assembly Hall. This will begin at 1 p.m. with an hour concert by the Beethoven Band of San Antonio.

At 2 p.m. Lee H. Gastinger, German Pioneer Observance chairman, will give remarks of welcome. Greetings will be extended for the Volksfest Association of Texas by Henry Riemer, Grand President of the Hermann Sons; for the City of San Antonio by Mayor Lila Cockrell; and for the Federal Republic of Germany by a German Consul Office representative from Houston.

Congressman Robert (Bob) Krueger will be the speaker. His topic will be "The German Heritage in Texas."

Riemer will be chairman of a flag decoration ceremony, which will be followed by songs by the men's massed chorus, directed by Otto Ransleben, with Miss Carol Koehl as pianist, and including selections from Mendelssohn-Barholdy, Wohlgemut and Mozart.

The Hermann Sons Polkateers, San Antonio, will dance several folk numbers. Next, the ladies massed chorus, directed by Miss Gisela Bauer, with Mrs. Alice Murphy as pianist, will sing.

John Donohue will direct the mixed massed chorus in several pieces; then the men's massed chorus, directed by Ransleben, will close with selections from Silcher, Hoffmann and Beethoven.

Dancing and Gemuetlichkeit will follow.

Gastinger said the public is also invited to hear the singing Saturday, which will begin at 2:30 p.m. at the Beethoven Home, 422 Pereida St., in the King William Area. However, with hundreds of official singers, the premises will be extremely crowded.

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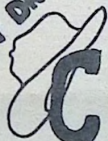

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Krueger Alerts Washington Visitors Teacher Of

WASHINGTON, D.C.—In the wake of reports that some 20 million people will be visiting Washington, D.C., this summer, Congressman Bob Krueger is offering advice to his constituents planning to visit the nation's capital.

"People should remember that admission to all federal buildings is free," Krueger said. "There have been some instances of people selling tickets to the White House or Washington Monument, when, in fact, those tickets are free from the National Park Service."

Krueger also urged his constituents to contact his office on arriving in Washington.

"Plans should be made as far in advance as possible," the Congressman said, noting that the large number of visitors is expected to put a strain on the city's motel and restaurant facilities. "Traffic will definitely be a problem," he added, "and that will undoubtedly contribute to the air pollution this summer. Older citizens, or those with a history of

respiratory problems, should be advised that the summer months can pose additional health problems due to the severity of the smog and air pollution. "Whenever possible," he added, "people should attempt to use mass transit to travel within the city."

The Rev. A. Nelson Daunt will become president of Texas Military Institute on June 15. He will succeed Dr. Leonard A. Duce, who is retiring after two years as president.

Born June 23, 1918, in Warrensbrook, Enniskean, County Cork, he received his education at Blue Coat School in Dublin and at Trinity College, Dublin, where he earned his Bachelor of Arts Degree (Moderatorship in Mental and Moral Science) in 1939, Divinity Testimonium in 1942, and Master of Arts Degree in 1945.

He was ordained a deacon in 1942 and a priest in 1943 by the Bishop of Ossory.

Dr. Rodolfo Jacobson, UTSA professor in bicultural-bilingual studies, will direct the institute.

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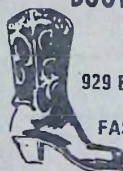
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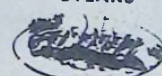
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Jay Winners Named

Jay Students Win Second In State

The two-man auto repair team of Charles DeRusso and Bruce Willing, John Jay High School, took second—only three minutes behind 1st place Georgetown, and 15 minutes ahead of the 3rd place team—in the May 13 State Championship Plymouth Trouble Shooting Contest in Austin.

Thirty-three high schools from Texas tried, in competition, to locate the problem in a 1976 Plymouth and repair it in the fastest time. Jay High School's team, under the direction of auto mechanics teacher, Clifton Crane, was sponsored in the contest by Chrysler Plymouth City, San Antonio.

Mammoths Roamed Hill Country In Ice Age

Fifteen thousand years ago, during what is known as the Wisconsin Ice Age, mammoths were a common sight throughout the Lone Star State.

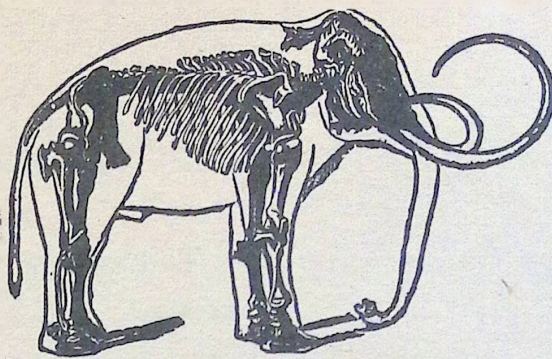
Standing as high as fourteen feet at the shoulder and weighing as much as eight tons when full-grown, these shaggy, extinct cousins of the modern elephant shared the grassy plains covering much of Ice Age Texas with musk-ox, long-horned bison, and tapir.

Many of these animals died natural deaths, while others, highly valued for their meat, were killed by ancient Texans. After killing an animal it was common for hunters to strip its flesh from its bones and leave the skeleton for scientists to uncover and study for clues to use in piecing together the puzzle of ancient man's relationship with his environment.

A mammoth skeleton, possibly the remains of an Ice Age slaughter, has been uncovered by Texas Arts and Industries University archaeologists working under the direction of Dr. Raymond Suhm at La Paloma Ranch near Kingsville. Dr. Suhm is a geology professor at Texas A&I in Kingsville.

The find is significant not only because it is reported to be one of the biggest mammoth skeletons ever found in the United States, but Carbon 14 tests date it back to approximately 7,500 B.C. This date places the animal into a time period almost a thousand years after which mammoths were believed to have become extinct.

A report on Dr. Suhm's work was presented at the Southern Texas Archaeological Association meeting May 15-16, at The University of Texas at San Antonio.



Other presentations included a talk on new discoveries concerning Golondrina and Plainview projectile points, the upcoming Texas Archaeological Society field school, and a report on the recent archaeology site mapping and surveying activities conducted at the Bear Creek Boy Scout Ranch near Kerrville.

Highlighting Saturday's activities was a film entitled "First Americans." Recently produced by Shell Oil Company, the film has been praised by archaeologists around the country as being one of the finest documentaries of its kind to be released in the past ten years.
