Cowboys To Hit Trail For San Antonio Show

With Frank Anderwald of Bandera as trail boss, the Cowboy Capital Trail Ride will be heading for San Antonio Feb. 4. It will have 30.9 miles behind it when it stops at John Floore's Country Store the second day out—and it will have at least as far to go before the big parade downtown marks the opening in the Coliseum of the 1969 San Antonio Livestock Exposition, Feb. 7.

Registration forms are available at the various stops along the way in Bandera, Pipe Creek, San Geronimo, and at the Country Store here.

The schedule goes like this: Register for the ride to San Antonio at Bandera Recreation Center area at 1:30 p.m., Sunday, Feb. 2. This is Bandera, Texas day.

On Tuesday, Feb. 4, at 7 a.m., assemble at the Longhorn Steakhouse in Bandera. Present a scroll to the Bandera mayor—the first of a series. At 8 a.m., hit the trail.

Stop for lunch at 12 noon at Pipe Creek, 10.1 miles down Highway 16. Present a scroll to Ed Jennings, "Mayor of Pipe Creek." At 4:40 p.m., stop at Pete's Place in San Geronimo, 22.3 miles out of Bandera. Camp for the night.

At 6 a.m., Wed., Feb. 5—rise and shine. At 7:45 a.m., present a scroll to Lato Martinez, "Mayor of San Geronimo." At 8 a.m., hit the trail. Take a rest stop midway at 9:30 a.m.

Mayor W. W. McAllister and Joe Freeman of the Coliseum, acting for the Council of Mayors, recently invited all the official and unofficial mayors of towns through which the trail rides will pass to a supper along with their wives at the Little Red Barn in San Antonio. Among those from this area who attended were John T. Floore and Mr. and Mrs. Lato Martinez.

At 10:30 a.m. present a scroll to John T. Floore, "Mayor of Helotes." Have a lunch stop at FM 1560 & FM 1604 intersection. Make camp for the night at 4:45 p.m. at Bitters Road and San Pedro Hwy.

At 7 a.m., Thursday, Feb. 6, hit the trail again. Stop at 8:15 at Bitters and Nacogdoches Road. Arrive at Coliseum for lunch at 12:30 p.m. Stock show officials will welcome all nine trail rides with fanfare there at 2 p.m. Make camp for the night at 3 p.m.

From 7:30 to 11 p.m., the Youth Trail Ride Party made up of those 20 years old and younger, will have a supper and dance compliments of the San Antonio Livestock Show under the chairmanship of Mr. Charles John of Circle R. Guest Ranch, Medina, Texas. The adult party, also Feb. 6, will be at 8 p.m. at the Pearl Corral and will include presentation of the Queen.

On Friday, Feb. 7, at 7 a.m., the riders will leave the Coliseum for the parade area in downtown San Antonio. The Cowboy Capital Trail will officially end after the parade.
