## Mobile Home Problems Stymie Council

### Solarfest To Return Sept. 2

Heading the celebration of Labor Day weekend in Helotes will be the Third Annual South Texas Solarfest, to be held Sunday, Sept. 2, at Villarreal's Ice House, from 11 a.m. to midnight.

Musical groups and singles who will show their support for the promotion of solar energy by donating their talents to the Solarfest include Jerry Jeff Walker, Augie Meyers, Claude Morgan, the Blast, Drugstore Cowboys, Ponty Bone and the Squeeze Tones, B. Bumble and the Stingers, Cecil and Sylvia, Bepko, Fletcher and Rose, Sojourn, Rex Foster, Bill Oliver, Muleskinner, Melissa Javors and Eddie Shook, Steven O. Sellars and many more.

Solarfest is sponsored by the San Antonio Forum on Energy (SAFE) and the Institute for Design of Environmental Alternatives, Inc. (IDEA). Both are non-profit organizations dedicated to promoting appropriate technology (energy systems that are appropriate for the climate, economy and needs of the people of South Texas).

Businesses dealing with wind generation, solar energy, biomass, conservation and energy efficiency are invited to participate in the festival by setting up displays and literature tables at no charge. This area of the Solarfest will be free to the public.

For music, and a variety of food, drinks, arts and crafts, tickets will be \$3 in advance at all Rainbow Ticket Master locations or \$4 at the gate.

In the two previous years Solarfest has attracted crowds of approximately 5,000 people.

Proceeds from the event will be used to further the promotion of solar energy and conservation by establishing an appropriate technology resource center, public workshops, seminars and energy forums.

SAFE's platform includes a requirement that building codes be altered to require all new construction, both residential and commercial, to be equipped with solar hot water heaters and constructed to meet strict energy efficiency requirements.

SAFE also seeks to have citizen

### Hearing Set Aug. 30 On Budget

The Helotes City Council struggled with building codes and temporary buildings during their meeting Thursday night.

After months of putting off adoption of a building code for the city, the Council once more tabled the subject Thursday and voted to invite a representative of each of the two principal codes to speak to the Council. The codes are the National Standard Code and the Southern Code.

Two citizens appeared before the Council to express surprise and dismay at notices they had received from the City Attorney that they must move mobile homes on their lots within 30 days or pay a \$200 a day fine.

One was Charles Smith of Helotes Ranch Acres. He was given a permit by the City Engineer last October to move a mobile home on his property while he superintended the building of his permanent home. Recently the City Board of Adjustment ruled that the engineer had been in error in granting the permit.

Smith claimed he was not notified of the meeting of the Board of Adjustment at which the decision was made on his property.

The other citizen was Abel Cruz, a contractor, who occupies a temporary office building on the property of Tom McCabe next to the post office. He claimed also to have been given permission by the City Engineer to move the temporary structure onto the McCabe property. It is not used as a home but strictly as an office. He also claimed he received no notice of impending action by the Board of Adjustment against his office building.

The City Council members present and the Mayor told Smith and Cruz that they do not know what to suggest as to how to avoid moving the buildings or get out of paying the fine. They told City Secretary Judy Reichardt to contact the City Attorney, Havey Hardy, Friday and find out what he suggests.

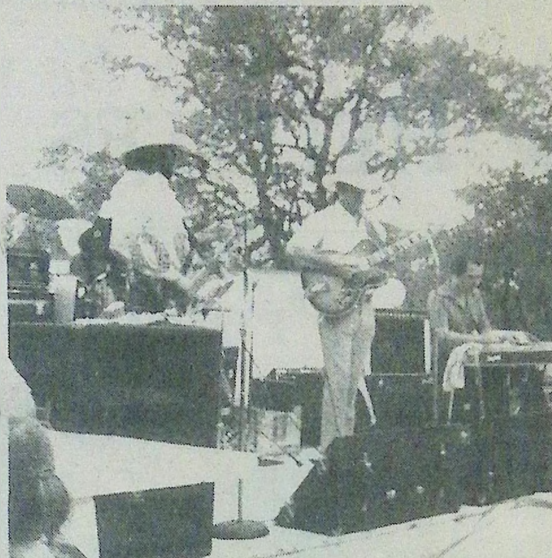

## Edwards Wells Rise

Despite a dry July throughout the Edwards Underground Water District, water well levels at Sabinal, Hondo and Castroville registered increases early in August compared with the readings at the end of June, the District office has announced.

Water levels dropped at Uvalde, San Antonio, New Braunfels and San Marcos, and spring flow in New Braunfels and San Marcos continued to decline, the office said.

Readings were taken between Aug. 2 and 9 at the index well sites.

Following are the water well levels shown in altitude above mean sea level:

Uvalde: 858.4 feet, down 3.3 feet;  
Sabinal: 711.6 feet, up 2.3 feet;  
Hondo: 667.0 feet, up 5.5 feet;  
Castroville: 647.2 feet, up 5.0 feet;  
San Antonio: 623.7 feet, down 0.2 foot; New Braunfels: 619.7 feet, down 0.3 foot; San Marcos: 574.4 feet, down 0.2 foot.

San Marcos Springs declined 22.5 cubic feet per second to a flow of 74 cfs on Aug. 2, compared with the longterm average of 168 cfs. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were down 11 cfs to a flow of 32 cfs on Aug. 6, compared with the average of 299 cfs.

Weather modification proposals and initiation of studies of two potential recharge reservoir project sites in Uvalde County were considered at a special meeting of the board of directors of the Edwards Underground Water District this week.

The board, representing Bexar, Comal, Hays, Medina and Uvalde Counties, met in the conference room of the District's new headquarters at 1615 N. St. Mary's St. in San Antonio.

Directors considered awarding a contract for a weather modification (cloud seeding) program in the Edwards Aquifer area. The two possible sites for a surface reservoir project for recharge of the aquifer are at Concan on the Frio River and near Reagan Wells on the Dry Frio, both north of Uvalde.

Purpose of the reservoir would be to store runoff water for release later as needed to maintain the water levels in the aquifer as near a desired point as possible, Fox said.

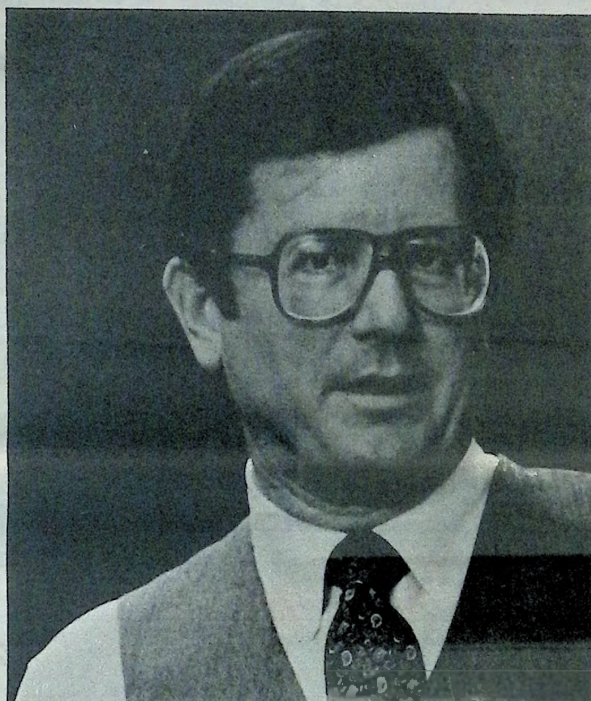

## Museum Acquires Major 17th Century Painting

"Saint John in the Wilderness", by 17th century Italian painter, Luca Giordano (1634-1705), has been acquired by the San Antonio Museum Association. "This acquisition is a very significant one for us", explained John Mahey, director of the Museum of Art. "This religious painting of the Baroque period was chosen because it represents the same painting tradition out of which Spanish Colonial painting emerged."

"St. John in the Wilderness" was probably painted while Giordano was a young man. The painting depicts St. John seated in a forest, wearing the skin of a wild animal. His twisted pose suggests that he is responding to the voice of God.

It was purchased with funds provided by the Ewing Halsell Foundation.

"Saint John in the Wilderness" is now on view at the San Antonio Museum of Art, 200 West Jones Avenue, Tuesday through Sunday during regular museum hours: 10 a.m. - 6 p.m. Tuesday-Saturday, 12 noon - 6 p.m. Sunday and Thursday from 10 a.m. - 9 p.m.

## Along Our Route

Helotes, Texas

Dear Editor:

After many months of trying, through a very crowded court system, it now appears that we — Guy Williams, Col. and Mrs. E.G. Scroggins, Dr. and Mrs. White and Mr. and Mrs. James Brigran — will have our day in court in a law suit versus Happy Acres Day Care Center, owned and operated by Eulalia and Margaret Aguilar of 11040 Indian Trail, Helotes Ranch Acres Unit 4, Helotes, Texas.

Happy Acres Day Care Center was formed about two years ago in the most strict violation of our existing deed restrictions. Those deed restrictions state that no commercial operation of any nature will be permitted.

This commercial operation at the outset has been supported mostly by people who live in Helotes Ranch Acres Units 3 and 4 and Helotes Park Estates, but has carried over into the surrounding area.

The Aguilar's now have at least 27 children enrolled, not including the afternoon school bus, which drops off more children. As many as eight are dropped off by the afternoon bus. At times there are as many as 35 children, not counting the hired help. The front yard is used as a playground for the children to ride bikes and other toys.

Our home (Guy Williams') is directly across the street from the day care center and for the last two years we and the other families of the immediate area have had to adjust our lifestyle from one that was at one time very peaceful, quiet, secluded and tranquil to something that has become a nightmare of traffic, noise, confusion, speeding cars, and not to mention the outright disrespect of our homes and the lifestyle we had in the past.

The traffic starts at 5:30 a.m. and is continuous until around 6:30 p.m. That is 13 hours a day, 5 days a week, 52 weeks a year. The people who have their homes in the immediate area of the Aguilar's have lost everything they have all fought so hard to have. Because of the Aguilar's and those who use the day care center, we no longer are privileged to have what the rest of our neighbors have.

Let me state to those who are from Helotes Ranch Acres and Helotes Park Estates that when their children are older and they no longer need the day care center, someone will take their place and use what these people have established.

If we win or lose in court (not to mention the large amount of money the law suit costs), I want to express my feelings to those who support the day care center, that if it were across the street or next to your home, how would they feel?

Every person's home is supposed to be his castle. Our has become a playground for our neighbors' children.

## Nation's Top Educator To Speak

Trinity University will present Dr. Ernest L. Boyer, selected by his peers as the leading educator in the nation, in a special public lecture Wednesday, Sept. 12, at 8 p.m. in Laurie Auditorium.

Boyer's keynote address on the philosophy and structure for general education curriculum is part of Trinity's General Education Conference featuring respected leaders and scholars in higher education.

During his 30-year career, Boyer has established a sterling reputation in the field of education. Since 1980 he has been president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching, an education policy center founded by Andrew Carnegie in 1905.

For five consecutive years, Boyer has been listed by "U.S. News and World Report" as one of the top educators in the nation. A former Commissioner of Education, he administered a \$12 billion federal agency. For seven years Boyer served as head of the largest university in the country—the State University of New York encompassing 64 institutions. He holds 57 honorary degrees. His most recent publication is the widely acclaimed book entitled "High School," a report on secondary education in America.

The lecture is free and open to the public, and seating is on a first-come, first-seated basis.

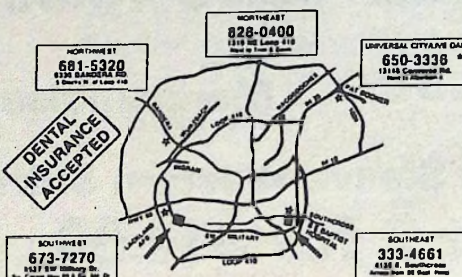

## Pablo Picasso Exhibit To Open UTSA Art Series

Pablo Picasso, New York painter Walt Jurkiewicz Jr. and Dutch environmental artists will share the spotlight with University of Texas at San Antonio student and faculty artists in a series of exhibitions scheduled from September 1984 through February 1985 at The University's Art Teaching Gallery.

"This September marks the start of the Gallery's third year and we will continue to place emphasis on the teaching/learning aspects of our program," said Gallery coordinator Mauricio Gonzalez. "This year we will offer a diverse and ambitious exhibition schedule that will not only prove instructive for UTSA students but will please the San Antonio community as well."

The exhibition "Picasso: Sonnets of Gongora" will launch the Gallery's 1984-85 season of Sept. 4. This exhibition, on loan from the Meadows Museum and Bridwell Library at Southern Methodist University in Dallas, will explore the great artist's work as a book illustrator in a suite of 41 etchings based on 20 sonnets written in the 16th century by Spanish Baroque poet Luis de Gongora. In addition to the title etching, the exhibition also contains pairs of 20 5/8" x 25 5/8" plates for each sonnet. One has the sonnet text etched in dry-point with marginal drawings; the other depicts a head inspired by the poem.

"The Picasso exhibition brings different disciplines together by attracting viewers who are interested in both literature and the visual arts," commented Gonzalez. "We are very proud to bring these little-known works by the famous artist to San Antonio." The show will be on exhibit through Sept. 21.

Prints and photographs, ceramics and sculpture will be among the works representing various media in the "Second Biannual Faculty Show" on display Oct. 1 through Oct. 26. Exhibiting artists are faculty members in the UTSA Division of Art and Design and will include painters Ron Binks, Michael Roskop, Charles Field and Ken Jewesson; photographers James Broderick and Neil Maurer; print-makers Dennis Olsen and Kent Rush; ceramist Steve Reynolds; sculptor Michael Bigger and multimedia artist Toni Rosato.

The Gallery's Visiting Artist Series, which in past seasons has featured such notables as Catherine Lee, Paul Rotterdam, Richard Thompson and Luis Muro, will continue this fall with an exhibition

of paintings by New York artist Walt Jurkiewicz Jr. The artist will devote much of his time during the fall semester to working with UTSA art students. His exhibition, on view Nov. 5 through Nov. 21, will include several canvases that have been displayed previously as well as those paintings completed during Jurkiewicz' Univesity residency.

Another highlight of the 1984-85 Gallery program is "The Art of Designed Environments in the Netherlands" which chronicles the contributions the Dutch have made

to the evolution of environmental design. The exhibition, on display Jan. 14 through Feb. 8, 1985, includes photographs, architectural renderings and scale models of many of these design projects.

"The Dutch environmental art exhibition provides insight into the possibilities and limitations artists and architects face when creating aesthetically pleasing yet structurally sound human environments," said Gonzalez.

The exhibition "The Art of Designed Environments" is a

project sponsored by IBM-The Netherlands, Stichting Kunst en Bedrijf, the Dutch Ministry of Culture and the University of Arkansas at Little Rock.

All exhibitions in the UTSA Art Teaching Gallery, located in the Arts Building on campus, are free and open to the public. Gallery hours of operation are Monday through Friday, 11 a.m. to 4 p.m., and by appointment. # Polio Still Threat Here For Unimmunized, Doctor Says

Complacency often leads to a false sense of security when it comes to childhood immunization, contends a San Antonio pediatrician.

"Most parents with young children are too young themselves to have seen the devastating effects of polio, for example," says Ciro Sumaya, M.D., professor in the infectious diseases division of pediatrics at The University of Texas Health Science Center. "They don't realize how serious the disease can be." Sumaya urges parents to have their children inoculated against polio and other communicable diseases before the upcoming school year begins.

Many illnesses are contagious before symptoms appear, he points out, so disease can spread quickly in a school before anyone is aware of it. Also, state law mandates that each school-age child be immunized unless the child receives a medical or religious exemption.

Even though polio has been wiped out in most states, the threat of polio is still quite real in South and West Texas, according to the doctor. Cases of the disease continue to be reported in this area because of the immigration of unimmunized people from other countries.

Polio is only one example of diseases that have been dramatically reduced through immunization. Consider measles. In 1971, 79 percent of children in Texas public schools were inoculated against measles. That year 9,585 cases were reported.

By 1982, 99 percent of children were vaccinated, and only 129 cases of measles were reported statewide. So far this year no cases of the disease have been reported in Bexar County, according to statistics from the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District.

Serious diseases such as diphtheria, tetanus (lockjaw), and pertussis (whooping cough) have become rarities because of immunization, Sumaya says.

Several new vaccines may be just around the corner, he adds, including one to prevent chicken pox.

"Right now that vaccine is being tested in high-risk cases such as children with cancer. It is possible that in the next few years the vaccine can be recommended for all children."

A leader in the evaluation of this vaccine among children is Philip Brunell, M.D. chief of pediatric infectious diseases at the health science center, Sumaya notes.

Another new vaccine undergoing experimental evaluation can prevent a severe form of meningitis and blood infection, according to Sumaya. There is also much research, he says, into reducing side effects or discomforts produced by some of the currently recommended vaccines.

Immunization is not only for the young or for people traveling abroad.

"Adults who live in relatively enclosed settings with a large number of people such as college students, military personnel and medical personnel in contact with patients should also protect themselves against infectious diseases," Sumaya says.

"People in high-risk groups, such as lung and heart disease patients, are other good candidates,

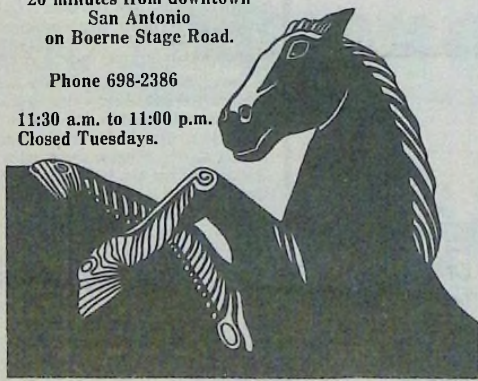

Examination of the fingernails and toenails helps, of course, in the diagnosis of diseases of the skin and nails, but few people know that changes in the nails can pinpoint internal disorders, often with surprising accuracy. Nails that are white, yellow or, even green, are banded, or contain linear red or brown areas, may all point to some disease.

Small scattered white spots on fingernails are due to minor injury at the base of the nail. Contrary to popular belief, these spots have no significance for health in general, nor do they represent a calcium deficiency. Transverse white bands on all twenty nails are a visible sign of arsenic poisoning; nail clippings can then confirm the diagnosis. Similar bands sometimes occur in leprosy.

Total whiteness of all twenty nails may occur. If it has been present from childhood, it is hereditary; but the later appearance of opaque white nails may be a sign of severe liver disease. Transverse white bands sometimes occur in protein deficiency; these will disappear after the disorder has been corrected. Chronic kidney failure can cause "half-and-half" nails, the base half white, turning brown further out.

Loosening of a nail, known medically as onycholysis, usually produces a superficial white color. A patchy separation can occur after injury or after severe disease. Sometimes it's due to psoriasis. Fungus or bacterial infections can loosen a nail, and about a fourth of patients with an overactive thyroid will lose fingernails from time to time! Loose nails, regardless of the cause, invite invasion by the *Pseudomonas* germ with a resultant green discoloration of the infected area.

Longitudinal black or brown bands in the nails are usually due to a benign brown mole deep in the nail root which supplies pigment into a strip of the growing nail. A majority of black individuals are born with one or more of these nails. But if such lines develop in any race later on in life, one has to think about Addison's disease of the adrenals, malignant melanoma, and pituitary tumors.

There's a Yellow Nail Syndrome caused by obstruction of the tiny lymphatic vessels in the fingers. Sometimes there is intermittent nail-shedding. These yellow nails may be associated with chronic chest infection, sinusitis, thyroid deficiency, or even malignancy.

Beau's lines, cross-wise furrows in the nails, are due to a temporary growth disturbance in the nail root, like annual growth rings of trees are altered by drought, fire or flood. The ridges can occur after high fever, pregnancy, a heart attack, or emotional shock, but won't become visible until a month or two after the incident. A doctor may appear to be Sherlock Holmes when he glances at your nails to find a transverse groove, and says, "I note you had a rather severe illness about six weeks ago."

Alterations of the nails, unless they have been present since birth, should be called to your physician's attention. These changes may be manifestations of some underlying disorder.

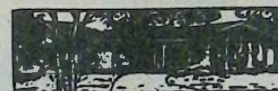

## Rattlers Add 10 New Players

There will be 10 new names on the St. Mary's University men's basketball roster this season. Three hail from Los Angeles, Calif.; one from Memphis, Tenn.; one from Weisner, La.; one from Moss Point, Miss.; and one from Wichita, Kan. Three of the new faces are from San Antonio.

The San Antonians include junior transfer James Douglas and freshmen Darrell Keller and Pat Sheridan, both from Central Catholic High School.

Douglas, 6'8", comes from Butler County Junior College in El Dorado, Kan. "He has an NBA body," Coach Buddy Meyer says, "but will have to overcome two years absence from basketball as well as knee surgery to fulfill his potential as a dominant player."

Keller, 6'2", and Sheridan, 6'5", both come from a traditional winning program at Central. Point guard Keller "could be a sleeper in the current group of freshmen," according to Meyer.

All-city performer Sheridan, who led Central to the TCIL Class 4A state title, was the city scoring champ with a 20.3 average. "Physically, he has the ability to compete in the rugged aspects of the game," Meyer says. "He runs quite well for his age and stature."

The three California additions are senior Russell Jackson, junior Kenneth Jackson and freshman David Gray.

Russell Jackson, 6'6", returns to

St. Mary's basketball after a year's absence. The English communication arts major has good basketball skills both offensively and defensively, according to Meyer, and will press hard for a starting position, whether outside or inside.

With an exceptional senior year, Jackson could catch the eyes of NBA scouts, the St. Mary's coach believes.

Kenneth Jackson of Valley Community College is the top recruit for the 1984 campaign. The 6'2" point guard "fits the mold of past point guards such as Jai Mahone and Harry O'Brien in that he plays good defense, is capable of making the big play and can be creative in the offensive end," according to Meyer.

Gray, 6'2", comes from L.A. basketball power, Crenshaw High School and "fits into the quickness mold of previous Rattler teams," Meyer says.

A transfer from Hinds County Junior College in Mississippi, Carl Douglas, 6'4", is the nephew of former Rattler star, Henry Douglas. Meyer expects the Louisianian to be redshirted in the '84-'85 season, although his abilities should allow him to play in the future.

Todd Gandy, a 6'6" forward from Independence Community College and a native of Wichita, Kan., has strengths in what Coach Meyer calls the "undesirable" parts of the game — rebounding and defense.

## Trinity Picks Benson To Coach Tennis

John Benson, who led the Trinity University men's tennis team to the quarterfinals of the 1984 NCAA Championships as interim coach, has been named as head coach for the 1984-85 academic year.

Benson, who will take over as coach on Sept. 1, succeeds Bob McKinley, who resigned in April to accept a position in Chicago with a major sporting goods company.

After becoming interim coach after McKinley's departure, Benson compiled a 6-2 record and a berth in the national collegiate tournament at Athens, Ga., where the Tigers beat Minnesota in the first round and then lost 5-4 to Pepperdine in the quarterfinals.

The 1984 team finished with a 25-7 dual match mark, and was ranked sixth nationally at the end of the season. Benson served as Trinity assistant coach the first part of the year.

Dick Stockton, the 1972 NCAA singles champion while playing for Trinity and an internationally-

known pro performer, originally was named as Tiger coach but asked to be relieved of his contractual obligations because of "personal reasons." University officials agreed to the request.

A three-time All-American at Trinity, Benson was runnerup for the national collegiate doubles championship with Tony Giammalva in 1980.

After graduating from Trinity in 1981 following a highly successful college tennis career which found him winning 81 and losing only 25 singles dual matches, Benson joined the professional tour. He has played in a number of major tournaments, including the U.S. Open and the All-England Championships at Wimbledon. He has shared in winning three major Grand Prix doubles championships.

Benson's 81 college career victories rank fifth in Trinity tennis annals, behind only Larry Gottfried, Erick Iskersky, Ben McKown and Giammalva, all well-known Tiger players.

In addition to reaching the finals of the NCAA Championships in 1980, Benson and Giammalva were doubles quarterfinalists in 1979, when Trinity finished as the No. 2 team in the nation. That year, the pair compiled a 19-1 won-lost record, one of the best Tiger doubles marks for a season.

Benson was a member of the Trinity net team in the 1979-81 period. He was named to the 1981 U.S. Junior Davis Cup Team, and was on the national team that played matches against Communist China. At the 1980 NCAA Championships he received the Rafael Osuna Award for Sportsmanship, and in 1981 was the NCAA Senior Player of the Year.

A four-time Colorado high school singles champion, he was named the state's High School Athlete of the Year in 1977. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William R. Benson of 5090 S. Franklin, Englewood, Colo.

## Trinity Tigers To Begin Workouts

Fifty hopefuls are expected to greet Coach Gene Norris and his staff as Trinity University begins practice for its 78th football season Sunday, Aug. 19.

Players trying for places on San Antonio's only college football team will report for physical examinations at 4 p.m. Sunday, then go through an hour of conditioning exercises at the end of the day.

Workouts get under way in earnest Monday when two-day practice sessions start. Morning and afternoon workouts are on tap through Wednesday, with daily 4 to 6 p.m. sessions set to begin Thursday with the opening of classes at Trinity.

The Tiger gridders should almost be equally divided among returning lettermen and newcomers, with the indication that 24 letter-winners should be back. The remainder of the squad will consist of squadmen, freshmen, transfers and walk-ons.

Coach Norris is expecting seven 1983 offensive starters back, but anticipates that only four defensive stalwarts will return.

Included in the offensive starters returning are last year's leading rusher, Allen Fowler, who averaged more than four yards per carry, and the top passer, Greg Caffey, who completed almost a third of his passes for four touchdowns and had only nine intercepted.

Also back is the outstanding kickoff return specialist from 1983—Rickey McKinley—and David Garcia, who intercepted four passes for 180 yards... one of these for a 100-yard return to break an all-time Trinity record.

Trinity will have to rebuild the defensive line that last year allowed its opponents an average on the ground of under 110 yards per game. The Tigers hope to improve their pass defense which was their

primary vulnerability in 1983.

They will welcome back Charlie Roberts, a 6-5, 300-pound offensive tackle from Pearland, who was out of action in 1983 after lettering the previous year.

Trinity will have less than three weeks to prepare for its season-opener at home against Lawrence of

Appleton, Wis., on Friday, Sept. 7.

Since opening grid play with a 17-0 loss to Baylor in 1900, the Tigers have won 293 games, lost 329 and tied 47. They did not field teams in the period during World War II. In his 10 years as Trinity head coach, Norris' record stands at 49 victories, 47 losses and four ties.

These were the findings of a

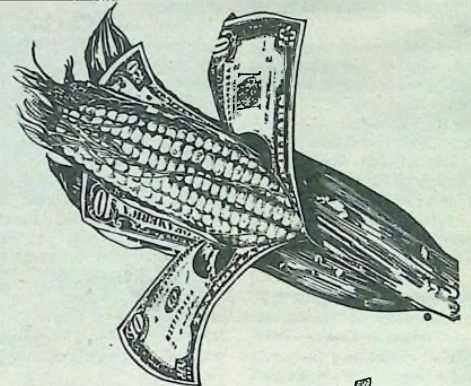

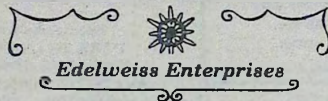

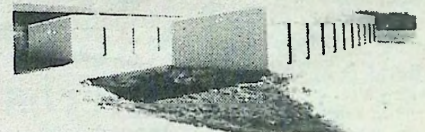

## A&M architecture professor designs energy-efficient home

COLLEGE STATION—If  
you think the Smithsonian is  
the only place you'll ever see  
another \$20 monthly utility bill,  
think again.

A Texas A&M University archi-  
tect has completed plans for  
a two to four bedroom, two  
bath house that, if operated  
properly, could use an average  
of less than \$20 a month in  
energy costs.

Raymond Reed, professor of  
architecture and a member of  
the American Institute of Archi-  
tects Task Force on Energy  
Conservation, said the next  
step in the Gulf States Utilities-  
sponsored project is to con-  
struct the house and operate it  
as an experimental model. •

Energy-saving features in  
the proposed 1,720-square-foot  
house include airtight vestibules  
that prevent the loss of heat  
and cooling, five-inch metal  
stud foam exterior walls and a  
seven-inch foam ceiling. The  
house also has a second metal  
roof which in summer provides  
continuous shade and a cool  
breeze through the space be-  
tween the two roofs. In winter,  
the separating space is closed  
off and the metal roof acts as a  
solar collector.

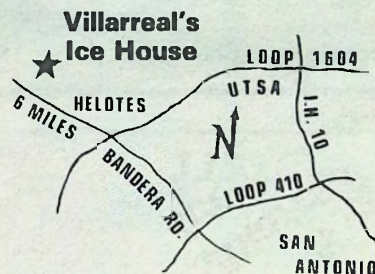
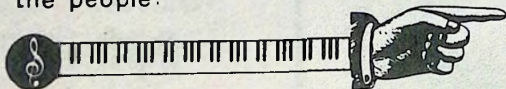
