The gala event had former reigning queens, dancers, gun-slingers, comedians, and singers. San Antonio—Spl.—The Environmental Protection Agency will hold a hearing in the Missions Room of the Convention Center in San Antonio commencing at 9 a.m. June 4 to hear evidence concerning the designation of the Edwards Underground Reservoir as the sole source of drinking water for the San Antonio area, and for determining which counties, or parts of counties, constitute the San Antonio area.

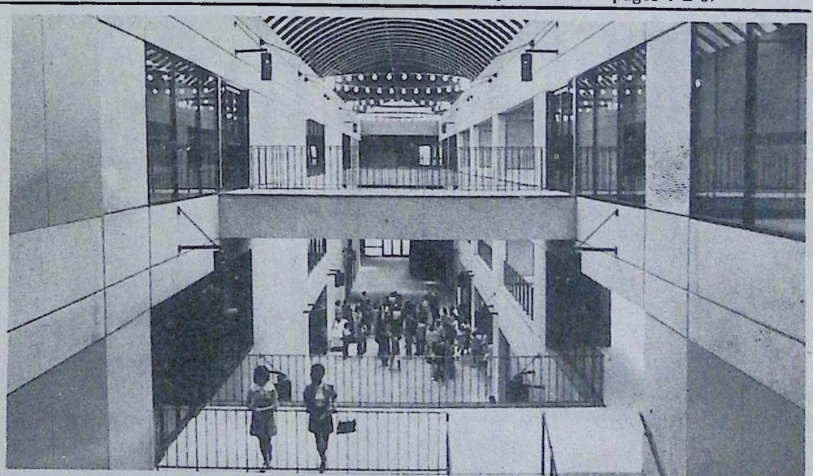
Comments are also solicited regarding whether if the Edwards Aquifer is contaminated it would create a significant hazard to public health, and whether development expected to take place in the recharge zone will pollute the water supply. The agency is particularly interested in comments and data relative to the geographical area which should be considered in the possible designation.

The Edwards Underground Water District contends no EPA action concerning the Edwards Underground Reservoir is necessary because Texas Water

## A Spirit Filled Teacher Looks at the Word of God

The Epistle to the Galatians, Chapter One, Verse Four

4 τοῦ ζῶντος ἑαυτὸν ὑπὲρ τῶν ἁμαρτωλῶν ἡμῶν,  
who gave himself for our sins,

In our last study we answered the question, "WHAT IS SIN?" Now we want to look at . . .

### THE RESULTS OF SIN

That we have sinned, there is no argument (RO 3:23) . . . What we need to understand is, "What is God's attitude towards those sins?"

The only reliable source for this information is the Holy Bible. (We know beyond doubt that the Bible is the inerrant, infallible Word of God, and we have the evidence to prove it. If you want to hear this proof, feel free to phone me any evening after 6:00 p.m. except Tuesday or Wednesday, and I will relate it to you.)

The Scriptures inform us that the real vital, spiritual, ETERNAL LIFE that brings Love, Peace, Joy, and Everlasting Hope, abides in God. The Lord Jesus is the only source of Eternal Life. (1 John 5: 11-12)

When men reject God's Word, rebel against His Will, and fill their hearts with unbelief, they begin to practice sin, and God thus is forced to classify them as "SINNERS."

### THE PERFECT GOD

Now the same Bible teaches that God is Perfect. (By Perfect we mean that nothing can be added or subtracted from God to make Him better.) It also states He is Holy and that Perfect Holiness demands that He sees sin and records it.

Not only that, but the Perfect Justice of God demands that the penalty for Sin be paid in full.

. . . . And that Penalty is to be separated from God's fellowship (ISA 59:2) . . . and thus separated from the Grace and Influence of the Holy Spirit. Man is automatically cut off from the only source of Eternal Life and he dies spiritually (EZEK 18:30; RO 6:23).

If he remains in this state until his physical body dies, he then slips down into Hades. There he awaits the White Throne Judgement (Rev. 20:15) where he receives his final eternal sentence. The books that have recorded his deeds are opened to him so he can see his sentence is just. Then he is cast forever into the Lake of Fire. That is the future result of Man's rebellion, unbelief and sin . . . .

### THE RESULT OF SIN TODAY

In this life today, men in sin live lives a little above the level of the animal. His self-centeredness breeds war, poverty, crime, hate, sickness, disease, and spiritual and mental bondages.

He has no lasting hope, purpose, joy, or fulfillment. He is a slave to sin and is dragged down to the depths while he sits in his comfortable houses and watches himself destroyed on his color T.V. . . . going nowhere . . . just one more rat in the endless race.

Against this picture of despair is the good news of the Gospel . . . that God loves you and He has made a way of ESCAPE from both the results and judgements of sin. You can be SAVED today and know you are saved beyond any measure of doubt . . . by simply believing on and receiving the Lord Jesus Christ as your very own personal Saviour . . . right now . . . Today . . .

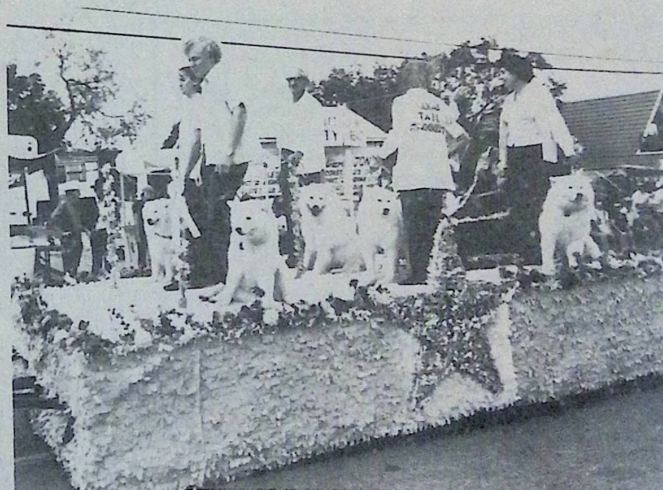

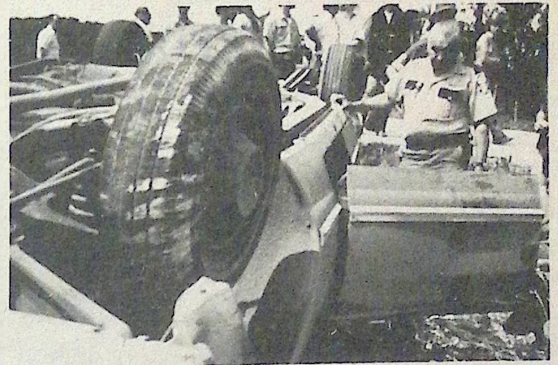
