## Referendum Vote To Be August 25

The referendum election posted originally for July 28, 1973, for the City of Grey Forest residents to vote on whether to have ad valorem taxes has been officially postponed. Mrs. Gretchen Stappenbeck, election judge, has established Saturday, August 25, 1973, as the new date. The election will be held at the Grey Forest City Hall from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Both property and non-property owners will be entitled to vote. Only those voters qualified by residence, whether property owners or not, however, will be allowed to cast a vote.

Absentee voting began August 6 and will continue through August 21 at the City Hall, open Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with the exception of one hour from 11:30 a.m. to 12:20 p.m. each day, Mrs. Stappenbeck said.

The election was postponed when it was determined that earlier absentee dates could not be observed because ballots had not been provided in time. The City Council was polled by Mayor Sam

Terry, and they agreed to endorse the postponement to the August 25 date, it was announced at the called City Council meeting August 3.

Mrs. Bertha Kempf will also serve as an election judge.

## Festival Assn. To Elect Slate

The Helotes Spring Festival Assn., at their recent Finale party at Parrigin Pavilion, enjoyed a review by way of moving pictures, taken by Leon Schueneman, of the 1973 Festival and the parade as well as the 1971 event. Mr. Schueneman also announced that any organizations wishing to have him show these pictures as part of their program may contact him to arrange dates.

President of the Festival Assn., Dr. James Arthur also announced that the elections would be held for next year's offices at the regular meeting at Floore Country Store on Wednesday, September 12. A nominating committee is completing the slate, and a membership drive will also be launched at that time.

Reports from the treasurer, and committee members indicated that this year's Cornyval was a

success. The members present voted to keep the date for 1974 as the second week-end in May—tried for the first time last year.

## Folklife Festival To Be Sept. 6-9

San Antonio, the fiesta city, takes on an international look when the University of Texas at San Antonio Institute of Texan Cultures stages the second annual Texas Folklife Festival, September 6-9.

The Texas Folklife Festival, to be held on the Institute's 13 1/2 acre HemisFair site, is designed to tell how Texans traditionally have fun. It will feature fun events and activities that range from champion watermelon seed spitters to Indian stick ball demonstrations; from toe-tappin' German Oompah bands to sandcastle-building contests with Galveston beauty queens.

The French-Alsatians of Castroville, representing the Castroville St. Louis Day Celebration, will make their initial appearance at the Texas Folklife Festival serving genuine French cuisine. Charles L. Suehs and Dr. Woodrow W. Sharp, Castroville, are co-chairmen.

The Chilypiad Festival, San Marcos, will host a display of the ingredients for making chili and will serve "Bowls of Red" under the watchful eye of food chairman Jim Hearne.

The huge, gaily-decorated "Mexican Market", representing the "Night In Old San Antonio", will tempt visitors with a dozen traditional Mexican dishes in-

## Survey Here To Help State

A data-gathering survey has been underway in the State, with Helotes as one of the local units chosen, to find out what families with children less than six years old do to provide care for them during the day. Houston and

Dallas areas are also being surveyed.

Dr. C. Wade Clifton and Dr. Gerald F. Higgins, who are economics professors at The University of Texas at Austin, are in charge of gathering the material. Al Rodriguez who has a research office at St. Mary's University is conducting the interviews.

The State of Texas, with a program originating in the Governor's Office, will use the computerized data to determine any action which the State may take to assist children or their families, should the need arise, one spokesman said. No advance conclusions are being drawn, he explained.

The program is somewhat complicated by the fact that five and six year olds are now required to attend kindergarten for the first time here, setting them in a slightly different category than their younger brothers and sisters. The survey is not concentrating on ethnic or economic differences, the directors here said, but will consider all children chiefly on an age basis. The question, it ap-

pears, boils down to, "Who takes care of the child—if anyone does—during the day?" And any action will depend upon the answer to that question, it appears now.

Did the Mayas traverse this area before or after settling below the Rio Grande? Legends of hidden and lost cities—of marvelously carved citadels are as old as the first settlers—the Indians—who told of the cities and purportedly showed some of them to conquistadores. The newcomers were—as they often reported—sworn never to reveal the sites. How many carvings are just wind and weathering action and how many are worn-out or destroyed works of Mayan art? This subject is now being studied by Hill Country archeologists independently and in groups, and every clue is being examined. As late as one hundred years ago, there were old timeers who claimed to know about it and some have mapped the areas.

## Firemen Suffer Smoke Inhalation

A spectacular fire which threw flames 60 feet into the sky, injured two local firefighters and resulted in a loss to a well-known institute of two buildings and many records. The buildings are near Leon Springs.

David Ade of Flying W Trail and James Boyle of Circle A Trail here are recuperating at their homes after receiving medical attention in hospitals.

The two 17-year-old fire fighters with the Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Department were hospitalized for smoke inhalation suffered while they battled a quarter-million dollar fire at Concept Therapy Institute, located on the Boerne Stage Road. The fire broke out before 9:45 p.m., Thursday, August 2, and the local fire department joined by Leon Springs Volunteer Fire Department was called to fight the blaze. Among other units present was the Grey Forest Fire Department also.

According to Chief Ray Garrison, the intense heat and smoke first caused injury to Boyle who was taken to Wilford Hall USAF Medical Center for emergency treatment. Soon after

Ade was taken to Bexar County Hospital.

The fire fighting continued for several hours, and water from a swimming pool on the premises was added to the original supply. Sheriff's deputies, making the inspection, and fire officials attributed the start of the \$250,000 blaze to a possible electrical short.

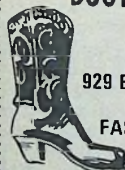

## Federal Lunch Program Adopted

The Northside Independent School District Board of Trustees has adopted a new federal lunch program scale, making more families eligible for free and reduced-price meals at school.

Income requirements for free meals, down from last year, range from \$2740 annually with one child to \$10,880 with 12 children.

Requirements for reduced price meals range up to \$3280 with one child and \$13060 with 12 children. Parents desiring to inquire should call the principal at their neighborhood school. Applications may be made any time during the school year, but parents must be aware that ten days are required for processing free lunch requests.

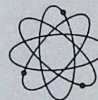
