The weather this week continued to run along a thin line between winter and spring. The temperature moved daily between the upper thirties and the upper fifties. It was too cold for spring. A prolonged thunderstorm Tuesday night and morning dropped two inches of rainfall—the most at one time in several months—and the creeks started running again. Bluebonnets and other wild flowers have started to bloom, and with a little warm weather the flowers should spread profusely.

Postmaster Vi Swift retired March 1. After a vacation trip to Arkansas and Missouri, she now is back in Helotes. A new postmaster is to be named by the U.S. Postal Service.

Delbert Sorrell, well-known former Helotes resident, died Wednesday, March 16, after a long illness, and was buried Saturday, March 19, in the cemetery at Dripping Springs following services at the Oakhills Funeral Home in San Antonio. The Sorrells had lived in recent months in Pipe Creek.

The Helotes VFW Post will sponsor a ham shoot Saturday March 26, at Braun Hall, beginning at 10 a.m. John Adams, chairman of the shoot, said, "Come out and win yourself a nice ham for Easter."

Helotes Meets The Candidates



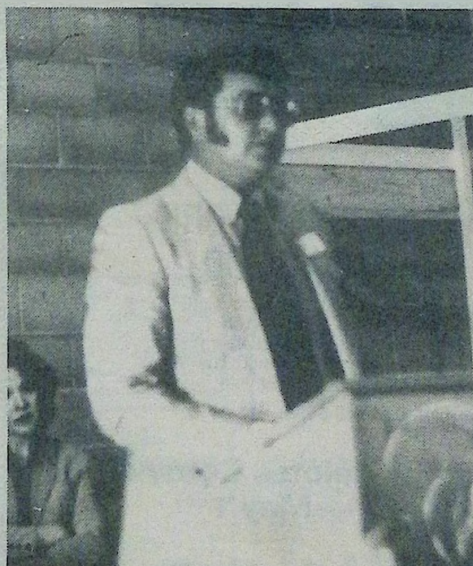
Leonard Hill is one of the five incumbent city councilmen who are running for re-election. Only two incumbents drew opposition. They are Reudy Loeffler, opposed by Phil Pittman, Jr. and Pat Wootton, opposed by Pete Cantu.



Six of the candidates for the Helotes city council in the April 2 election await their turn to speak at the Meet the Candidates session held Sunday afternoon, March 20, at the Helotes Lions Club Pavilion. The session was sponsored by the Helotes Lions and the Helotes Home Owners Association. The candidates are Pat Wootton, Reudy Loeffler, Guy Burnett, Pete Cantu, Verna Thompson and Phil Pittman, Jr. At the speaker's stand is Leonard Hill, the seventh candidate.



Tom Beatty is the incumbent mayor, opposed by Frank Thompson. The voting on April 2 will be held in the Helotes Hills Methodist Church building from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. Kathy Langlinalis will be election judge.



Frank Thompson, Helotes contractor, is seeking to unseat the incumbent mayor. Absentee voting in the Helotes city election is continuing at the city hall through March 29. City elections also will be held in Grey Forest and Leon Valley, and on the same day an election for the Northside District school board will be held.

Northside To Elect Two Trustees

Two members of the Northside District school board will be elected on April 2. The two are incumbents and both are unopposed. They are Virginia Myers, in Place 3, currently serving as board secretary, and W. J. (Tex) Thornton, in Place 4.

Voters in the Helotes area will vote at Helotes School. They include voters in Precincts 2061, 2062 (those living west of Scenic Loop Road), 2063, 2064, and 2065. Voters in Precinct 2062 who live east of Scenic Loop Road will vote at the new Locke Hill School on DeZavala Road.

Voters in Precinct 1073, who used to vote at Helotes School, will vote at Pease Middle School, 201 Hunt Lane.

Also voting at Helotes School will be voters in Medina County Precinct 9

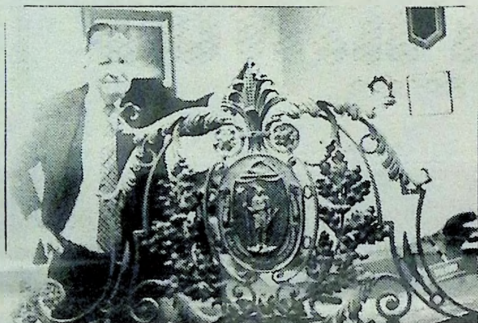

Bank Elects Directors

The Helotes State Bank held its first annual stockholders meeting on Wednesday, March 2, in Helotes, according to Dale Parker, president.

The stockholders elected twelve directors to serve for the coming year. Elected were: Norman L. Wulfsohn, Frank J. Corte, Herbert G. Davis, Calvin Galm, Scott Holden, Robert T. Lee, Maurene Mullins, Seth Newberger, Dale Parker, Ken Rehler, Howard Timlin and H.C. Wehring, Jr.

The stockholders also approved a proposal to form

a one-bank-holding company.

Norman L. Wulfsohn, chairman of the board, announced that the Helotes State Bank deposits as of March 2, were 6,605,974, and loans outstanding were \$5,614,334. He also announced that the bank ended its first ten months of operation, December 31, 1982, with a net profit of \$50,340.

The new board re-elected Wulfsohn as chairman, Calvin Galm as vice-chairman and Herbert G. Davis as secretary.

Fiesta Arts Fair Near

April 9 is the deadline for artists and craftsmen to register for participation in the Southwest Craft Center's 1983 Fiesta Arts Fair, according to Mrs. Jon Sandidge, general chairman for the Fair.

Applications have been pouring in for months, but there are still some exhibit spaces left in this fifth annual show. All media are eligible for the popular art exhibition and sale, but the event has been limited to only 100 participants this year. All applications are juried to maintain quality and to insure variety. Only original works will be accepted, Mrs. Sandidge emphasizes, with no manufactured, imported or re-sale items allowed.

The first public event of Fiesta Week, the Arts Fair is set for noon-6 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, April 16-17, on the grounds of the Southwest Craft Center, 300 Augusta Street, San Antonio. The Fair is a major fund-raiser for the Craft Center, a non-profit organization and nationally-recognized arts/crafts school.

An "Artists' Prize Fund" of \$500 will be awarded to five artists for "best overall display of work." Judges, expert in a variety of media, will select those exhibitors receiving the \$200 first prize; \$125 second prize; \$75 third prize; and two \$50 honorable mentions.

The lively mix of art and entertainment, food and family-oriented activity, coordinated with Fiesta for the past five years, began ten years ago as the summertime Craft Experience.

Southwestern Bell Plans New Billing Requirement

Effective April 1, Southwestern Bell operators will not complete long distance calls placed from a public phone and billed to a third number without verbal approval from someone at the third number.

Jim Reed, Southwestern Bell division manager-residence services, said that since February 1982 operators have been attempting to obtain verbal authorization for charges to a third number on long distance calls placed from public phones. However, if there was no answer or the

line was busy, operators completed the call.

Reed emphasized the new guidelines requiring verbal approval for charging long distance calls to third numbers involve only calls placed from public telephones. "It's a relatively simple task to trace long distance callers who charge their calls to a third number from another residence or business telephone," he said. "It becomes more time consuming and difficult, however, to trace the originator of such calls placed from a public phone."

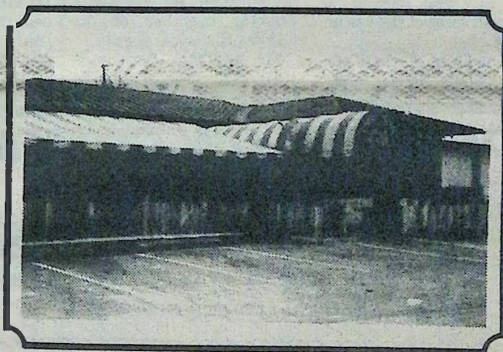

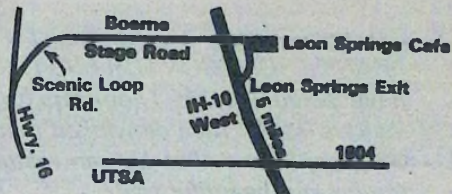

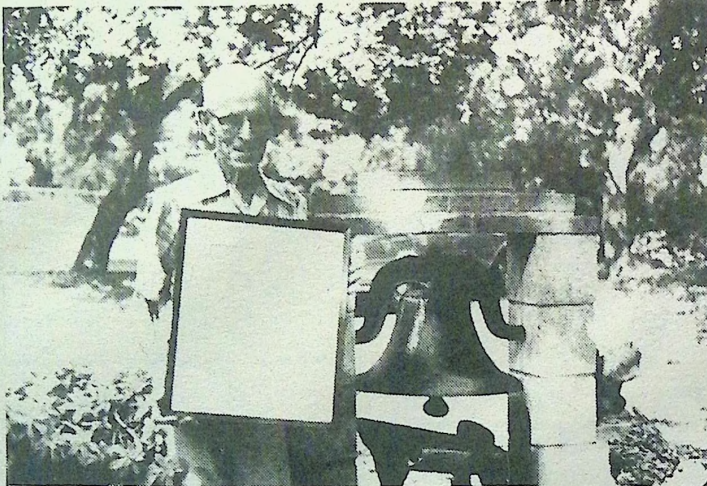

Pioneer Citizen Ross Barham Dies At 87

Ross W. Barham, a well-known Helotes building contractor and philanthropist, and a 60-year resident of this city, died at 5:45 p.m., Tuesday, March 22, in a San Antonio hospital following a brief illness. Born in 1895, Mr. Barham was 87 years old at the time of his death. He was preceded in death by his beloved wife, Matilda Barham, who served as Postmistress of Helotes until 1966.

Mr. and Mrs. Barham purchased land in Helotes in 1923

and built several homes in the Bandera Road and Scenic Loop area, where they spent all their married life.

Mr. Barham, an amateur archeologist and student of Indian lore, was consulted on local history as well. He was a charter member of the Helotes Lions Club and donated the grounds for Helotes Lions Pavilion to that organization. He was also a charter member of the Helotes Historical Society.

Mr. and Mrs. Barham in 1981 established a uni-trust

for the benefit of The University of Texas System. He hoped that all the funds would go into scientific research, especially in the fields which most interested him, geology, astronomy, archaeology, and history.

Mr. Barham was the youngest of four brothers, Ward, Guy, Fred, and himself, Ross. He was born in Dallas Valley, Arkansas, near Mena, during a time that his family was migrating from the Old South. He was a seventh

generation American of English stock, chiefly.

Mr. Barham was a World War I veteran and served overseas in France under heavy battle conditions.

He was a man of action rather than words, but he also had a theory that he could learn something from anyone and he accumulated a vast store of information. His exactness made him an authority on dates and conditions in the area equal to that of persons whose families had been here much longer.

Mr. Barham will be missed by the community where he has many long-time friends. He is survived by several nieces and nephews. A private memorial service was planned in keeping with Mr. Barham's wishes.

Mrs. Onion Dies at 93

Mrs. Harriet Onion, longtime resident of Leon Valley, died Friday, March 11, at age 93, and was buried in Sunset Memorial Park Monday afternoon, March 14.

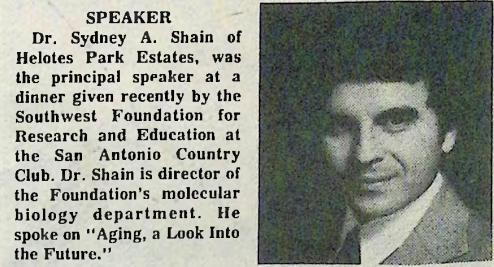
She was the widow of the late Judge John F. Onion and the mother of District Judge James C. Onion of San Antonio and Texas Court of Criminal Appeals Presiding Judge John F. Onion, Austin. Other survivors include a sister, six grandchildren and four great grandchildren.

Mrs. Onion served as a substitute teacher in Northside District schools for many years. A native of Mississippi, she was educated at Blue Mountain College.

Dr. Buckner Fanning officiated at the services on Monday afternoon. Honorary pallbearers were the district judges of San Antonio and the judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Bill Crane Buried At St. Mary's

Dr. Bill Crane, a noted political analyst and revered professor of the political science department at St. Mary's University, died Saturday, March 12, in Texarkana, Texas, after a brief illness. He was 56.

On the political science faculty at St. Mary's for 25 years, Crane was a former Danforth Associate, Piper Professor, grant recipient of the National Academy of Sciences, Rho Beta Gamma's "Man of the Year," chairman of the political science department and author of numerous books and articles on San Antonio and Texas government and politics.

Born in Bethany, Louisiana, Crane was a graduate of Texarkana Junior College, North Texas State University, where he received both undergraduate and master's degree in government, and the University of Texas, where he earned his doctorate in 1960. He taught at Texarkana High School, Texarkana Junior College, Navarro Junior College and the University of Texas before joining the St. Mary's faculty in 1958.

Crane traveled extensively, including visits

to more than 80 countries throughout the world, and was well known for his community, civic and political activities across San Antonio and South Texas.

But nothing was more important to "Doc" Crane, as he was affectionately called by students, faculty and alumni, alike, than teaching.

"Teaching, really, is the cause of my being. I feel almost indecent taking money for it. Teaching is my life and I love it," he once shared with a university staff member.

A funeral Mass was celebrated on Monday, March 14. Burial followed in the Marianist Cemetery, on the lawns of the Marianist Faculty Residence. Crane is the first lay member of the university faculty to be buried in the Marianist Cemetery. He had requested such arrangements in his will, and, for the community of St. Mary's, there would be no more fitting a resting place for "Doc" Bill Crane than "at home," on his campus.

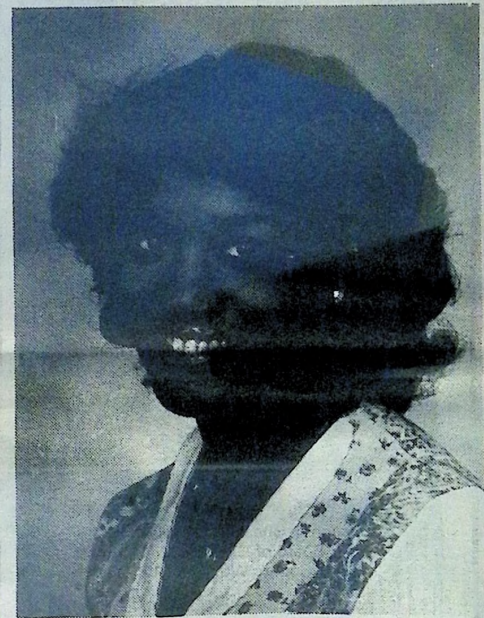



Attacks Vandalism

"Positively Northside" is a new vandalism prevention project which will make Northside School District Schools even better places for students to learn and for teachers to teach, according to Northside Superintendent Jack C. Jordan.

In 1982, more than \$75,000 damage was done by vandals in Northside. Considering that Northside has more than \$100 million invested in school buildings and equipment, the amount seems less significant. However, the

vandalism problem is something Northside is concerned about.

In 1982, school trustees appointed a blue-ribbon committee made up of citizens, parents, educators and students and led by administrator Carl Wanke. Through committee recommendations to make Northside's 35,000 students more aware of the vandalism situation, a Positively Northside campaign was implemented in each of the District's 43 schools.

NOT FEELING WELL? IS YOUR PET RESPONSIBLE?

Most of us own a dog or a cat or maybe a bird. Nice pets. Usually. However, each of these can directly affect your health. Fortunately, the occurrence of pet-associated illness is infrequent, but it can and does happen.

Let's set rabies aside for now. It is more common, very serious, and deserves a separate commentary.

Did you know Fido can bring Black Plague into your home? and, Old Tom, the family cat, something called toxoplasmosis? Even Tweety Pie (your parakeet) can lay you low. Here's how: Your pet may look and act just fine, but can be harboring a germ. The louse, tick, and flea, common to all pets, can spread a number of diseases. The insect has a "blood meal" from Fido; you fondle him and some of the insects get in your clothing. The next time the bug gets hungry, you may contract whatever disease your pet was harboring. The list is long: Rocky Mountain spotted fever, tularemia, typhus, encephalitis, even Black Plague, and some others. Rare diseases, true, but now and then a mini-epidemic pops up. Moral: Keep your pets de-bugged.

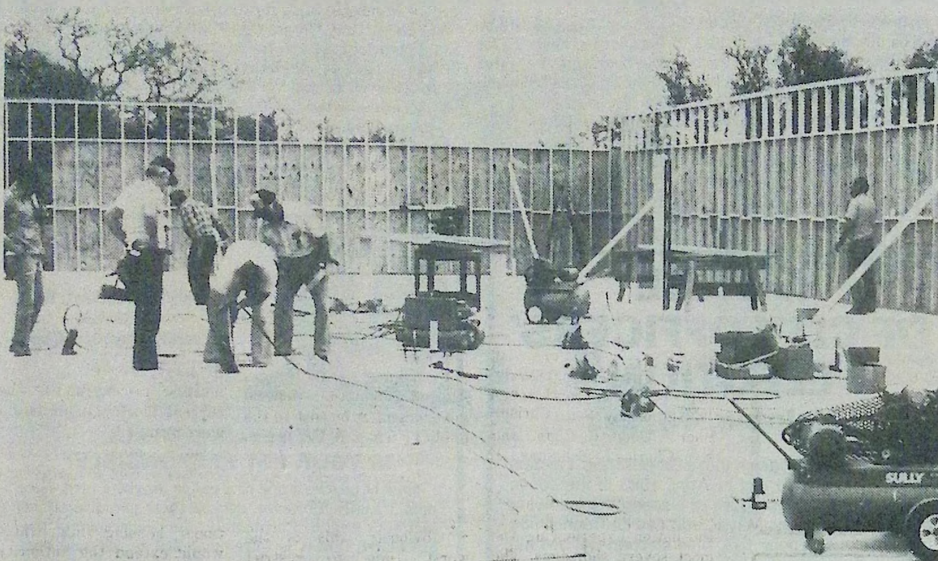
Each of these pets can transmit specific diseases to its owner without the assistance of an insect. Old Tom can cause an obscure illness peculiar to cats called Cat Scratch fever. It starts with a scratch or a bite, but the wound may be completely healed days or weeks before the lymph nodes ("kernels") under your arm or in your groin start to swell and become tender. Then comes fever and fatigue. If you get something like this, try to remember if you stepped on Tom's tail and he retaliated. It will help your doctor make a diagnosis.

Old Tom can be blamed for another uncommon disease, toxoplasmosis. Uncommon, yes, but a very bad one... especially when it involves your unborn baby. It works this way: Tom is fed raw or undercooked meat containing the germ. He dutifully goes to the litter box. And deposits toxoplasma eggs by the thousands, which remain infective for months. Mom cleans the litter box (cockroaches or flies can carry the eggs from the sand to her food), and she comes down with persistent low grade fever, swollen glands in her neck, and other symptoms. She's got toxoplasmosis from the germs in Tom's litter box! If she's pregnant, there's an ominous probability she'll pass it along to her unborn baby, which is extremely bad news after delivery. So, don't feed Old Tom raw or undercooked meat. And never, never let pregnant Mom anywhere near his litter box. Toxoplasmosis is a mean disease.

You clean Tweety Pie's cage or let him take a crumb from your lips. Then — ZOT — ten days later you are laid low with fever, headache, and chest congestion. Your parakeet just gave you Parrot fever (we call it psittacosis or ornithosis). Fortunately, it responds readily to antibiotics. Other fowl such as turkeys, chickens, parrots, and pigeons can have it. It expectedly pops up with greater frequency in pet shop owners and those who work with poultry. Laws govern the importation of birds because of this disease, so buy your bird only from a reputable pet shop. A cheap... and thus probably smuggled... parakeet might be harboring psittacosis.

Pet-borne diseases are best managed by prevention. Inoculate and de-bug your pets. Try to avoid a cat scratch, and cleanse it well if you do get one. Cats should be fed only cooked meat; a pregnant woman must avoid the kitty litter chore. Sick pets should not be fondled. And don't let Tweety Pie take crumbs from your lips.

Pilgrimage To Aid Vocations

miles during the five days. One group will take a northern route starting at Comfort and going through Boerne and Leon Springs. The other will take a southern route starting at Cestohowa and going through Kenedy, Falls City,

Floresville and Elmendorf.

The destination of both will be Mission San Jose.

Rev. Dennis Darliek, in charge of the pilgrimage, said, "It will be a time of meditation and sacrifice for an increase in religious vocations (more priests, religious brothers and nuns)."

The Youth Group from Our Lady of Guadalupe is planning to participate.

The pilgrims will spend the night at various parish halls along the two routes.

Anyone 13 years or older can participate—or younger if accompanied by a parent or guardian.

Wells Hold Same Levels

Water well levels in the Edwards Underground Water District remained relatively stable at the end of February, declining only slightly from the end-of-January readings.

Spring flow increased in New Braunfels and San Marcos. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were up 20 cubic feet per second to a flow of 294 cfs, just short of the longterm average flow of 299 cfs. San Marcos Springs increased a scant six cfs to a flow of 133 cfs, compared to the long term average flow of 168 cfs.

Leona River Springs at Uvalde, which are checked every six weeks, were flowing at a rate of 26.4 cfs, compared to the longterm average of 13.5 cfs.

Following are the water well levels at the end of February shown in altitude above mean sea level with the all time recorded highs in parentheses:

Uvalde: 876.2 feet, down 0.8 foot (886.3).

Sabinal: 772.0 feet, down 2.5 feet (835.4).

Castroville: 696.5 feet, down 0.7 foot (737.8).

Hondo: 723.5 feet, down 1.8 foot (773.8).

San Antonio: 666.4 feet, down 0.4 foot (696.5).

New Braunfels: 625.4 feet, up 0.4 foot (630.2).

Kyle: 565.0 feet, down 0.1 foot (593.8).

Accent With Annuals

COLLEGE STATION—A bed of flowering annuals is a versatile means of providing color and accents in home landscapes, says Everett Janne, a landscape horticulturist.

Janne, who is with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M

University System, offers some suggestions for planting annuals this spring.

"Use them as borders along fences, at the side of houses or around patios," he suggests. "This allows them to be seen and enjoyed while at their best but not be conspicuous in the off-season.

Home Builders Cautions About Economy Recovery

A multi-family rental pro-
duction program is needed to
prevent shortages of rental
housing from reaching crisis
proportions, according to
John Koelemij, vice-presi-
dent/treasurer of the
National Association of
Home Builders.

Koelemij told members of
the Senate Committee on
Banking, Housing and Urban
Affairs that NAHB generally
supports the approach taken
legislation by Sen. Christo-
pher J. Dodd (D, Conn.) and
Rep. Charles E. Schumer (D,
N.Y.). The Dodd/Schumer
bill would expand the supply
of rental housing in areas of
the nation experiencing the
most severe shortages. The
Tallahassee, Fla. home
builder said that multi-family
rental production had lagged
150,000 to 175,000 units
behind what was needed
during each of the past two
years.

While continuing to work
for an acceptable
conventional mortgage-
backed security program,
Koelemij said that NAHB
would oppose setting any
commitment limits
restricting the use of the
FHA insurance, VA
guarantee and GNMA mort-

gage-backed security
programs. In addition, he
said NAHB would oppose
any administration proposal
restricting FHA activity to
first-time home buyers or
inner city residents.

"Since its creation in
1934," Koelemij said, "The
FHA had enabled 16 million
moderate income families to
purchase homes with low
down-payment mortgages
insured by the federal
government at no cost to the
public. FHA and VA represent
the major source of low
down-payment, fixed rate,
long-term mortgages avail-
able today.

"Obviously, this is the
worst time to restrict
government insurance for
housing as the recovery gets
underway," Koelemij said.
"The reports of death of the
fixed-rate mortgage are
greatly exaggerated.

Koelemij recommended
allowing the Federal
National Mortgage Associa-
tion (FNMA) and the Federal
Home Loan Mortgage
Corporation (FHLMC) to
purchase single-family home
mortgages exceeding the
current limit of \$108,300. He
said that the average price of
single family homes

exceeded the FNMA and
FHLMC purchase limit in 19
metropolitan areas during
1982.

"More than half of the
home mortgages originated
at the present time,"
Koelemij said, "are sold on
the secondary market. But,"
he said, "the excellent
service of the secondary
market would be threatened
in many markets by rising
housing prices, unless the
current mortgage limitation
were changed."

On other housing
proposals, Koelemij said that
NAHB strongly supports a
provision in the administra-
tion's housing bill which
would extend the authority
of the Department of
Housing and Urban Develop-
ment to insure graduated
payment mortgages (GPMs)
for multi-family projects.
"Our preliminary view,"
Koelemij said, "is that the
GPM provides a major new
alternative for financing pri-
vate rental production."

Turning to the overall
state of the housing industry,
Koelemij said that housing
data in the last few months
had generated great
optimism within the
industry, but the final out-
come of the recovery had yet
to be determined.

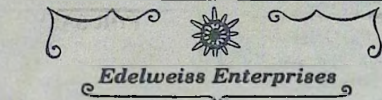
