Wolff Hits Campaign Trail



A total of 116 Democratic and Republican candidates are seeking 52 County, State, or National offices in the May primaries. For the Helotes area, the congressional race has gained heavy interest.

Former State Senator Nelson Wolff, above, of Leon Springs, has rolled up his sleeves and gone to work on the long campaign trail covering this — the 21st — District seeking election as a Democratic candidate in the May 6 primary for the seat in Congress now held by Rep. Bob Krueger, who is not seeking reelection.

. If Wolff wins the election in November, he will be the first Bexar County citizen who has represented this area in Congress in more than a decade.

The Helotes and Bexar County portion of the 21st District was once part of the heavily populated 20th District represented then as now by Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez. Former Congressman O.C. Fisher of San Angelo inherited the area along with much of the Hill Country and West Texas. In the past two elections, Congressman Bob Krueger was elected representative. His home base is New Braunfels in Comal County.

Another referee and pilot of the plane, Dr. Jerry Richard Neely, 34, an associate professor at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, also died in the crash. His services were scheduled Wednesday in San Marcos with burial yesterday in Abilene.

Hill Opposes Phone Hike

Attorney General John Hill will ask the Texas Supreme Court to affirm lower court rulings barring Southwestern Bell from collecting \$242 million in rate increases while appeals are being reviewed.

"This appeal will determine whether our consumers must pay the full rates requested by the telephone company while it

attacks in court the cuts made by the Public Utilities Com-mission in the company's \$300 million request," Hill said. The Commission cut \$242

million out of the company's \$300 million request, and now Bell wants the courts to let it charge its customers the full increase requested while the case is appealed.

Regents approved an increase in the general fee for UTSA from \$4 to \$6 per semester credit hour effective fall semester 1978. The fee previously was called the student use fee.

In presenting the proposal, UTSA's acting president, Dr. James W. Wagener, explained that the increased fees are needed because of "continuing requirements for additions, improvements, repairs, equipment purchases and other

operations for the campus."
The UT System administration, which concurred, noted that the increased fee is the same as that charged at UT Dallas and UT El Paso.

"Don is doing an outstanding job as vice chairman for ap-propriative matters for the Elections Committee and he will distinguish the House with his service to the commission,' Clayton said.






