UTSA Picks 'Winningest' New Coach

Don R. Eddy has been named head basketball coach at The University of Texas at San Antonio. He has signed a four-year contract with UTSA and will start July 15.

UTSA athletic director Rudy Davalos announced the selection Tuesday during a news conference at UTSA.

Eddy, currently head basketball coach at Eastern Illinois University, has been called the winningest coach in the history of that university.

"Don Eddy will provide us with the leadership in our men's basketball program that will enable us to compete successfully in the near future," Davalos said.

In discussing his new position, Eddy commented, "President Wagener has made apparent UTSA's desire to become to become very competitive in Division I. He added, I hope to have a part in developing an esprit de corps among the total university community—students, faculty and staff."

Eddy joined Eastern Illinois University in 1968 when the university had had only one winning season out of the past nine. During his 12 seasons at the university he compiled a composite record of 208 wins and 119 losses with his last six teams winning 123 games and losing 53. His team was regional runner-up during the 1979-80 season with a record of 22-7.

For the 1978-79 season, Eddy was named conference coach of the year. His team was Mid-Continent Conference champion. He twice has been an NCAA Division II coach of the year finalist and twice has led his teams to NCAA Division II national championships.

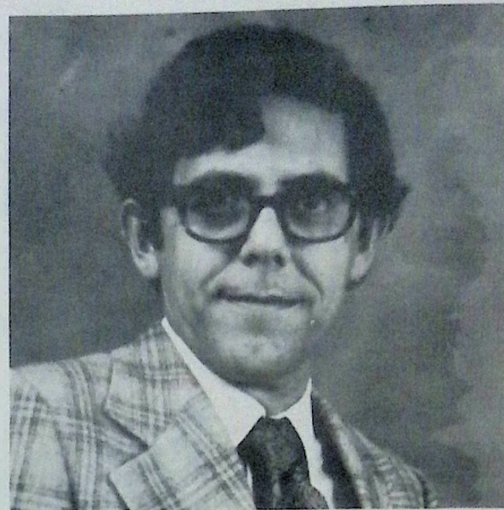
Parish To Vote Sunday

New Dean



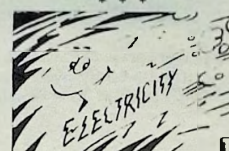

Medicare Helps At Home

When people think of services covered by Medicare, it is usually a hospital stay or doctor bills that come to mind. But the two parts of Medicare—hospital insurance and medical insurance—actually cover a broad range of services. One of these is home health care, which can be covered under either or both parts of Medicare, depending on the circumstances.

Home health care is available to people who do not need full-time skilled care as inpatients of a medical facility, but who do have an illness or injury that prevents them from leaving home to receive the health services they need.

Such services are generally provided by a home health agency. A home health agency is a public or private organization that specializes in providing skilled nursing services and other health care services to patients in their own homes. Your doctor or hospital can generally refer you to the nearest one.

Under certain conditions the two parts of Medicare together may provide up to 200 home health visits a year. However, the qualifying conditions differ slightly.

Medicare hospital insurance can pay for home health care only if six specific conditions exist. The six conditions are (1) you were in a qualifying hospital for at least three days in a row; (2) the home health care is for further treatment of a medical condition which was treated during a hospital stay or covered skilled nursing facility stay; (3) you need part time skilled nursing care or physical or speech therapy; (4) you are confined to your home; (5) a doctor prescribes home health care and sets up a home health plan for you within 14 days of your most recent discharge from a hospital or skilled nursing facility; and (6) the home health agency providing services takes part in Medicare.

Under Medicare medical insurance, there is no requirement for a hospital stay before receiving home health services. And it isn't necessary that your treatment is for a condition for which you were hospitalized. The other conditions must be met however.

In addition to part-time skilled nursing services, physical therapy, and speech therapy, Medicare can also pay for part-time services of an occupational therapist, home health aide, or medical social worker. Medical supplies and the use of medical appliances furnished by the home health agency may also be covered.

You should note that all of the home health services covered are part-time and provided by skilled persons. Medicare cannot pay for full-time nursing care at home or

such homemaker services as help in household tasks, bathing, dressing, and other personal care needs. Also not covered are meals delivered to your home, or drugs and biologicals.

finishing third both times.

A former NCAA District IV coach of the year, Eddy has the best winning tourney percentage among active NCAA Division II coaches, and his teams have qualified for post season competition for seven out of the last nine years. His teams also led Division II nationally in attendance during the 1974-75 and 1975-76 seasons.

While Eddy has been at Eastern Illinois, his teams have

been consistently rated in the top 20 defensively in NCAA Division II. His teams also have successfully competed against such Division I schools as Illinois State, Indiana State, Auburn and Ole Miss.

His previous coaching experience includes two years as assistant basketball coach at East Tennessee State University, where his team won the Ohio Valley Conference. From 1964 to 1966 he served as head basketball coach at Southwest High School in Atlanta, Ga. His teams won 53 and lost 11. They played in state tournaments both years, and he was named coach of the year.

His college career includes varsity play in basketball and baseball at the University of Southern Mississippi, where he started every game for three consecutive years in basketball and was fifth leading scorer.

Eddy currently is a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Hall of Fame Committee, of the NABC Division II All American Committee and of the NABC Auditing Committee.

He is a consultant to the Basketball Federation of Argentina, and in 1977 he traveled to Brazil to conduct clinics for Brazilian professional and amateur teams.

Eddy has bachelor's and master's degrees from the University of Southern Mississippi.

He and his wife, Elizabeth,

have three children, Christopher, 19; Amy, 17; and Julie, 12.

Cancer Research Viruses

Versatile viruses which can cause cancer in one kind of animal but only make another kind of animal sick are being used at Baylor College of Medicine to track down alterations in genes that permit cancer to occur.

Dr. Rodney E. Kellems, Assistant Professor of Biochemistry at Baylor, is tracing the effects of two cancer-causing viruses, SV-40 and polyoma viruses, on normal and abnormal cells grown in the laboratory. The research is supported by an American Cancer Society grant.

SV-40 is a virus that causes an infection in monkeys, but in mice it will cause cancer. The polyoma virus, originally discovered in wild mice that it made ill, caused cancer when injected into hamsters and some other animals.

Focusing his search on two genes that are responsible for enzymes that play a role in cell reproduction, Dr. Kellems has traced the pathway of their activity through a torturous biochemical maze by utilizing the virus-transformed cells.

One of his "probes," DHFR (dihydrofolate-reductase) an enzyme that makes folic acid—a constituent vital to cell reproduction—can be experimentally blocked by a widely used anti-cancer chemical, methotrexate. The gene responsible for DHFR has been located.

Ample supplies of DHFR are obtained from methotrexate-resistant cells. These mutant cells produce 500 times as much folic acid as do normal cells. This probably explains why some cancer patients develop resistance to methotrexate treatment.

Other genes under study are those directing a group of "histones," substances rich in amino acids, the building blocks of proteins.

At one point in cell reproduction the enzyme's activity is changed or blocked on command of the virus "genes" invading the cell's apparatus. Dr. Kellems is investigating how this is accomplished. He uses mutant cell lines—those with faulty or changed genes—to single out specific genetic products: the enzymes he is studying.

So far, a "resting stage" in the cell division process has been identified. It is at this point that the virus enzymes are ordered to restart the cell machinery. Answers to this virus "command" phenomenon could provide ways of controlling abnormal cell growth and probably cancer, regardless of its cause.

Separated, Divorced Taxpayers Should Check Withholding

Taxpayers who have recently become divorced or separated should check with their employers to make sure they are claiming the correct number of exemptions.

The Internal Revenue Service said, that a new Form W-4, "Employees' Withholding Allowance Certificate," must be filed within 10 days after it becomes apparent to the taxpayer that he or she is no longer entitled to an allowance claimed on Form W-4.

Additionally, if the tax-

payer receives annually more than \$500 in alimony or other income not subject to withholding and expects to pay at least \$100 in taxes, then the individual must file a declaration of estimated tax using Form 1040-ES, "1980 Declaration Voucher."

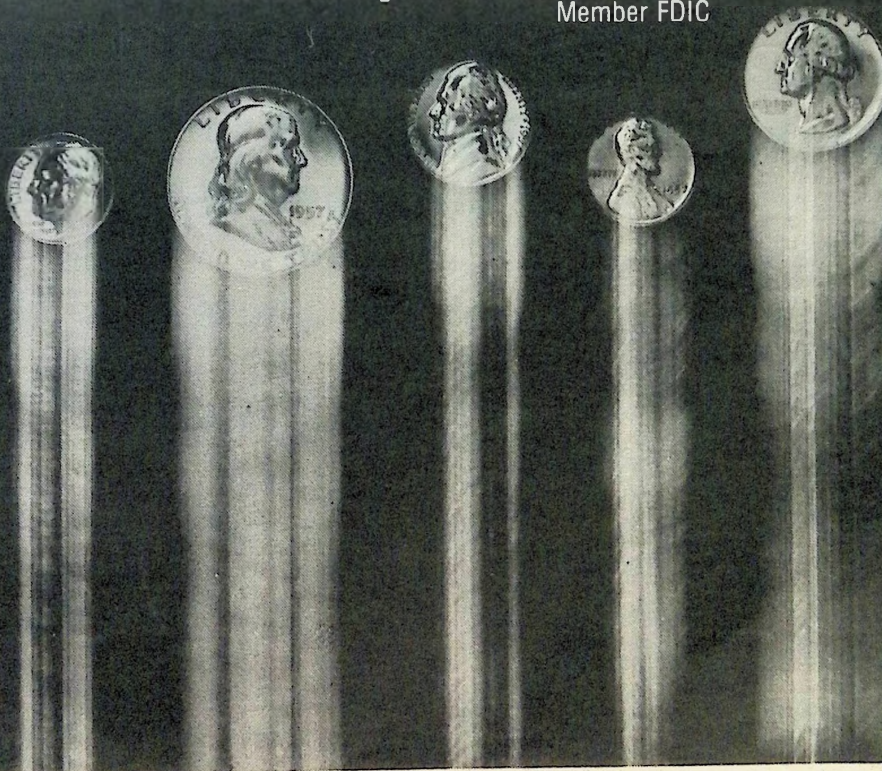

Baby-Sitters Need Help From Parents

Baby-sitting is a job with a lot of responsibility, and the Texas Medical Association (TMA) urges parents to take steps to help the baby-sitter face any problem.

Medical emergencies may be physically threatening but they pose little problem for the baby-sitter seeking treatment for a child since the law says a physician can give treatment without parental consent if there is an emergency. To help the sitter

know what to do in an emergency, the parent should provide a list of emergency phone numbers and a note saying where a parent can be contacted.

If a child needs medical treatment that is not an emergency, a doctor must have permission before treating children under 18 in most cases. If a parent or guardian is not available, an adult brother, sister, aunt or uncle or a grandparent can

give written consent. Or a parent or guardian can give written permission to an adult or school to permit non-emergency treatment.

If parents plan to be out of town or unavailable for awhile, they may want to leave a note authorizing someone to permit non-emergency treatment. TMA suggests the note say, "I hereby authorize (fill in the name of an adult who can be responsible for the children) to act as my agent in consenting to medical treatment needed by my children (list the children's names) during my absence." A parent should sign and date the note.

Other instructions also are important for the baby-sitter. TMA suggests supply a per-

manent fact sheet and one for each occasion when a baby-sitter works.

The permanent fact sheet should have emergency phone numbers including doctor, fire department, police, relatives, utility companies and others. The sheet also should note location of first aid supplies for very minor problems.

The other fact sheet should tell where parents will be and for how long and a phone number where they can be contacted. It also should have instructions on meals and snacks, sleep, bathing, deliveries and calls expected, medication to be given, the child's current medical problems and other facts.

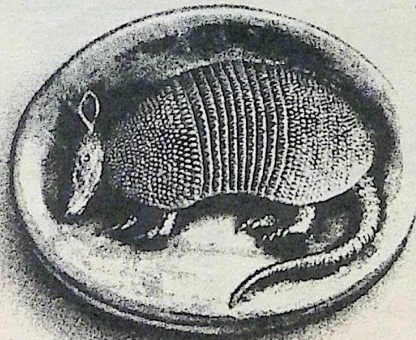

- 1 package (3 oz.) cream cheese, softened
- 1/3 cup grated Parmesan cheese
- 2 tablespoons parsley flakes
- 1 teaspoon basil
- 1/4 teaspoon garlic powder
- 1 cup hot beef broth
- 1 teaspoon cornstarch
- 2 cups hot cooked rice

Combine meat, onions, bread crumbs, 1/2 teaspoon salt, and pepper; mix thoroughly. Form into 8 balls 1-1/2 inches in diameter. Brown on all sides in oil. Drain off fat. Combine remaining ingredients except cornstarch and rice; blend until smooth. Pour over meat balls, cover and simmer 15 minutes. Stir 2 tablespoons water into cornstarch. Pour into sauce; cook, stirring constantly, about 1 minute or until thickened. Serve over beds of fluffy rice. Makes 4 servings.

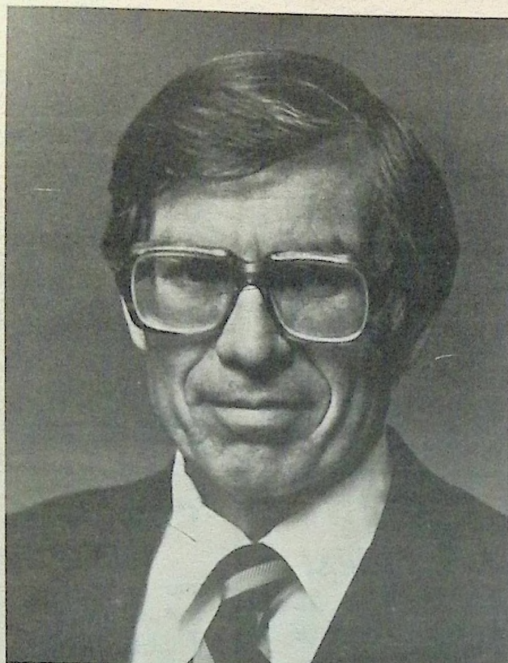

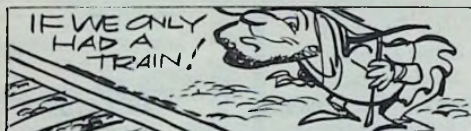

SHADES FIGHT ENERGY WASTE

A new weapon in the war on energy waste is an old household product.

Studies at Cornell University and Illinois Institute of Technology found that window shades prevent heat from moving through glass windows.



The researchers report opaque vinyl coated cotton shades—the most familiar type—retailing for about \$6, were found to be up to five times more effective than costly drapes and venetian blinds.

In summer, the sun's rays ricochet off shades to reduce the amount of heat that enters a room. Less heat buildup means less air conditioning—and expensive energy—needed for cooling.

The Window Shade Manufacturers Association advises that shades be kept down on hot, summer days to reduce heat buildup. But during the evening, night and morning hours, raise shades to let the cool air in.

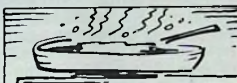

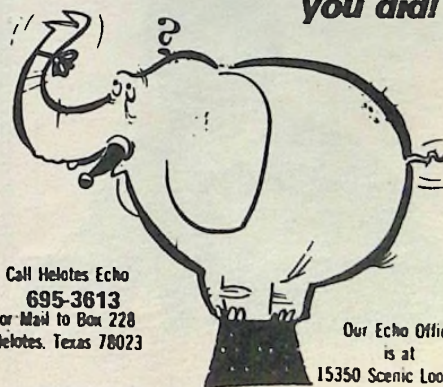

Parents Should Use Care, Common Sense

Parents can do a lot to give children a good start in life. The Texas Medical Association Auxiliary is distributing pamphlets statewide that emphasize care and common sense principles that parents can easily overlook.

Proper care starts even before the baby is born. Medical checkups during pregnancy can provide an opportunity to obtain good advice about diet, possible delivery complications and some problems the baby may have.

Checkups are still important as the child grows older. Detecting hearing, vision, speech and other problems before the child enters school can help avoid frustration and failure in school and other areas of life.

Immunizations are another important task to take care of long before the child enters school. In fact, schools will not admit youngsters who have not had immunizations.

The local health department or a physician can tell what shots are needed and when.

Immunizations are an occasional unpleasant event. Far more battles will be fought over two other important areas, bathing and nutrition. But like it or not, cleanliness and a balanced diet are worth any battle because they help children grow properly and avoid disease.

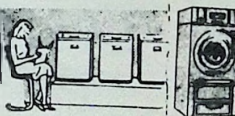
One important area most children will not fight about is exercise. But occasionally the lure of the television set will keep children away from being active. Excessive television watching during a child's formative years may set patterns for unhealthy habits in later years.

Children need guidance, love and understanding as much as they need immunizations and balanced meals. Depriving them of emotional needs can cause pain and stunt their emotional growth

as surely as any disease will hurt physically.

These are not the only requirements to help children grow up happily and healthily, but they will do a lot to provide a child a good foundation for development.

Hermann Sons Lodge Celebrates 89th Anniversary

Louis B. Engelke of San Antonio, grand president of the Order of the Sons of Hermann in Texas, was guest speaker Tuesday night at the 89th Anniversary celebration of Siemering Hermann Sons Lodge No. 32.

'Early' Is 3 Months

"File for Social Security benefits early," is the advice given to potential beneficiaries by Gilbert G. Gonzalez, manager of the Social Security office in San Antonio. He pointed out that a person may file as early as three months before benefits are to start.

Processing of the claim can also be speeded along by having the necessary documents with you when you file. This includes your Social Security card, your birth certificate, and your latest W-2 form or self employment tax return. An applicant for widow's benefits would also need to provide her marriage license and the death certificate. Disability applicants should have the names and addresses and telephone numbers of all doctors and facilities treating them for their disability.

As an added convenience to the public, Social Security also provides teleservice, Gonzalez said. A person can file an application for any type benefit by simply calling the Social Security office at 229-6466. Teleservice saves the person gasoline, prevents the search for a parking place, and eliminates waiting to be interviewed.

New Clinic Put on Hold

Bexar County Hospital District's application for \$1.3 million of federal funds for opening of a West Side primary health care clinic has been put on hold by the Department of Health, Education and Welfare.

The Hospital District's Executive Director, Dr. C.E. Gibbs, received word last week from Dallas regional office that the clinic application "is being deferred," pending the resolution of nine issues. Cited were questions concerning organizational structure, project costs and whether federal funds were being requested to substitute for local funds in providing health care.

The Hospital District had hoped to gain approval for its clinic application this week and to possibly open the health care facility in early 1981 at 445 Old Hwy. 90 West to serve as the West Side primary health care clinic.

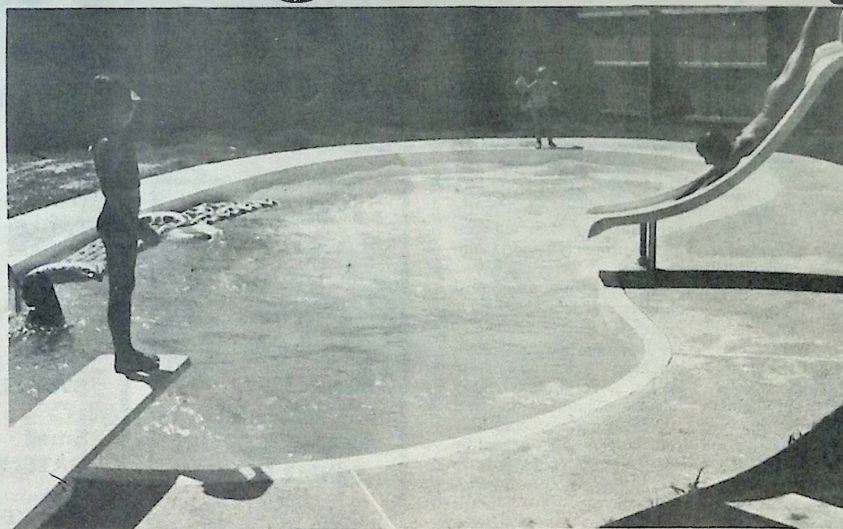
