After questionnaires were filled out by the Sisters, additional work by a self-study group and a special clothing committee was carried out. Designs were proposed by individual Sisters and commercial firms.

Finally, from those designs submitted, the committees chose several styles in dress and head-wear which the nurs narticipat.

To make a chemically treated dust oth at home, put a gen-erous sized piece of soft cloth into a hot, strong soapsuds with a few drops of turpentine in it. Let stand two hours, wring and dry. Treat once in two weeks.

Recipe of the Month

GOLDEN FRUIT CAKE

Ingredients 2 ctps (10 oz.) white raisins

2 pkg. (½ lb.) citron
2 pkg. (½ lb.) orange peel
2 pkg. (½ lb.) lemon peel
4 lb. glace cherries
1b. glace cherries

lb. shelled almonds tsp. orange or lemon extreet cups (1 lb.) flour

½ tsp. salt 2 tsp. baking powder

12 lb. hutter 2 cups sugar

1 cup orange juice Directions

Directions

Prepare the fruits and nuts. Sift the flour, baking powder and salt over the fruit. Mix the fruit through the flour with fingertips. (Or warmed fork.) Cream the butter. Add sugar. Then add beaten eggs and flavoring. Stir in the floured fruit alternately with the orange juice. Bake in slow oven (399 to 325 degrees) for 1½ to 2½ hours. Weight of cake—about 6 pounds. (This is the old recipe of famed cook—Mrs. H. J. McDermott. A fruit cake may be made weeks before it is wanted for serving and improves with aging—in a tin or wooden container.)

P.O. Warns **Pranksters**

Mailboxes are protected by Federal law, and pranksters or vandals who damage or destroy the boxes and their contents may be in for a heavy fine or im-prisonment, Postmaster C. C. Davis warned recently. C.

The Postmaster noted that some 25,000 mail receptacles were damaged or destroyed in the na-tion this past year. It was also noted that 2,641 persons were arrested up to June 30 for damaging or destroying mail receptacles.

Postmaster Davis quoted from the law: "Whoever wilfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letterbox or other receptacle intended or used for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or wilfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

This applies to all mail receptacles and the mail in them, even though the boxes are bought by citizens and are their personal property, Postmaster Davis emphasized.

"Pranksters — and especially children who do not know any hetter—should be made to realize the seriousness of their actions, the Postmaster said. "A \$1,000 fine or a term in jail is enough to take the humor out of any
