Citizens To Meet Sunday At 6 P.M.

The truth about what Bexar County and the City of San Antonio are planning to do to Scenic Loop is still being sought.

Some of the unanswered questions may be cleared up at a general meeting of Scenic Loop residents and property owners and other interested persons to be held in the Parish Activities Building of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church, Sunday, Oct. 13, beginning at 6:00 p.m.

Invited to the meeting are County Commissioner Andy Casias and the director of Bexar County Public Works, Bob Tomasini.

Mark Pritchett, Scenic Loop resident, will report on a recent meeting with the Land Use and Transportation Committee of the City of San Antonio. Attending the meeting with Pritchett were Mrs. Irene Scharf of Grey Forest and Jack Muyres and Doug Bless of Scenic Loop.

Pritchett said two members of the San Antonio committee promised to investigate a possible historic designation for Scenic Loop and also to investigate a possible alternate route from IH-10 to Bandera Road through the ranch country west of Scenic Loop.

Concern about Scenic Loop developed after some residents got word that the County planned to widen it to 86 feet. The road also is carried on maps of the Planning and Zoning Commission of the City of San Antonio as being scheduled for future development as a major thoroughfare.

Residents oppose these plans as being destructive of the scenic nature of the road and its historic significance. They also are fearful of the increased traffic.

Pritchett developed a 16-page booklet, "Save Scenic Loop: Natural, Geographic and Historic Considerations," to present to members of the San Antonio committee and others who can help in the fight to preserve Scenic Loop. He also will have "Save Scenic

Sewer Line Proposed For Center

A routine meeting of the Helotes City Council on Thursday, Sept. 26, became livelier when in the "Citizens to Be Heard" section two engineers presented a plan to construct a sewer line to the Helotes Park Shopping Center.

The engineers represented Fred Anderson and Gilbert Kinder, well-known developers, who would

pay the entire \$1,500,000 cost of the line.

It would extend from the corner of Bandera Road and Guilbeau Road up French Creek to Loop 1604 and FM-1560 to the shopping center.

Another representative of the developers, Mary Jean Brigham, said Anderson hoped with the sewer line to get rid of the cost of hauling

sewage from the shopping center. It is now caught in an underground tank near FM-1560 and Riggs Road and pumped out and hauled in trucks to a City of San Antonio sewer line.

Mrs. Brigham said Anderson then would be able to afford to make

New State Law Controls Signs

Raymond E. Stotzer, Jr., district engineer of the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation, has announced that the owner of each off-premise advertising sign which was erected before Sept. 1, 1985, along a road outside an incorporated city or town in Texas is required by recent legislation to register the sign by Dec. 30, or remove the sign.

The new law is known as House Bill 1330 and refers to an off-premise sign as a sign which advertises a service or product not principally sold on the premises where the sign

is located.

Stotzer stated that forms are available in the San Antonio District Office for use in registering a sign and that a form would be sent upon request. He also said that a \$25 nonrefundable fee is required with the filing of the registration application.

Stotzer pointed out that there are only two exceptions to the State registration requirement. If the sign was allowed under the Highway Beautification provisions of the Texas Litter Abatement Act or if the sign is in the extraterritorial jurisdiction of a city or town which

is controlling signs in such extraterritorial jurisdiction, the sign does not have to be registered with the state.

In enacting House Bill 1330, the Legislature also authorized the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation to regulate on-premise and off-premise signs which are erected after September 1, 1985. A permit for each such sign is now required. Permit application forms are also available in the District Office.

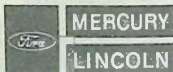

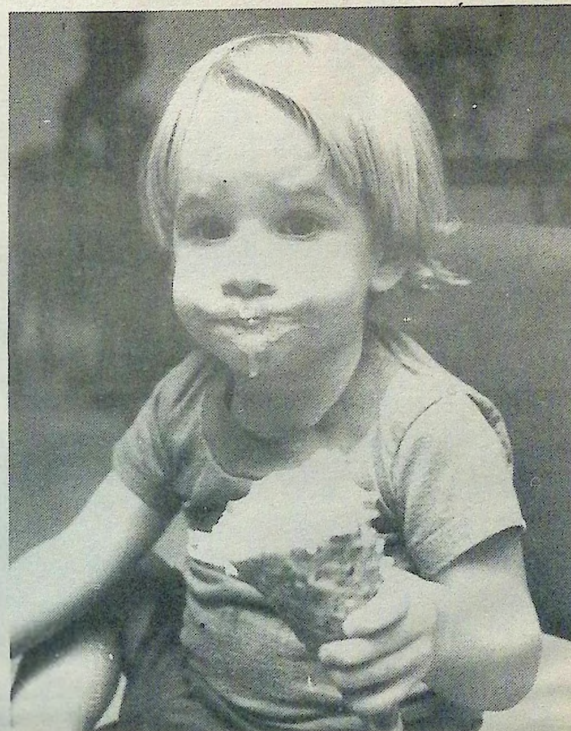

USAA To Sponsor 'Unknown Soldier'

"The Unknown Soldier," a one-hour documentary hosted by distinguished actor and decorated World War II Navy veteran Jason Robards, will air nationally over Public Broadcasting Service outlets on Veterans Day, Nov. 11.

The documentary is being underwritten by USAA. It marks the Association's first major venture into public television.

"The Unknown Soldier" will present the life stories of six American servicemen who died in

action during World War II and whose bodies were never recovered or identified. These personal profiles will be told through combat footage of the battles they fought in, personal letters, mementos, and through candid interviews with family members, childhood friends and fellow servicemen. The six servicemen were among the more than 78,000 World War II casualties who were permanently listed as Missing in Action.

Deputies Add Traffic Control To Duties

Bexar County Sheriff's Deputies have been manning a radar patrol in the Northwest quadrant of the County, monitoring traffic speeds and issuing citations to offenders.

"My office received a number of complaints about traffic problems in

several areas of Precinct 2, especially where new subdivisions have been developed in the Northwest of the County," said County Commissioner Andy Casias.

"I requested the Sheriff's Department to increase its activity in those areas because of the

growing volume of traffic, and Mr. Tommy Lauderdale, the Sheriff's Patrol Administrator, has been very responsive.

"He sent me information on the radar patrol's activities. In one 2½ hour period on Timberhill Road, for example, his men issued 11 citations for speeding and other violations."

Commissioner Casias has asked the Sheriff's Department to keep him informed about the radar monitoring activities in the unincorporated areas of Precinct 2.

"Traffic problems are a side effect of the rapid growth of development we are experiencing in Precinct 2," says Commissioner Casias. "However, I will continue to do my best to see that there is adequate traffic control and law enforcement in the areas where traffic volume is the highest."

"In fact, we have already been successful in getting another Sheriff's Patrol for Precinct 2, and will be increasing the number of patrols from October."

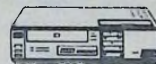

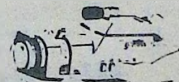

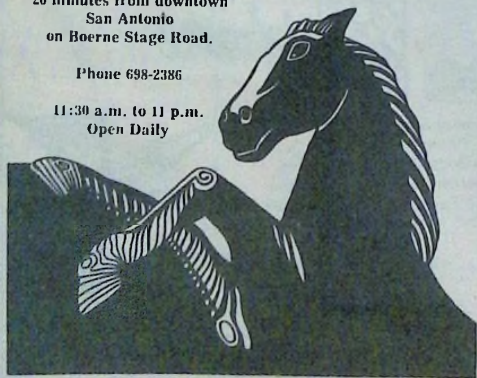

Medical School Enrolls 2,200

An even 2,200 students are registered for classes this fall in the five components of The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio.

The total is down from last fall by slightly more than 100 due in part to a drop in the number of undergraduate nursing students.

According to officials in the school of nursing and in the office of student services, limits were placed on undergraduate nursing enrollment because of possible budget cuts and ongoing curriculum changes.

Freshmen registered for medical school total 203 including 50 minorities and 69 women. Average age of the first-year medical class is 25, although individual students range in age from 20 to 47. The entering medical students have an average grade point of 3.49, and 189 of them are Texans.

Denatal freshmen total 99 including 15 minorities and 21 women. Their average age is 23. All but 10 are Texans and their average grade point is 3.15.

Enrollment in the university's graduate school of biomedical sciences totals 316 including 179 graduate nursing students, 20 special students, 81 basic science students and 36 dentists pursuing specialty training in certain dental areas.

The six allied health programs registered 255 students this fall, up 17 from 1984 figures.

Undergraduate nursing students total 383. In nursing, 84 students are enrolled in the accelerated FLEX program. Forty-nine of the undergraduate nursing students and 12 graduate nursing students are men.

Not reflected in the totals but present on campus are public health students from The University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston, undergraduate pharmacy students rotating from UT-Austin and students pursuing Doctor of Pharmacy degrees jointly awarded by the health science center and UT-Austin.

Shrimp Farming

Shrimp farming has the potential to develop into a multi-million dollar industry in Texas says Dr. Addison Lawrence, marine scientist with the Texas Agriculture Experiment Station. While the commercial raising of shrimp in captivity, called shrimp mariculture, is still a high-risk undertaking, Dr. Lawrence predicts that technology advances in the next five years will make cultured shrimp a \$30 million crop.

The scientist will discuss these and other related issues in an Oct. 18 lecture at The University of Texas at San Antonio. "Shrimp Mariculture as a New Texas State Agricultural Crop" will begin at 1 p.m. in room 2.03.14 of the Science Building on the UTSA campus. His presentation is free and intended for the general public.

New Vaccination Urged For Children

A nationally recognized expert in children's infectious diseases is urging parents to take advantage of a new vaccine for kids, especially if their youngsters attend day care centers.

Philip Brunell, M.D., professor of pediatrics at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and chairman of the infectious diseases committee for the American Academy of Pediatrics,

recommends that all children between 2 and 5 years of age be immunized against haemophilus influenza type B, called Hib for short.

Despite the name, haemophilus influenza is not a kind of flu. Rather, it is a common bacterium that can lead to a number of serious and sometimes fatal diseases including meningitis and pneumonia.

"There are an estimated 20,000

cases of severe disease due to this organism every year in the United States," Dr. Brunell says. "That is similar to the number of polio cases we had before the advent of the polio vaccine."

The bacterium, like some contagious illnesses, can spread quickly in day care centers, making immunization especially important for children in such centers. Youngsters should be immunized before

entering day care whenever possible, Dr. Brunell says, because vaccines usually are not effective after one child in the center has developed a severe case.

Hib's symptoms can be very nondescript, Dr. Brunell says. Some children simply have fever and don't feel well. Others experience excessive sleepiness, convulsions, airway obstruction that comes on suddenly.

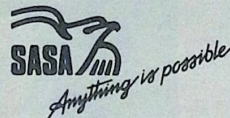

Rams To Kick Off District Play Saturday

Coaches and sports writers have different terms for this period of the

football season. The real season. The second season. This is where it counts. Everyone is 0-0 right now.

Simply put — it's time for district wars. It's time to see how good a

football team Marshall has and if the 4-1 record and third place ranking Express-News poll in the city is a good indicator.

Some teams use the non-conference to build up confidence by scheduling patsies. Others use it to toughen players by scheduling higher classed teams. Marshall went for the latter with one exception, Central Catholic.

The combined record of Marshall's non-conference opponents is 13-12 but even that is deceiving with Roosevelt's record of 1-4, which is one of the better teams with such a record. Judson and Madison, two state quarterfinal teams from last year, were both ranked ahead of Marshall at one time during the season. Judson escaped with a 14-12 victory over Marshall but Madison wasn't as lucky, losing 8-7.

The Rams find out how they'll start the District 28-5A race against Kennedy at 7:30 p.m. Saturday, Oct. 12, at Northside Stadium. Kennedy is struggling this season with a 1-4 record but Marshall coach Jim Weaver isn't downplaying that.

"They've had their problems," Weaver admitted. "But I'm sure starting district, they're going to play a lot better."

The Rockets have eight players returning from last year's 5-4 team. Fernando Villarreal was a second team all-district choice last year at quarterback.

"They have a good running back and a little quarterback who hurt us quite a bit last year," said Weaver. "They'll try to take the ball and control it."

Weaver said the Rams are ready to play and get on with the district schedule.

"I think we're starting to play better," praised Weaver. "We're not looking for a balanced attack. We'll just take what the defense gives us. What we do depends on what they do against us."

Weaver dismissed the idea of a balanced attack when it was pointed out the smaller difference in the rushing and passing yardage against Roosevelt last week. Both areas were effective as the Rams blasted the Rough Riders, 41-13.

Once again George Harris led the rushing attack with 140 yards on 10 carries. He scored on runs of 22 and four yards and hauled in a 76-yard pass from Jason DeLeon. The Rams finished with 221 yards rushing and

181 passing. DeLeon also hit D.J. Dykes with a 22-yard touchdown pass. Tony Cooper and DeLeon also scored.

Weaver was concerned about the Roosevelt game, noting the Rough Riders had lost two straight tough games. The Riders had a 21-0 lead on Jay before bowing 22-21 and a pair of turnovers led to a 12-0 loss to Churchill.

Marshall was down at the end of the first quarter, 7-6, but the fears were put to rest on three second quarter touchdowns.

There was little to worry about against Central Catholic as the Rams demolished the Buttons, 53-0. Harris scored four touchdowns, the first on a 75-yard opening kickoff return. He added scoring runs of two and four yards plus a 57-yard punt return.

Six other players got into the scoring for Marshall against Central Catholic. Tony Lambrano, Ronnie Neimeyer, Bobby Garcia and Cooper added touchdown runs and Britt White and Bobby Davis booted extra points.

"I was glad to win a ballgame but I don't know how much good we got out of it," said Weaver. "Central Catholic lost quite a few kids to injuries and eligibility. They were good two weeks ago."

"We got a lot of kids in the game, which is good for the program. A lot of times when games get out of hand, you do things you don't normally do and get away with it."

That wasn't the case the week before as the Rams had to scratch and claw for an 8-7 victory over then-No. 4 Madison. The Rams fought back with an 87-yard drive in the final quarter and scored on a one-yard run by Harris with 1:14 left. He then ran in the all-important two-point conversion for the victory.

Harris was on the sidelines in the third quarter with injured ribs but returned for the drive. He finished with 102 yards on 15 carries.

"Going into the Madison game, I thought it would be a hard-fought type of game and I also felt like we had a chance to win it," Weaver said afterwards. "To drive it 87 yards in the last quarter and score says something pretty good about the kids. Byron Gross was hurting and we had several other players banged up but they toughed it out, and that says a lot for the kids."

Admission for Saturday night is free. The Oct. 27 tickets are now on sale. Gate admission will be \$5 and advance tickets are \$4.

Lady Rams Lead District Volleyball

Volleyball trivia.

Which paragraph concerns a high school volleyball team that is 23-4 overall and first in District 28-5A with a 4-0 record?

"We have to get better organized. We don't take it to them at the beginning like we should...I'm not sure I've prepared them enough."

"Everytime I look at them, they are definitely improving. I still see a lot of room for improvement. There's more movement on court."

Answer: the first paragraph. The speaker, Marshall Coach Laura Lye was commenting on a not-too-impressive 15-13, 15-13 victory over Jay Tuesday night. The latter comment is from Taft Coach Jan Steinmetz after a decent showing against second place Clark, 15-10, 15-5 loss.

Marshall leads District 28-5A but it hasn't been easy. The Lady Rams were down 13-6 in the second game before rallying against Jay.

"We came back together and

played more together," Lye said. "We became aggressive like we had been at first. They could have served for match. They had their chances. They were well prepared."

In defense of her Rams, Lye said the tournament and overall experience in addition to the "never-say-die" attitude are what pulled the team through.

"Once they Jay started winning, they were excited and we were struggling," Lye said. "I don't think we quit. The problem is we're not taking everyone seriously."

"It goes back to the theory I have of 'you have to lose in order to win.' We're just not ready to be killers."

The lack of the killer instinct was evident last week against Kennedy, which is winless in district. The Rams blitzed the Rockets in the first game, 15-1, but couldn't put it away in the second game with second string players, losing 10-15. The Rams locked it up with a 15-9 victory in the third.

Marshall ends the first half of district when it takes on Clark at 5 p.m. today, Oct. 11. Next week's schedule will have Marshall playing Holmes at 7 p.m. Wednesday, Oct. 16, and Taft at 6 p.m. Friday, Oct. 18. Both games will be at Taylor.

"We're going to do something different," Lye said. "I'm not sure I've prepared them enough. Every game has to be treated the same and we're not doing it."

Taft is still winless in 16 games but Steinmetz says the Raiders continue to improve. With one exception.

"We lost to Holmes last week, it was the worst match of the season," Steinmetz said of the 15-5, 15-4 decision. "Nobody had a good performance. They forgot to run the offense and defense. There was no teamwork. No communication on the court."

"It was a fairly substantial loss since Holmes was missing three starters. The girls were very

embarrassed after Holmes. They played a fairly good match against Marshall. And against Clark, we had an excellent first game. We just weren't able to hold on."

Taft fell to Clark, 15-10, 15-5, and also to Marshall, 15-3, 15-10. Taft plays Kennedy, another 0-4 cellar dweller, but Steinmetz said the Rockets have the edge on paper.

"They have taken everyone to three games in district," Steinmetz noted. "which is better than us. They could be a little stronger than us."

The Raiders are still suffering a player shortage, having only eight players on varsity. Steinmetz is starting two juniors, two sopho-

mores and two freshmen.

"We have two girls with just one year of junior varsity experience," Steinmetz said. "The kids have improved. We're getting more organized and getting more aggressive."

Taft's top player is 5-8 junior Jennifer Lennon, who plays hitter and setter. Melissa Baxter and Susie Romijn, both hitters, alternate as starter with Salene Ali also a hitter.

The two sophomore starters are Luisa Arocha, back row, and Robin Green, a 5-8 hitter-middle. The two freshmen are 5-10 Tracy Campbell, middle, and Trisha Wendt, hitter-setter.

Del Rio Spoils Taft Party

The celebration of Taft High School's first football victory was short-lived. Del Rio put a damper on things by bringing the Raiders back to Earth with a 34-18 drubbing on Saturday, Oct. 5.

The mood was festive the prior week at Taft as the Raiders scored their first football victory, a 28-0 shutout of Central Catholic on Sept. 26. The Raiders also bowed to Jefferson 8-6 and were 1-3 going into Thursday's game against Marshall. Results were unavailable at press time.

Del Rio gave Taft a strong dose of reality.

"We didn't play very well," remarked Taft Coach Mike Haynes. "They played well and we didn't. It showed in the score. They had as good, strong running game and they controlled the ball." They didn't make many mistakes.

"We had our chances early. We just didn't take advantage. People were open on passes. That allowed them to get the momentum going."

Robbie Lax led the Raiders rushing attack with 157 yards on 22 carries. He scored all three touchdowns—two on runs and another on a 56-yard pass from Shane Allen. Allen was three of four for 105 yards, with Nathan Griffin catching two for 49 yards.

Haynes praised the work of Louie Villaseñor, "the most consistent player on the defensive line," and Mike Spinkler at strong side linebacker.

Haynes said the Raiders experienced a physical and mental letdown after the big victory against Central Catholic. That plus

the relative mistake-free game played by Del Rio led to the loss.

"Prior to the Del Rio game, we had seen improvement every week," Haynes said. "The Del Rio game took a step back. We were a little flat after winning the week before."

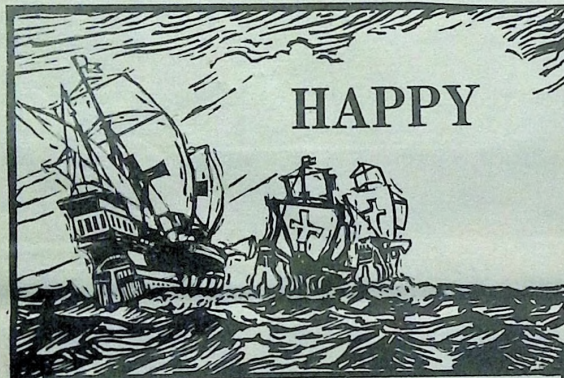
The Raiders put things together the week before with the 28-0 victory over Central Catholic. Lax scored all four touchdowns and Shane Allen booted all four PATs. The Raiders finished with 298 yards rushing. Lax had over 100 yards on the ground.

"We've had a lot of enthusiasm out of the student body, and that win just made it much more so," Haynes said. "Our team did a better job of eliminating mistakes and we were able to control the ball more. We lost one fumble but we didn't have many penalties and didn't throw any interceptions."

Haynes praised the steady progress of the offensive and defensive lines, particularly John Decker at offensive left tackle. He also singled out Jessie Arnold for his blocking and running efforts at fullback where he gained 85 yards against Central Catholic.

A missed extra point may look to be the only difference between Jefferson and Taft in the 8-6 Raider loss but there's more.

"We played real well other than some mistakes," Haynes said. "We had 100 yards in penalties and two fumbles. We moved the ball well, we just made too many mistakes to win. We just didn't put points on the board because of turnovers and penalties."

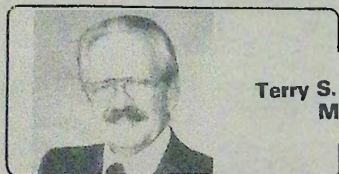

DIFFICULTY IN SWALLOWING AN IMPORTANT SYMPTOM

Difficulty in swallowing is known as dysphagia (pronounced dis-faje-ah). When it's not related to food or drink the cause is probably stress. But when the complaint is that food "gets stuck on the way down" the doctor thinks about a host of medical problems that might be at fault. In any case a diagnosis must be established because something serious might be involved.

Stress-induced dysphagia, the most commonly encountered, isn't hard to spot. It happens any time the patient swallows, without association with food or drink. There's usually a history of a stress situation such as divorce or financial hardship. Then a mild tranquilizer or anti-anxiety drug is given. If the swallowing difficulty completely disappears we rarely need to look any further.

If the problem continues, other diagnostic measures are a must. A careful physical examination to reveal swellings that mechanically interfere with swallowing is done, followed by a swallow of barium under the X-ray fluoroscope. If the answer is still elusive, a direct look is in order. This is called endoscopy or esophagoscopy, a specialist procedure wherein the entire swallowing apparatus is directly visualized with a flexible endoscope, perhaps with biopsies being taken of suspect areas during the procedure. Not only is it visualized, but size and muscular action (manometry, motility) is measured. All of these studies can be done in a brief period of time without the need for an anesthetic.

Now, what are we looking for? The causes of dysphagia are many. The most serious, of course, is cancer. This often presents with increasing dysphagia, weight loss, and the ominous "food gets stuck" symptom. If there's difficulty in getting food past the mouth and throat, any of a host of neurological disorders might be responsible; examples are myasthenia gravis, multiple sclerosis, brain tumor, or even Lou Gehrig disease.

Further down, besides cancer, gastroenterologists are on the lookout for a lot of things. Thin mucosal webs, curiously associated with severe anemias, may cause partial obstruction. Something outside the esophagus (such as blood vessels or bony projections) may compromise the passage of food by simple pressure. At the very bottom of the esophagus a fibrous narrowing called Schatzki's Ring may be the cause of dysphagia. Or a condition known as achalasia might tighten up the puckerstring just above the stomach to prevent the normal passage of food. Another possibility is the recurrent reflux of acid from the stomach into the esophagus; severe enough and scar tissue can form to interfere with the normal swallowing process.

Don't dismiss dysphagia as "just indigestion". If food won't go down, if it hurts to swallow, if there is awareness of the difficulty in the passage of food or drink between your mouth and your stomach (especially if it "gets stuck"), see your doctor! Most of the conditions I've mentioned above, even cancer, respond to treatment...especially with an early diagnosis.

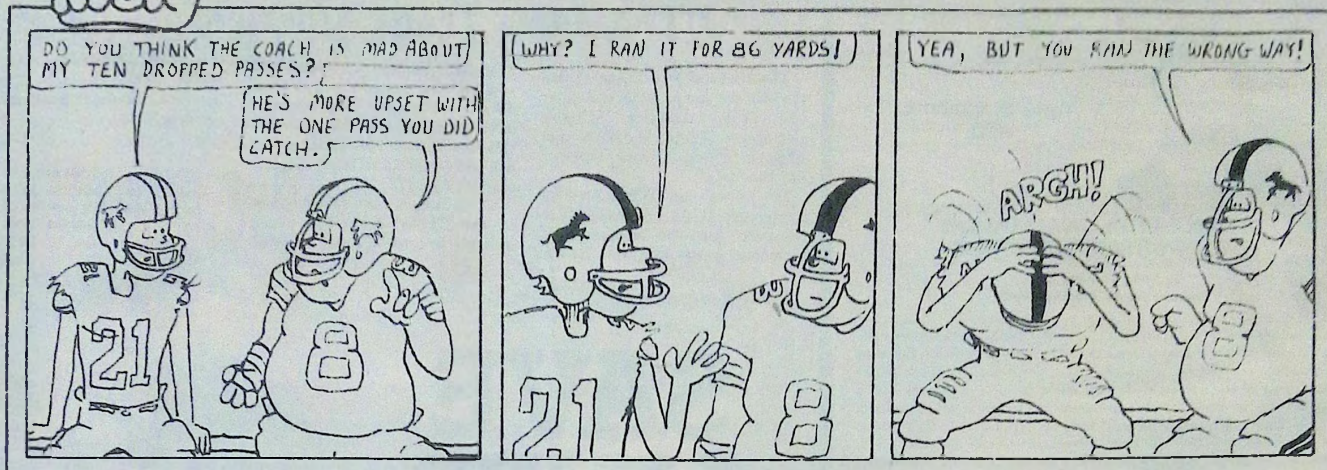

Mexico Earthquake To Have Lasting Effect

While the extensive physical damage caused by Mexico's recent earthquake is obvious, the lingering effects of the geological upheaval on that country's economy are more subtle and perhaps, in the long run, even more devastating, says an assistant professor of economics at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

"In Mexico City, the retailing and distribution centers, as well as government operations, were perhaps hardest hit," notes Dr. Alejandro Velez. "Although an estimated 50 percent of Mexico's factories are in the District, they predominantly are located in the north part of town which did not record severe damage."

At first glance, this information may appear encouraging. But Dr. Velez notes that while factories remained relatively untouched, they represent direct capital investments, the productivity of which depends on more indirect sources of capital such as railroads, utilities, sewers, etc., which were demolished in many areas.

"We'd be derelict to underestimate the damage to Mexico's indirect sources," he asserts. "As a developing country, these facilities always are lagging behind population growth anyway. What may be a relatively small initial effect may become extensive because of the difficulty Mexico will have in replacing the equipment needed to build these facilities."

Of prime importance to Mexico's economy involves the repayment of its \$96 billion international debt. Dr. Velez feels that Mexico's attempts at repaying these loans will be even more difficult than previously anticipated because American dollars already have become more expensive since the earthquake, as indicated by an increased ratio of pesos to dollars.

"Their debt crisis is a symptom of a chronic shortage of foreign currencies," Velez explains. "Foreign currencies increase through exports, tourism and the

like. If this disaster had occurred, say during the late 1970s or early 1980s when Mexico earned these much-needed foreign monies through oil exports, it might not have had such a critical impact."

Dr. Velez cites the tourism

industry as a major factor in Mexico's future economic rebound although cautioning that it might be a while before visitors return. "Mexico derives an enormous amount of foreign currency through their tourist trade. This industry,

needless to say, was one of the hardest hit, considering the devastation of a number of large hotels located near the heart of Mexico City's major attractions."

Like any other emergency, however, Dr. Velez believes that the

earthquake could have positive internal effects as well. "No doubt it has already created some heroes," he says. "But more importantly, it may lead to more streamlined city functions including firefighting and communications."

Prep Harriers Pick Up Pace

The cross country teams at Marshall and Taft high schools continue to pick up the pace as they near the district meet scheduled Oct. 26.

Marshall improved in the recent Northeast Invitational, placing second in the girls division and 11th in the boys. Taft did not have enough competitors to field a team but the individuals posted improved times.

The Lady Rams finished with 66 points, six points behind champion Clark. Marshall's top three runners once again came through, with Carol Theinpont placing third (12:37), Erin McWalter fourth (12:41) and

JoAnn Langlinais sixth (13:06). Freshman Melinda Crum turned in a strong 16th place showing in 13:33. Carol Hernandez rounded out the scoring with a 50th place finish.

Dawn Love of Roosevelt won individual honors with a 12:26 clocking over the two-mile Blossom Athletic Center course. Kerstin Blumhardt of Clark was second at 12:36.

Marshall and Taft will compete in the San Antonio Invitational at Highlands Park Saturday, Oct. 12. Both will compete Oct. 19 at the Edgewood meet which will be dampened by many students taking the SAT.

Marshall's top three finishers were also in the top 10 at the Northside meet Sept. 28. The Lady Rams finished with 119 points for fourth place.

"That's what we're hoping for (improvement)," said Marshall Coach Jo Nitsch. "I'm very pleased with the girls and with the guys, too. They're improving."

Theinpont led the way at the Northside meet with a sixth place in 13:52. McWalter was eighth at 14:00 and Langlinais ninth at 14:02. Seguin was first overall.

Nitsch believes she has found a strong fourth runner in Crum but is still hoping for Sheryl Theinpont to become the fifth. She was the sixth Lady Ram at the recent Northeast meet.

"Melinda is a freshman and is coming on strong. We moved her up to varsity and she finished 33rd (at Northside)," Nitsch said. "I think Sheryl is having a problem with the pain. There's blistering from the brace and she's having a time getting it all together again."

Langlinais was the Rams' top runner at the Central Catholic meet Sept. 21 with an eighth place finish. Carol Theinpont was ninth and McWalter 10th in the meet as the Rams finished sixth.

Marshall's boys have been improving each week, going from 16th in the Central Catholic meet to 14th at Northside to 11th in last week's Northeast meet.

Marshall's 231 points was a distance behind champion Jay's 39 at Northeast. Jeff Hugdahal was clocked the fastest for Marshall with a 16:51, good enough for 33rd place. Augie Flores of Burbank was first in 15:29 over the three-mile course.

Jim Neal was a step behind Hugdahal with a 34th place finish in 16:53. Mike Haynes was 43rd at 17:08, Steve Ybarra 50th in 17:17 and Ron Besore 71st in 17:52.

Jim Neal led the group at the Northeast meet with an 18:25 clocking for 49th place. Hugdahal

was 53rd at 18:33.

"Del Rio (sixth at Northside) and Jay (first at Northside) are ahead of us in district," Nitsch said of the boys. "We'll be shooting for third. Ruben Reina (of Jay and the city's top distance runner) didn't run and they'll be tough when he comes back."

The Taft Raiders had a boys team at Northside but illness took its toll on the team at Northeast, where only three varsity boys ran. The girls side is still short of runners with only two on varsity and one junior varsity.

Ralph Trinidad had his best finish of the year at Northeast, running 16:24 for 12th place. Aaron Stubenazy was 70th. Sandra Roman was the top girl, finishing in the upper 40 percent as compared to the top 50 percent the prior week at Northside. Tara Hays finished 27th out of 75 in the junior varsity girls at Northside, according to Coach Kathy Richter.

"Everybody ran the best they have this year at Northeast," Richter said. "I'm always looking on the positive side. The kids ran well Saturday. The cooler weather did something with that plus they're getting more enthusiastic and looking forward to district."

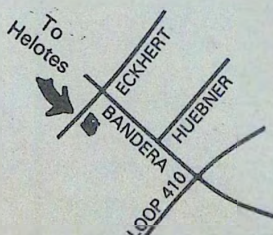
