Voters Must Okay 1/2° Sales Tax

VIA bus service for the Helotes area, including Helotes, Grey Forest, Braun Station, Woods End, Wildwood, and rural areas between Helotes and Leon Valley, is now being sought.

Leader of the movement to get the transit service ex-tended is Greg Trimble, 8827 Brigadoon, of the Braun Station Community Improvement Association.

In order for VIA to extend service to this area, voters will have to approve the 1/2-cent sales tax which helps support VIA in areas where the bus system now is operating.

Trimble said the sales tax vote can be included at a negligible cost in the county's constitutional amendments referendum to be held in November. He has written County Judge Albert Busta-mante requesting permission to appear before the commissioners court on July 16 to ask that the sales tax vote be added to the referendum.

Fourteen voting precincts in the northwest quadrant of the county-Commissioner Tom Stolhandske's district-would participate in the vote. They are Precincts 238, 240, 241, 242, 244, 245, 246, 247, 248, 253, 255, 256, 268 and 269.

Precincts 245 and 246 are in Grey Forest. In 1977 in the first vote on the tax to authorize VIA service, the Grey Forest precincts voted against the tax and the service 122 to 71. The other precincts defeated the proposal 638 to 506.

Because of the gasoline shortage that has developed in recent weeks Trimble believes that these narrow defeats of the VIA tax can be turned into

approvals.
"Most of the people living in the Helotes area work in San Antonio and, as a result, require the usage of more fuel in our cars. It is not incon-ceivable that the government eventually will be forced to implement a gas rationing program, and we will have no alternative but to rely on mass transit systems such as the VIA bus system," he said.

Also interested in getting VIA service are residents in Universal City, Winderest and China Grove, according to a VIA official.

Trimble will speak to the members of the Helotes Park Homeowners Association July 12 concerning the VIA

Springs Hold Aged Relics

Artifacts from Indian civilizations dating back more than 13,000 years were discovered at Aquarena Springs, the resort and vacation center at San Marcos.

The discovery was made by Dr. Joel Shiner, a professor of anthropology at S Methodist University. Southern

discovery proves theories of continuous occupation by Indian civilizations in North America.

"Aquarena Springs has the longest continuous record of Indian occupation of any locality in North America," Dr. Shiner said. "We have Shiner said. "We have examples of the Clovis Indian culture as well as Comanche and Apache cultures. In addition, we also discovered evidence of their day-to-day activities, their social structure and their religious practices.

Continuous occupation gives us the opportunity to study the styles and form of tools and trading practices. We found rocks from all over Central Texas that were brought by these people to San Marcos."

Ancient bison remains and a varied assortment of arrow-heads and flint tools were discovered with the rocks. In addition, more than 10,000 small bits of flint, which were used for making tools, were also unearthed. Dr. Shiner believes these findings indicate clusters of activity within the civilization. The relics have been preserved in mud for thousands of years and have been protected from the elements.

Historical discoveries are not new to Aqurena Springs and San Marcos. These findings reaffirm the location as a per-fect site for civilization. The natural beauty and ample supply of food and water were documented in early Spanish records.

Two centuries ago the springs were re-discovered by Franciscan monks who were exploring the Guadalupe River Valley. Since that time, the springs have been the site for a mission, a fort, a ranch and a city-San Marcos.

Excavation at Aquarena Springs will continue under the direction of Dr. Shiner and a national public television film is in the making.

"I'm interested in the humanity of the Indians. I would like to show that these people had an eye for beauty and practiced some form of religious worship," explained

Shiner.
"There's no evidence that these Indians became extinctonly that they might have moved on with the influx of Spanish and American settlers."

Dr. R. E. W. Adams, UTSA professor of anthropology and former dean of the university's College of Humanities and Social Sciences, has been named an overseas fellow of Churchill College, a part of Cambridge University in England. He will take a leave of absence from UTSA beginning September.

More Study Of Aquifer?

A decision concerning a recent request from the San Antonio City Council to follow up the Metcalf and Eddy studies of the Edwards aquifer is expected to be made Tuesday, July 10, by the board of directors of the five-county Edwards Underground Water District.

To meet at 10 a.m. in the Tower Life Building, the board will take up the Council's request that the EUWD follow up the Metcalf & Eddy report with additional studies of other quandrants in the Edwards

Thomas P. Fox, district general manager, said the lengthy agenda also will include consideration by the board of requests that the district participate in the Bureau of Reclamation's Nueces River Basin study, cooperate with Southwest Texas State University to establish a permanent Edwards aquifer research and data center, and cooperate with Texas A&M University to develop further the University's educational programs concerning agricultural lawn irrigation practices.

Grey Forest Seeks Mobile Homes Ban

Mobile homes and a possible contract with the San Antonio Metropolitan Health District to serve as the Grey Forest health agency will be Topics A and B of the Grey Forest City Council when it meets Tuesday night, July 10, a meeting postponed from the regular meeting night of July 3 because of the Fourth

of July holiday.

The council will be working on an ordinance to exclude mobile homes from Grey Forest. A public hearing on mobile homes held by the city's planning and zoning commis-sion on June 25 drew an unusually large crowd. Speakers against and for mobile homes were heard, with those against in the majority.

After having heard this input from citizens, the commission headed by Mrs. Margaret Martin recommended to the council that mobile homes be excluded.

At a work session (nonofficial) of the council on June 26, two members of the staff of the Metropolitan Health District, Ken Crain and Harold Scherwitz, explained what services the district could offer the city.

These would be be the same services now performed for Bexar County and the city of San Antonio except for animal control and mosquito control, they said. The district is too understaffed to extend these to Grey Forest.

The other services include education, environ-health, veterinary health mental health, services, communicable disease control, nursing services, laboratory services, and statistical services. The cost to Grey Forest would be approximately \$2,000 per year. The director of Metropolitan the Health District, Dr. Courand N. Rothe, would be the city health officer of Grey Forest.



Smithers' adventurous career included riding with a pack mule train during a stint with the U.S. Army in Big Bend. He photographed the U.S.-Mexican border from Brownsville to the Pacific for the border patrol, and also participated in several cattle drives during the 1930's.

As a teenager he photo-documented the birth of military aviation at San Antonio and its subsequent employment in Gen. John J. Pershing's campaign against Pancho Villa. The exhibit includes a photograph of "The Army's first aeroplane" at Ft. Sam Houston.

Since 1974, Smithers has lived quietly in El Paso, writing about the events to which he bore eyewitness.

The photos on exhibit are on loan from the W. D. Smithers collection at the Humanities Research Center of The University of Texas at Austin. The center owns more than 12,000 of Smithers' pictures along with 1,207 pages of typed manuscript he has written since 1976 about his adventures as a photographer in West Texas.



Dr. Calgaard Named Trinity President



Dr. Ronald Calgaard President, Trinity University

Dr. Ronald K. Calgaard became the 16th president of Trinity University Friday, June 29, in a brief ceremony in the Great Hall of Chapman Graduate Center on the Skyline Campus.

The 41-year-old economist accepted three symbols of the University presidency from Mr. Harold Herndon, chairman of the board of trustees. They are the charter of the University, which was founded in 1869; a chain of golden medallions traditionally worn by the president at each commencement; and the official mace of the University.

The golden medallions on the chain are each inscribed with the name of one of Trinity's previous 15 presidents and his years of service. The mace, made of wood and weighing more than 30 pounds, is engraved with the seven symbols of classical learning. These engravings emphasize the dedication of Trinity University to the liberal arts.

Following the ceremony, University trustees, faculty, students and staff met informally with Dr. Calgaard, his wife Genie, and their children Lisa, 14, and Kent, 10.

Dr. Calgaard was vicechancellor for academic affairs at the University of Kansas before accepting the appointment to the presidency. He takes over the helm of the 3500student University from Dr. Bruce Thomas, who served as acting president for two years.

Farm Land Due Break

Owners of agricultural land in Bexar County are reminded that they must act themselves to take advantage of the new law passed by the Legislature which limits the property tax value of such land, according to M. L. Stolte, president of the Bexar County Farm Bureau.

"First, all such owners are urged to contact the elected officials of each of the taxing authorities involved and request that they not deny this tax relief in 1979," Mr. Stolte said. The act states that the Legislature believes that the implementation of the law is both feasible and desirable this year "unless it is impossible to do so.."

"We believe that our local taxing districts—county, cities, schools, and others—have the competence to implement the law this year," the county farm leader said.

Mr. Stolte also reminded local landowners that they must apply with each taxing district between July 1-15 in order to take advantage of the law.

Mr. Stolte said the local county Farm Bureau office at the San Antonio Union Stockyards has sample application forms available which are helpful in preparing information for the official form.

"We urge farmers and ranchers to take advantage of this new law," the farm leader said.
