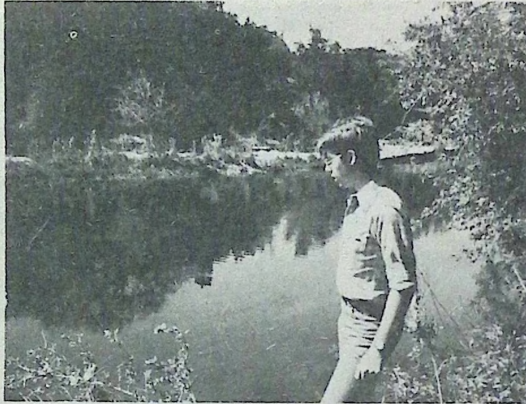

EPA Hearing Leads To Water Study

Results of the hearing called by the Environmental Protection Agency on Wednesday, June 4, will be evaluated as soon as possible a large gathering of interested persons were told at the Convention Center. The hearing will determine whether the Edwards Aquifer—the apparently chief source of drinking water—is the sole source for the San Antonio area, which, if contaminated would create a significant hazard to public health. The hearing was called at the instigation of several groups, including the Citizens for Better Environment.

The hearing is expected to decide whether the local controls such as those exerted by the Texas Water Quality Board are sufficient protection. The Board in carrying out its duties under new mandates such as the Safe Drinking Water Act has brought two recent actions to determine that present San Antonio developers obey all clauses in the Board's regulations.

San Antonio's water history dates back to the time when the San Antonio River and creeks were joined by springs as the chief water sources.

A 19th century pioneer, George W. Brackenridge, drilled the first city-wide well on the North side of the city but probably did not tap much of the Aquifer according to early experts.

This present evaluation will shed much light and add to the knowledge of the vast underground reservoir which covers six counties.

Results of the study will be released to the public in a few months, those present were told. Persons there included

developers, concerned citizens, civic and cultural leaders, as well as water control experts.

Daughter Of Local Pastor Dies In Dallas

She is survived by her husband, Whitley R. Smith, Jr.; her son Whitley R. (Robbie) Smith III, who has completed a year's college at The University of Texas at Austin; and she also leaves a daughter, Mrs. James H. (Terry) Lucius, Jr. of Carrollton, Texas.

In addition to her parents and brother here, she is survived by a sister, Mrs. Anna Ruth Byerly of San Antonio, and a brother, Sam R. Terry of Tulsa, Oklahoma.

Mrs. Terry was born in Chicago, Illinois while her father was a student at seminary college. She was of Texas heritage on both sides of her family and grew up in Texas. She moved to various communities as her father was

A long legal hassle—which had been won in two earlier rounds—had held up work, but one of the by San Antonio Ranch Town developers came to an end in the closing days of May when the Supreme Court of the United States announced to the defendants that the Court would not review the lower Court's decision, already upheld in the U. S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals.

The Ranch Town, on the former Lytle Ranch of Helotes, covers 9,318 acres of land, and plans are to develop a community of more than 80,000 residents. They are eligible for an \$18,000.00 federal guarantee.

According to plans released for study during the long court battle by the Ranch Town developers, the first work will be near the Bandera Road—Highway 16 entrance to the Ranch which will include the community center. A green belt over part of the Edwards-Aquifer is planned.

Site planning will be continued on the actual land rather than on paper in the near future, one spokesman revealed. Actual building should get underway this

summer. The legal restrictions had held up work, but one of the group expressed an opinion during the earlier stages of the court action that the extra care would doubtless pay off in a better planned community despite the additional cost brought by the delay.

At one time the developers had offered 1,000 acres to The University of Texas for the San Antonio campus, but the Board of Regents chose the present site of the campus instead, giving as their reason that the 600 acres were more accessible to San Antonio students.

UTSA To Offer Bilingual Course

The University of Texas at San Antonio is sponsoring a Bicultural Bilingual Summer Institute June 2 to July 11, 1975, for teachers. Registrants must meet regular requirements for admission to UTSA summer graduate programs to participate.

Deadline for applications was April 18. Dr. Maricio Charpenel, UT Austin and Dr. Ingeborg McCoy, Southwest Texas State University, are the instructors.

The Institute is limited to 60 participants.

San Antonio—The Edwards Underground Water District has noted that owners of septic tanks and other private sewage systems over the Recharge Zone of the Edwards Underground Reservoir can save as much as \$50 if, prior to Jan. 28, 1976, they will secure their registrations now required by such systems.

Under provisions of the new Texas Water Quality Board Order No. 75-0428-20, which is designed to protect the aquifer from pollution and which went into effect Jan. 28, 1975, all private sewerage systems existing at that time, as well as all newer private sewerage systems, must be registered and licensed.

The TWOB Order provides that owners of systems that were in being prior to the issuance of the order will not have to pay the licensing fees if they apply for and receive their registrations for these systems before next Jan. 28.

Under the order, licensing enforcement will be handled by counties at county agencies as follows:

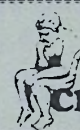

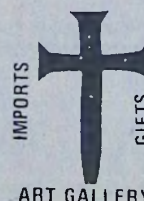

Krueger Supports Estate Tax Reform

Congressman Bob Krueger announced recently that he is co-sponsoring with Representative Omar Burleson (D-Tex.), legislation designed to reform federal estate taxes.

H. R. 1793, supported by the Texas Farm Bureau, raises the present \$60,000.00 tax exemption, adopted in 1942, to \$200,000.00, applicable to all estates. The bill also raises the marital deduction from 50 percent of the adjusted gross estate to \$100,000.00, plus 50 percent of the total value of the adjusted gross estate.

The proposed legislation establishes a procedure by which farm and ranch estates could elect to be assessed at their value for agricultural purposes, provided these estates have been devoted to farming or ranching for at least five years.

Rainfall Averages Close To Normal

UTSA Summer Enrollment High

Enrollment at The University of Texas at San Antonio for the first summer session has set a record—up more than 25 percent over previous summer session enrollments. Classes are still at the Koger Executive Center at Loop 410.

According to preliminary figures released Tuesday, June 3, by the University, 1,236 graduate students registered for classes during Summer Session I.

UTSA President Peter T. Flawn observed that the growth of the summer program indicates that UTSA will be a 12-month university.

Official enrollments during the past summer sessions have been 968 for Summer Session I 1974, 703 for Summer Session II 1974, 634 for Summer Session I 1973 and 352 for Summer Session II 1973. Enrollment during the past spring semester was at an all-time UTSA high—1,681.

As specified by the Coordinating Board, Texas College and University System, the official enrollment is determined by the number of students enrolled on the fourth class day, which will be June 6, 1975, for the current session.

Classes will move to the campus for the Fall term September 2. The campus is at 1604 and Babcock.

UTSA Now Has Testing Center

UTSA is now a testing center for the Educational Testing Service and the American College Testing Program.

This authorizes the University to give the Graduate Record Examination (GRE), the College Level Examination Program (CLEP), the College Entrance Examination Board (CEEB) and the American College Testing Program (ACT).

The GRE will be administered on the UTSA campus on the national administration dates of Oct. 18, 1975, Feb. 28, 1976, and June 12, 1976. The test is required

by most graduate schools as a criteria for admissions. During Summer '75 the University also will administer GRE tests for UTSA and prospective students under special arrangements of the ETS summer institute testing program.

The ACT is an entrance exam used for admission of high school students to a university and will be given at UTSA on Dec. 13, 1975, and April 10, 1976.

June brides should remember to change their name with social security, reports Gilbert G. Gonzalez, social security district manager in San Antonio.

"No matter which month she's married in, a bride should give us her new name so we can keep her social security card and her earnings record up to date," Gonzalez said. "Then earnings she had both before and after her marriage can be correctly credited to the same record."

Earnings women have in jobs covered by social security will determine the amount of their cash benefits—"and not just when they retire," according to Gonzalez. "During their working years, women also build disability, survivors, and Medicare protection for themselves and their families," he said.

To get her name changed on her record, a new bride can call or write any social security office. "Or," he said, "she can use a form available at any post office and at many employer personnel offices."

The San Antonio, Texas, social security office is at 309 Dwyer. The phone number is 349-3991. The Social Security Administration is an agency of the U. S. Department of Health, Education, and Welfare.

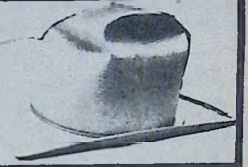

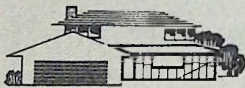

HEALTHY GARDENING You Can Learn From Mother Nature

by Dee Mullins Creech

Most Americans, when they think of a home with a lovely yard and garden, visualize solid carpet grass, always neatly trimmed, with shrubs, flowers and trees in certain areas, carefully weeded and completely free of insects. We all need to look carefully at Mother Nature's backyard and re-examine what we've come to regard as the perfect American home and yard.

First of all, Mother Nature is never perfect in the way we've come to think of perfection. She is never "plastic". In her backyard, bugs abound, keeping a natural balance by feeding on one another. She knows that a variety of weeds, grasses, flowers, trees and shrubs help keep each other healthy and create the proper atmosphere for birds, insects, frogs, lizards, etc., which in turn do their work towards controlling harmful insects. She never poisons, even when a certain group of insects become excessive.

We should allow our yards and gardens to be microcosms of nature. By so doing, we will find the battle of bugs works itself out naturally and we needn't worry about poisons.

One of the best ways to invite Mother Nature back to your home is to allow some weeds to grow in an out-of-the-way area of your yard or garden. They will draw many birds and some frogs, lizards, etc., to patrol bugs.

Many people see weeds, and automatically see snakes. It's best not to allow too many weeds if you have children zooming about, but a narrow belt of weeds here and there will not encourage snakes of the poisonous variety anymore than your flower beds or shrubs will.

I allow weeds to grow a foot or two high all around the edges of my garden. I have seen for four seasons now how the harmful bugs nearly always choose the weeds over my vegetables. And in those weeds, live my Lady Bugs and Praying Mantises and other helpful bugs munching away on the harmful ones. My populations

of Lady Bugs and Praying Mantises have grown tremendously since they homestead all year in this protected zone. Anytime I do have a bug outbreak in the vegetable patches, I see the Lady Bugs and Praying Mantises come out by the dozens and sometimes hundreds to help correct the imbalance.

These weeds, and a small portion of the lawn I leave unmowed until mid-June, also draw many different and unusual in-

sect-eating birds that I would otherwise never have here. I see them each day soaring about the garden and dipping quickly down to snap-up insects.

Just look around when you're working outside. Have you cleaned out too much? Does your yard look "plastic"? Are you still using poisons? Now take a close look at Mother Nature's yard by the creek down Scenic Loop Road. Do you see life everywhere in her beautifully free yard? If some of this life is not around your home, you know you need to imitate her as best you can.

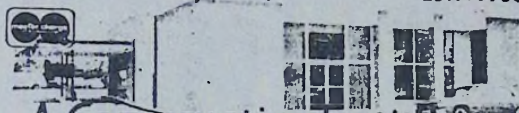

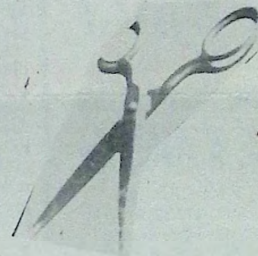
