



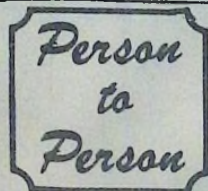

## Council Hires City Administrator

### Galm Road Closing Again Turned Down

Helotes City Council Thursday night approved the appointment of Ramiro Cavazos to be the city's first Administrative Assistant, a new position created by the council several months ago but not filled until now.

Cavazos is a 23-year-old graduate student at St. Mary's University and staff member in the Budget Office of the City of San Antonio. He is a native of McAllen and was graduated from Weslaco High School.

He earned a bachelor's degree in political science last year at the University of Texas in Austin. He is enrolled in a master's program in public and institutional administration at St. Mary's and expects to complete that degree next May.

He will begin work for the city on July 29 at a salary of \$16,000 per year.

In a second public hearing on the closing of Galm Road at its intersection with FM-1560 near the Helotes Creek crossing, the Council decided not to reverse itself and to keep the Galm Road open, as it had voted at a first public hearing held last month.

Present for the public hearing was Charles Hackebiel, State Highway Department engineer from

The Helotes senior girls' all-star team advanced to the third round of the District 19 softball tournament after easily disposing of Camelot, 18-4, Wednesday.

Laurie Klein picked up the victory on the mound and was one of eight girls to collect at least two hits. Klein held Camelot to seven hits and struck out four. She also had belted a triple and two doubles.

Liza Vasquez led the all batters with a perfect four-for-four night, including two doubles and two RBIs. Kim Wolf doubled and singled twice. Denise Monreal had three hits and Laurie Seitz had a triple

and single. Meredith Zachry doubled and singled, with Leslie Zachry and Janet Phillippe both hitting two singles.

Helotes, one of two undefeated teams in the tournament going into Thursday's games, will play at 8 p.m. today, July 12, at the Northeast Little League field.

Two other Helotes all-star teams stayed alive with consolation round victories. The major girls rattled Camelot, 24-5, to advance to a Thursday game.

James Rogers stroked three hits to lead the Helotes junior boys to a 3-2 verdict over Perrin Beitel in a consolation game. Joseph Escamilla

picked up the victory. The junior boys play at 5:30 p.m. today, July 12 at the Northeast Little League field.

The senior boys were eliminated from the tournament by falling 8-7 to McAllister Park-Northeast.

The senior boys' bats were silent Monday as they could muster only one hit in dropping a 12-0 decision to Windcrest. Carlos Jimenez collected Helotes' only safety.

The junior boys had the hits but couldn't string them together for enough runs as Helotes fell 12-3 to McAllister. Eric Peterson rapped out four hits and Armando Flores three for Helotes.

Northwest blanked Helotes, 9-0, in

the major boys division. Kenny Flores led Helotes at the plate. Helotes played a consolation game Thursday.

The senior girls team was the only Helotes group to post a first round victory by whipping Northwest, 9-5, behind the pitching of Kim Wolf. Wolf went the distance for Helotes, striking out 10 batters and holding Northwest to three hits. Wolf also led a quintet of Helotes batters who collected two hits each. Meredith Zachry, Denise Monreal, Laurie Klein and Laurie Seitz also had two hits. Liza Vasquez had a key double in the 15-hit attack.

Hondo, who showed plans for the state's reworking of FM-1560 from Helotes to FM-471 near the new Taft High School. The state plans to build a 200-foot bridge over Helotes Creek and widen and re-pave the

road, although it has only an 80-foot right-of-way. Farm to Market roads now require a 120-foot right-of-way.

Hackebiel said the State Highway Department takes no stand on whether or not to close the Galm Road intersection.

Closing of the road was strongly protested by Mr. and Mrs. C. E. Williamson, who live on the section between Antonio Drive and FM-1560.

The Council decided not only to let their previous decision stand to keep the intersection open, but voted also to ask the State Highway Department to pave the graveled section of Galm Road which extends from Antonio Drive to FM-1560 as short distance beyond the intersection at the Helotes Creek crossing. The state earlier had offered to pave that section at a cost to the city of \$7,000.

The busy session of the Council also received a visit from County Commissioner for Precinct 2, Andy Casias, and an assistant administrator for the county, Joe Garza. They were seeking an agreement between the city and Bexar County to participate in a federal grant program. The county is attempting to qualify for an urban county designation by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

To qualify, the county must report a 200,000 population (outside the City of San Antonio). In order to reach this population it must have the cooperation of all 32 incorporated towns in the county plus the persons living outside incorporated areas. The county then can apply for a \$6 million grant for

## San Geronimo Indian Campsite Studied

The remains of a 4,500 year old Indian campsite are being excavated near San Geronimo by archaeologists from The University of Texas at San Antonio.

Artifacts uncovered include Nolan, LaJita and Bulverde dart points dating from 3000 to 2000 B.C. which belong to what is called the Early Archaic period.

Areas similar to this one are found throughout Central Texas

according to Dr. Thomas R. Hester, the director of the Center for Archaeological Research at UTSA. However Hester added, "These sites are an enigma to archaeologists. We still aren't sure what they are. We do know they were associated with a large camp of hunting and gathering Indians that lived one and two thousand years before Christ."

Some of the area being dug is called a burned rock midden by archaeologists and contains large amounts of broken and charred rock that accumulated during the Middle or Late Archaic period, forming a large mound.

"We don't know why these Indians gathered and piled up these mounds," Hester admitted. However, it is the flat lands between the

mound and a nearby creek, an area where the Indians must have camped, that Hester believes contains the more significant scientific artifacts.

The five-week project, which is the subject of UTSA's 1985 archaeological field school, was made possible through the cooperation of developers of the Oak Country Subdivision.

environmental improvements and public housing assistance, Casas said.

The Helotes Council will put the proposed agreement on the agenda for its next meeting, on Thursday, July 25, at the PARC Building, beginning at 7 p.m.

## Loop 410 To Be Widened

Loop 410 widening and improvement from Valley Hi Drive to Bandera Road has begun. The project will widen Loop 410 from the present four-lane divided roadway to a six-lane facility. Included in the work are road revisions and the building of turnarounds at several interchanges. The Valley Hi Drive bridge will be raised to increase vehicle clearance. Improved drainage facilities will be installed at Marbach Road. The frontage roads will receive asphalt overlays as needed. Illumination is also part of the improvements.

The \$14,285,000 improvements should be completed by December, 1986. They will increase the capacity of this section of Loop 410, which is handling greater traffic volumes as a result of extensive area residential and commercial development. Average annual daily traffic counts have increased from 11,000 vehicles per day in 1965 to the present 71,000.

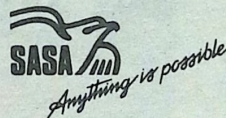

## Mrs. Maguire Dies At 59

Mrs. Pat H. Maguire, retired director of development at The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures at San Antonio, died of cancer Sunday, July 7, at the age of 59.

Memorial services were held Wednesday, morning, July 10, at the First Presbyterian Church in San Antonio, and Wednesday afternoon at University Presbyterian Church in Austin.

Both Mrs. Maguire and her husband, Executive Director Jack R. Maguire, joined the Institute of Texan Cultures in 1976 following their retirement as leaders of The University of Texas Ex-Students' Association. She retired from the Institute in January 1984. He plans to retire as Executive Director on August 31.

The Maguires worked together as a team for more than 20 years, blending their individual skills and talents. Of their work at the Institute Jack Maguire says, "Unless my successor is as fortunate as I have been, directing the Institute will be a harder job than mine ever was. That is because ours has been a team operation. Many of the best programs offered statewide today by the Institute grew from Pat's ideas."

During her eight years at the Institute Maguire was instrumental in organizing and establishing numerous programs designed to carry Texas history throughout the state including the publications and audiovisuals programs; traveling exhibits, traveling trunks and Tex-Kits; the membership program; the Alliance, the Institute's volunteer association; and the Ambassadors, a statewide network of

volunteers who represent the Institute in their local areas.

From 1961 until joining the Institute in 1976, Mrs. Maguire worked with the U.T. Ex-Students' Association, first as Director of Alumni Publications and later as Director of Communications. During that time she also served as managing editor of *Alcalde*, the U.T. Austin Alumni magazine, for which she received numerous publication awards.

In addition to her many accomplishments, Mrs. Maguire was active in several professional organizations including Women in Communications Inc., the American Alumni Council and the International Association of Business Communicators. She was recognized in *Who's Who in American Women*, *Who's Who in the South and Southwest* and, in 1974, she was named as one of Austin's Outstanding Women.

Mrs. Maguire is survived by her husband; her mother, Mrs. Hilda Collier of Fredericksburg; her son and daughter-in-law, Jack, Jr. and Margaret of San Antonio; son and daughter-in-law Kevin and Jay of Austin; and grandson Christopher of Austin.

In lieu of flowers, the family has requested that memorials be made to the Pat and Jack Maguire Scholarship at The U.T. Ex-Students' Association, the Pat and Jack Maguire Cultural Outreach Endowment Fund at The Institute of Texan Cultures, the Oncology Development Research Fund at The U.T. Health Science Center in San Antonio, or the Cancer Therapy and Research Center in San Antonio.

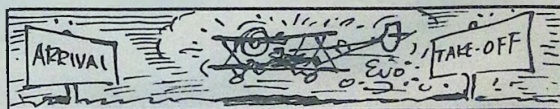

## State Water Plan To Be Topic

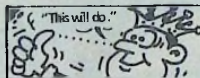

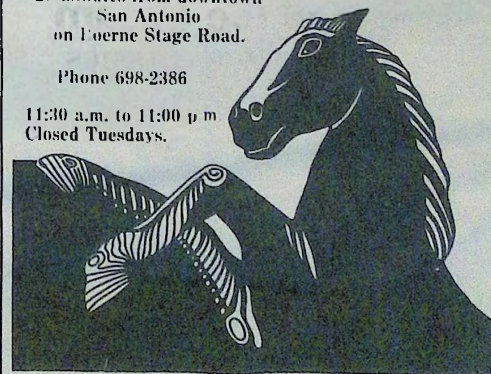

## National Merit Scholarship Corp. Wins Court Case

In a case filed on June 25, 1985 by National Merit Scholarship Corporation of Evanston, Illinois, Judge Prentice Marshall of the United States District Court in Chicago on June 27, 1985 issued a Temporary Restraining Order prohibiting the use of the name National Merit Foundation, Inc. by an organization located in Los Angeles, California.

The plaintiff, National Merit Scholarship Corporation, conducts the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Over one million students from some 19,000 high schools currently enter each year's competition, in which more than 104,000 college undergraduate scholarships valued at \$325,000,000 were awarded between 1956 and 1985.

The defendant, National Merit Foundation, Inc., with which National Merit Scholarship Corporation has no association, had made a mass mailing to students throughout the country stating that, because of outstanding achievements, the student's name would appear in the National Merit Foundation's National Honor Roll.

The complaint filed by National Merit Scholarship Corporation alleged that the mailing included some students being honored in the National Merit Scholarship

Program, but also was sent to students with poor academic records and to students who had dropped out of school. The mailing included an offer for the student to purchase a book entitled The National Honor Roll for \$29.95, as well as a key chain for \$8.95, a wood grain plaque for \$19.95, and a certificate of recognition for \$9.95. The defendant also offered to send letters of recommendation to businesses and colleges for \$2.00 each.

National Merit Scholarship

Corporation has received numerous letters and telephone calls from students, parents, school administrators, and news media inquiring about its association with the defendant. In the suit filed by National Merit Scholarship Corporation, it alleged that the defendant had caused substantial actual confusion, and that it was highly damaging for National Merit Scholarship Corporation to be considered to be associated with National Merit Foundation, Inc.

### Nears Record

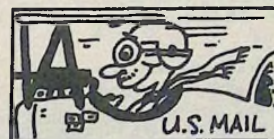

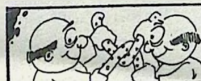

Dean Krueger will lead Northside District's ninth middle school, named for H. B. Zachry, when it opens in September with more than 900 students. The \$6 million school is one of three which Northside District will open this fall. H. B. Zachry Middle School is located in the Emerald Valley subdivision, and its attendance area includes Emerald Valley, Hidden Meadow, Misty Oaks, Silver Creek, Ridge Creek, Sterling Oaks, Bandera Landing, Oak Creek, North San Antonio Hills, and the rural areas along Talley, Potranco and Culebra Roads near Loop 1604. Also to be opened this fall are the new William Howard Taft High School, a new elementary school, and the new Health Careers High School.

## Summer Brings Sprains, But Most Not Serious

With the warm weather and sunny days in full swing, many who engage in outdoor summer sports may fall victim to a sprain of some type, more than likely, a sprained ankle.

All it takes is a little common sense, according to Dr. Peter McGanity says, occurs when a ligament is forced to exceed its normal range of motion. The more the ligament is forced to stretch, the

worse the degree of injury will be. Most of the time, however, nothing more than a simple sprain occurs, causing only slight discomfort and swelling.

To prevent a sprain of this type, Dr. McGanity recommends warm-up and cool down exercises before and after any sport or activity. According to the doctor, one should spend half the amount of time warming up and cooling down that

is expected to be spent engaged in the sport. The ankles and Achilles tendon should be given particular attention in warm-ups and cool downs, since they are much more vulnerable to sprain, adds the doctor.

So, what can be done after a sprain has already occurred?

Dr. McGanity recommends applying an ice pack, which will cut down on swelling. Aspirin can also help relieve any pain to the sprained area.

Sometimes, when a sprain occurs, explains the doctor, the nerves in the area may also be injured. If this has happened, there may not be much pain, if any; and for this reason, a sprain can be tricky.

If there still is swelling, whether there is pain or not, warns Dr. McGanity, one should never resume an activity after a sprain until the swelling has significantly diminished. And then, the doctor adds, the sufferer of a sprain should not return to the activity at the point which was left off. "A person who has just suffered from a sprain should slowly ease back into the activity which caused the sprain," Dr. McGanity says.

## Southwest Research Studies 'Star Wars' Defense Program

Motivated in part by the United States Strategic Defense Initiative, popularly known as the Star WEars Program, scientists at Southwest Research Institute (SwRI) have developed a new technical course called "penetration mechanics" that in its first two offerings drew students from nine countries.

The Strategic Defense Initiative seeks to develop a space-based defense against nuclear missiles. "What this means," explains Alex B. Wenzel, director of the Institute's Energetic Systems Department and one of the originators of the new course, "is that U.S. scientists are working to develop materials, structures, weaponry, and satellite systems that will maximize the survivability of U.S. defenses, and, at the same time, increase the vulnerability of enemy weapons and capabilities."

The five-day SwRI course, which has drawn military and civilian students from Canada, France, West Germany, Norway, Sweden, Taiwan, Brazil, Singapore and from across the U.S., covers almost all aspects of penetration mechanics, a science that deals with the effects of projectile-target interaction. The students, Wenzel said, were all involved in land and air combat vehicle, space system, and weapon system development and operations.

"In the past, penetration mechanics concepts were generally applied to conventional warfare systems, for example, a rocket striking an armored vehicle or a bomb landing on a building," Wenzel said. "The application of the science, however, to civilian and military space systems — for example, nuclear missiles attacking military satellites — requires solutions to complex problems not encountered before."

Drawing on more than 90 combined years of experience in this field, five Southwest Research Institute scientists designed the course as a means for teaching students how to analyze the impact of low, medium, and hypervelocity projectiles striking thick, thin, spaced, and composite materials targets. Besides Wenzel, the course developers and presenters are Dr. Ulric S. Lindholm, vice president, Engineering and Material Sciences Division; Staff Engineer Peter S. Westine; Consultant Dr. James S. Wilbeck; and Dynamic Analysis Section Manager Dr. Charles E. Anderson.

The course will be taught again in September, on the Southwest Research Institute grounds, and Wenzel says that he has requests to teach it at several Army, Navy, and Air Force research facilities.

### Medical Center Aids Athletes

The University of Texas has patented a new product for athletes that was developed by faculty from The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and at UT-Austin.

"Fresh Guard" is an oral lubricant and mouth freshener. It was created to counteract the dry mouth condition that often discourages athletes from wearing protective mouth guards, according to Robert Morrow, D.D.S., one of the product's creators. He leads a team that annually makes custom-fitted mouthguards for football players at UT-Austin and at Prairie View A&M University.

"Trainers tell us that athletes complain that their mouths become

drier than usual when they wear mouthguards," Morrow says. "If we can increase the comfort of the protective guards, athletes will wear them more often and we can reduce mouth injuries."

The new product is a pleasant-tasting, clear liquid that can be sprayed onto athletic mouthguards before use. It is not yet commercially available.

Morrow is associate dean for advanced education at the San Antonio dental school.

Working with him on the compound were James W. McGinity, Ph.D., associate professor at the UT-Austin College of Pharmacy, and William A. Kuebker, D.D.S., professor of prosthodontics at the dental school.

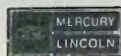

### Safety Belt Law

#### To Begin Sept. 1

Beginning Sept. 1, the use of safety belts will be required to operate or ride in the front seat of all passenger cars and trucks with a manufacturer's rated carrying capacity of not more than 1,500 pounds. This includes the three-quarter ton trucks.

A person commits an offense if the person is at least 15 years old, riding in the front seat of passenger car or truck while it is being operated on a street or highway in this state, in a seat equipped with a safety belt and the person is not secured by the safety seat.

A person can also commit an offense under this law if the person operates a passenger car or truck on a street or highway in this state, a vehicle equipped with safety belts and allows a child at least four (4) years old, but younger than 15 years old to ride in the front seat of the vehicle without requiring the child to be secured by a safety belt.

The safety belt law applies to non-resident travelers, as well as resident Texans. Also, a passenger car is deemed to be equipped with safety belts if required to meet the Texas Vehicle Act, section 139E to be equipped with safety belts.

Upon conviction for a violation of the Safety Belt Law, a person may receive a fine of not less than \$25, nor more than \$50.

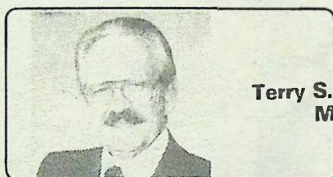

## TICK BITES CAN CAUSE DISEASE

The discovery of a tick after Texas outdoor activity is so common that it's best to undertake a "tick inspection". The pesky critter can be any place on your body, where it will happily guzzle your blood until satisfied. It can be removed in numerous ways. Some use a drop of gasoline, lighter fluid, or alcohol; others swear by fingernail polish, or recommend the heat from a match, cigarette, or heated paper clip. If these methods are unsuccessful use tweezers to gently tease the intact insect out of your skin with head and mouth parts attached. Important: Use tweezers and not your fingernails! Deadly disease can be transmitted.

A girl lay in the hospital, paralyzed. A host of laboratory tests were normal. The diagnosis eluded me so I performed yet another complete physical examination. Quite by accident, I found a tick firmly attached to her scalp and removed it. Her paralysis rapidly disappeared and she went home two days later. Diagnosis: Tick paralysis. This uncommon but serious reaction to a tick bite is caused by a neurotoxin, not a bacteria.

When a tick sucks the blood of any animal, it takes in what bacteria might be present. Then it can bite a human host and transmit any of a number of diseases. One we've known about for eighty years is Rocky Mountain Spotted Fever, named because it was first identified in Montana. However, most occurs in the southeastern USA. The illness begins two to ten days after a tick bite with fever, chills, severe headaches, and muscle soreness. About three days later a characteristic rash appears on the hands and feet and spreads inward to the rest of the body. Untreated, 20% to 30% of the victims may die. Fortunately it responds readily to antibiotics.

A decade ago the village of Old Lyme, Connecticut, suffered an epidemic marked by fever and a characteristic rash which was followed by painful joints. It got tagged with the name Lyme Disease. Investigation showed the causative microbe to be in rodents and deer. Then a certain tick was found to transmit it to humans. The peculiar arthritis that follows the typical rash and fever might not appear for several weeks; diagnosis is difficult unless the joint pains can be connected to the preceding fever and rash. Again, antibiotics are quite effective.

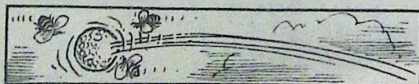
Relapsing Fever or Borreliosis is tick-borne in the western USA; in Africa it is louse-borne. Symptoms of fever, chills, sweats, and extremely painful muscles come on a week after being bitten, subside for about a week and then recur. These relapses can occur many times. Once diagnosed by laboratory means, this uncommon disease responds well to antibiotics.

Babesiosis is caused by a protozoan which infests rodents (mostly in New England); the tick carried it to a human. Symptoms are fever, chills, malaise, fatigue, and sore muscles. Fortunately this is a self-limited illness that required no specific treatment.

Tularemia, or Rabbit Fever, is well known to hunters because it can be directly spread from rabbits to humans. However, ticks can get in the act and carry it to folks who have never been near a rabbit. The usual picture is the formation of an ulcer at the inoculation site, followed by a painful enlargement of the lymph nodes in the armpit or groin. About this time the patient suffers from fever, chills, sweats, malaise, and muscle aches. Sophisticated antibiotics can bring about an effective cure.

Colorado Tick (Mountain) Fever is the only tick-borne disease caused by a virus, which lives in squirrels and is transmitted to humans by a tick. The symptoms are much like the other tick-borne diseases, with the addition of a severe behind-the-eyeballs headache. These may last for two or three days and disappear forever; or about half the patients suffer relapses. The exact diagnosis can be tricky, but it is helped by finding a very low white blood count. There is no specific therapy because the illness is self-limiting.

In Q Fever the tick gets into the act from a different angle. In the other diseases the germ is carried from the host animal to the human by the tick. In Q Fever the spread is from one domestic farm animal to another via a tick; people get the disease only from the animal and not from the tick. The symptoms are fever, chills, and malaise; however, pneumonia is a frequent complication.

## Medical Center Seeks Volunteers With High Blood Pressure

Volunteers with high blood pressure are needed for two studies at The University of Texas Health Science Center.

Males and females between the ages of 18 and 70 will receive a complete physical examination and will be paid for their services in testing two new blood pressure

medications.

"For one of the studies, we are looking for people taking the drug hydralazine for their blood pressure," said nurse Pat Flanagan, research instructor in pharmacology at the university. Those volunteers will be asked to spend 24 hours in the hospital on four separate occasions while taking a new timed release form of hydralazine.

During the hospital stays, blood samples will be taken to measure the effects of food on the drug's action. Female volunteers should not be pregnant or breast feeding.

Subjects who complete the study will be paid \$100 for each hospital visit.

The second study will involve being taken off all blood pressure medication for four weeks and then put on a new medication for about 16 weeks.

Volunteers will be asked to make weekly visits to the health science center for appointments lasting about 45 minutes. Those completing the study will be paid \$195.

## Polio Can Bring After Effects 30 Years Later

About one in four people who have had polio suffer what are called "late effects" 30 or 40 years after recovery.

"The late effects these patients are reporting now include fatigue, weakness in the muscles originally damaged, pain in muscles or joints and some weakness in areas not previously affected by the illness," reports John Herring, M.D.

Herring is associate professor of physical medicine and rehabilitation at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio and attending physiatrist at Medical Center Hospital.

Polio is a disease caused by a virus that attacks nerve cells in the spinal cord. Patients can be left paralyzed when the virus kills nerve cells connected to muscle fibers.

The disease began to disappear in this country in the 1950s when Dr. Jonas Salk developed the injectible vaccine and later when Dr. Albert Sabin followed with an oral vaccine still used today. For that reason, most of the estimated 200,000 to 300,000 people living in the United States who had polio as children or young adults are now in their forties or older.

"We don't know yet whether anything can stop or reverse these late effects," Herring says. Exercise is probably not the best thing for most of these patients, he adds.

The polio virus attacks motor nerve cells that operate specific muscle fibers. When a patient recovers, the remaining healthy nerve cells must shoulder the burden of the killed cells and may become fatigued, the doctor suggests.

"It is thought that some nerve cells normally drop out as people age. The increased burden on former polio patients' healthy nerve cells may simply be causing the cells to wear out faster."

Other possible explanations for late effects might be the onset of another disease or a reactivation of the polio virus. This has not been shown, however, and many physicians doubt the explanation, Herring says.

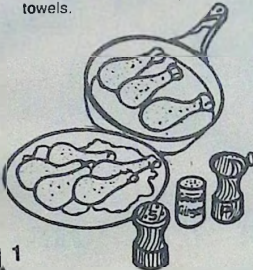
"When former polio patients come to us with these symptoms, we first try to rule out any other treatable problem such as a slipped disk. Then we offer a variety of suggestions. We may recommend they rely on a brace, a wheelchair or a respirator for part of each day to allow their muscles to rest."

According to Herring, a group of polio survivors in San Antonio meets to share information including the latest findings on polio's delayed effects. Interested persons may contact the group through Herring's office, 691-7201.

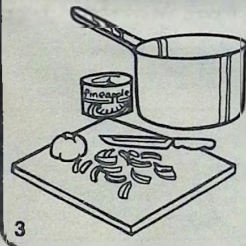

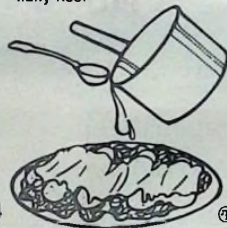

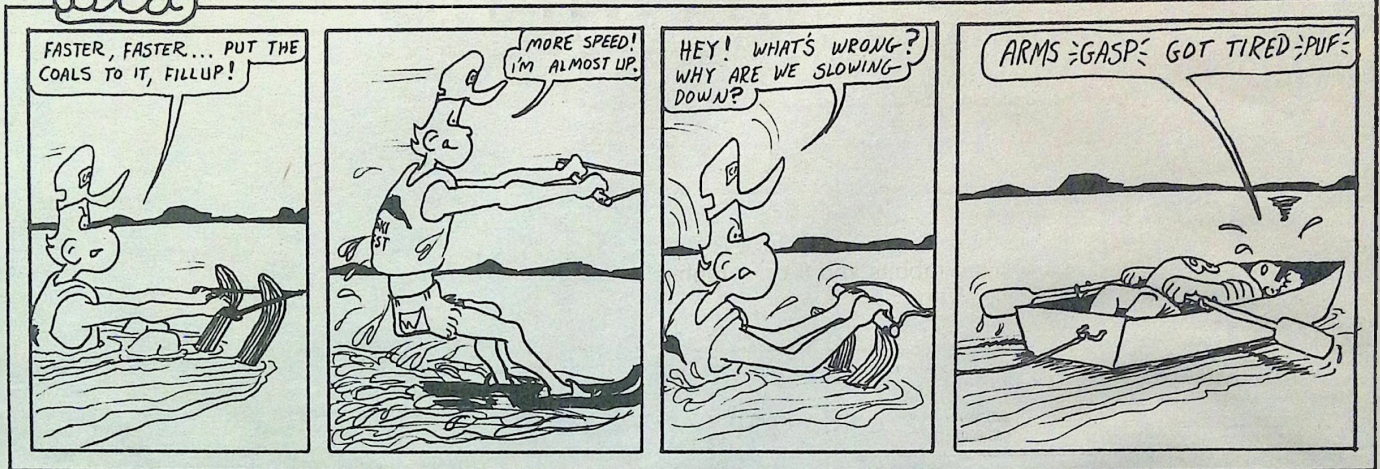

## Antique Jewelry Exhibit Opens At Art Museum

The San Antonio Museum of Art has been selected as one of ten art museums in the United States to host "Objects of Adornment: Five Thousand Years of Jewelry from the Walters Art Gallery, Baltimore," July 14 — September 15.

This exhibition includes more than two hundred of the Walters Art Gallery's finest pieces of jewelry from the renowned historical collection, which is one of the largest and most comprehensive

jewelry collections in the world. It was assembled by Henry Walters, a railroad magnate and an avid collector. Between 1893 and 1931, he purchased hundreds of examples of historical jewelry from around the world.

The objects in the traveling show range from simple stone amulets of the Ancient Near East to Lalique and Tiffany's dramatic 20th century creations. The exhibition includes many of the Walters Art Gallery's

masterpieces, such as a magnificent bracelet from the Olbia Treasure, the great Esterhazy Marriage Collar, the Tiffany Sapphire Iris and Rene Lalique's Tiger Necklace. Tiffany's "Iris Corsage" brooch is comprised of 120 sapphires.

Works from Egyptian, Etruscan, Greek, Roman, Byzantine and Medieval periods also are included, as well as pieces from the Renaissance through the early 20th century. The exhibition will be augmented by a selection of pieces on loan from local private collectors. The American Federation of Arts,

co-organizer of the exhibit, has produced a soft-bound catalogue that includes color photographs and a glossary of jewelry terms.

The San Antonio Museum of Art is located at 200 W. Jones Avenue. The museum is open Tuesday through Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m., and Sunday, 12 noon to 6 p.m. with a late night opening on Thursdays until 9 p.m. Admission is \$3 for adults, \$1.50 for senior citizens, students and military personnel, \$1 for children ages 6 to 12 years and free for children 5 years and under.

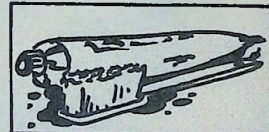

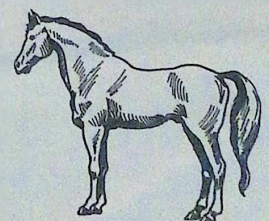

spokesman for Owens-Corning Fiberglas Corp. "An insulated duct system can add value to a home," Macy says. "Energy savings and a quieter living environment are benefits to keep in mind, not only when you're buying a home, but also when it comes time to attract a buyer for your home."

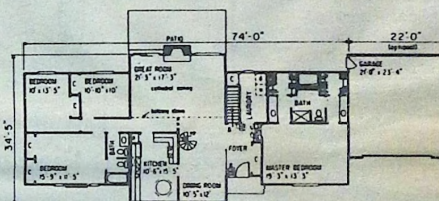
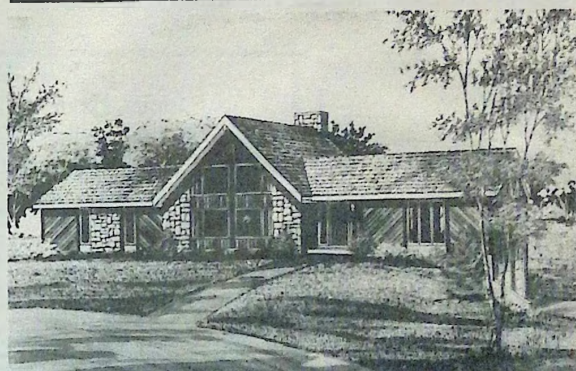

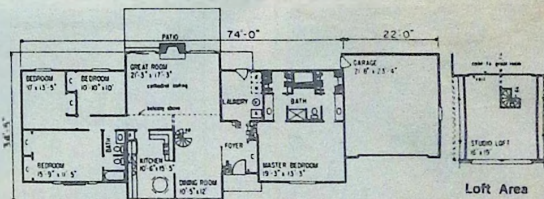

## TIPS FOR HOMEOWNERS

### OHI THAT MOVE

If you are preparing your home for the "For Sale" sign, paying attention to the small things can make your castle more desirable for a prospective buyer, and help you get what you're asking. Here are some tips:

- If you are undertaking interior painting, choose a neutral color to blend with any buyer's furnishing. First remove all picture hooks, nails and screws and fill in the holes with spackle. Patch the gouge made by grampa's rocker with wood putty or crack filler. Sand and prime all patches before painting. When you finish painting, pour any leftover paint in a screw-top jar, label for kind, color and method of cleanup. Your buyer will bless you.

- Did some paint spatters go unnoticed on your painted or urethaned floor or woodwork until too hard to wipe up? Moisten a lint-free rag with commercial deglosser, rub lightly and watch the spot dissolve. Then avoid for a few hours until the undersurface reharden. Touch up with paste wax if necessary. This works even on old spots,

provided the undersurface is older still. With other finishes, check a hidden corner first.

- Sometimes a new paint job isn't necessary. A good scrubbing with heavy duty cleaner can perform miracles. Those containing trisodium phosphate, such as Savogran's Tsp, are good for clean-

ing greasy grime and soot from walls, woodwork and floors. They can even remove cigarette smoke stains.

Mixing a trisodium phosphate cleaner with liquid laundry bleach

(directions are given on the box) produces a very effective solution for removing mildew and mildew stains from both interior and exterior surfaces. A small amount of the mixture stored in a glass jar will allow for quick removal of new spots encouraged by summer humidity. Always wear protective rubber gloves when working with bleach—and turn up the cuffs a few inches to keep the solution from running down wrists and arms.

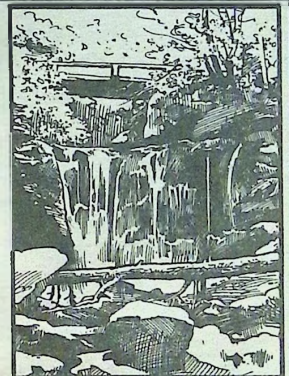

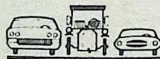

Some apparently well-meaning people have suggested America "save" money at the expense of her own veterans. The Grace Commission, for instance, said funds for Veterans Administration hospitals should be deleted from the budget. The Congressional Budget Office suggested hospitals run by the VA be dismantled by the end of the decade. The budget proposed by the president for the Veterans Administration for the coming year is \$26.7 billion. 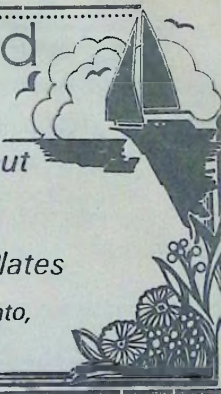
