

Hearing Set On Corridor Route Here

The Texas Highway Department has announced a public hearing on Tuesday, May 27, at 2 p.m. to discuss the Corridor Route—as it is termed—"for the improvement of State Highway 16 between the Scenic Loop Road, North of Helotes, and the Medina County Line."

The meeting will be held at the District Headquarters, corner of I. H. 410 and Callaghan Road. The announcement said that the proposed improvement will eventually provide a four-lane divided highway. The initial work will consist of a two-lane highway parallel and adjacent to the "existing right of way."

Maps will be shown and may be copied, the report said. Relocation problems and assistance will also be discussed, as will tentative schedules of right of way acquisition and construction.

Interested persons are invited, the announcement said further. Written statements and exhibits must be submitted to the District Office by 10 days after the hearing.

Suspect Arrested

Following several separate complaints from women in North Bexar County—including some in the Helotes area—a 27-year-old man was arrested at IH 10 and Loop 1604 April 16 as a suspected exhibitionist.

The man's car—said to be a small foreign model—was described by several witnesses and his license number taken. The suspect was identified as a medical doctor on duty at a local hospital, married, and resident in North San Antonio. He has subsequently been released on bond.

Little League Park To Open April 26

Opening day ceremonies for the Greater Helotes Little League have been set for Saturday, April 26, at 11:30 a.m. at their new ballpark, the Gerlach Memorial Field, with Edwin L. Faust as master of ceremonies. Ball games between the major teams in the league begin at 1 p.m.

Ernest Barrera, president of the League, said, "I want to thank everyone who has contributed time and material, making it possible to have this up-to-date ball park for our community. Come out Saturday, bring the family, have lunch, and see what many dedicated people have done."

The new concession stand will be open. Hot dogs, barbecue buns, soda water, ice cream, candy, snow cones, and other foods will be sold.

It is requested that all boys—and there are about 140—in the minor and major league teams report to the ball park in uniform for picture taking at 12 noon. Color pictures will be taken and 5x7 copies may be purchased for \$1.50.

The ball park—honoring the late Mr. and Mrs. Otto Gerlach—is located three miles north of FM 1604 on Babcock Road.

Prejean Joins Commissioners

At the first regular Council meeting last week following the April 5 elections the three commissioners of the City of Grey Forest making the race were sworn into office by Mayor Jack Nottingham, and proceeded to handle business.

Incumbents Dot Parrott and Alta McCoy along with Gary Prejean who ran for the first time were unopposed in an election that saw only some 40 Grey

Forest voters turn out. There were two write-in candidates receiving votes—H. E. Brown and Laura Stubblefield, although neither had campaigned. The five commissioners approved the budget for the Gray Forest Utilities after reserving the right to amend it. Last February was the date announced for the official acceptance of the gas lines from the contractors, Mayor Nottingham said.

It's Cornyval time in Helotes, True West capital of Bexar County.

The 4th annual Spring Festival at Helotes (which means "green corn" in Spanish) will be held May 1-4.

The program has grown this year to include two free dances, a three-mile parade, a coronation, horse show, bicycle race, two-day art show, a tour of the future stagecoach museum, a carnival, and a mile of food and games booths.

President of the Festival Association and chairman of this year's celebration is Edwin L. Faust of Grey Forest.

The opening event—a contest to select Miss Helotes 1969—will be held Thursday, May 1, at 7:30 p.m. in the Helotes Park Party House. Admission will be free. The reigning Miss Helotes, Mary Jane Logan, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Logan, San Geronimo, will crown her successor among a dozen high school girl contestants. Mrs. H. E. Brown, president of the Women's Club here, is chairman of the Queen's contest. David Rodgers will be featured entertainer Thursday.

Street Dance

Mrs. Fred Anderson, Helotes Park Estates, is chairman of street dance to be held Friday night beginning at 8:30 p.m. in Helotes Park Plaza. Dale Keith and his Starlight Ramblers will play. Admission is free.

Saturday Parade

Saturday and Sunday will be the biggest days. Kicking off Saturday will be a Western parade stretching three miles from Toeppervewin's corner at Bandera Highway and Leslie Road to downtown Helotes. Floats from neighboring cities and towns and from civic and commercial organizations will be accepted without an admission charge. The parade will end at Scenic Loop Road. Parade chairman is Larry Bergstrom, Helotes Ranch Acres. Those wishing to enter a float or band may call him at MY 5-3263.

Art Show

An all-day outdoor art show both Saturday and Sunday will be sponsored by the 140-member Helotes Art Guild with Mrs. Lillian Hurlbut as show chairman. Artists and craftsmen from all over Texas and from other states have applied for space to display their works. Jim Tow of Asheville, N.C., nationally recognized for gold wire wrapping, will be a guest artist.

Artists wishing to exhibit along the Cornyval route may contact Mrs. Charles Laenger, MY 5-3207. Entrance fee for each artist or craftsman is \$3. The fee for food and games booth is \$5. All booths will be decorated in a festive mood, stressing fresh corn. Corn-

Lion's Name Slate Again


Helotes Lions Club, Inc., held their annual meeting Tuesday, April 22, for election and installation of officers for the coming year.

The Bugle Note of Duty

1890-1969

Born in Texas—but with the accent that carried Kansas directly to the world all his life—Dwight David Eisenhower was always influenced by his native State and also our own Hill Country. Details of his and Mamie's courtship, of his days as a St. Mary's University coach, of his military career have been retold in the moments of tribute following his death in March.

His days as 34th President were recalled. But more probably millions thought private thoughts of his great leadership as commander of the Allied troops. He it was who had absorbed his lessons well in the years before World War II and who exuded the courage required to make a citizen army ready to overcome tyranny. Leon Springs residents can still tell of the days when Ike was a good companion. In the long hot summer of 1941, he was the one who taught draftees how to fight in Louisiana swamp maneuvers—sometimes with only sticks to represent guns.

In 1916, while on duty at Fort Sam Houston and the Leon Springs outposts he may have come upon these prophetic words of Francis Cummins Lockwood published about that time:

"You do not know just what service you will be called upon to render a quarter of a century from now. It may be distinguished. But, be the demand that the State is to make upon you in the future what it may, the service that you owe just now . . . is that of organizing within the round of that self that you may call yours such physical stamina, such intellectual vigor, such seasoned moral fibre, such ideals of purity, justice, and honor, and such a disciplined and fearless will as shall prepare you to meet the emergency when the bugle note of duty sounds—no matter how remote the duty, no matter where the battle-line may be drawn, no matter what the assignment may be. Your duty now is to be master of yourself that you may later be the master of destiny—the champion of mankind in its hour of need." And that is very much as Dwight David Eisenhower will be remembered.

This Is True

In an April 16 "BEXAR FACTS" column in the LIGHT, Morris Willson had this to say, and we quote:

A vote for local color: At Southwest Research Institute Jack Harmon has had a letter from Phil Hamburger, the feature writer who did a piece some years back on San Antonio for the New Yorker magazine . . . having learned of the proposed rerouting of the highway that would bypass the Floore Country Store in Helotes.

Hamburger wrote in his note to Harmon, "They just can't do that to the country store."

CASTROVILLE'S HISTORICAL HERITAGE. Castroville: Castro Garden Club. Produced by a committee for distribution with the annual historical pilgrimage, the booklet gives a readable short history of Castroville, and then gives separate histories of 29 of the historic homes. There are 12 photos, a street map, and a list of owners of homes with Castroville Pioneer Home markers.

It is a pleasure for those who make the pilgrimage—a heart-warming memento for all who know and love Castroville, and a powerful lure for those who haven't been there lately.


Practice Set For April 28

It All Comes Naturally To Present "Miss Helotes"

When she presides over the Coronation ceremonies May 1 at which her successor will be chosen, Miss Helotes 1968—Mary Jane Logan—will have rounded out a year of activities in her role as a representative of Helotes which required tact, travel, and a true pioneering spirit.

On June 24, for instance, Helotes had its own HemisFair Day at the San Antonio World's Fair. It fell to Miss Helotes to accept the official welcome from the bigwigs of the HemisFair, and to be introduced to the 30,000 guests of the day along with members of her court.

On Washington's Birthday, Feb.

22 of this year, she rode in an open convertible in the giant parade in Laredo to publicize the Spring Festival here. This was the first time the festival has taken part elsewhere.

She was introduced recently at the Club Paricutin formal, also. And dressed as an Indian maid, she was chosen to ride the first float entered by the Helotes Spring Festival Assn. in the San Antonio Battle of Flowers Fiesta parade Friday, April 25.

Pioneering should come easy to this 16-year-old Marshall High School girl, however. She is direct descendant of Texas pioneers, many of whom were first settlers in Helotes. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Logan who ranch in San Geronimo. Her paternal grandparents were both very well-known early residents here. Her grandfather, the late David Logan, came from Edinburgh, Scotland, and married Mary Jane's grandmother who was of a local pioneer ranch family. Mrs. David Logan, who lives also at San Geronimo now, was Miss Mary Anne Madla of Helotes before her marriage. Mary Jane's great grandparents included the late Frank Madla, Sr. an early rancher of Helotes and his wife, the former Miss Francisca Menchaca, also from one of the first families known to have settled here. The Menchaca homeplace still stands and the ranch was cut to form in part Scenic Loop Playground—now Grey Forest.

Her maternal grandparents are

Mr. and Mrs. Bernabe G. Gutierrez, ranchers also in Zapata County. She is a direct descendant of Jose Bernardo Maximiliano Gutierrez De Lara, who was the first governor of Mexican Texas—which means during the time after Spain gave up Mexico and before Texas became independent, a revolutionary age.

Reigning as the second Miss Helotes, Mary Jane succeeded Kay Spencer, the first Miss Teen Helotes chosen at the second Festival in 1967. Mary Jane's court included Robin Wynn, first alternate, and Jamina DuBose, second alternate, who also took part at the HemisFair.



Summer School Sets Registration June 2

Registration for Northside's fully accredited secondary school begins at 7 a.m. June 2 and continues until 4 p.m. Classes begin June 3 and end July 30.

Air-conditioned Oliver Wendell Holmes High School, 6500 Ingram Road, will be the host school. John Marshall students will also attend Holmes for this program.

Classes will be offered for 7th through 12th grade students and will include courses in math, science, social studies, language arts, and commercial areas. In addition, students may select from reading, Spanish I, art health and mechanical drawing. Students who are 15 years old before June 2 may enroll in Drivers Education courses.

Tuition for one semester's work is \$30 and for two semester's work is \$40. Graduating seniors—those who will finish this August—may enroll in a third semester's work for an additional \$15, a total of \$55. Driver's education tuition is \$37.

The summer school program

provides students with an opportunity to make up work in order to graduate on schedule. Students may take courses to gain knowledge in subjects that have not been easy for them or to enrich knowledge where they are superior. However, the school authorities report that summer school is not designed to enable students to lighten their class loads during the long term or to graduate from high school in less than four years. A student may sign up for a course he cannot take during the regular term.
