Echo To Suspend Publication

After twenty-seven years, the Helotes Echo is going to cease publication after this issue.

The first edition was published on Sept. 1, 1961. On the front page was a picture of the Scenic Loop Playground swimming pool — then full of water — and the lead stories were about the re-opening of the Northside District schools and the Kendall County Fair in Boerne.

The Echo has been the oldest business in Helotes under the same management. It was established by C. O. and Lucy Brown of Grey Forest.

The Marnoch mansion, a 150year-old former ranch home which has been the office of the Echo for the last twenty years, will be sold.

C. O. will stay in the area, however, in the house in Grey Forest where he and Lucy have lived for more than thirty years.

He thanks all the readers and advertisers who have supported the paper through the years.

He is not able to continue the paper not only because of the current depressed economy affecting the region, but mostly because he cannot continue it without the companionship of his wife, Lucy, the editor of the Echo for twenty-seven years, who died of a heart attack last month.

The Echo office will continue to be open until the affairs of the paper have been wound up.

Three Doctorate Programs Get Okay

The University of Texas System Board of Regents have approved the establishment of a Doctor of Philosophy (PH.D) degree program in biology at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

The degree program will require approval of the Texas Higher Educational Coordinating Board and will be implemented as soon as that approval is obtained. The doctoral program will be administered by the UTSA Division of Life Sciences within the College of Sciences and Engineering in conjunction with the Division of Life Sciences Committee on Graduate Studies.

In addition, the University of Texas System Board of Regents approved the initiation of a private fund campaign to support the development of doctoral degree programs. in science and engineering at The University of Texas at San Antonio.

The campaign will be conducted under the leadership of a consortium of San Antonio organizations including the Greater San Antonio Chamber of Commerce, the San Antonio Economic Development Foundation, and the Texas Research and Technology Foundation.

The consortium, which plans to meet a \$10 million campaign goal by the year 2000, will raise funds to provide start-up operational costs for the three doctoral programs in biology, computer science and engineering that are projected for implementation; to assist with financing new building construction and equipment; and to create an endowed academic chair for each of the proposed doctoral programs.

Finally, the Board of Regents responded favorably to the implementation of a cooperatively ad-

State Board Studies Fine For D&B

The fight the rock quarry proposed by Vulcan Materials is still alive and hot.

It got mixed up in the hearing Tuesday night, Dec. 13, conducted by three representatives of the Texas Air Control Board on an application by D&B Materials, also on FM-1560, for a permit for a new asphalt plant.

Approximately two hundred area resident attended — unanimously opposed to D&B's asphalt plant and to the proposed Vulcan quarry.

"We don't permit rock quarries—only rock-crushing plants," Priscilla Falzone, attorney of the Air Control Board, told the group. "That is the way the law is written. Rock quarries do not have to have a permit. We monitor operation of rock crushing plants, and levy administrative fines for non-compliance with our regulations. A plant owner also can have a court trial."

The board's headquarters in Austin now is reviewing three fines levied against D&B. One is for moving the new asphalt plant into place without a permit and two for operating the plant on two separate occasions after D&B had been told not to operate it.

Henry Zumwalt, one of the owners of D&B Materials, said he thought a permit to move the plant onto the site was not necessary because it had replaced an older plant on the same site. He said he had operated the new plant to test it and repair a computer that controls its operation.

State Representative Jeff Wentworth said he requested the hearing because of numerous complaints by residents about noise and dirt in D&B's operations. He said he will introduce in the State Legislature in January legislation to provide more protection against quarries in built-up residential areas.

Meanwhile, Mrs. Shirley Cotton, chairman of the Helotes Environment and Land Preservation group (HELP), announced that Vulcan Materials has made two requests to



ministered Ph.D. program in Educational Administration between The University of Texas at Austin and The University of Texas at San Antonio. The program will be offered under the authority of UT Austin with portions of the program taught at UTSA.

This doctoral program, the first to be offered in San Antonio at UTSA, is geared toward middle management educators who plan to pursue careers as administrators in public schools and educational agencies, or hold professorships at universities.

According to plan, the program will be divided into three developmental phases. During the first phase, students will enroll primarily in UT Austin courses. However, the first two courses in the degree program will be offered at UTSA this coming Spring semester, one to be taught by UTSA faculty and one to be taught by UT Austin faculty. In the second phase, UTSA will offer other doctoral level courses and will assume greater responsibility for supervising dissertations. The third phase will allow UTSA to offer the full doctoral program independently, subject to UT Board of Regents and Coordinating Board



the City of Helotes, one for a permit to build a road in their property to the quarry site, and the second for a rezoning of 500 feet of their property along FM-1560 from residential to commercial zoning.

Mrs. Cotton also announced that Phil Hardberger has agreed to represent HELP in legal actions against Vulcan. Another attorney, Phil Haag of Austin, also has been retained and will work with state agencies in Austin in the fight.

She said she had hoped the hearing on D&B's application would help set guidelines on protection of Helotes' environment in general.

Attorney Falzone said the Texas

Air Control Board has not received a request from Vulcan Materials for a permit of any kind.

The board recently shut down a Vulcan rock crushing plant on Huebner Road in San Antonio because Vulcan moved the rock crusher to the site (from Mountain Home) without a permit, and then tried to operate it after Vulcan had been cited by the board.

The consensus of the people who attended the hearing in the Community Activity Center of Our Lady of Guadalupe Church was that neither D&B nor Vulcan would be good neighbors as they have said they would be.



About Investments

It's important to know your investment objectives and to communicate those objectives to your financial planner. Define your minimum desired rate of return and your maximum risk tolerance. Would you rather miss out on a bull market or lose significantly in a bear market? By listing your objectives, you can decide on a mutual fund that is most appropriate for you and avoid misunderstandings down the road.

How can an investor reduce risk in today's volatile market conditions? Most financial planners will tell you that no single investment will protect your finances from all risks. However, you can reduce the inherent risk of investing through diversification - spreading risk over a variety of securities.

In designing a diversified portfolio, you try to balance both risk and return opportunity. Generally, the more risk you take, the higher your potential return. Diversification does not eliminate risk, but it can substantially help reduce the volatility of your portfolio while still providing attractive returns over the long run.

Since the underlying investment principle for mutual funds is diversification, investing in a single mutual fund is one of the simplest ways to achieve diversification.

Investing in more than one fund can further increase diversification.

Mutual funds are just one recommendation that your financial planner might make in analyzing your entire financial situation. Mutual funds can be balanced with life insurance and annuity products, face-amount certificates, income protection products and limited partnerships to achieve greater diversification.

Are there any investment strategies that provide protection from erratic market swings? Through a technique called dollar-cost averaging, you can use the ups and downs of the market to your advantage. With this strategy, you invest the same amount of money in a specific mutual fund or other fluctuating investment at regular intervals over an extended period of

Regular investments of a fixed amount of money can reduce the average cost of buying shares. Over time, the average cost of your shares should be lower than the average price of the shares you have purchased, although there is no guarantee. Usually investors incur a loss if they stop investing early or sell shares during a market decline. The success of dollar-cost averaging depends on investing regularly over a long period, regardless of price levels.

What are the mutual fund's limitations? A mutual fund manager will try to take advantage of changes in the economy to improve the fund's performance and reduce volatility. You must remember, however, that no one can perfectly predict the market. In addition, each mutual fund has policies that restrict the types of securities in which it invests in order to meet the goals of each fund. That's why a balanced portfolio made up of a number of different investments is important.

Your financial planner can help you develop a balanced portfolio to help meet your financial goals that may include mutual funds.

Edwards Candidate Hits 'Overdraft'

Speaking at the monthly meeting of the Associated General Contractors Wednesday, Edwards Underground Water District director candidate Carl Norris outlined the two approaches to water supply management that have developed, and explained why his position is more visionary.

"I believe withdrawal from the aquifer on a long-term basis must be balanced with its annual average recharge. The other group believes in an 'overdraft' method of aquifer management in which more water is withdrawn annually than is replaced with recharge. This method places the community at an unreasonable risk, and I am opposed to such thinking.

The solution, Norris said, lies in the "safe yield" method of aquifer management combining a variety of mechanisms. These include prudent and fair pumpage rules, protection of water quality, conservation, reuse and development of supplemental surface supplies.



Heat Pumps: What They Offer the Homeowner

Heat pumps operate like regular air conditioners during warm weath-

er. However, it's the heating cycle that accounts for their significant savings. Unlike a furnace that converts fossil fuel or electricity into heat, the heat pump collects heat that already exists in the outdoor air. This means that the heat pump can supply from 1.5 to 2.5 times more

heat than the energy it uses. On electric heating bills, heat pumps can mean savings of 30 to 60 percent because they use 30 to 60 percent less energy to supply the same heat as an electric furnace.

When buying a new heating and cooling system, or replacing an old one, consumers should consider how a heat pump works, location, initial cost, operating cost savings, payback, service, and maintenance.

Heat pumps are the most cost-

effective in temperatures above freezing. For colder days, supplemental heat may be necessary, either by a booster electrical resistance heater installed with the heat pump, or by fossil fuel heating.



Let Tomatoes Ripen

It's easier than most people realize to have fresh tomatoes anytime of the year. The key is bringing tomatoes home from the supermarket, setting them out on a shelf or countertop, and allowing them to finish ripening.



Let tomatoes ripen for a few days at room temperature

Tomatoes which come from Florida, this time of year, are picked at the hard, mature green state so they can withstand shipping. When they arrive at the supermarket, they're still hard, not very flavorful and usually pale pink. Unfortunately, they'll stay that way if you refrigerate them. Give them a few days at room temperature, however, and they'll soften, develop a red color and an excellent flavor.

"Fresh tomatoes are best when treated like green bananas," says Wayne Hawkins, Executive Vice President of the Florida Tomato Exchange. "And they're at peak flavor when served cool, not cold... like you'd serve a fine wine.

House Burns On Babcock Bald Eagles

Return

The bald eagles have returned to Lake Buchanan reports O.C. Garza, manager of the Vanishing Texas River Cruise. "We spotted our first mature eagle on October 17 and have been seeing eagles on every cruise for the past week," Garza said.

The eagles on Lake Buchanan comprise the densest population of birds in the state. During last year's National Wildlife Federation eagle count — coordinated by the Highland Lakes Birding Society, Buchanan Bass Busters, Texas Parks and Wildlife and the Vanishing Texas River Cruise — 35 eagles were counted on the lake.

Catrina Martin, wildlife biologist for Texas Parks and Wildlife, estimates that 1,000 eagles visit Texas each winter. She asks that anyone who spots an eagle with colored wing tag or leg tag call her office at 512/389-4979 to report the sighting.

Demand to see the eagles is very high. "We have bald eagles on the lake from November through March," Garza said.
