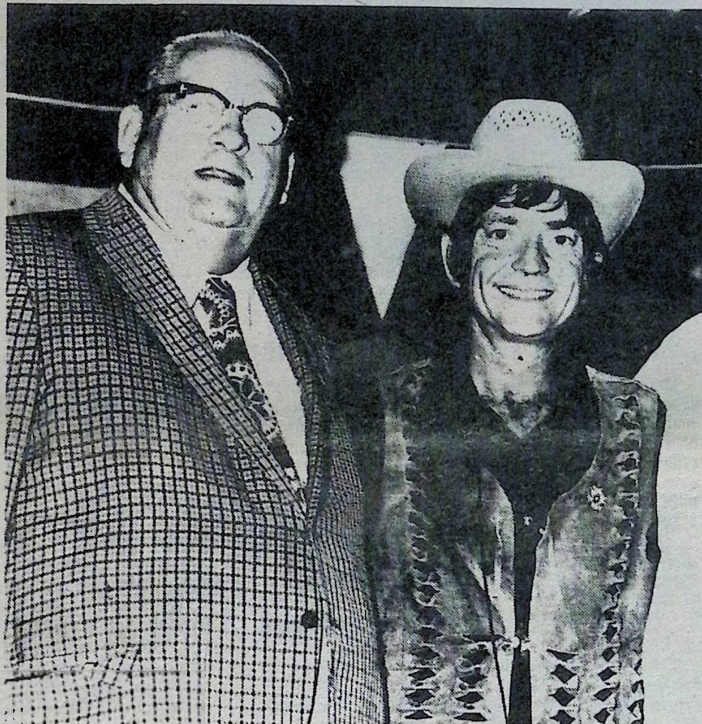

Helotes State Bank Gets City Accounts

The Helotes City Council voted Thursday night to designate Helotes State Bank as the official city bank, approved the closing of Bandera Road through Downtown Helotes for the 1984 Cornyal of the Helotes Festival Association, appointed Jackie Bryant of Donkey Flat Road to the City Board of Adjustment, held payment of the bill for this year's EMS services until some of terms of the contract have been renegotiated, and authorized the City Attorney to send Rogers-UA Cablevision Systems a bill for the penalty owed by the Cablevision Systems for not completing installation of cablevision lines in the city by the contract date.

The cablevision company

was supposed to have been ready to provide service to Helotes residents by Aug. 17. On Oct. 4 the company said the installation was completed. But some Helotes residents have complained that they still cannot get the service. The penalty clause in the contract with the city provided for the payment of \$100 a day beyond Aug. 17 if the service was not ready. The letter to demand payment was requested by Mayor Frank Thompson.

The Council also discussed at length the adoption of a building code, which involved also the adoption of plumbing and electrical codes. Action was deferred until the Council can study the prospective codes.

Councilman Pat Wooten reported that the police car to be bought from Texas Department of Public Safety will be available about the end of March.

The Council is operating with only four members since Verna Thompson was given a leave of absence last month to attend a three-month U.S. Air Force school in Dayton, Ohio.

USAA Has New Bank

USAA officially opened its new Federal Savings Bank on the USAA grounds on IH-10 just south of Huebner Rd., Friday morning, Jan. 20. USAA Chairman Robert McDermott presented the bank charter and introduced the new bank president, Larry Lanie.

Meanwhile, plans for a "Galleria-type" mall also on the USAA grounds are being held up by a denial by San Antonio's Historic Review Board for a permit to demolish the Barton-Farnsworth home on the site.

The home was formerly owned by the Owen Farnsworth family, which operated the Original Mexican Restaurant in San Antonio. The original part of the house was built by the Rollin Barton family in 1876.

The new mall would be built on a 52-acre site on the USAA grounds.

Congressman Abraham (Chick) Kazen, whose 23rd Congressional District includes Helotes, announced Tuesday—his birthday—for re-election. The announcement was made at a breakfast at Fresh Horizons restaurant hosted by the four co-chairmen of his re-election steering committee, Cliff Norton, Emilio Nicolas, Frank Sepulveda and H. B. Zachry. Kazen is a Democrat.

State Representative K. T. Patrick, whose legislative district includes Helotes, announced on Jan. 10 for re-election for his third term in office. He is the first Republican to be elected as a state representative from District 123.

Doretta Mikel Dies In Car Crash At 31

Funeral services were held Friday, Jan. 13, at Mission Park Funeral Chapels North for Mrs. Doretta Mikel of Grey Forest. Mrs. Mikel, 31, was killed when her car and a truck collided at the intersection of Bandera and Eckhart Roads on Tuesday morning, Jan. 10, about 10 a.m.

Mrs. Mikel was married to Robert (Bobbie) Mikel of Pipe Creek. By coincidence he came upon the accident shortly after it happened and discovered that his wife had been a victim of it.

Mrs. Clela Mikel, mother of Bobbie Mikel, said her daughter-in-law had gone to Coke Stevenson Middle School early in the morning to register one of her two sons in the school. Then she went on to Leon Valley to do some grocery shopping. On her way back to Grey Forest the accident happened.

She was driving Mrs. Clela Mikel's car, which turned over several times after the collision.

Doretta Mikel won the San Antonio Express-News Look-a-Like Contest last year for her resemblance to Crystal Gayle and had appeared in one television commercial. She hoped to combine a

career of modeling with that of being a mother. She also was well-known as a local artist.

Survivors include her husband: two sons, Robby and Christopher; her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Sydney Williams of San Antonio; a sister, Nona Mallock of Arlington; two brothers, Bobby Glenn Meadows and Ronnie Williams of San Antonio; her grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. J. J. Andrews of Waco; and several nieces and nephews.

Burial was in Mission Burial Park North.

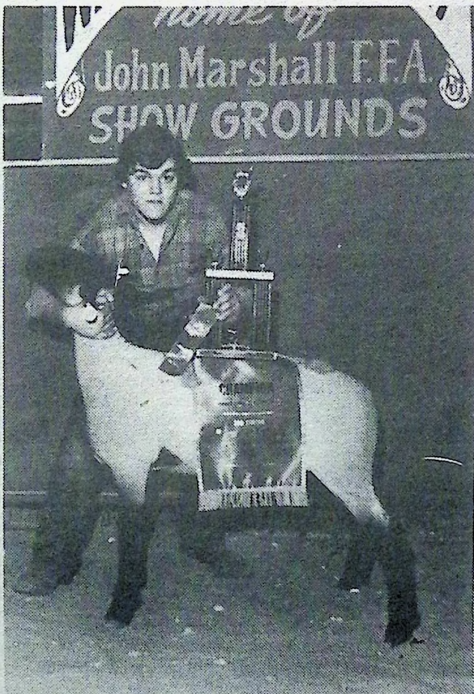

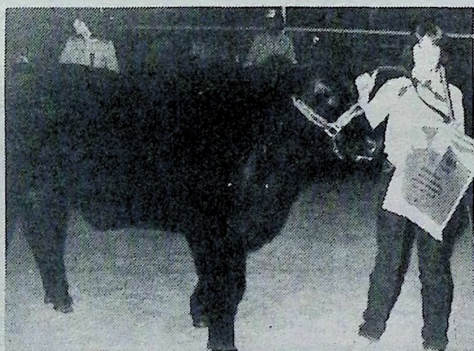

Melt-In-Your-Mouth Doughnuts Ready To Eat In Minutes

SPEEDY ORANGE GLAZED DOUGHNUTS

GLAZE

- 1 1/3 cups sifted powdered sugar
- 2 tablespoons orange juice
- 2 teaspoons grated orange peel

DOUGHNUTS

- 7.5-oz. can Pillsbury Refrigerated Buttermilk or Country Biscuits
- Shortening or oil for frying

Heat shortening to 375°F. In small bowl, combine sugar, orange juice and peel; set aside. Separate dough into 10 biscuits. Using thimble or small round cookie cutter, cut hole in center of each biscuit. Fry biscuits and holes in hot shortening (375°F.) until golden brown, about 1 1/2 to 2 minutes. Drain. While hot, dip both sides of doughnut into glaze. Serve warm. 10 doughnuts.

Polar Bear Cub

Born At Zoo

A male polar bear born at San Antonio Zoo on Dec. 5 is being reared in the Herff Animal Nursery in the Children's Zoo, where it can be viewed by zoo visitors. Feeding times during public hours are 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. At other times the youngster is visible in a see-through incubator at the viewing window of the nursery.

There is no previous record of a successful rearing of a polar bear at San Antonio Zoo. Polar bears are even more difficult to hand-rear than other bears because their dietary needs are more specialized. Experience has shown that they require a formula higher in fat and calories than other bears, for one thing.

The cub, named Nicholas in honor of the holiday season, weighed 1 pound, 4 ounces at birth and has gained nearly a pound since then. He will continue to gain about a pound a week if all goes well and, if he reaches his father's size, will eventually weigh 1,000 pounds. His father, Mr. Pooh, was wild-caught in Canada and had been in San Antonio since 1978. His mother is named Houston because she was received from Busch Gardens in Houston in 1973. She was born in Duluth Zoo in 1970.

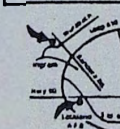

UPDATE ON THE COMMON COLD

We've all had the common cold (known medically as acute coryza) with throat discomfort, sneezing, profuse clear nasal discharge, muscular soreness, low-grade fever, hoarseness, cough, and a burning discomfort in the chest. It's a five-to-seven day misery, although the hacking cough may linger as long as two weeks. You'll desperately want a cure. Sorry about that. A cold is self-limiting and treatment is directed at making the patient more comfortable until it runs its course.

Antibiotics do absolutely no good in an uncomplicated cold. I've had to deny hundreds of patients a penicillin shot when they came in with the misguided belief that it would hasten their recovery. There's not a single oral or injectable antibiotic that will affect the course of the common cold one whit.

There are some things that you can do to make your illness more bearable:

Taking aspirin or acetaminophen will ease muscle ache, headache, and the sore throat. A good trick is to alternate aspirin with acetaminophen (Datril, Tylenol) on a two-hour schedule. You are then getting something for both aches and fever every two hours without overdosing on either. Cautions about aspirin: It is contraindicated for patients with bleeding disorders, peptic ulcer, pregnancy, or aspirin sensitivity.

Over-the-counter (OTC) decongestants are useful for temporary reduction of nasal congestion, but you should use restraint and follow the directions on the package exactly. Used only every eight to twelve hours, nose drops or nasal sprays (Afrin, Neo-Synephrine) offer quick relief, but can actually cause continued blockage of the nose if used too often or too long. There's a pediatric strength for use under age six.

Oral OTC decongestants include Sudafed, Actifed, Drixoral, and others. Again, caution! Read the package directions and follow them exactly! Antihistamines dry respiratory secretions and thus may actually worsen the cough and bronchial irritation. Most of the combination anticold preparations contain an antihistamine, so you'll probably be better off without one. Cough preparations containing small amounts of codeine or dextromethorphan will provide some relief. Your pharmacist will advise you.

Popular home remedies for the common cold may make the patient feel better even if they don't alter the course of the infection. Bed rest and lots of liquids might do some good, but mustard plasters and vapor-rub preparations won't. In passing, acupuncture is totally ineffective, and vitamin C hasn't withstood scientific investigation as a cold remedy or preventive.

Complications of the common cold are another matter. Middle ear and sinus infections are the most frequent, especially in infants and children. Older patients are at greater risk for bronchitis and pneumonia, particularly those with pre-existing pulmonary disease such as asthma or emphysema. All patients with rheumatic or other cardiac disease are at greater risk for complications. If these conditions are present, consult your physician and see if antibiotics are indicated.

What causes a common cold? Viruses, especially rhinovirus, coronavirus, and adenovirus. Children get colds more often because they haven't had an opportunity to develop resistance. Some pre-schoolers have as many as ten or twelve colds a year, while a typical adult will have only two or three. Stress, diet, and exercise don't seem to affect the chances of getting a cold. Chilling or exposure to cold appears, under controlled scientific circumstances, to have little to do with the common cold. Sure, there's an increase in colds in raw, rainy weather, but it's believed that it's because this tends to congregate people indoors and favor the spread by droplets in sneezing or coughing.

There is no effective means of preventing the common cold. However, certain things may aid in limiting its spread:

- Get sufficient rest.
- Wash hands frequently, and keep them away from eyes and nose.
- Avoid contact with those who have a cold.
- Make careful disposal of tissues and handkerchiefs and, if possible, use separate dishes, utensils, and towels.
- Cover the mouth and nose when sneezing or coughing.

More than 40 vintners will offer their wines for San Antonians to sample at KLRN's fourth annual Wine-tasting on Friday, Jan. 27 from 7 to 10 p.m. The event, which benefits Public Broadcasting Service (PBS) station Channel 9, will be co-sponsored by San Antonio Savings Association (SASA) and held at their headquarters building, Loop 410 and San Pedro.

Guests are entitled to unlimited winetasting, and

representatives from California and Texas vineyards will be on hand to present their wines and provide information. Cheese, fruit and bread will be available to cleanse the palate between wines.

"We're proud that SASA could play such a big part in the winetasting," said SASA President W. W. "Bo" McAllister III. "We feel privileged to be able to host the event and help KLRN raise money so our community can

benefit from public television. It's a worthwhile cause that the private sector needs to come forward and support," he added.

The purpose of the report will be to measure the extent of violence/vandalism/crime within our schools in an effort to have an up-to-date analysis of the problem.

on Jan. 3, business office call volumes began to drop back to normal during the rest of the week.

Based on customer queries to service workers, Southwestern Bell provides these answers to the most commonly asked questions concerning the divestiture:

Q. Do I have to buy a phone?

A. No. If you were leasing a phone from Southwestern Bell, that phone is now owned by AT&T, but you may continue to lease it. You may also buy that phone from AT&T or buy another

phone from various vendors, including Southwestern Bell Corporation's new subsidiary, Southwestern Bell Telecom.

Q. Whom do I call for phone repairs?

Q. What about my long distance service?

A. Southwestern Bell will still handle short-haul long distance calling. Longer toll

calls will continue to be handled by AT&T, MCI, SPRINT and other long distance services of the customer's choice will handle long distance calls throughout the state.

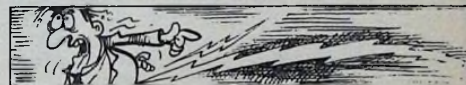

Marshall Students Aid Retarded Teens

Calling their project a "labor of love," John Marshall Marketing and Distributive Education students recently wound up three months learning about and working with mentally retarded clients at the San Antonio State School for the Mentally Retarded. Marshall students adopted a nine-member Boy Scout troop (sponsored by Unit 3 of the State School), befriended them and helped them create holiday crafts. The Marshall students benefitted greatly by acquiring an increased capacity for human compassion and understanding.

The MDE students include Jody Arnold, Matt Cho, Imelda Gallegos, Maria Garcia, Ayla Petterutti, Eddie Ruiz, Stacey Fulmer and Rita Chaffin. Al McCutcheon is the MDE Coordinator.

"We were a little apprehensive at first," says Chaffin, who served as student chairperson, "but then we realized that they are individuals with needs (although more specific) just

like you and I."

Another student, Maria Garcia, described the time working with and learning about mentally retarded children as an "eye-opening" experience. She says that her views of handicapped people changed dramatically and that she can better appreciate what she has (physically and mentally) after spending more than 100 hours with these children. She added that many people misunderstand the world of the mentally retarded, "but not me, not my classmates anymore."

Chaffin added that it took a lot of soul searching to understand the magnitude of the problems and obstacles that stand in the way for mentally retarded people, both economically and socially. She said that it was an "exhausting experience but it was time well spent."

The Marshall students, members of the Blue Chapter of MDE, undertook the project to fulfill requirements for one-quarter of their club diamond emblem

motto—civic consciousness. The other three are social intelligence, vocational understanding and leadership development.

MDE is a cooperative program in which high school students earn three credits by working half-days in retail businesses and attending school the other half. Students carry a regular academic load, stressed McCutcheon.

In outlining the project from inception to completion, Chaffin says that the idea was developed in October, 1983, after contacting the administrators of the State School. Students were given a tour of the facilities and personal contacts were made with the clients. Great efforts were made to establish a friendly and working rapport with the clients. A one-on-one working relationship was deemed the most beneficial. Several socialization visits were scheduled to allow clients and students to get acquainted and build trust.

Their main project was to

help them make a large Christmas tree out of construction paper and decorate it with fingerprints and magazine cut-outs. The Marshall students also were invited to attend a Special Open House hosted by the State School for parents of the clients. Marshall High School students used the occasion to present their Boy Scout Troop members with MHS caps.

Chairperson Chaffin adds,

"It truly was an emotional experience and it really it home with us because these children are our own age but their functioning level is that of a very young child. Becoming their friends changed all of us... for the better."

Plans are being made to continue this "wonderful relationship" with our new friends at the State School throughout the year, concludes Chaffin.

Foster Parents Needed

The Texas Department of Human Resources has announced that an estimated 25 per cent more foster parents are needed this year, in order to keep up with the anticipated increase in child abuse and neglect cases.

In the most severe of these cases, children will be temporarily removed from their homes and placed with agency-approved foster families, while their parents receive the counseling necessary to provide a safe environment for the child. The average stay of a foster child is 6 to 8 months before returning home, or going into some other permanent placement.

Foster parents can be married, with or without children, single, retired, military, and do not have to own a home. Medical expenses, financial reimbursement for the child's basic needs, and complete training is provided by TDHR.

Space Heater Use Requires Caution

With the arrival of cold weather, people with portable heaters perform the annual ritual of removing them from storage and setting them up.

Special care is needed in setting up and checking gas heaters because of the open flame and possibility of fire, says the Texas Medical Association.

Southern Union Gas

Company provided these safety tips for using gas space heaters:

—Check the air valve on the burner to make sure no lint or animal hair has accumulated there.

—Make sure the burner is not clogged. A clogged burner may produce carbon monoxide, a poisonous, odorless gas.

—When lighting the

heater, follow the manufacturer's instructions to the letter. And strike the match before turning on the gas.

—Keep flammable items like drapes and furniture away from the heater.

Additionally, for unvented heaters:

—Replace any radiants (the glowing parts) that are broken, chipped, or missing.

—Make sure there is

adequate ventilation by leaving windows open slightly to prevent possible carbon monoxide buildup.

—Have the heater checked by a licensed heating contractor, plumber, or the local gas company if you are not sure of its safety.

For vented heaters, make sure the vent is not obstructed by a bird nest or other object.

The Texas Medical Association also encourages parents to keep children away from a gas space heater and to instruct them not to touch the controls.

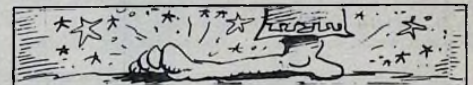

Edwards Wells Show Decline For Year

Water well levels in the Edwards Underground Water District at the end of December were relatively unchanged from the November readings but ended the year from one to 16 feet below the same month a year ago.

In San Antonio the index well was down 3.6 feet from

the November figure and at 653.3 feet was 13 feet below the 666.2-foot level at the end of December, 1982. Uvalde's index well was 4.1 feet below the level a year ago, and Hondo's well was 16.2 feet below last year's. The well in New Braunfels was down just 1.1 feet.

Comal Springs at New

Braunfels were flowing 222 cubic feet per second, down eight cfs from the November flow and 44 cfs below the December 1982 reading. The longterm average flow is 299 cfs. San Marcos Springs at 116 cfs were off just two cfs from November and 11 cfs from a year ago, compared to an average of 168 cfs.

The overall decline for the year was attributed to below-average rainfall.

Following are the water well levels at the end of December shown in altitude above mean sea level with the alltime recorded highs in parentheses:

Uvalde: 873.0 feet, up 0.3 foot (886.3); Sabinal: 756.4 feet, up 0.1 foot (835.4); Castroville: 683.1 feet, down 1.1 feet (737.8); Hondo: 708.9

feet, down 1.0 foot (773.8); San Antonio: 653.3 feet, down 3.6 feet (696.5); New Braunfels: 624.3 feet, no change (630.2). San Marcos: 575.0 feet, down 0.2 foot (581.9).

As the result of special groundwater monitoring, including drilling 19 special test wells, the Edwards Underground Water District has concluded that the source of entry of minute amounts of organic compounds into the Edwards Aquifer is a former landfill site in the area north of IH 410 near the intersection of Blanco Road and West Avenue in San Antonio.

Tom Fox EUWD general manager, reported to the district's board that groundwater quality data developed during an intensive 19-month study had indicated that organic chemicals (solvents) were present in the landfill, in formations adjacent to and below the landfill and in the Edwards limestone some 250 feet below the bottom of the landfill.

He said the contaminants, all in very minute quantities, apparently had entered the aquifer through a fault running through the landfill

acreage. Fox reported that further study will be conducted by the City of San Antonio to correct the problem. This could entail capping the landfill to prevent further entry of water and also pumping out existing water.

Fox further indicated that, based on Environmental Protection Agency and other data, no health hazard exists.

In other action at the bi-monthly meeting of the EUWD board, the directors voted to increase the budget for the district's new office building by \$65,000 and awarded the construction contract to PECO Construction Co. of San Antonio. PECO was low bidder at \$307,000 for the building planned in the 1600 block of N. St. Mary's St.

The board authorized the general manager to provide assistance in bringing the annual Groundwater Management Districts Association meeting to San Antonio late in 1984 and to have the EUWD act as host. It also transferred another \$1 million to the EUWD Surface Water Development Fund, bringing the total in the fund to \$3,150,564.

Baldness Treatment Hopeful

A medication used to treat high blood pressure might well be the long-sought remedy that prematurely balding men (and women) have sought for centuries.

Results of a year-long clinical study just completed at The University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio show that minoxidil, a potent antihypertensive drug marketed by Upjohn Pharmaceutical Company, produces a remarkable response — hair! — in some balding men when applied topically to the scalp.

Richard De Villez, M.D., assistant professor of dermatology, conducted the study, in which 56 male volunteers applied the drug to their scalps twice a day for one year. De Villez reports that 21 per cent (12 men) had "a noticeable cosmetic enhancement of hair growth."

Of these, nine showed a 50 per cent to 75 per cent improvement and three had a 75 per cent to 100 per cent improvement.

Another 16 volunteers, while not showing quite as dramatic a response, still showed adequate improvement in hair count.

Fifty per cent of the volunteers had no response, De Villez says, and some "grew only fuzz."

The health science center is one of 20 medical research facilities across the nation that conducted the minoxidil studies for Upjohn. The drug company, sensing a new market for its hypertension medication, commissioned the studies after patients using minoxidil began reporting unusual body hair growth.

"We're not sure how the drug promotes hair growth," De Villez says. "Perhaps it stimulates 'sleeping' hair bulbs by providing them with an increased supply of blood

and nutrients, or maybe it blocks hair bulb sensitivity the balding effect of the male hormone testosterone."

While age does not seem to be a significant factor, individuals who have been bald for more than 10 years do not appear to be good candidates for topical minoxidil.

"The shorter the duration of baldness and the smaller the bald area, the better the results," De Villez reports.

He emphasizes also that his study indicated the drug "may be a better preventer than a restorer."

If Upjohn markets topical minoxidil, the drug probably would not be approved by the Food and Drug Administration and available to consumers before 1987, De Villez estimates.

It Can Happen To You

People are always saying, "Oh, that will never happen to me," and that's usually because they're too ignorant, lead a charmed life, or it already happened to them and they just know it won't happen again.

My family is a lot like this. We're the ignorant ones who hear about horrible things happening everywhere, and we never really stop to think that these things could happen to us.

We've had horses in our family since I was just a baby and we were always very lucky with them. Oh, we've had horses get hurt, but nothing we couldn't cure. For years I had been hearing new things about friends of ours that we showed with, telling us how they had to put their horse away or how it was sick and probably would die.

One of my best friends was coming from a rodeo one evening and he hadn't hitched the trailer correctly. He was driving up a steep hill when the trailer came off of the hitch and rolled back into a nearby lake. A very frightened and frustrated Tim could do nothing but watch as the trailer along with his best roping horses sank to their deaths with no one to save them.

It just made me sick to think that something like that could ever happen. It wasn't long though before it was our turn. Yes, it finally happened to us.

It was 7:15 a.m., just another hectic morning like any other before a horse-show. As usual, I was my grouchy self because all that Dad fixed for breakfast was burned bacon. By 7:25 a.m. we were all loaded up and ready to go, with my two horses, Tri Image and Divi Three Bars, and two girls that also show my horses. Everything going as usual.

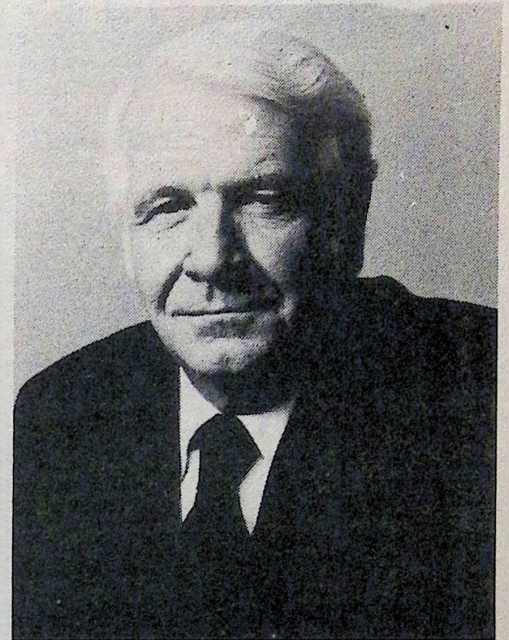
We had only been on the road I'd say five minutes when we came to a small hill on the little windy road out where we live. We had to

pick up speed so we could make it over safely. As we got to the top, the worst happened. There was a loud bang and from there I lost all of my hearing. Not because of the sound, but because of sheer panic. I knew something was wrong, but what? I yelled at Dad, "What is it?" He said loudly, "The damn trailer came off the hitch."

I looked to my right and there was the trailer with both of my horses, speeding past us. The last thing I heard was my Dad saying, "It's going to hit the tree!" I panicked and jumped out of the truck, falling flat on my face. I jumped up and ran as hard and as fast as I could. I guess I thought I could stop the trailer, but it was too late. BAMM! It crashed into the tree. It fell quickly to the left side, the fiberglass top popped off and both horses rolled out. I grabbed both of them and made sure they could walk. Only one was hurt bad enough to take to the vet. He just needed a few stitches, and the other horse was just very scratched up.

Even though it did finally happen, we were still very lucky; both horses are still alive, and we learned a valuable lesson. It can happen to you.

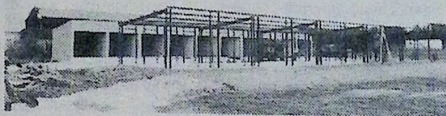

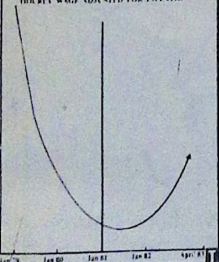

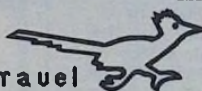

Mexico Vanilla No Bargain

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration reported recently that tourists in Mexico may be buying a bargain that could be hazardous to their health.

Coumarin extract is being sold as genuine vanilla or added to real vanilla in Mexico, says Dr. Alice Hunt, a Texas A&M University Agricultural Extension Service foods and nutrition specialist. It smells and tastes enough like real

vanilla to satisfy all but the experts, and sells for as little as \$1.50 per quart, she says.

Coumarin has been shown to cause liver damage in test animals and is banned for use in food in the United States. The FDA has tested vanilla extracts from Mexico and found coumarin in varying amounts, so tourists have no way of knowing the amount present in the flavoring they buy, cautions the specialist.





They established school marks for most points in a single game, highest victory margin (37 pts.) and most free throws made in a single game (26).

The Roadrunners, who have won four of their last five games, advanced their season record to 9-6 on Monday, Jan. 16 by defeating UT Arlington 76-65 in Arlington. The win puts them one game away from the 10 wins in 1982-83, most ever in the school's two year history.
