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

# **Edwards Voting Now Underway**

Absentee voting in the Ed-wards Underground Water District election began Tuesday in all five counties in the district and continues through Jan. 16. The election is scheduled Jan.

20, and in Bexar County it will be held in conjunction with the San Antonio River Authority election.

Hours for absentee voting, which will be conducted in the Elections Department, 2nd floor of the courthouse, for Bexar County voters, will be from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.

Voting will be in the county clerk's office in Comal, Hays, and Medina Counties and at the city manager's office in Uvalde

To vote by mail, eligible voters may write the county clerk's office for an application to get an absentee ballot.

One director will be elected from each of the five counties Only in Bexar County is the seat

Haby of Medina County and J. Ray Carnes of Uvalde, both seeking re-election, and William H. Brown of Comal County and F.M. Mauldin of Hays County.

### **Improvements** Rate

**Priority For** New Year

Growth in transportation facilities in Bexar County-and especially those leading into and out of the major city, San Antonio-may well be the most

dramatic change for 1979. Because of growing popula-tion demands, the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation has announced anticipated 1979 projects will total over \$88 million of State funds. Most money will go for streets and roads, but some funds will be allocated for purchase of buses, bus maintenance equipment, park-and-ride facilities and bus waiting shelters, it was reported. Both "on" and "off" systems

of streets, roads, and highways will be worked or reworked with user—taxes chiefly. The presence of the Universi-

ty of Texas at San Antonio has caused the planners to target some major work at I.H. 10 -Loop 1604 to alleviate increas-ed traffic volume. The increase reflects the increase in UTSA enrollment. Funding for the project comes solely from State sources and represents \$38 million in needed im-provements, it was explained.

Also released was a county-wide map showing current and projected work. Only the northwest quadrant reproduced here reproduced here with numbered projects affecting this area. The entire map showwith ed all areas of the county receiving work with the central city remaining the most reworked. A code shows numbered projects encased in a circle for those planned; a square for those already completed; an inverted triangle for projects underway; and a hex-agon for authorized projects. In the northwest quadrant are

Leon Valley and Helotes as well as Leon Springs and the City of Grey Forest-all of which have more accessibility through both I.H. 10 and Loop 1604 improvements.

A major widening project for I.H. 410 is planned to increase the number of lanes from four to six in the segment from Fredericksburg Road to Ingram Road (88).

North of San Antonio, Bandera Road, State Highway 16, (76) is being developed into a four-lane divided highway.

Ramp improvements are under contract for I.H. 10 at I.H. 410 (82) near Wonderland.

Drainage improvements are anticipated for I.H. 410 at Rock Creek (89), Tee Cee (90) and Marbach (91).

Loop 1604 will be reconstructed with paved shoulders and grade separations at some intersections and rail crossings.

## **'79 Starts Off Yowling**

The entrance of 1979 in this area was dramatized by the natural fireworks of an unusual and spectacular lightning and thunder storm in the middle of the winter.

The cold New Year's Eve rainfall amounted to a half-inch by midnight in the immediate Helotes area, but ran up to four or more inches in the vacinity of San Geronimo.

Veteran Helotes weather wat-Veteran Helotes weather wat-cher Henry Brauchle braved the cold and rain to go out at midnight and read his rain gauge. His brother-in-law, Walter Haby, reported San Geronimo Creek on an un-precedented rise at his place, isolating some deer hunters. Bight behind the New Year's

Right behind the New Year's Eve rain storm came some of the coldest weather in the history of Helotes. New Year's Day began with a gray and gloomy temperature in the low 20's, and by 5 p.m. on New Year's Day the wind-chill temperature was three degrees below zero Farenheit.

Tuesday morning the temperature had dropped under clearing skies to a record-setting 12 degrees Farenheit in Helotes -- and 10 degrees in San Geronimo. Wells froze, cars would't start, fireplaces burned log after log, and everybody who could stayed home.

Wednesday morning was predicted to be even colder, but clouds moved in again and the daybreak temperature was around 20 degrees, and moved

up to 47 degrees under partly cloudy skies that afternoon. Cold drizzle - but not as cold

as the previous days - returned Thursday. Mr. Braunchle said the half-

inch of rain on New Year's Eve brought the total for the month of December to 2.3 inches, and the 1978 total for the year to 39.4

inches. This was eight inches more than in 1977.


## Mr. Carter Dies At Age 81

## Aquifer Study Late Again

The report on the Edwards Aquifer by the Boston consulting firm of Metcalf and Eddy has been postponed again.

It had been promised to the San Antonio city council by Dec. 29. Now the first section of the report is not supposed to arrive until today, Jan. 5, and second and final section by Jan. 12.

The public may get its first look at the report on Jan. 15, at a meeting in the Mission Room of the HemisFair Plaza Convention Center.

The report is supposed to have cost San Antonio nearly a million dollars, and is supposed to provide San Antonio with information about how development over the aquifer will affect the city's water. The aquifer extends from

The aquifer extends from about Brackettville to Kyle, underlying parts of five counties. Wells drilled into the aquifer provides water for communities throughout the area, as well as for irrigation and industrial uses.

Most wells in the Helotes area draw water from the Glen Rose formation, which is below the Edwards strata in the San Antonio area. The Edwards strata were eroded away in the Helotes area when the Hill Country was uplifted in the geological past.

## Legal Services Extended To Aged

A new program to help senior citizens obtain legal services has been established by the Bexar Area Agency on Aging of the Alamo Area Council of Governments. The Bexar AAA's program is available through the law offices of Lee, Sommers, and Parks, 126 Main Plaza. Legal services include, as examples, wills and matters dealing with administrative law, such as problems with social security, medicare/medicaid, food stamps, consumer relations, tenant rights, and contracts. Any person who is 60 years or older and lives in Bexar County is eligible to receive these services. There is no charge for one person with an income of \$465 per year or two persons with \$600 per year or less. Those persons with incomes above these amounts will pay on a sliding schedule. Funded by the Governor's Committee on Aging, the program is planning to fill a gap of those persons who do not qualify for legal aid, but cannot afford to see an attorney. For more information, call



Cook over low heat, stirring often, until mushrooms are golden, about 5 min-utes. Remove from heat. Stir in lemon juice. Blend in flour, salt, basil and black pepper. Gradually stir in half and half. Cook and stir until sauce bubbles and thickens, about 5 min-utes. Spoon over hot spaghetti. Serve immediately. Yield: 6 portions.

## **Fur Trappers Having Boom**

### Year Here

Mention fur trapping and you conjure up images of nineteenth century mountain men.

But about \$11,000 has been But about \$11,000 has been paid in the last year alone for furs in Bexar County by D&W Fur Company of Hallettsville, according to John Frank Shaddix junior partner. Each Thursday Shaddix ar-

rives in Helotes and San Geronimo with a refrigerated truck and negotiates the purchase of furs.

Buying furs in Helotes for Kallison's is Ralph O. Brown. He operates across from Helotes Park Plaza every even-ing from 5 o'clock on and all day

Wednesday and Saturday. Shaddix reported that dealers in New York say this fur season wil be the largest fur buying year ever recorded.

Shaddix got his start in the industry when he was in college. He became a professional bounty hunter in Tom Green county


to help pay for his education. While some humanitarian groups have vowed to try to stop all trapping and fur taking, he believes that fur buyers are some of the best conserva-tionists around.

"After all, we would be out of business if we didn't try to maintain animal wildlife," he said.

Fur taking lasts only 66 days and is not profitable to hunters and buyers unless furs are and buyers unless turs are taken from overpopulated areas. Also the \$5 fee for a trap-per's license goes to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department for conservation of wildlife.

As a member of Fur Takers of America and the Missouri Trappers, Shaddix is actively engaged in efforts to reduce waste of fur bearing animals through the use of traps which damage the pelt, such as the conibear trap. "Leg hold traps are by far the most successful and humane way of collecting the game. And they are more easily placed in areas where crops are badly damaged by varmints than the live cage traps," he said. He also cautioned all current

the also call they must have their bobcat pelts tagged before they are sold. Due to the dwindl-ting status of the bobcat popula-tion, the Texas Department of Wildlife has set up tagging stations all over Texas.



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
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## Administrators Reassigned
