





Christmas affiliated with Highland Auto Spirit Is Same

In Zambia they say Chaka Filipinos it's Maligayang Pasko. The Germans say Frohliche Weihnachten, and in French it's Joyeux Noel

Here in the U. S. we know it better as . . . what else but Merry Christmas?

The Austrians have their Klaus and Krampos, while Belgians are familiar with Black Peter. For Spaniards, there's San Nicolas, and in France he's Pere Noel, whom the Scottish know by the name Father Christmas

Of course, we Americans are visited by . . . who else but Santa Claus?

Christmas is celebrated in different ways and even at different times in countries around the globe

For instance, in Venezuela streets are blocked off during the evening beginning in mid-December and youths roller skate until the wee hours

And in most Spanish-speaking countries, the Three Kings day, Jan. 6, is the day of traditional gift giving, while Dec. 25 retains a

primarily religious significance In the East African nation of Zambia, there is no Santa Claus. but there are Christmas trees, presents and cards. The traditions are very similar to those in America, but the gifts don't come from Santa Claus. Whenever a baby is born, people give gifts to the mother, so the Zambians exchange gifts on the day of Christ's birth.

Another Venezuelan custom is the "Aguinaldo," where small groups playing typical South American musical instruments pass from house to house caroling.

In Thailand, New Year's Day celebrated Aug. 13 — is a much bigger holiday than Christmas. Different churches in Thailand celebrate Christmas on different dates in December, and this choice of dates even extends to various groups within a church

Probably providing the greatest outside influence in San Antonio are the customs of Mexico, where both Dec. 25 and Jan. 6 are special

The influence of the U.S. has changed things some, though in the old days Dec. 25 was

religious there were no gifts, etc. Now gifts are exchanged on Christmas, and Jan. 6 is the day they usually have a small dinner and cut the "Rosca de Reves (Cake of Kings)

The cake is baked with a tiny infant Christ figure lodged somewhere inside. When the slices are cut, the person who gets the figure is, by tradition, required to throw a party in March

Another longtime Mexican custom is the procession of singers known as the "posada" Groups wander through a neighborhood singing a traditional Catholic song. searching for a place to stay-just as Mary and Joseph did nearly 2,000 years ago
