## Candidates Square Off-For April Elections

### Four Vie for Mayor of Helotes

Candidates for city offices in Helotes, Grey Forest and Leon Valley, for the Nor-thside District school board, and for the Helotes Park Estates water board all had to file this week. The elections will be held Saturday, April 3.

In Helotes, the mayor and entire city council, in office only since Nov. 15, will have to run again to retain their incumbency. After this elec-tion, the council members elected will draw lots to see who is to have a two-year term and who a one-

Incumbent Mayor Tom Beatty will have three op-ponents in the April 3 Helotes city election. They are Charles (Chuck) Lee, Bennie H. Lyon and Frank Thompson. Lee ran for city council in November. Lyon ran

against Beatty and Pete Cantu for mayor and finished second. Thompson, a building contractor living in Helotes Park Estates, is a newcomer to the mayor's race.

All five incumbent Helotes city council persons filed for re-election. They are Guy

Burnett, Leonard Hill, Reudy Loeffler, Verna Thompson and Pat Wootton. Two additional candidates for city council who filed this week are Pete Cantu and Mike Krisak.

Incumbent City Marshal Earl Smith filed for reelection and has no opponent.

In Grey Forest, Mayor Manuel Vara filed for reelection, as did Councilman Matt Vyvermen. Janet Shelton filed for the other vacancy on the Grey Forest council. She has not run before, and seeks Harry Drought's place. Drought did not file for re-election after two terms on the council.

In Leon Valley, the mayor, Kenneth Alley, and two in-cumbent council members whose terms are expiring filed for re-election. The council members are Bob Scar-borough and Charlotte Asch. Mrs. Asch drew no opponent, but running also for Scarborough's place will be Jim Brown and James O. Perry.

For the two expiring terms on the Northside District school board, the two in-cumbents, Nellie Reddix and Harry G. Cunningham, filed for re-election. Mrs. Reddix

### Chalk up 4 Inches

March came in like a gray lamb, but a decided improvement over cold February here. Two inches of rain fell in February, matching precipitation in January almost exactly for a total of four inches for 1982. There were 19 days in January of 40 degrees or lower with an average mean temperature of 42.6 degrees according to records kept by Henry Brauchle, local weather observer. If the predicted March 6 weather materializes, remember the Alamo. #### Edwards Board OK's Dam

Directors of the Edwards Underground Water District will discuss water resources issues in regard to pending revisions of the Texas Water Plan at the regular bimonthly board meeting at 10 a.m. Tuesday, March 9, in San Antonio, Tom Fox, general manager of the EUWD, has announced.

To be considered by the 15-member board for comments and suggestions is "An Overview of Texas Water Resource Problems and Water Resource Issues," prepared by the Texas Department of Water Resources.

The executive committee of the board of directors of the Edwards Underground Water District Thursday morning awarded the H. B. Zachry Co. of San Antonio the contract to construct the Seco district's Creek Recharge Dam project in Medina County.

The Zachry Co. was the

low bidder out of seven submitted with a bid of \$276,114.40.

Second low bidder was J.

CIVII.

R. Ramon and Sons, with a bid of \$296.196.55. Highest bid was \$457,041.50 from Jalco, Inc.

The Seco Creek dam and diversion channel, located on the upper reaches of Seco Creek 14 miles north of D'Hanis, is the fourth recharge project initiated and financed entirely by the EUWD, said Tom Fox, EUWD General manager.

The structure, which also will provide for flood control above D'Hanis, will be 15 feet high and 350 feet long. The diversion channel to a nearby cave will be 1600 feet long and 16 feet deep. Average annual recharge to the Edwards Aquifer will be 1185 acre feet.

recharge The first project undertaken by the EUWD was the Parker Creek Dam, which was completed in 1973. The district has also participated with other agencies and counties in a number of recharge and flood control projects in the five-county





# Reports from Washington

## **Economic Report To Congress**

Almost everyone is aware of the State of the Union message which the President delivers in person to Congress and the nation. In recent years, however, a second report has become perhaps more important for those of us making public policy. This year, The Economic Report to Congress has been high on everyone's

The 357-page document, put together by the Council of Economic Advisers and signed by the President, contains few surprises. It is somewhat cautious about projecting the future, but steadfastly maintains that continued monetary restraint and further reduction in the rate of government spending are necessary to reduce inflation, bring down interest rates, and to provide the basis for sustained economic growth.

During 1981, we saw general economic conditions reflecting the transition in federal economic policies. The major elements of the program for economic recovery are designed to increase long-term economic growth and to reduce inflation. Short term recovery miracles are not expected.

According to the report, the conflict between continued expectations of rising inflation, based on the history of the last 15 years and more recent monetary restraint, explains many

The outlook for 1983 and subsequent years is based on a continuation of the Administration's spending, tax, and regulatory policies, continued monetary restraint, and broader public recognition that the Administration is committed to each of these elements. Prospective budget deficits result from differences in the timing of spending and tax policy actions and the impact of continued monetary restraint on nominal gross national product

Given our nation's economic situation, it is absolutely incumbent on Congress to remain committed to reducing the projected deficit now and in the years ahead. Financing huge federal budget deficits absorbs money that otherwise would be available to the private sector. And, the plain fact is that the federal government's demand for funds is insensitive to changes in interest rates. What that means is that the Treasury will raise the funds that it requires regardless of interest rates while the private sector suffers.

Economists say that during a recession a given deficit can be financed with less pressure on interest rates than during a period of growth, when business and consumer demands for credit are increasing. That is why it is imperative for the government to reduce the budget deficit in FY 1983 and beyond when a period of accelerated growth is expected.

The current recession is expected to end in 1982, followed by a resumption of growth. According to the report, the key areas of rebound in the economy this year are expected to be consumer goods, housing, autos, and defense. The principal areas that are anticipated to lead the expansion next year are business invest-

ment, inventories, and further acceleration in defense deliveries. Reversing the trends of the past is not an easy task. The damage inflicted on our economy was done by imprudent and inappropriate policies over a period of many years. There is no quick fix, as I have said before, but during the past year we have made a substantial beginning. Much hard work lies ahead.

## Unique START Gallery To Open March 7

The San Antonio Museum of Art announces its newest unique gallery, START, will open on March 7. START is an orientation gallery designed to encourage museum visitors of all ages to interact with the exhibits within the gallery.

The Junior League of San Antonio donated \$250,000 over a five-year period for the new gallery. The completely bilingual participatory gallery is located on the first floor of the San Antonio Museum of Art's East Tower. It is composed of six exhibits, each designed to encourage the visitor to explore the basic elements of art-color, line, texture, shape and space.

A seven-foot-square Touch Wall will be the first area visitors will encounter. The design of the wall was chosen in a contest sponsored by the San Antonio Museum Assocation and the Junior League. Roland Rodriguez' winning design encompasses the idea of an interrelationship between art, architecture and music. The materials used in the wall range from stone and ceramics to a color wheel and revolving planetary

Also in the START gallery is the Drawing Wall, a 21'x9' prepared surface of baked-on enamel to which most draw-ing and painting media will adhere. This wall will provide an area for artist's demonstrations, class projects and individual experimentation with art material provided.

Discovery Boxes are a major part of the gallery. These boxes will contain materials which focus on the elements of art, as well as worksheets that will include an introduction to the topic, a related glossary of terms and suggestions for projects which can be done at the museum with the box or at home with household objects.

Other features are the amphitheater in which visitors can sit and watch films, slide shows and demonstrations; computer terminals pro-grammed to challenge the visitor with a wide selection of art topics and excerises in Spanish as well as English; and a gallery wall, a carpeted area for displaying mini exhibits and works of art from the museum's permanent collection.

Museum Association START coordinator, believed the timing of the March opening is very appropriate. "The National Art Educators Association has declared March as National Art Month. This ties in very nicely with the goals and objec-tives of the START gallery."

The San Antonio Museum of Art is located at 200 W Jones Ave. It is open to the public Wednesday through Sunday, 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is \$2 for adults and \$1 for children under 12. There is no admission charge Saturdays until noon.
