UTSA Site Bids to Be Opened

Sealed bids for site preparation of the University of Texas/San Antonio will be opened on October 26 at 2 p.m. at the Office of Facilities Planning and Construction, University of Texas System in Austin.

Architects, Bartlett Cocke and

Associates, Inc. of San Antonio with offices on Broadway drew up the plans and specifications which all bidders had to obtain to be eligible.

Work is expected to begin soon after awarding of the successful bid.

Hunting Season Opens Nov. 13

Deer season will return to the Hill Country on Saturday, November 13—and extend through Sunday, January 2.

And with it will return an army of hunters both resident and non-resident to whom this season is the most

important of the year—with the chance to get out in the open, the crisp weather (hopefully), the excitement of the hunt, the trophies to be bagged and bragged about, and, incidentally, the fresh meat to be provided for the table.

A good season generally is predicted, meaning lots of deer in good shape.

In Bexar and most of the Hill Country counties the limit will be three deer—including no more than two bucks. A special permit required for taking antlerless deer may be obtained from the land owner where the deer is killed.

Open season on wild turkey also will open November 13 and run through January 2 in most of the Hill Country. In Bexar and Kendall counties the limit is to be two gobblers or bearded hens. In Bandera, Medina, Kerr, and Gillespie counties the limit will be two turkeys of either sex.

All deer and turkey hunters must have a license. For Texas residents the fee is \$3.25, for non-residents it is \$25. Exempt from the resident license are persons under 17 or over 65 and anybody hunting on land on which he resides. There is a 25-cent fee for the exempt licenses. To be classed as a resident, the hunter must have lived in Texas for more than six months (except members of the armed forces, for whom 30 days is the requirement).

Hunting licenses will be available in Helotes at Toepferwein's and in San Geronimo at Pete's Place.

Shooting hours will be from one-half hour before sunrise to one-half hour after sunset. Immediately after killing a deer the hunter must attach to it a tag from his hunting license and leave the tag on.

Game birds and animals may be stored indefinitely, said the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department. If stored in a commercial plant, they must be registered with the storage plant manager. They cannot be sold or shipped except to the hunter's home or to a taxidermist. (Taxidermists may sell unclaimed mounted specimens.)

Meanwhile, preceding the opening of the regular deer and turkey season, a special October season for archery hunters only has been underway since October 1 in Bexar, Bandera, and Kerr counties. It will close October 31. Buck deer only may be taken during the archery season, and any deer or turkey taken must be counted in the hunter's bag limits or the regular season.

San Geronimo Dam Okayed At Hearing

The site and general plan of a recharge dam to be built on San Geronimo Creek by the Edwards Underground Water District were decided at a public meeting held October 12 at Sammy's Cafe in Castroville.

The site is about on the Bexar-Medina county line, on the Fred Ewert property, north of Highway 471 near Castroville.

Lodal & Bain Engineers presented detailed studies for two alternate methods of effecting the recharge. One plan called for a single 53-foot dam and the other for a 40-foot clay dam plus a smaller concrete dam downstream at the edge of the recharge zone.

Because of objections to the higher dam by property owners whose lands would be affected, the two-dam plan was chosen. The upper dam will form a holding reservoir from which water can be released at the proper rate to be injected into the Edwards Underground at the concrete dam.

The cost of these two dams is estimated to be \$331,750. The single dam would have cost \$258,450. The District will pay for the dams with funds it has on hand, and not ask for federal or state help.

At the meeting it was generally agreed that the recharge facility (Continued on Page 5)

City Hall Planned

A new city hall for Leon Valley was authorized by voters of that community in a special election on October 16. The site will be the corner of Bandera and El Verde Roads, one block south of Leon Valley School.

The voters approved a \$125,000 bond issue to cover the city hall, including police and fire station, and purchase of fire-fighting equipment. The vote on the city hall bonds was 204 for to 42 against, and on the fire equipment was 224 for to 35 against.

The Leon Valley city offices presently are located in the Lyda Building on Bandera Road. Originally they were located in the building which now houses Luckey's House of Beauty, next door to where the new city hall is to be built.

Recipe of the Month

Barbecued Chicken

This is a supreme main dish for fall gatherings . . . Game birds or small turkey can be treated similarly for a hunting party or Thanksgiving outing. Serves 8.

Use four broiler-fryers, about 2 pounds each, cleaned and halved. Remove giblets and use in broth to be added to sauce.

Sprinkle each chicken half with salt, pepper, and brush lightly with salad oil.

Place chicken on grate about 5 inches from heat. Allow about an hour cooking time with slow coals. Baste frequently until very well done and rich mahogany color.

The sauce should be made as follows:

- 2 8-oz. cans tomato sauce
- 1 stick margarine melted
- 1 tablespoon prepared mustard
- 2 onions, medium white
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 tablespoon vinegar
- 3 tablespoons brown sugar

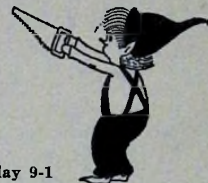

ity would be beneficial and should be built. Because of the small area of Edwards limestone exposed in the streambed of the San Geronimo, most of its water passes across the recharged area and goes into the Medina River. The engineers estimate that the recharge structures would be 90 percent effective and that the cost of the water recharged when amortized over a period of 20 years would be one cent per 1,000 gallons.

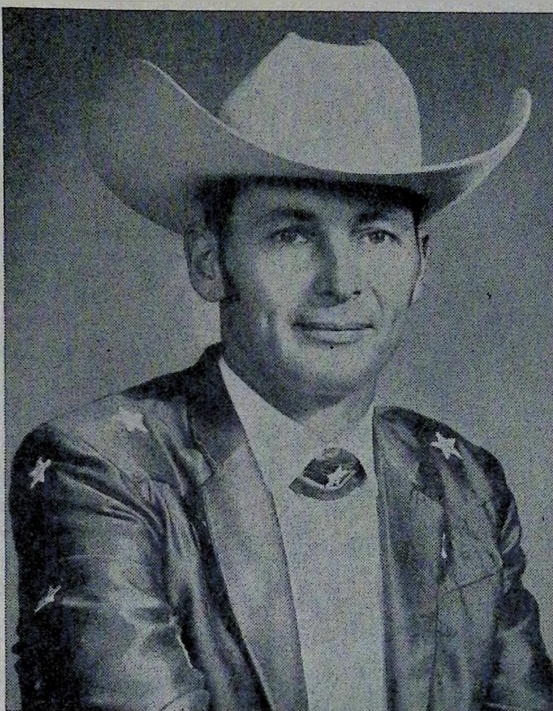

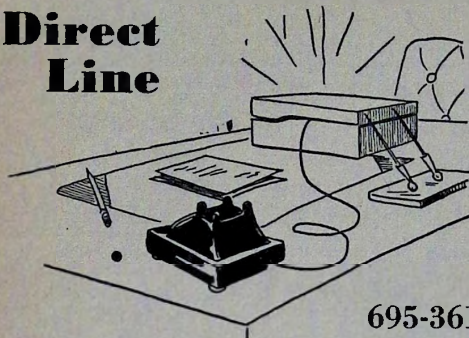

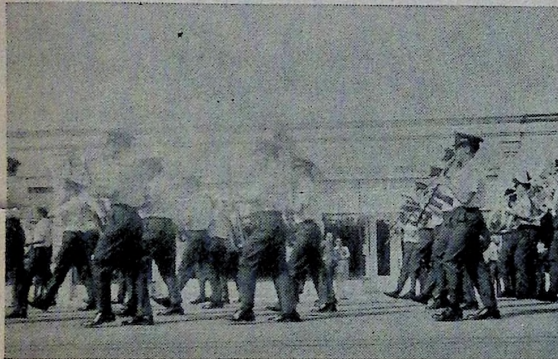

Prior to joining AACOG, he had been Acting Director of Aviation for the City of San Antonio. Earlier he was first city manager of Canadian, Texas.

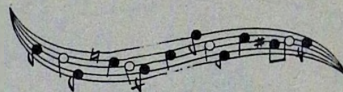

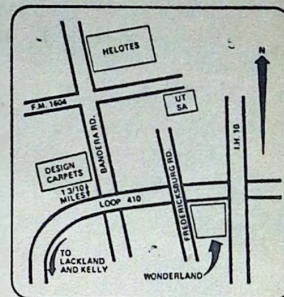
