Two Break-ins Spur Added Precautions

Merchants of the Helotes area, as well as other members of the business community, have formed a solid front to combat growing problems, including crime, and to plan for the future of the area.

A new organization—with some 50 businesses or institutions eligible—was voted into existence with 25 delegates present on Nov. 9, and will be known as the Helotes Merchants Association. The meeting took place at Chef John's Loft—and a regular first Wednesday meeting was selected. Next meeting will be at 8:30 a.m., Wednesday, Dec. 7 at the Loft.

A slate of officers includes Fred Holden, president; Art Brivic, vice president, Tom Kirby, treasurer, Norma Pittman, secretary, and Glenn Mason, comptroller. They were chosen by acclamation.

Following a series of special meetings, the Merchants Assn. has made formal arrangements for additional deputies to be on duty here to quell vandalism and break-ins.

It was reported that two business establishments suffered losses this past week. On Thursday night or early Friday, Nov. 10-11, the Helotes Feed and Supply was broken into with loss of a stock of steel traps in addition to a monetary loss which consisted largely of silver coins.

The Exxon Station on late Sunday night, Nov. 13-14, had cigarette machines broken into, it was reported. The time was about 1 a.m., according to estimates.

Homeowners of Helotes Park Estates, with Lt. Col. Thomas E. Stout (Ret.) as president, are also considering additional security measures and are working with the Helotes Merchants Assn. to combat local problems.

Any merchants or business persons wishing to join the Helotes Merchants Assn. may contact officers or members for details and are welcome to attend the next meeting, Pres. Holden said.

1978 Livestock Show To Award \$200,000

Harold M. Freeman, life chairman of the board, and E.M. "Marvin" Beam, general manager of the San Antonio Livestock Show and Rodeo, have announced the judging schedule and premiums for February's show. Prize money this year will total \$200,000, with premiums going for goats, sheep, swine, poultry, horses, beef and dairy cattle.

Breeding classes for Open Show include Angus, Brahman, Brangus, Charolais, Hereford, Polled Hereford, Red Poll, Santa Gertrudis, Zebu, and Simmental beef cattle, and Guernsey, Holstein, Jersey and Brown Swiss dairy cows. Swine classes include Berkshires, Chester Whites, Durocs, Hampshires, Poland Chinas, and Yorkshires. Breeding classes for sheep and goats include Columbias, Corriedales, Delaines, Dorsets, Hampshires, Montadales, Rambouillets, Shropshires, Southdowns, Suffolks, and Angora goats. Poultry will be judged in the Junior Ready-to-Cook Poultry Show.

Prizes will also be offered in the Quality Beef, Lamb and Pork Contest, Cutting Horse Contest, Quarter Horse Show, Paint Horse Show, and Appaloosa Horse Show.

Deadline for livestock entries is December 10, 1977; for horse entries January 6, 1978. Interested persons can get a copy of the 1978 Premium List by writing: San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo, P.O. Box 20228, San Antonio, Texas 78220. This year's show is slated for Feb. 10-19, 1978.

UTSA Students To Register

A new registration process beginning Nov. 21 will allow students to reserve spring courses early at UTSA.

Newly-admitted students and former students returning to UTSA, as well as those already attending the University, will be able to go through advance registration.

An on-line computer system will allow students to know immediately if they can get into a class, or if it has been filled. Fees may be paid Dec. 12-16, Dec. 19-22 and Jan. 5. Students who reserve courses in advance, but who have not paid by 7 p.m. on Jan. 5, will have all course reservations cancelled and will be required to go through regular registration on Jan. 10-11.

UTSA seniors, graduate degree-seeking students and certificate seeking students will be able to begin advance registration on Nov. 21-23.

Juniors may begin Nov. 28; sophomores, Nov. 29; and freshmen, Nov. 30.

Special students may begin registration on Dec. 1-2, and transient students may start the process on Dec. 2.

Krueger Asks Meat Laws

Two agriculture bills sponsored by Cong. Bob Krueger will be focal points at specially called hearings in Scottsbluff, Neb., on Nov. 22.

The two bills call for tougher inspection of imported meat and more specific labeling for consumers.

"Currently imported beef does not always meet the same rigorous health requirements American beef does. This is unfair to domestic cattle raisers and to American consumers," Krueger said.

Krueger has sent letters to the Independent Cattlemen's Association, Texas and Southwest Cattlemen's Association and Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association urging them to send representatives to testify at the hearings.

Krueger, along with American cattle producers, is especially concerned about stopping the outbreak of brucellosis.

Let's Celebrate Thanksgiving

Practically nobody needs to be told that this Thursday, Nov. 24, is Thanksgiving Day. It is a truly American holiday, observed at all times of the year by the earliest settlers to thank God for His help. Practically, to this day, it is a national annual festival of thanksgiving for the mercies of the closing year. And in 1977 there is a growing awareness of the need to be grateful for a year of peace.

Thanksgiving, by proclamation of the President and the Governors of the States, ranks as a legal holiday.

The earliest harvest thanksgiving in America recorded was kept by the Pilgrim Fathers at Plymouth in 1621. There were others. Family tradition remembers those of this century as well.

Congress recommended days of thanksgiving annually during the Revolution, and in 1784 for the return of peace—as did President Madison in 1815. Washington appointed such a day in 1789 after the adoption of the Constitution, and in 1795 for the general benefits and welfare of the Nation. Since 1863, the Presidents have always issued proclamations appointing the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day until the days of Roosevelt when the last Thursday was observed.

As in the past, the fourth Thursday will be observed. But on Wednesday—the Eve of Thanksgiving, the community has an opportunity to gather together as did our forefathers in a Thanksgiving service representing the religious emphasis that first prompted the establishment of this family holiday. Let's all attend, and offer up thanks for mercy bestowed this year.

Kay's Rich Thanksgiving Cake

- 1 cup raisins
- 1 cup chopped walnuts
- 1 cup thick applesauce
- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 2. Beat honey, oil and egg together.
- 3. Sift together whole wheat flour, salt, baking powder and spices. Add honey, oil and egg.
- 4. Lightly stir in raisins, nuts and applesauce.
- 5. Spoon batter into an oiled 9x5 inch loaf pan. Bake for 40 minutes.
- 6. Glaze cake with rice syrup.
- 7. To make a larger cake double the recipe and bake in a ring pan.


He was elected to the executive board during the association's charter conference recently at the Menger Hotel.

The Consumer Alert

AUSTIN—Texas' foul weather months have just started and many people are beginning to think about ways to cut back on a high heating bill.

The first thing that comes to the minds of many of us is the cozy and inviting blaze of a fireplace, although it may be questionable as to how much warmth and comfort a fireplace can provide in actually heating a home on a chilly evening.

There is no doubt that it can provide a reasonable amount of heat if it's installed correctly and the proper materials are used. Otherwise, some consumers who are thinking of adding a fireplace could find that resulting problems may cause more discomfort than comfort.

The lawyers in our Consumer Protection Division have had a number of reports of fireplace construction problems. One incident involved a woman who hired two itinerant contractors to build a fireplace. When it was finished, all the fires she built went out immediately. She discovered later that the contractors had failed to install a damper to regulate air flow, and the resulting draft blew out every fire the woman tried to start.

To avoid problems after a fireplace is built, give plenty of advance thought to what you want, and take certain precautions before hiring a contractor for the job. The initial step is to decide on the type and size of fireplace. Three kinds are available. The best known is the traditional version with firebrick interior and brick or stone chimney.

Another is a preassembled built-in unit with metal firebox and flue. This kind can be installed to look like the traditional version, even to the extent of enclosing the metal

flue within a chimney. The third kind is a freestanding pre-fabricated unit that can be placed anywhere in the room. Any of these types, if properly installed and made of quality materials, should be satisfactory and safe.

Several sizes of fireplaces are available. The size you choose will determine the maximum size of the logs you can burn. You should also decide whether to include certain options in a fireplace, such as a gas or butane starter or an outside door or special drawer for ash removal.

Think, too, about some of the heat-circulating devices that can improve the ability of the fireplace to heat an entire room. Some of these might be a worthwhile investment if you plan to use the fireplace as a major source of heat.

It is also advisable to get several bids before selecting a contractor to build or install the fireplace. When you have decided on a contractor, discuss with him exactly what you want. Reputable companies or individuals will be happy to show you examples of their work. After you have reached an agreement on the work to be done, the price, and the timetable for completion, draw up a contract. Some companies will have their own contract.

Also, when contracting a fireplace, be wary of paying too much money before the work is completed. Our Consumer Protection attorneys say a good rule of thumb is to hold back a substantial part of the price until the job is completed.



If Retiring, Apply Now

Working people who plan to retire between now and early 1978 should start planning now to arrange for their social security benefits, Gilbert G. Gonzalez, social security district manager in San Antonio, said today.

He gave these tips: First, get together information that will be needed to support your claim. This includes your social security card or a record of your number; proof of your date of birth recorded early in your life, preferably before age 5; evidence of last year's earnings (a copy of your W-2 or a copy of your Federal tax return, including schedule C).

If your husband or wife is also planning to apply on your record, he or she should have this additional information, Gonzalez added: His or her social security card or a record of the number; proof of age as described above; marriage certificate; if either was married before, information about the beginning and end of those marriages; and information about your husband's or wife's earnings if he or she is working.

Gonzalez emphasized that it is important for you to apply two or three months before you

plan to retire, even if you don't yet have all of the information you need.

The San Antonio social security office, 727 E. Durango, is open 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday. The telephone number is 229-6400.

Edwards Board Studies Tax

The Edwards Underground Water District is investigating the need for obtaining surface water for the San Antonio metropolitan area and to call a tax election in Bexar County, if found appropriate.

A staff study indicated the EUWD could contract with the Guadalupe-Blanco River Authority for up to 50,000 acre feet of surface water. If the San Antonio City Water Board contracted for the water, the cost would be borne by CWB customers. If the EUWD acts as the agent, the cost would be spread over most of Bexar County. It has been estimated a 10-cent increase over the present 2-cent property tax would be needed.

For the second consecutive year, Marshall High School's Ram Band will perform half-time ceremonies for a professional football game in the Astrodome at Houston.




