Services Planned For Mike O'Hara

The community was saddened to hear of the death of Mike O'Hara Thursday afternoon, August 17, at his home in downtown Helotes. Cause of death was an apparent heart attack and he died peacefully while watching television about 4 p.m. Emergency medical aid was summoned promptly, and he was taken to Audie Murphy Veterans Hospital. Mr. O'Hara had suffered earlier heart attacks and had been home from the hospital about three weeks.

A memorial service and requiem Mass will be said by Rev. Louis A. Trawalter at 10 a.m. Monday, August 21, at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church in Helotes. His mortal remains have been donated, at his bequest, to the University of Texas Health Science Center.

Mr. O'Hara, a veteran of World War II, was born Sept. 4, 1911 in Knoxville, Tennessee and died at the age of 66 years in Helotes.

He was a resident of Helotes for 21 years and had many friends in the community. He was active in civic projects and was a member of the Helotes Lions Club. Before his recent illness, he was associated with Gillespie Ford in San Antonio and Big Country Ford in Boerne. All his working career was spent with the automotive industry and he was sought after for his opinions on transportation vehicles.

He is survived by his wife, Gwen O'Hara of Helotes. He leaves also his daughters, Janice O'Hara Bennett of Helotes, and Joyce Harrell of Robstown, Texas. His other survivors include his stepsons, Benny Williams and Robert Williams, as well as seven grandchildren.

Honorary pallbearers at the memorial service will be members of the Helotes Lions Club.

Mike O'Hara will be missed by all his family, and his many friends in the Hill Country and San Antonio area, who found his friendship valuable.

Those wishing to make donations in his honor may give to the Audie Murphy Veterans Hospital chapters of VFW, the American Legion, or DAV for social projects in the hospital, a family member suggested. During his hospital stays, Mr. O'Hara enjoyed the visits of these groups and the activities provided.

Sympathy is extended to his family in their loss. Mr. O'Hara will be missed.

LOANS OFFERED TO DISASTER VICTIMS

Bexar County Eligible

The U.S. Small Business Administration (SBA) announced Sunday that it will continue to accept loan applications from Texas flood victims who live in or own property in Bandera, Kerr, Kendall and surrounding counties.

"Although the Federal-State Disaster Assistance Centers have closed, Texas flood victims can continue to apply for SBA disaster loans in three hill country communities," said James S. Reed, SBA District Director. "We have opened temporary offices in Kerrville at the Charles Schreiner Bank, in Comfort at 821 Front Street, and in Bandera at the First National Bank. SBA personnel will be available at these locations as long as they are needed."

SBA disaster loans are low-interest and may be used to repair or replace damaged or destroyed homes, personal property and businesses. House trailers and vacation homes also are covered. Renters are eligible to apply for personal property losses.

"Our loans cover other items too," Reed said. "Homeowners who have damaged fences, private roads and bridges, and shrubbery or landscaping may be eligible for a loan to help with replacement costs. Uninsured automobiles may be covered for a loan amount equal to the Blue Book or fair market value."

In addition to the three declared counties, persons in the adjacent counties of Kimble, Gillespie, Blanco, Comal, Bexar, Medina, Uvalde, Real and Edwards may apply for SBA disaster loans.

At 10:30 a.m. Tuesday Bert Koch and "his 50 smiling troops", in a convoy of pick-up trucks and cars, pulled up outside the Comfort High School cafeteria.

They came laden with 400 pieces of barbecued chicken, 210 pounds of potato salad, cole slaw, pinto beans and rice, 60 loaves of bread, 20 homemade cakes, 200 cartons of milk and 17 cases of soda—enough to feed 425 hungry Comfort residents.

Jose Ibarra, a resident of Helotes and owner of Ibarra's Ranch House died Wednesday, August 9, in a San Antonio hospital of an apparent heart attack.

He was the beloved husband of Mrs. Herlinda P. Ibarra. He is survived by his sons Jose M. Ibarra and Jesus P. Ibarra. He is also survived by his daughters, Mrs. Herminia P. Ibarra, Mrs. Olga Erlewien, Mrs. Lilla Rodriguez, and Miss Yolanda Ibarra. He leaves also 19 grandchildren.

Mr. Ibarra was a devoted father and husband and was active in the development of the parish at Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church.

Mr. Ibarra had a career which included operation of his Ranch House and he was noted for having invented food items which grew to national popularity.

Rosary was said for him at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church on Friday at 7:30 p.m. His friends came to pay last farewells as he lay in state there. Funeral Mass was held Saturday, August 12, 1978 in the morning with burial at the Helotes Catholic Cemetery. Mr. Ibarra was owner of the beautiful gardens of Our Lady of Guadalupe fronting Bandera Road and made it available to the church during the pastorate of Rev. Cyril Kuehne.

The Forest Hills Presbyterian Church has called a new pastor. Rev. Joe Reynolds and his family moved onto the field August 10 and began duties at the church last Sunday.

He succeeds Rev. Sam Terry, who has retired for a second time. Earlier he retired as pastor of Madison Square Presbyterian Church in San Antonio, but then moved to Helotes and became pastor of the local church. Rev. Terry, his wife, Margaret, and son Bill, plan to continue to reside at their home on Scenic Loop in Grey Forest. Rev. Terry also served for one term as mayor of Grey Forest while pastor of Forest Hills Church.

Rev. Reynolds, 31, was born in Idabel, Oklahoma, and was raised in Arlington. In 1969 he was graduated from St. John's College in Santa Fe, New Mexico, with a B.A. in liberal arts, and returned to Texas intending to pursue a master's degree at U.T.-Austin in music theory and pedagogy. During his studies at the University, Joe could no longer avoid the call he felt to the Christian ministry. He enrolled in Austin Presbyterian Theological Seminary, from which he was graduated in 1975 with a Master of Divinity degree. Joe was ordained by the Presbytery del Salvador that same year.

While in seminary Joe did summer work at the First Presbyterian Church of Texarkana, Arkansas, and at Wilshire Presbyterian Church, Austin. He also served two churches in the Moore County area of North Carolina for a year. The Reynolds come to Helotes from Corpus Christi, where Joe has served as pastor of Woodlawn Presbyterian Church for the past three years.

Joe is the husband of Pamela Anne, also a native of North-Central Texas, and the father of George Patrick, age 5, and Andrea Noel, age 19 months. They enjoy music, working around the house, cooking, and generally celebrating life. The whole family is excited about both the church and Helotes.

After just one week they have come to love the community feeling and the unique qualities of the Helotes-Grey Forest area. They look forward to the opportunities and the challenges of working with the church. "We are eager as a family to grow with Forest Hills and with Helotes," Joe said.

the past week, but instead had come to offer a little entertainment and a different bill of fare.

By noon, the 50 young college and high school-age volunteers had moved the kitchens of their two San Antonio restaurants, the Sandpiper and the Quarterdeck, to the Comfort Red Cross station to relieve Red Cross workers for lunch.

Both restaurants closed down temporarily for lunch to serve in Comfort. Bert and his group barbecued 400 pieces of chicken while two of the girls baked 20 homemade sheet cakes in the kitchen of a tiny efficiency apartment.

As restaurant entertainers Mike Stern and Rick Flake

belted out "Best of My Love" and "Take Me Home Country Roads", enthusiastic young waiters hustled residents through lines and even startled some with table service. One rancher asked whether he was in the right place.

By 12:30 p.m., approximately 400 residents had been served and the supply of chicken was

running low. Undaunted, Bert and the others set up a makeshift grill and began flipping hamburgers in assembly-line fashion.

When it was all over, more than 600 Comfort flood victims and Red Cross workers received hot lunches, a little variety and a hefty dose of enthusiasm.

New Kindergarten To Open Doors

Wells Rise

Well water levels in San Antonio and other points in the Edwards Underground Water District began a dramatic rise in the week following the heavy rains triggered by Tropical Storm Amelia.

In San Antonio, the well at Dodd Field on the north edge of Fort Sam Houston, on Aug. 7 had risen 16 feet from the reading of July 26. Col. McDonald D. Weinert, P.E. general manager of the EUWD, said this reflected both reduced pumpage and increased recharge.

But more significantly, he said the well at Sabinal, which had dropped some 20 feet in two months, due to heavy irrigation, had risen 1.1 feet by July 26, prior to the heavy rains. Recovery of the Sabinal well, he said, was due to reduced pumpage, not recharge.

The district's new flood water retarding structure on Middle Verde Creek north of Hondo did its job well, Col. Weinert said. At 12:30 p.m. Aug. 2, water was flowing six inches over the 20-foot-high recharge dam. At 6:30 p.m. Thursday the water had sunk six feet below the top of the dam and by mid-day Friday was 14 feet below the top, indicating the water had gone into the aquifer recharge zone.

Tennis Courts Ready For Use

There is no court charge for UTSA students, faculty or staff who have paid the athletic facility use fee or for members of their families who have paid the fee.

The tennis center will be open from 8 a.m. to 9:30 p.m. daily, except on University holidays. Davalos said the courts will be closed Sept. 4 for Labor Day.

Parking is available in the Convocation Center parking lot.

The courts were constructed by Kunz Construction Co. of San Antonio.

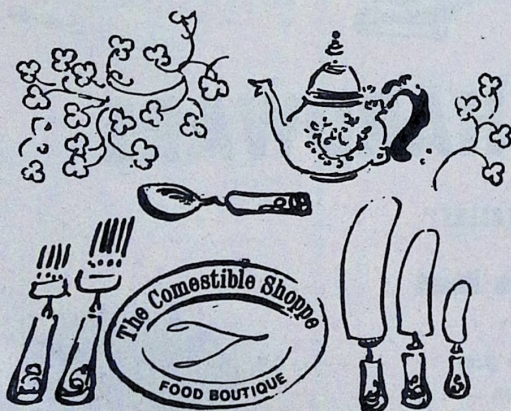
