The split-level school will have central facilities for 1600 sixth, seventh and eighth graders and is designed so that classroom wings can be added. It is located near Tezel and Gilbeaux Rds. off Bandera Highway between San Antonio and Helotes.

NORTHSIDE SETS HIGHER TAX RATE

In regular session Aug. 27, Trustees approved a \$35 million dollar annual budget and set the tax rate at \$1.88 on 75 per cent per \$100 assessed value.

This year's budget includes a 21.6 per cent increase in current operating funds plus the \$10 million construction bonds for new school buildings.

The \$1.88 rate reflects a five-cent tax increase.

The low bid of A. E. Martin Construction Company was awarded for construction of Phase II classrooms for Pease Middle School. Architect David

Bradley received a go-ahead on final designs for an Opportunities Workshop at Mackey School.

Trustees adopted a Board policy for identifying first graders eligible for State Bi-lingual instruction, according to state law and Texas Education Agency procedures.

A two-cent increase in the price of extra milk purchased by students and adults in school cafeterias was approved. One carton of milk is distributed with the purchase of a school lunch, and the increase applies only to additional milk purchases.

Folklife Festival To Begin Thursday

Colorful costumes of 26 ethnic groups will provide a rainbow backdrop for the third annual Texas Folklife Festival to be held Sept. 12-15 at the UTSA Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

The festival will be a 15-acre showcase for the various cultures who will display their arts, crafts, music, food and games.

Ethnic groups on hand for the four day celebration will include: Anglo, Belgian, Chinese, Czech, Danish, Dutch, English, French, German, Greek, Indian, Irish, Italian, Japanese, Jewish, Lebanese, Mexican, Negro, Norwegian, Polish, Scottish, Spanish, Swedish, Swiss, Wendish, and Yugoslav.

The English will operate an authentic Pub complete with Shandygaff to drink and darts to play.

There will be a Children's Toyland, fun center for youngsters, where they can learn to make pottery or simple pioneer

toys.

Visitors to the fete get two bargains for the price of one. They can tour the floor of the Institute to see 26 exhibits of the historic contributions of major ethnic groups in Texas; see a multimedia dome show every half hour, and wander out over 15-acres of live festival fun, musical fare and old country cuisine.

The Texas Folklife Festival will feature the foods of 24 nations, offer constant entertainment on seven stages, with daily demonstrations of 53 arts and crafts and dozens of games and contests in which you can watch or participate.

More than 4,000 people from 120 Texas communities will staff the huge four day state festival. Admission is two dollars for adults and fifty cents for children. Free shuttle buses will be available from downtown parking lots to the festival, Sept. 12-15.

Rains Plentiful In August

The rains came in August, and 11.4 inches fell in Helotes—more than fell in the entire first seven months of the year, according to records kept by Henry Brauchle at his ranch here.

While San Antonio and other areas claimed a new record, this amount of rainfall was short here by more than two inches of the record August high. That is claimed for 1971 when 13.7 inches made it the wettest August here in history.

The total rainfall so far this year is 21.3 inches with 27.84 an average yearly total. Last year by

contrast had such a wet July that creeks overflowed and the water went over the spillway at Medina Lake but that August chalked up only 1.2 inches. It was 4.1 inches in 1972 for the eighth month.

September came in dry but shows signs of being cooler than usual. The Medina Lake was so near capacity that no one was taking odds the year would be completed without a new over-the-spillway statistic. Creeks and rivers took on charm throughout the Hill Country these past weeks also.

Joe Algueseva Retires From Kelly

Joe Algueseva has retired as a civilian employee effective August 30 from Kelly Air Force Base Jet Engine Division after 29 years. His active service included military duty with the 323rd Marauders Bomb Group flying B 26's in England, France, Germany and Belgium in the European Theatre of Operations during World War II.

Algueseva, who was born in Boerne, has resided 30 years in Helotes. He and his wife, Stella, are now owners of Floore Country Store, founded by John T. Floore. They have a grown son, Joe, a daughter Lydia, and a grandson in addition to other relatives in this area.

Algueseva was honored by his family and friends on the occasion of his retirement, and more festivities are being planned.

Local friends offer congratulations for a job well done and are pleased to welcome him to

the Helotes business community on a full-time basis. If he and John T. have any extra time after fishing, he is also being sought for volunteer jobs in active civic organizations here—including the Festival Assn. where he has been a working member for several years, according to a reliable source.

Krueger Opposes Sanguine In Texas

Re-affirming his opposition to Project Sanguine, Democratic congressional nominee Bob Krueger was in Llano for the annual meeting August 27 of the Texas State Committee to Stop Sanguine.

Krueger, a Hill Country native who joined the state-wide effort to stop Project Sanguine in its early stages, explained, "The countryside around Llano is just too beautiful to allow the environmental disaster that Sanguine would cause."

Referring to efforts by the U. S. Navy to build a major underground communications system in the Texas Hill Country, Krueger said, "I've talked with Senator Bentsen's (D-Tex.) office about this, and we agreed that every effort must be made to insure that Sanguine is kept out of Texas."

"I grew up in this area," Krueger continued, "and I intend to work closely with both Senator John Tower and Senator Lloyd Bentsen to see that the environment of the Hill Country is preserved."

Emphasizing that he is not opposed to the American military enhancing the nation's defense by building such an underground communication system, Krueger explained that there are "more appropriate sites than the Texas Hill Country for Project Sanguine."

Both children attend daytime classes at the Bexar County Mental Health Mental Retardation Center's Child Development Units. Each morning they eagerly await the Units' bus to stop by their house to pick them for a day of exercises, special training and games.

Angie can walk holding on to someone's hand. Her legs are very strong, but she needs a person to encourage her to try to walk by herself. Angie has a hearty appetite and eats just about any kind of regular table food. . . . she loves food so well, in fact, that sometimes she doesn't want to stop eating! She is very curious and likes to crawl on the floor discovering whatever has been left out—books, the wastepaper basket or someone else's toys. Sometimes Angie likes to sit next to Robert and babysit with him.

Robert loves music on the television or radio and will swing and dance to its rhythm, especially Mexican music! He gets up early on Saturday mornings to watch cartoons. Robert can't walk yet, but can sure crawl to get where he wants to go! But Robert needs extra special care every day because he takes colds rather easy and sometimes gets infections. Robert is very quiet but

with much love and attention, he can be very playful.

Angie and Robert learn so much every day at the Child Development Unit, but Angie and Robert need a foster family to help them grow and develop.

With the growth in tourism in this area, the restaurant is expected to keep pace. Everyone is invited to come by or call 695-8956 for reservations.

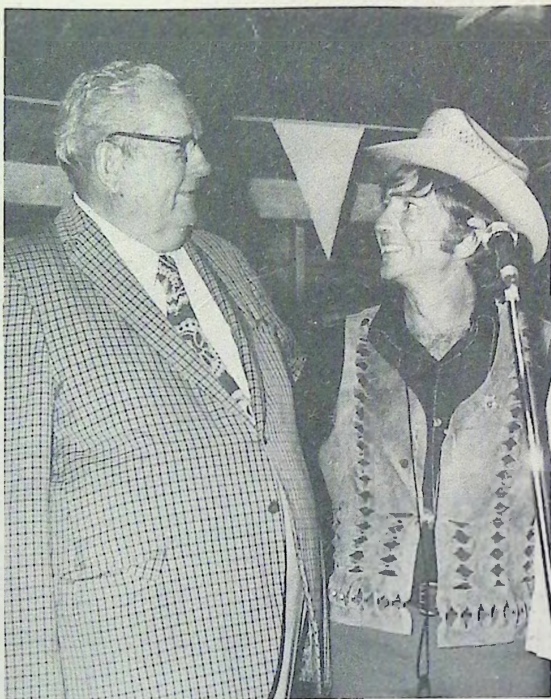

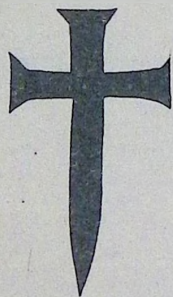
The Hill Country Fruit Market, located in a landmark rock building on the original segment of Bandera Road directly across from Helotes Park Plaza, has recently been opened by Mrs. Severiano Mireles, assisted by her husband who also has another business. Mrs. Mireles, born Andrea Bustos, whose father Joe Bustos had three stores in San Antonio, says she has always enjoyed the fruit business although she was away from it for a while running restaurants. In 1931 the Bustos family were in the fruit-grocery business at Fredericksburg Road. Later locations included Zarzamora, Broadway and Nagolitos.

In 1950's, Mrs. Mireles operated a fruit business in Bandera, Texas, also when her son was attending high school there. In 1956 she went to Wisconsin where she and Severiano Mireles were married. They opened a big Mexican restaurant there and made a success. But in 1963, because of the severity of winters there they returned to Helotes. They ran the Moonlight Inn—located at the same place as the present market. Their menu was so famous that the Dallas Morning News praised it as well as

Mr. Mireles is enthusiastic about the business although he has much other work. He plans to have a fruit delivery service to wholesale produce to restaurants from here to Fredericksburg also.

Mrs. Mireles has a son carrying on the tradition of the Mexican Restaurant business—with a popular place in Racine, Wisconsin. She says that she cannot stay away from the fruit business. The community recognizes the local growth of population by welcoming them to the growing food service business community here.

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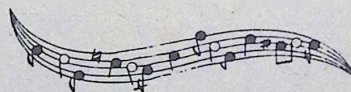

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R. Morado Dies Of Heart Attack Grange Ladies

Rumaldo Morado of John Wagner Road in Helotes died Tuesday, August 20, 1974, when he suffered a fatal heart attack while driving his car accompanied by several members of his family about 2 p.m. The automobile which was travelling on Scenic Loop was stopped by his teen-age sons who ran to summon help. Although emergency ambulances arrived promptly and worked to revive him, Mr. Morado was pronounced dead on arrival at the hospital. A well-known worker employed in building the new Highway 16 segment from 410 to Scenic Loop, he was 60 years old.

He had been in the community for several years and worked in the area as a laborer.

According to his family, he had recently suffered an earlier attack for which he had been hospitalized. He was on the way to his doctor's office accompanied by his wife, a daughter and sons at the time of his death, although he was not ill.

He is survived by his widow, Maria Morado; sons, Juan, Tony, Rumaldo and Robert Morado, and daughters, Angelita, Andrea, Juanita and Mary Lou Morado, and Roman Rios and Della Gonzalez.

He is survived by his mother Librada Morado; brothers Manuel, Barron, Isidoro, Donicio and Augustin Morado; sisters, Victoria Morado, Bruna Alonzo, Tomasa Espinoza, Sara and Rosa Morado.

Rosary was recited Thursday evening, August 22, at the Rodriguez Chapel. Funeral Mass was said by Rev. Louis A. Trawalter, S.M. at Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church with burial in the Helotes Catholic Cemetery, on Friday, August 23.

Mr. Morado was a good worker who was interested in bringing up his family to be useful citizens. He was noted for his courtesy as well, and the community has felt sympathy for his family and a desire to help them adjust to his loss. Business courses are generally \$5 for tuition; auto mechanics at Jay only will be \$15.

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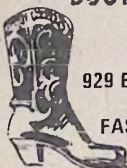

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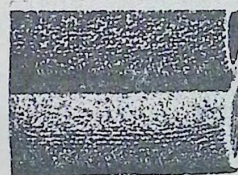
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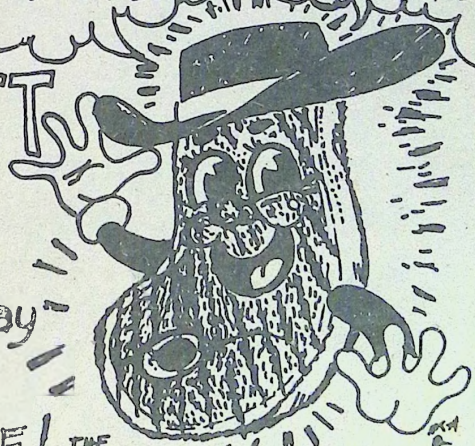
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
