## MARSHALL STOCK SHOW TO OPEN JAN 24



### Auction Set For Saturday At Show Barn

The Marshall Show Barn at Gerlach Memorial Field, located on Babcock Road, will be the setting for the 7th Annual Marshall Livestock Show & Sale, Jan. 24-26, with 250 students from John Marshall High School's Future Farmers, as well as 4-H Clubs in the Northside District participating. Included also for the first time this year will be members of the 4H Club of the Mexican Baptist Children's Home. The new 4H unit is in the Northside District, making the group eligible to participate.

Judging begins Thursday, Jan. 24, and the auction is scheduled for Saturday afternoon. Events are free and open to the public. More than 600 livestock entries will be judged and scored during the three-day event. Sales at the Bexar County Junior Livestock Show this month totalled \$194,000, reflecting much interest in livestock grown by youth of the area.

Marshall High School is unique in having a setting for its own show, and the Gerlach Field and Marshall Show Barn are popular with the public. If the weather is good, all attendance records should be broken. The barn is comfortable regardless, and weather is not expected to deter the serious buyers who look forward to this show each year. Auctioneer will be Bryan Stacy. Entertainment will be provided by the popular C & W band George Chambers and the Country Gentlemen. There will be food concessions on the grounds also.

Officers of the various clubs involved have put in hours of work as have individual contestants.

Marshall agricultural teachers include C. E. Vickery, Joey Tomlinson, Steve Chumbley, and Robert Keaton, and they will have a large part in the success of the show.

According to Tomlinson, pre-registered entries include 30 steers, 225 market swine, 75 market lambs, 32 market broilers, 16 market turkeys, 20 market rabbits, and 250 breeding rabbits. These total 648 entries.

The show opens Thursday morning. Judging begins at 2 p.m. that day with market poultry entries being considered. On Friday, Jan. 25, market lambs will be judged beginning at 8 a.m. followed by market rabbits. Swine judging Friday begins at 1 p.m., and the

## Ranch Town Gets Okay

Directors of the Edwards Underground Water District have voted to support San Antonio Ranch New Town's application to the Texas Department of Water Resources for a waste-water discharge permit.

After assuring themselves that the new treatment plant proposed by the developers would pose no threat to the Edwards Aquifer recharge zone, the 15-member board voted to support the issuance of the permit on the condition that the development's utility district provide the EUWD with a copy of each monitoring report required by the TDWR which has primary monitoring responsibility.

Thomas P. Fox, EUWD general manager, told the board in its bi-monthly meeting in the Tower Life Building the treatment facility will be constructed 2.3 miles north of the recharge zone in two stages. The first stage, he said, would be for a capacity of 96,000 gallons per day, with the second stage to bring the volume to 192,000 gpd, sufficient to serve 565 homes.

Currently, he said, raw wastewater is hauled from the development across the recharge zone for treatment at another location.

Fox said the proposed facility would eliminate hauling of un-

treated wastewater across the recharge zone and also pointed out that the wastewater will be

used after treatment to irrigate 25 acres of Coastal Bermuda grass.

## Trailwalk Set For Area

The City of Grey Forest and the Texas Wanderers of San Antonio will sponsor the first International Grey Forest Trailwalk on March 8-9.

Several thousand are expected to take part in the event sanctioned by International People's Sports—USA. There will be two trails—a shorter one through Grey forest itself and a

longer one through the nearby countryside. Numerous awards and trophies will be given.

## Area Wells Record Quake

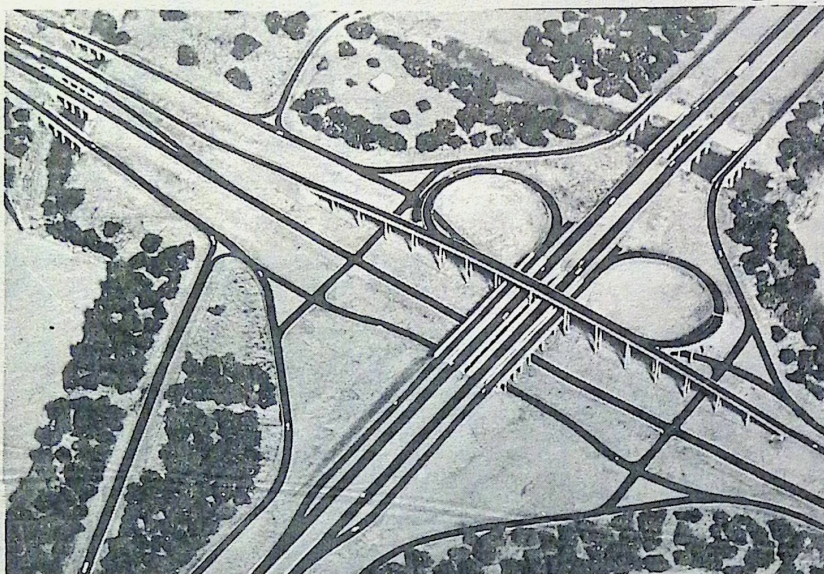
The Edwards Aquifer recorded another earthquake in December. This one was the powerful Columbia-Ecuador quake that struck at 1:59 a.m. (CST) Dec. 12 and registered 7.5 on the Richter Scale. Thomas P. Fox, general manager of the Edwards Underground Water District, said charts taken from the district's water well check stations recorded an up-and-down movement of about six inches each way in the water levels about 2:15 a.m. that same date.

Shock waves from other major quakes have been recorded over the years, including the destructive quake in Mexico last year, Fox said.

## Loop 1604 and IH-10 Interchange



This is the way the new interchange at Loop 1604 and IH-10, now under construction, will look when completed next summer. IH-10 enters the picture at top right, coming from Boerne. Loop 1604 runs from lower right to top left. The north lanes of Loop 1604 will go over IH-10 and the south lanes will go under IH-10. The University of Texas at San Antonio is off the picture to the left. The site of the new building for University National Bank, also under construction, is in the lower left side of the picture. Two exit ramps — half a cloverleaf — will take northbound traffic — from San Antonio — onto westbound Loop 1604, and westbound Loop 1604 traffic onto the southbound lanes of IH-10. This model of the interchange was developed by the Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation.

## Homestead Forms Due

Northside School District homeowners have until April 30 to sign and return Homestead Tax Exemption forms mailed by the school Tax Office last week.

Although NISD Tax Assessor Collector John White does not anticipate many questions this year—since homeowners did the same thing last January—he says "Of about 30,000 taxpayers we think are eligible, we have addresses for only 24,000. The other 6,000 homeowners need to contact us by telephone so we can mail out their forms."

According to the Homestead Exemption law which went into effect last year, homeowners must declare that the property is their legal home by signing and returning—in person or by mail—the form to the NISD tax office. The taxpayer will then qualify for a \$5,000 tax exemption. The law also states that the form must be signed every year. People who bought property since last January will be completing the forms for the first time.

NISD is also mailing exemption forms to taxpayers who are over 65 years old or

who qualify under the law as disabled veterans. Both groups of people qualify for additional tax breaks. Over-65 and homestead forms are combined. The disabled veteran form is a separate item of paperwork.

Taxpayers who do not receive the forms automatically—because they were misplaced in the mail or because their property is too new or because they are still using a temporary address—are asked to furnish NISD with the legal description of their property when requesting the exemption forms.

For thousands of school district homeowners, the procedure is simple: Fill out the form verifying that you are living in the "homestead" and return it by mail or in person to the NISD Tax Office by April 30.

## State Monitors Future Water Resources Edwards Flow To Be Controlled

The Texas Department of Water Resources has developed a ground water resources management tool that can be used in total water-resources management programs for the Nueces, San Antonio, and Guadalupe-Blanco River basins.

Available to the public, a published report of this development also details the occurrence of the Edwards aquifer in the San Antonio region and the availability and dependability of the aquifer's water supplies.

Scope of the aquifer report is directed primarily toward the relation of the amount of ground-water withdrawals to the spring flows.

That would be the relation of the amount of water pumped from the Edwards aquifer by wells supplying the city of San Antonio and eight counties in the region to spring flows at natural discharge points of the aquifer, the San Marcos Springs, Comal Springs in New Braunfels, San Antonio and San Pedro Springs in San Antonio, and Leona River Springs near Uvalde.

Evaluation is made of the long-term effects of pumpage and recharge on the aquifer.

In the report, future predictions are made of spring flows and regional water levels under varying hydrologic and pumping conditions of the aquifer.

The predictions are made through the developed ground-water management tool, a digital computer mathematical model of the Edwards aquifer.

Integrating historical geologic and hydrologic data with new collections of data from the field, digital computer techniques are used to simulate water levels and spring flows based on the physical constants of the system and on the recharge and pumpage rates for the aquifer.

The report recommends that water resources managers, hydrologists, and others make use of the responses of the high-speed digital model. The Department is able to answer

questions by using the model response to obtain needed information.

The Edwards aquifer model stores voluminous complex hydrological data and is able to rapidly analyze many alternative management plans. Predicting aquifer response to alternative development plans and pumpage rates can be used in selecting the best management plan.

The recommendation notes that sound ground-water resources development and management decisions concerning the Edwards aquifer must be based on the geohydrology, water demands, and the aquifer response to many alternative plans of operation.

Copies of the report are available without charge from the Texas Department of Water Resources, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711. Report number is 239 and the title is "Ground-Water Resources and Model Applications for the Edwards (Balcones Fault Zone) Aquifer in the San Antonio Region."

Digital computer simulation of the Edwards aquifer in the San Antonio region for the period of 1972 through 2049 indicates the following conditions:

Ignoring any water-quality constraints, the aquifer is capable of meeting projected demands through the year 2049.

Natural flow of Comal and San Marcos Springs will cease before the year 2020, if projected pumpage in the region occurs at predicted rates.

There is sufficient storage in the Edwards aquifer to allow spring flow of Comal and San Marcos Springs to be replaced by augmentation pumpage through the year 2020. (Water can be pumped from the aquifer and then released downstream from the springs to maintain stream flow.)

The drought-flood sequence of the 1950's was introduced at various points in the simulation and produced only minor effects when compared to the

long-term simulation of the aquifer.

The addition of currently proposed artificial recharge does not result in appreciable increase in the aquifer's available water.

Strategically located dams serve as recharge structures by capturing and then slowly releasing flood waters of streams that naturally recharge the aquifer through infiltration.

The Edwards aquifer, in the Balcones fault zone, is a vital source of water to the San Antonio region. It yields large quantities of water due to its extensive honeycombed and cavernous nature. Its transmissibility ranges from less than 1,000 gallons per day per foot in the outcrop to over 20 million gallons per day per foot in the highly transmissive artesian zone within Bexar and Comal counties.

Large localized withdrawals of ground water occur in the aquifer. However, the aquifer's response is in terms of regional water-level fluctuations due primarily to its high transmissibility which allows large volumes of water to move over wide areas to points of discharge.

The portion of the Edwards aquifer extends approximately 175 miles from near Brackettville in Kinney County eastward to Kyle in Hays County and varies in width from five to 40 miles in the study region.

The area covered by the report is referred to as the San Antonio region. Boundaries coincide with the hydrologic boundaries of the Edwards aquifer in Atascosa, Bexar, Comal, Guadalupe, Hays, Kinney, Medina, and Uvalde Counties. The San Antonio region is located within the Nueces, San Antonio, and Guadalupe-Blanco River basins.

One of the many tables in the report contains projections of annual pumpage by counties from the Edwards aquifer for 1975-2049. Extensive aquifer simulations based on projected conditions are described in the report text and are shown in graphic illustrations.

Recharge of the Edwards aquifer to a lesser extent occurs by direct infiltration of precipitation on the outcrop and by lateral underflow from the Glen Rose Formation.

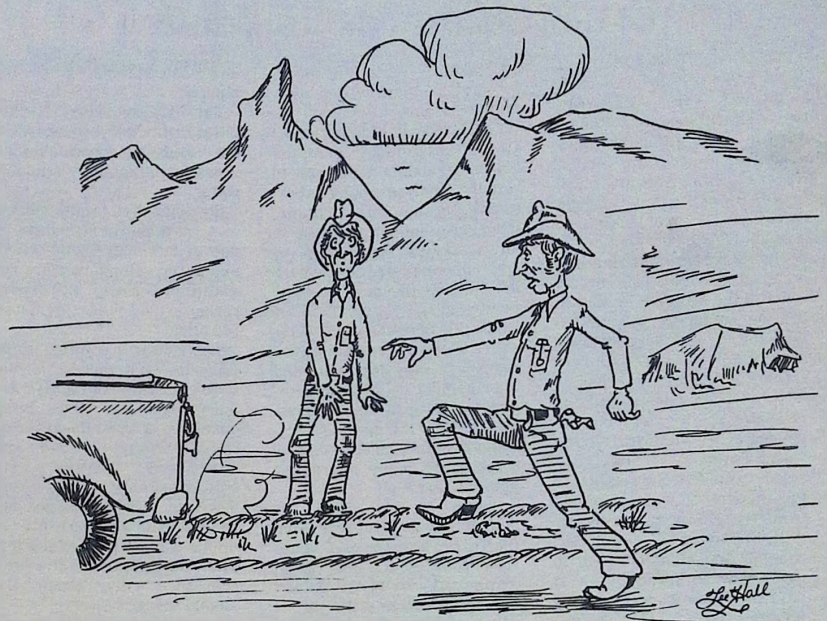

## Widening Set For Marbach

The State Department of Highways has announced a bid opening this month for improvements to Marbach Road.

Marbach Road will be widened into a 4-lane facility with a continuous left turn lane between IH-410 and Hunt Lane. Curbs and sidewalks will be added and major storm sewer drainage systems will be installed along Marbach and under IH-410 to handle high volume rainfall run-off.

## PTA Hears Jim Kazen

James D. Kazen, president of the Center for Educational Development in San Antonio, was the speaker for the January meeting of the Helotes PTA Thursday night.

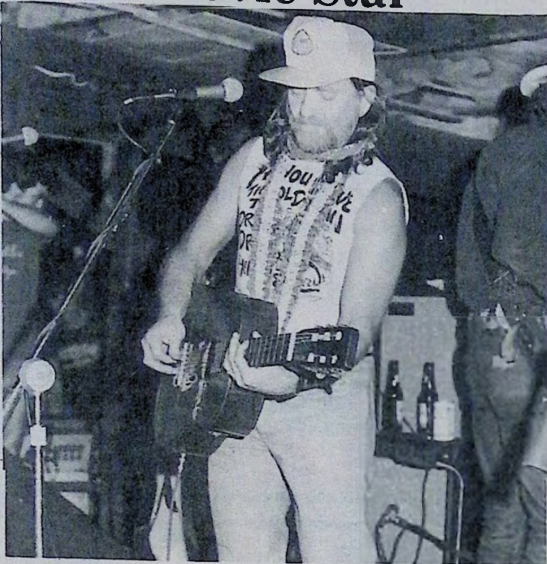

The new Mustang coach, a native of Phillips, Texas, played quarterback and halfback in junior college in Lawton, Oklahoma and at New Mexico State University, Los Cruces, N.M., where he earned B.S. and Master's degrees in education.

Henderson and his wife, Fid, have two sons and a daughter, all of whom are coaches in Texas high schools. The new Mustang coach replaces Doug James who resigned to taking a coaching job in Hobbs, New Mexico.

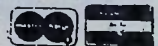
