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A once-familiar scene will come to life this weekend as cowboys "round'em up and head'em out" on a Longhorn drive from Helotes heading northwest 30 miles to Bandera.

The Longhorns are from the YO Ranch of Mountain Home and the Hicks Ranch of Bandera, among others.

Sponsored by the City of Bandera, the event will raise money for the March of Dimes during its 50th anniversary of birth defect prevention and research.

The Longhorn cattle - 40 head plus 25 roping steers - will be brought to Helotes today, Thursday, Oct. 20, and penned in the pasture at Bandera Road and Scenic Loop.

A party and dance will be held at Floore Country Store tonight with music by Clay Blaker and the Texas Honkytonk Band.

On Friday morning at 9 a.m. a trailhead ceremony will be held in front of Floore Store, featuring officials from Helotes, Bandera, San Antonio and Bexar County. The March of Dimes child ambassadors also will attend.

Radio Station Y-100, one of the co-sponsors of the cattle drive, will broadcast from Floore's Friday morning beginning at 6:30 a.m.

The drive will stop for lunch at Pete's Cafe in San Geronimo and then go on to Kelley's Shamrock near Pipe Creek for the night stop. A barbecue and dance will be held at Kelley's Shamrock with music by Blaine Keith and Sundown.

The lunch stop Saturday will be at McCall's Flea Market west of Pipe Creek.

Loop 1604 To Be Widened

The proposed improvement of Loop 1604 in northwest Bexar County has been cleared for detailed plan preparation. The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation made the recent

The project, which extends from one mile west of Interstate 10 to one mile west of Texas 16 (Bandera Highway), will expand the existing facility into a four lane divided highway with continuous frontage roads. Overpasses are planned for John Peace Drive, Chase Hill Boulevard, Babcock Road, the proposed extension of Tezel Road, and Hausman Road.

The clearance came from the Federal Highway Administration, based upon completion of the public hearing process. A public hearing was held June 23 at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

As soon as plan work is completed the project will be scheduled for construction. The project's estimated cost is \$15,143,000. It is anticipated to be contracted in early 1990

UTSA Researcher Wins Award

Research on a device that can detect toxic substances has earned a researcher from The University of Texas at San Antonio a special award from the U.S. Army. Dr. James P. Chambers, an associate professor in the Division of Life Sciences, is one of only five scientists nationwide to receive a Distinguished Service Award in 1988.

Brig. Gen. Peter D. Hidalgo, commander of the U.S. Army Chemical Research, Development and Engineering Center, presented the award to Chambers Monday. Chambers' award honors his

Chambers' award honors his efforts to develop a system known as a biosensor which can detect toxic substances using certain proteins contained in the brain of humans and animals. These proteins, called receptors, are located on the surface of nerve cell membranes. When the receptors are exposed to various types of toxins, the toxins bind to them, triggering various chemical reactions.

The Army is concerned about the dangers of chemical and biological weapons, and hopes that Chambers' work will lead to the development of receptors capable of identifying poisons on the battlefield.

Chambers said the Army is also very intersted in potential peacetime uses for biosensors.

Although the receptors that Chambers uses in his research chiefly react to neurotoxins, he anticipates that other types of receptors could be isolated for medical purposes such as diagnosing certain diseases. For example, insulin-sensitive receptors could be used to monitor sugar levels in the bloodstream, alerting diabetics when they need insulin or even triggering special equipment to automatically administer the necessary dose of insulin. Other receptors may be found that react to pre-cancerous proteins in cells, enabling early detection and treatment of cancer.

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



Physician Assignment

There are many advantages to using Medicare "participating" physicians. First, your responsibility is lunited to 20 percent of Medicare's "reasonable charge," because the doctor is not allowed to charge you addi-tional fees-or "balance bill" you.

Second, the physician submits claims to Medicare for you To be "participating" means the doctor ac-

cepts assignment on 100 percent of Medicare patients' claims. Even if physicians accept Roosevelt assignment on some claims, they're called "non-participating." If your doctor is a non-participating physician and he or she does not agree to accept assignment in your case, you'll probably be charged additional fees over the 20 percent copayment. Few supplementary private insurance plans cover these balance bills. Another negative is that you often are required to file your own claims. If they're denied, it is up to you to appeal rather than your doctor.

Although it's estimated physicians will balance bill beneficiaries by over \$3 billion in 1988, the Administration does not think assignment should be mandatory. Instead, it has implemented, a voluntary program offering incentives to doctors to become participating physicians. So far, this program has had little visible impact. About 22 states have introduced legislation in the last few years and four have passed some form of mandatory assignment-Massachusetts having the most comprehensive law so far.


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Free Air Trips Set For Seniors

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About Investments

Q. I've been reading lately about the investment people getting in trouble after dealing with "junk" bonds. An investment advisor has been trying to convince me to buy a mutual fund that invests in junk bonds, but everything in the news scares me. Should I stay away from the fund?

A. As is often the case in the investment world, the use of one term - in this instance, "junk" bond in a broad sense makes things a little confusing.

A bond that has a rating of BB or lower from the major rating agencies is considered a junk bond; such bonds are perhaps more appropriately known as high yield bonds. These bonds are issued by companies that do not have a long history of sales or earnings, or by companies with uncertain credit strength. Recently, you've heard about junk bonds being issued to finance some corporate takeovers; in most of these cases, the bonds have received low ratings because it is unclear whether the assets of the company being taken over would be sufficient enough to finance the bond offering.

In any case, so-called "junk" bonds offer higher yields than investment grade bonds - because they are riskier and their prices are more volatile. It's the old story; you assume higher risk for a higher potential reward.

A number of income-oriented mutual funds have such bonds in their portfolio. These funds sometimes offer higher yields than funds holding primarily investment grade bonds, but their share prices also may be more volatile and their principal more at risk.

Investment policies differ from fund to fund, but with many of them, high yield bonds comprise only a portion of the fund's portfolio, and even then, the fund may hold only those high yield bonds that the fund's manager considers to be relatively low-risk. In addition, many funds can switch to bonds with higher ratings during periods when high yield bonds may be especially risky (such as when the economy is in a recession or growing slowly).

Still, an investment in a high-yield bond fund is not for everyone. Your financial advisor should explain to you the specific risks involved in investing in such a fund, and you can decide whether the fund would fit in your personal investment portfolio. Q. Please explain the difference between a mutual fund with a load and one with no load.

A. The difference seems to be getting more and more complicated, but it's an important difference.

A mutual fund with a "load" is one that has a sales charge, usually taken out when you purchase shares in the fund. In the past few years, 'rear-end load" funds also have become popular; these funds impose a deferred sales charge that you pay when you redeem your shares. Rear-end loads are usually charged on a sliding scale, with the fee normally dropping one percent a year; if you own the fund for more than five years, the charge is eliminated.

We should not generalize, however, because there is a wide variety of ways that mutual funds calculate sales charges, depending, among other things, on whether you make a lump sum investment or purchase shares over a period of time. The most common charge is around five percent, although charges can legally be higher. Always check a fund's prospectus carefully to determine the load, and ask your financial planner to explain it to you.

"No-load" funds, as you might have guessed, do not impose a sales charge. It would seem that you would be better off not paying a sales charge, but the decision is not always that easy.

In many cases, no-load funds are purchased directly from a fund company, with no contact with an individual representative from the company. This may be fine for the investor who is willing and able to make his or her own investment decisions. On the other hand, load funds are often distributed by companies that, as part of your purchase, offer the services or a representative or financial planner who can help guide your investment decisions, both before and after the initial sale. Whether that financial expertise is important to you is an individual decision.

One final word. The sales charge is not the only charge involved when buying shares in a mutual funds, be sure to compare the charges above and beyond the sales loads.

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

John Holmgreen is a native of San Antonio, He began his career with Alamo Iron Works in 1942 after graduation from Southern Methodist University. He was



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



Swedish Exhibit To Open Oct. 25

Sweden visited Texas to honor the

contributions of Swedish Texans

and to observe the 150th annivers-

ary of the arrival of the first

Swedish settler in Texas.

"Sweden and America 1638 — 1988: A History Celebrated" will be on display at The University of Texas Institute of Texan Cultures from Oct. 25 through Dec. 11.


The exhibit, which documents the contributions Swedes, Swedish immigrants and Swedish Americans have made to America, consists of 12 large panels with photographs and text on both sides, with information on the New Sweden colony founded in 1638 in what is now Delaware, the immigration period and the present-day relationship between Sweden and America.

Approximately 1.25 million Swedes immigrated to the United States between the Civil War and World War I, according to the Swedish Council of America. The first Swedish settler in Texas, Sven Mangum Swenson, arrived in 1838. 



Bids Due On Engineering Building

The University of Texas System Board of Regents has approved the final plans and specifications for the new engineering building at The University of Texas at San Antonio at a total project cost of \$12.9 million

The Board of Regents also voted to approve the use of \$12,020,000 from the Permanent University Fund bond proceeds for project. funding.
