

INDIAN RELICS AND THEIR STORY by Hugh C. Rogers. Fort Smith Arkansas: published by the author.

Few hill-country households have no arrowheads or other Indian artifacts lying about some-

where, in a drawer or a box.

This book, a handbook for collectors, gives a lot of simple, straightforward no-nonsense information about such items. Rogers devised a system of classifi-cation of arrowheads and gives unmistakable guidelines for clas-sifying at least 28 different kinds.

He also discusses manufacture; drills and scrapers; tomahawks and chisels; fishhooks and gigs; and, most curious of them all, the "ceremonials."

He also treats of bead and bone objects; metal objects; and tex-tiles. He also includes an impor-tant chapter on fakes. A fas-cinating book—especially for the amateur—with dozens of photo-graphs as well as drawings.— -JOHN IGO

THE HISTORY OF THE GERMAN SETTLEMENTS IN TEXAS, 1831-1861, by Rudolph Bicsele. Published by the author.

A reissue of the 1930 work by e University of Texas professor, the University of Texas professor, this book remains the only worth-while book on the subject. It is comprehensive and sound. It includes along with photos, maps, a wealth of supporting information. It deals with at least 27 communities including New Braunfels, Fredericksburg, Sisteralla, Bernerent Confert.



Voters Okay School Bonds

Northside residents voted May 25 overwhelming approval of an \$11.2 million bond issue for improvement and expansion of existing school facilities and con-

truction of several new schools.

The bond issue was divided into three propositions with the first providing for 89 million in first providing for \$9 million in new construction and additions to existing facilities. An additional 151 new classrooms will be built so that each of the three existing highschools; Marshall, Jay, and Holmes, will be brought to a total student capacity of 3,000 by 1970. On the junior high level, classroom additions will be built at Neff and Rayburn Junior High Schools, and new junior high schools will be built in the southwest and northeast sections of the district.

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
