Person-to-Person

The Third Century—as history buffs have dubbed 1977—1 AB—after the Bicentennial—came in with a bang here. All dance places were sold out. Parties were everywhere—and a rumble from metropolitan San Antonio reminded the military of the Battle of Britain. It was only fireworks—which went without major mishap here, anyway.

The Helotes Ballet Folklorico dancers are still talking about their recent triumphant appearances in Dallas at festivities there including three performances and a parade. Their trip was made possible in part through the donations of Joseph Montemayor, Attorney in Dallas, and Marcanos of Dallas as well as Sociedad Cultural Mexicano of Dallas. Ronald McDonald also gifted them with a free meal there at McDonald's. They will be active in Festival here this Spring.

Parties were given by so many organizations that the spirit was carried into homes—and relatives who haven't spoken in years got together despite the fog and rainy weather in the Hill Country to watch the marathon bowl games and speak of the Second Century's accomplishments.

Most notable were the groups who helped others. In Bexar County, 40,000 packages were given by the Salvation Army. Right here, many gathered for those less fortunate.

A family from this area was helped by joint efforts of church groups, the VFW, Helotes Women's Club, and 4-H club-members, to name a few.

The Ram Band made it and everyone thought the moment of glory on television as well as the 200 or more happy memories worth every bit of the time and \$58,000 expended.

Fur Buyer Explains The Trade

While others were enjoying holidays, John Frank Shaddix, 28-year-old junior partner in the D & W Fur Company, the largest fur buying company in Texas with headquarters in Hallettsville, was travelling 18 hours a day throughout the State. He sometimes logs 750 miles a day in his '76 pickup—he told the San Angelo Standard-Times recently, and covers as many as 14 towns for his six-year-old company.

He is going to keep up this schedule during January as well. He stops every Thursday to buy furs in San Geronimo at Pete's Place from 2 p.m. to 2:30 p.m. He then comes to Helotes to Floore Country Store from 2:45 to 3 p.m. to deal with the local trappers. At one stop Jan. 6, he paid \$26 for a grey fox pelt and as much as \$20 for well-furred coyotes. At another he paid \$37 for a red fox. He has given \$22 for good coons with size and black and silver color, with the average about \$16 to \$18.

He moves on to New Braunfels, Texas to Y Rectors Cafe each Thursday from 4 p.m. to 5 p.m.

He said here yesterday that he has spent \$25,000 in Bexar County alone buying furs, since Dec. 1 when he started off the fur season paying \$16 the first day for coons.

Shaddix says that he enjoys personally covering one-third of the State of Texas. He meets conservationists everywhere and he puts up a strong argument for the fur trader, explaining that he feels the profit motive is an incentive to control predators who would have to be destroyed some other way or would destroy livestock or harm children if overpopulated.

In the San Angelo area where bobcats and coyotes are a definite threat to sheep and goat ranching, Keith Carpenter, district supervisor in charge of government trapping, has said there is a predator problem, he reported.

Shaddix reported also that two of the oldest sheep ranchers in Pecos County have gone out of business after losing so many lambs to bobcats and coyotes.

He prefers steel leg-hold traps, because it is the only sure method of snaring bobcats.

He adds the conibear traps backed by humanitarians—which kill animals instantly—are not practical for most trappers who make their runs one time a day. He said pelts

would spoil unless they are checked every few hours.

He also opposes poisoning as a control measure.

Last year, the fur-buying

San Antonio Tax Year Dates May Be Changed

San Antonio Voters go to the Polls on Saturday, Jan. 15, to vote yes or no for Proposition One.

At present, all nine members of City Council are elected from the city at large. The proposed changes would require the election of 10 members from individual districts and the mayor at large. Each member would be a resident of his district.

Proponents of single member districting say campaign cost of those individuals running for office would be lower. They also say it would provide representation for minorities. In addition, single member districting holds each council member directly responsible to the voters of his or her own district. Furthermore, city government would be more accessible to its citizens because each councilman would be closer to his constituents.

Opponents of single member districting say it would cause a tendency for provincialism which would result in poor representation of city-wide interests. Also they say the system would cause vote trading, and favor-giving would be more possible. Furthermore, because fair alignment of district lines seem almost an impossibility, gerrymandering may occur. In addition, the voter's influence is confined to a single councilman.

The election being held in January is a result of the Justice Department's objection to the dilution of the ethnic voting strength in San Antonio due to Annexation.

The city of San Antonio is proposing to change its tax and fiscal year, also.

The proposal would amend the city charter to change the tax year and the fiscal year. The tax year would be changed to January 1 through December 31 and the fiscal year to October 1 through September 30. Both changes would be made in one or more stages. The proposal would also authorize any necessary borrowing for financing during the transition period and the levy of a sufficient tax to pay interest thereon and to provide the required sinking fund.

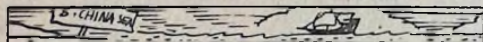
1977 Cowboy Capitol Trail Queen

Stock Show Adds 10th Trail Ride

A total of 10 trail rides will be out publicizing the 1977 San Antonio Stock Show and Rodeo in February, according to A.J. Ploch, Trail Ride General Chairman.

For the past several years the show sponsored nine rides from as many divergent points. However, Ploch explained, the trail bosses voted at their last meeting to accept the application of the Mesquite Trail Riders and include them as a sanctioned ride for 1977.

The ride begins in Bastrop and will meet with the other nine rides at Joe Freeman Coliseum for an official welcoming ceremony, Thurs., Feb. 10, the day prior to the official opening of the 28th annual show.

The Mesquite Trail Ride has been organized for several years and participated in the annual Western Parade, but until this year they were not sanctioned by the show, according to Ploch.

The original nine rides include the Texas Trail Ride from Columbus, now in its 23rd year; the South Texas Trail Ride from Corpus Christi, in its 18th year; the Six Flags of Texas Trail Ride from Victoria, in its 16th year; the Old Chisholm Trail Ride from Cuero, in its 16th year; the Alamo Trail Ride from Camp Wood, in its 15th year; the Central Texas Trail Ride from Hutto, in its 14th year; the Hill Country Trail Ride from Stonewall, in its 12th year; and, the Cowboy Capitol Trail Ride from Bandera, in its 8th year.

Each year, about a week prior to the opening of the annual Stock Show, these rides assemble at their starting points and ride a

total of more than 1,000 miles, visiting nearly 100 towns and cities in South Texas.

The main purpose of the rides is to generate Stock Show interest in

outlying communities and to invite South Texas citizens to visit the 10-day San Antonio Show. The 1977 show will run from Feb. 11 through Feb. 20.

1976 Rainfall Tallies 54.8

New Year's Eve which had a threat of snow, according to weather forecasters, came in and went out dry—but that didn't keep 1976 from chalking up a whopping rainfall total of 54.8 inches. While not the rainiest year ever recorded here, according to Henry Brauchle, local weather observer, it did about double the average annual rainfall.

December had 2.7 inches of rain which fell in mists and fogs and short rainfalls, giving the month a colder than average record several days and actually breaking some records set long ago.

Rainfall in the early days of January indicate little chance of drouth conditions here. There have been individual reports of occasional snowflakes, but none remained visible in any amount throughout the holidays, or into the New Year.

S.S. Benefits Aid Students

Social security benefits paid students over 18 total more than all U.S. scholarships combined, according to Gilbert G. Gonzalez, social security district manager in San Antonio.

Such benefits, based on the work record of a retired, disabled, or deceased parent, are paid to unmarried full-time students ages 18-22, Gonzalez explained. He said that one out of every 14 students in the U.S. receive such benefits.

"Students 18 and older receive their own benefits and are personally responsible for reporting changes in their status," Gonzalez said.

He reminded such beneficiaries of the need to report marriage, earnings, changes in schools, leaving school, attending less than full-time, and being paid by an employer to attend school.

"Timely reports are necessary to ensure prompt and correct payment," Gonzalez said. He added that failure to report changes could result in overpayments which the students would have to repay.

Edible Receipts

The following recipe first published by the ECHO in 1968 has been requested so often that we are offering it for a 1977 special. Turkey is in good supply and this recipe makes buying it worthwhile.

If you can't resist cooking a truly big turkey for holidays, but tire of serving cold turkey leftovers—try this gourmet recipe. It can be stretched to fit any size crowd—works great for an open house—and it will win for you all kinds of praise.

Turkey Chow Mein or Chop Suey

Dice or cube the turkey and measure by cupfuls to determine proportions. The following may be divided or multiplied to suit: For 4 cups cooked turkey—to serve 10-12—use the following:

- 4 cups Turkey—cubed or diced
- (This may be stretched by adding any amount of cubed cooked pork).
- 4 tablespoons butter or fat
- 3 cups (about half-dozen) finely chopped onions—white preferred.
- 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- 4 cups thinly sliced celery
- 4 cups consommé or turkey broth
- 4 tablespoons cornstarch (flour may be substituted)
- 6 tablespoons soy sauce

Add variety of Chinese Vegetables

(2 cups vegetables to 4 cups turkey)

Two #2 cans mixed Chinese Vegetables or

- 1 can above plus
- 1 can mushrooms
- 2 cans water chestnuts
- Also one of these:
- 2 cans fried noodles
- 1 platter white rice

Directions

Brown the turkey lightly in butter in fry pan or Dutch oven. Then add celery, onions, pepper, and broth. Cover. Cook until vegetables are tender.

Add drained Chinese vegetables, mushrooms. Bring to boil. Remove from fire.

Mix cornstarch into soy sauce. Add this to hot mixture, stirring constantly. Simmer about two minutes until slightly thickened.

Place on large—preferably deep platter and encircle with rice and/or noodles. For a party, garnish with toasted slivered almonds and green olives.

Serve Chinese tea bread sticks...and plenty of soy sauce.

Flawn Named Adviser

UTSA President Dr. Peter T. Flawn has been named to the Interior Coal Advisory Committee by Interior Secretary Thomas S. Kleppe.

The committee was appointed

to help increase production and use of coal consistent with the nation's mine safety and environmental goals.

In announcing the appointment in Washington, Kleppe commented, "President Ford has directed his administration to help boost coal production in both the East and the West to reduce dependence on foreign energy sources. The members of this advisory committee will provide depth of experience and insight to assist us in these efforts."

The committee will function independently of the Department of the Interior's Advisory Committee on Coal Mine Safety Research and the Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Advisory Committee on Coal Mine Health Research, Kleppe said.

Dr. Flawn has served as President of UTSA since 1973. He holds a Ph.D. degree in geology from Yale University and for many years has played an important role in national and state efforts to learn more about the earth and its resources.

From 1960 to 1970 Dr. Flawn was Director of the Bureau of Economic Geology at UT Austin. He is a past president of the Association of American State Geologists and is a former director of the American Geological Institute.

He was elected to the prestigious National Academy of Engineering in 1974 and in 1976 was named to the National Petroleum Council.

Former St. Mary's Univ. President Dies At 63

Rev. Louis J. Blume, SM— who served as president of St. Mary's University in San Antonio for a total of 16 years—died Jan. 2, 1977 in St. Louis.

Father Blume, who was convalescing from a heart attack suffered in October, was 63.

At the time of his death he was assistant pastor of Our Lady of the Pillar Parish in Creve Coeur, St. Louis.

Father Blume was first named president of St. Mary's University in 1947 when he was 34 years old. At that time he was one of the youngest university presidents in the nation.

He completed his first term as StMU president in 1953 and was transferred to other assignments in the St. Louis Province of the Society of Mary and, eventually, to the headmastership of the Villa St. Jean International School in Fribourg, Switzerland.

Father Blume was re-appointed president of the San Antonio university in 1963 and served in that post until 1973.

Father Blume, who was ordained to the priesthood in 1945, entered the Society of Mary in 1931. He held a BS Degree in education from the University of Dayton and an MA Degree from Catholic University of America.

Interment was in Maryhurst

Cemetery, Kirkwood, Mo.

Father Blume was well-known in Helotes as administrator of St. Mary's University. He was also occasionally—over the years—celebrant of Masses at Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church here. The local parish at its present location for a quarter of a century has been served by clergy belonging to the Society of Mary based at St. Mary's University.

To all who knew Father Blume and will miss him, sympathy is extended. His memory will endure in his encouraging of the growth of education at a great University, and his encouraging of religious growth in everyday life and especially in the Helotes area.

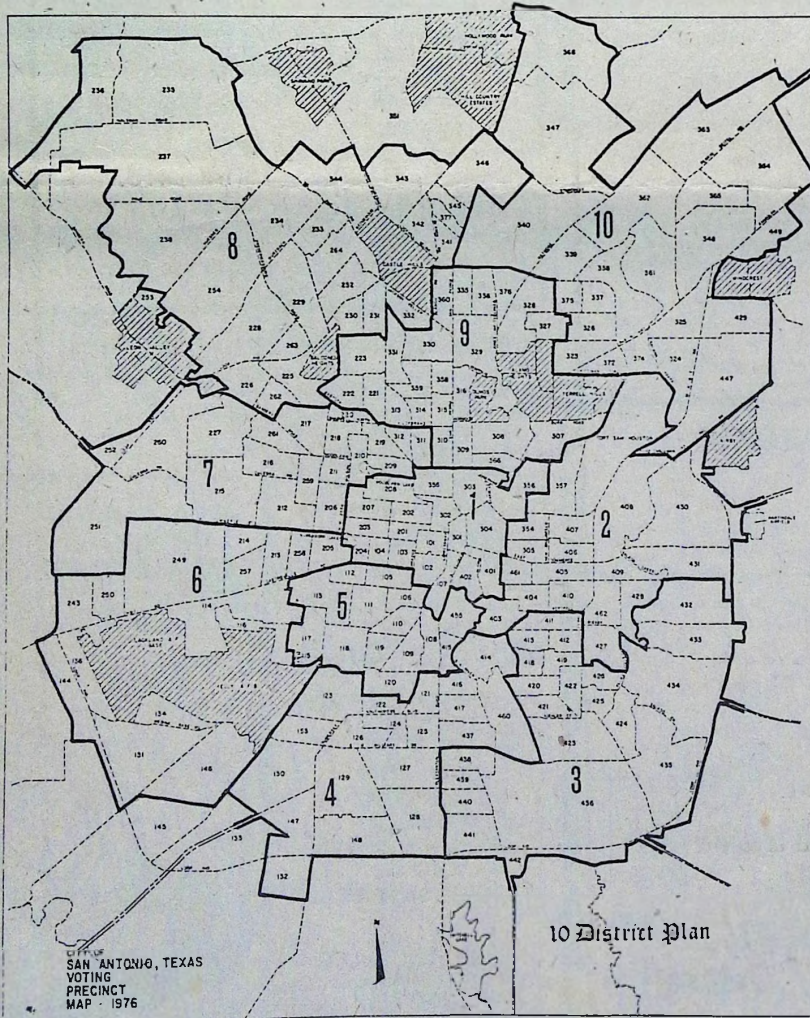

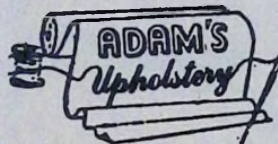

business— in 22 Hill Country counties— in the first 30 days showed a total value of \$425,000 placed on the 81,000 furs sold in the area.

Shaddix agreed with those who remind trappers that there are game reserve areas where animals are not to be taken. Grey Forest, as the original Scenic Loop Playground, is a game preserve.

He said that he is proud of helping boys and girls as well as mature trappers raise funds while learning about furs and wildlife.

It would not make sense for him to believe in the extinction of wild animals, and he says there is a definite line between good trapping and the things the conservationists and humanitarians rightfully oppose. He explains to each boy why the fur is not meeting standards—and offers refusal if his price does not meet their expectations.

Shaddix says that he cuts out the middleman, but pays a good price to his buyers nonetheless. Most fur is shipped to the New York furriers.

Ten more months of the year, Shaddix keeps busy with a pine

plantation and pecan produce companies where proper conservation is even more a part of his life, he says.

Bill Wallace of the D & W Fur Co. last year wrote checks as large as \$600 to trappers who worked big over-populated ranches. Long-haired furs demanded in New York have cut the price on bobcats, Shaddix said, this year.

An endorsement for the big fur buying company come from the competition Shaddix said. Streamlined methods have caused local buyers to upgrade their methods and prices as well, they have admitted.
