## RANCH TOWN GETS ANOTHER SETBACK

### Energy Crisis?

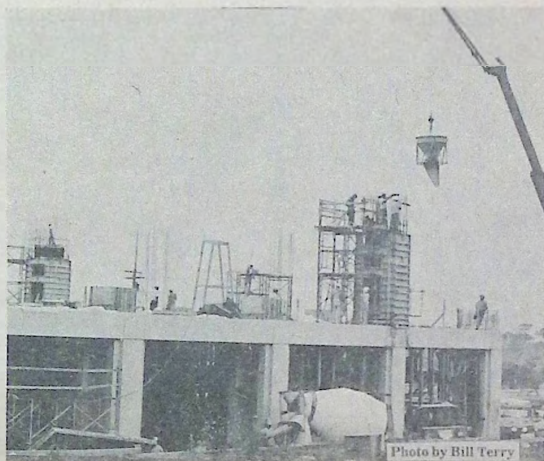

WILL THE UNIVERSITY OF TEXAS-SA Campus be completed in time for undergraduate classes in 1975? Will the concrete shortage brought on by the energy crisis cause progress to halt in the current building program? This is how one of the first buildings looks—and word from the administration is that regardless of the outcome—classes will be held in September '75—if temporary buildings—such as those now occupied by the graduate school—have to be pressed into service elsewhere.

### Grey Forest Names Audit Committee

In a called meeting at Grey Forest City Hall June 11, the City Council appointed Edwin Faust, Milton James, and Jerry Adams by a vote of four-to-one to an Audit Committee to look over and audit the financial report of the City.

Mayor Sam Terry announced that the ballots and stubs of the April election were burned at City Hall at 2 p.m. June 8 in the presence of witnesses and in accordance with the law.

Judge Robert Duty also obtained from the Council by a vote of four-to-one permission to take such steps necessary to prevent the closing of a road. This was originally a shortcut to Menchaca Road, but through annexation last year of Morningside Drive at the edge of Grey Forest, it forms a convenient exit and entrance to the City from the former Menchaca—now Wagner Road entrance by way of Morningside.

Judge Duty reported that for more than 20 years he and his neighbors had driven across a lot which has recently been sold by the property owner to a new owner who knew of this but who protests the use of part of the lot as a road. Sometime after the City of Grey Forest was established—which was in 1962—roadgraders were used to maintain a passage there

for the benefit of some eight property owners who live up the hill—formerly reached via Hilltop Drive from Scenic Loop.

Utility trucks and fire and police vehicles find this convenient, also, Judge Duty said.

An earlier neighbor, he reported, had cut the barb wire put up by the property owner of that date so that she could drive to her home without using Hilltop Drive, which happens to be steep.

Judge Duty said that his statements at a former City Council meeting had been misinterpreted by the public and that he does not wish at this time to resign as Judge of the City of Grey Forest and that he is an active practicing attorney and maintains a legal office.

In clarifying his position, he said that he was merely protesting the judicial workload which had grown tremendously during his six years as City Judge. He asked for relief in the way of an addition to the staff of a City Attorney, and further help in the handling of the responsibilities of a City Clerk. He said that he also wanted it understood that he has to have more room to hold court. He said that there are as many as 30 people at one time at the court sessions and that the present City Hall does not

allow adequate space for orderly seating of so many.

Following the session, several citizens suggested that the Scenic Loop Club Building be used for this purpose, as the building allows more than 100 to be seated for plays and other events. This was not discussed at the meeting.

A tentative budget for the City was also offered by Councilmen to be formalized within two weeks.

An appeal has been filed in federal district court this month—led by the Edwards Underground Water District, and joined by other plaintiffs—to the ruling which would have allowed development of the nearby Ranch Town—known as San Antonio Ranch New Town—to proceed without further delay.

The Federal District Court ruled in May that the proposed Ranch Town would not pollute the Edwards Underground Reservoir, and found that the Department of Housing and Urban Development had complied with all applicable laws in locating the project in northwestern Bexar County. This is a mile-and-a-half above Helotes on the former Lytle Ranch located between Bandera and Culebra Roads.

Judge Adrian Spears directed, however, that reports be made to the Court by the Texas Water Quality Board and the Edwards Underground Water District on or

before July 1, and at intervals of not more than six months thereafter. These reports are to reflect the status of any development taking place in the recharge zone in Bexar County—covering a much larger area than the Ranch Town.

At a special meeting of the Board of Directors on June 5, Directors present unanimously determined that an appeal from the ruling of the 57th District Court should be made to the Appeals Court in New Orleans, Louisiana. Counsel was directed to prepare the appeal.

The Board also announced that a task force of all agencies responsible for protection of the Edwards Reservoir is now drafting more stringent construction standards than previously considered. These are expected to be incorporated into a revised TWQU order and be made effective within 30 days. The Edwards Reservoir is one of several that underlie more than half of Texas. The Edwards aquifer—and associated ones of the Edwards Plateau and the Balcones Fault Zone—extends eastward from Del Rio to San Antonio and turns northeastward to Austin. Water here surfaces in springs, and the artesian reservoir along the Fault furnishes large quantities of water to wells, also.

Plaintiffs in the original suit who have joined the appeal action include Bexar County—when the commissioners last week voted to join the action. Commissioner Tom Stolhandske was the only one voting against the appeal, and gave as his reason that Judge Spears had ruled that the developers of the town were taking more precautions than any other group of local developers.

Others opposing the new town are the following groups—Citizens for Better Environment, the Sierra Club, the League of Women Voters, and the American Association of University Women.

It was also being asked by plaintiffs that construction at Ranch Town be delayed pending the ruling on the appeal.

Development in Bexar County is expected to be affected by the case. Ranch Town, which covers some 8,500 or 9,000 acres would occupy only one percent of the Edwards aquifer surface land, it has been estimated; but rulings will apply to all future development of the other 99 percent.

## Grange Passes Resolutions

Leon Valley Grange members will travel to Dripping Springs on June 21 for an exchange program with the Dripping Springs Grange.

## Defensive Driver Course Offered Lions Plan Barbecue

Some \$81,000 in auto insurance premiums have been saved in the local area by those taking the Greater San Antonio Safety Council's Defensive Driving Course.

To date, more than 5,000 persons have graduated from the Safe Driving Course and qualified for a 3-year 10 per cent reduction on private passenger automobile liability, collision, property damage, and medical payment insurance premiums.

The state board of insurance reports that the average state-wide cost of this coverage is approximately \$142.00 a year. At this rate, each driver who completes the Defensive Driving Course will save \$14.20 annually.

Enrollment fee is \$10.00 per person. Each class meets weekly until 8 hours of classroom work are completed. No "behind the wheel" driving is involved.

The Defensive Driving Course is intended to make good drivers, better drivers. It utilizes the techniques and skill of professional drivers to help passenger car drivers recognize and react to road hazards.

Lives can be saved as drivers learn to drive defensively, a spokesman said.

Classes are being offered at Northside locations on June 18, 20, 21, 24 and 30. For further information, call the Greater San Antonio Safety Council at 225-3029.

## Texas Keeps Changing Faces

Since 1933, this area has doubled its population, and changes are still ahead, an expert on trends told newsmen recently.

Migration has brought a new face to South Texas, according to Dr. Hugo A. Bourdeau, associate professor of sociology at Trinity University.

Addressing the South Texas Press Association and the Texas Gulf Coast Press Association recently, Bourdeau spoke on "Population Trends in Texas: Where Are Your Customers Coming From and Where Are They Going?"

In-migration rather than birth is responsible for gain in all segments of the population, said Bourdeau. He added, the net immigration shows that the population of South Texas now includes 24.9 per cent who are natives of other states, while 17.5 per cent who were natives of South Texas are now residents of other states. In the past 40 years, the South Texas area has doubled. The non-white population increased by 5.01 per cent. The Spanish surname population increased by 7.2 per cent.

The figures cover counties south

of an imaginary line beginning just north of Houston and extending due west to the New Mexico border.

"Because the rate of home ownership is high, these people evidently desire to become permanent residents," he said.

"Persons who migrate are usually better educated than those of the same age at the place of origin," commented Bourdeau.

Workers who migrate also received near average pay.

Potential and actual specialists, experts and managers migrate to places where their abilities can be used most profitably in the economy, the Trinity educator said.

There will also be a shift in age groups. By 1980 the population between the ages of 25 and 34 years of age will have increased by 49.8 per cent. The U. S. Department of Commerce predicts an increase of 25.4 per cent in those between 18 and 24 years of age in this same period. There will also be a significant rise in the number of persons over 65 years of age, or an 18.5 per cent rise between now and 1980.

Due to the lower birth rate, Bourdeau noted, a decline of 12.3 per cent in the 5-13 age group will occur.

By 1980, he added, the median number of grades completed is expected to rise from 8.0 grades to 11.5 grades completed.

The presence of retired military personnel from all four branches of the service is another aspect of the picture, said Bourdeau. According to a study done by Retired Col Robert J. Daniels, now a graduate student in sociology at Trinity, South Texas has 14,781 retired U. S. military persons with total estimated household population of 44,343 persons. Of these 93 per cent are homeowners and 80 per cent are not originally native to the area nor to the State of Texas.

## Northside Schools Offer 'Plan A'

Comprehensive Special Education, "Plan A," recently okayed by the Texas Education Agency following approval by the Northside Independent School District Board of Trustees, means the expansion of a project to integrate most special children into mainstream education.

In the past, there have not been enough specialists to offer corrective programs on all 31 District campuses.

State funds from Plan A will allow Northside to increase special education faculties and supportive staff so that all but severely handicapped youngsters can attend their neighborhood school and still receive individualized help.

NISD will add 10 teaching units for early childhood special education—plus counselors, supervisors, diagnosticians and psychologists, according to W. L. Stegall, NISD Special Education Director.

For the first time, this Fall, Northside will have Special Education for pre-schoolers. Through half-day classes, youngsters from three to five who are diagnosed as having potential learning disabilities, may be helped early to prevent later problems.

Northside will continue to operate two specialized schools, Mackey Elementary and Leon Springs, for children whose needs require distinct environments. Resource teachers, helping teachers and special education aids will function in all other

District schools on a neighborhood basis.

Special education in the District is so diverse as to include hospitalized, homebound, visually handicapped, deaf, mentally retarded, brain injured, orthopedic handicapped, teenage mothers, language-learning disabilities, emotionally disturbed, and others.

Northside has experts to identify a child's needs. Parents are invited to consult with the Special Education Department.

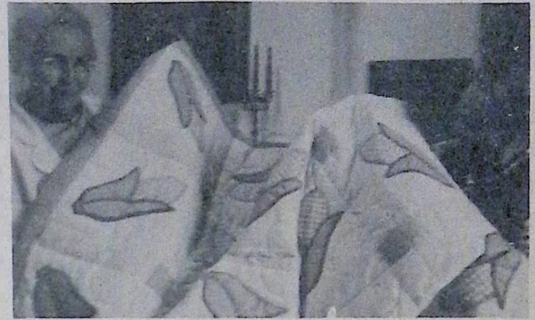

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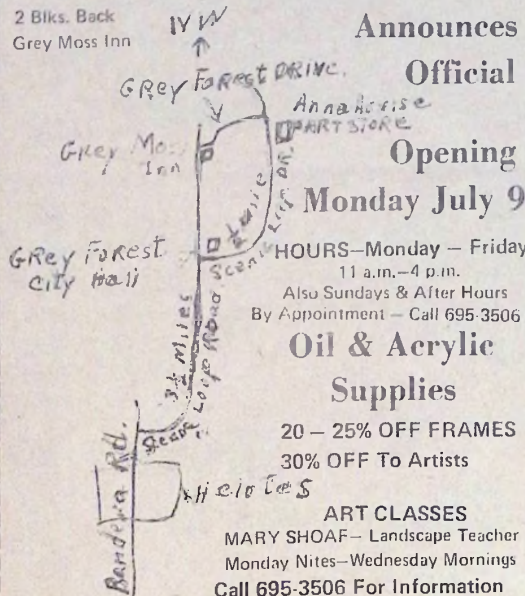
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## Wins Honors'

He pointed out that Benny Roark of Fordyce, Arkansas, was sentenced Tuesday, May 22, to three months in prison, a two year suspended sentence, and fined \$2100. Judge G. Thomas Eisele handed down the sentence following Roark's conviction on seven counts of defrauding the Medicare program.

An alert medicare beneficiary was credited with bringing this case to the attention of authorities. Every medicare recipient receives a letter describing payments made on his behalf by the Medicare program. In this case the beneficiary notified authorities that the payment was incorrect and a subsequent investigation uncovered the fraudulent activities.

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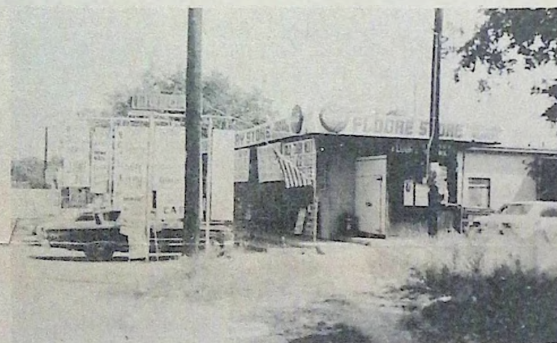

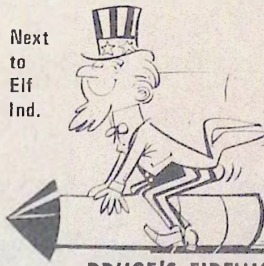
Bill and Anna Louise Schumann are residents of Grey Forest, and the shop is near their home outside the town. They have two children who have attended local schools.

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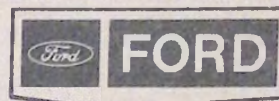
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## For Those Who Like To Look At The Future . . .
