Council To Meet



survey are Rosie Castro and Kathy Komray, UTSA graduate students, under the direction of Professor Robert R. Ashcroft.


The surveys are not binding on the city or on the persons who fill them out, Mr. Powell said. They are just to gather information about what the citizens are thinking.

Well Levels Drop As Rainless Days Continue

Water well levels throughout the Edwards Underground Water District fell during June, some as much as 24 feet below the May levels, Tom Fox, EUWD general manager, has announced.

The seasonal decline, he said, resulted from heavy lawn and agricultural irrigation during the comparatively "dry" month. However, Fox said the levels throughout the five counties are near or above the "mean" for June, based on records from 1933 through 1979. The index well in San Antonio, recorded at 658.9 feet, down 19.6 feet from May, was five feet below the longterm "mean." The well at Sabinal, on the other hand, was 25 feet above the "mean" despite a one-month decline of 19.2 feet.

The current readings for June were the reverse of those last year when all wells increased as much as 30 feet

following the heavy May and early June rains. But the drop was not as bad as that of June 1980 when San Antonio's well declined a foot per day.

Spring flow also was down at the end of the month. Comal Springs at New Braunfels were flowing 304 cubic feet per second, down 22 cfs. San Marcos Springs were flowing 130 cfs, down 11 cfs.

—Uvalde: 879.1 feet, down 1.5 feet (886.3).

—Sabinal: 779.8 feet, down 19.2 feet (835.4).

—Castroville: 688.5 feet, down 24.4 feet (737.8).

—Hondo: 719.8 feet, down 22.9 feet (773.8).

—San Antonio: 658.9 feet, down 19.6 feet (696.5).

—New Braunfels: 625.8 feet, down 1.2 feet (630.2).

—Kyle: 561.0 feet, down 4.9 feet (593.8).

Aid For Students Still Available Says Counselor

Despite rumors of financial aid cutbacks, students who are thinking about attending college this fall shouldn't be discouraged.

They are not too late, says UTSA's new assistant director of admissions, if they act quickly.

Roger Bilow, whose position includes recruiting and counseling, urges prospective college students to carefully evaluate their personal financial situations and work closely with educational institutions in determining college expenses.

"Financial aid counselors may not be able to offer students their first choices in types of assistance or the total amounts they want," he noted, "but, even at this late date, the counselors may be able to help."

Bilow comes to UTSA after serving eight years with the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation. He has conducted seminars for students from throughout the state. He reminds students that when they submit financial

aid forms, they also need to apply for admission.

"Students should keep their options open and apply to more than one institution," the new administrator said. "Their situations may change, and students then are unable to attend the institutions that are their first choices."

Bilow, who last year had contact with more than 1,500 high school and college students, remembers a young man who applied to the Air Force Academy and nowhere else. Though he was accepted, he later was unable to attend the academy for health reasons. He then was without options because he had not applied to other institutions.

The deadline to apply for the fall semester at UTSA is August 2. Students needing admissions information should phone the Office of Admission at 691-4532. For financial aid information, students should phone the Office of Student Financial Aid at 691-4154.

Retiring Chaplain Says Healing More Than Medicine

There is an old Gospel tune that includes the line "He touched me and made me whole." Chaplain (Colonel) Charles R. Posey, who retired last week as Wilford Hall's director of pastoral care, believes there is more than symbolism in that old song.

His belief is that healing, whether it be physical or spiritual, is not all drugs, machinery and scientific know-how. Neither is it something magical and mysterious to be practiced in darkened rooms with chants and incantations.

"Each of us has a healing touch to some extent," he maintains. "There is both opportunity and responsibility for every hospital employee — doctors, nurses, administrative people and janitorial staff, to participate in the healing process."

This concept represents a philosophy known as holism, which maintains that the determining factors in nature are wholes and not reducible to the sum of their parts. Put more simply, holistic medicine applies to the person as a whole: body, mind and spirit.

"The holistic approach is not new. It is not a matter of changing to holistics, but going back to holistic medicine," Chaplain Posey went on to explain that doctors and priests have worked together since the days of Hippocrates himself.

"Vital life is more than just the absence of the symptoms of illness," he says. "The chaplains are now part of the

physical therapy follow-up for cardiac patients. We minister to the fears, angers and spiritual pain of these patients at the same time the doctors are healing their bodies. Both are equally important."

"In addition," Chaplain Posey continued, "we minister to the staff and the staff ministers to us. When this works properly, we all minister to the patients."

Understanding the holistic approach requires that health care professionals step outside the realm of the physical. Even words that

are spoken in the presence of a patient supposedly comatose can have an effect on their well-being.

"We should not allow people, either staff or visitors, to say negative things around patients," maintains the chaplain. "There is a part of the mind that registers outside stimulus, even when the patient is 'unconscious'."

Chaplain Posey has no intention of giving up his work in hospital pastoral care, he will simply be doing it in another setting. He plans to go to work at the Ecumenical Center for Religion and

Health in San Antonio.

Wrapping up his comments, the new retiree said, "Gratitude is essential to the healing process. We must encourage the patient to go full circle: fighting the sickness, becoming well and offering thanks for his health."

The chaplain leaves Wilford Hall followed by the thanks and best wishes of the literally thousands of patients and staff members he has helped.

Those thanks, however, are accompanied by regrets, for we have lost a pair of healing hands.





In 1-quart microwave-safe casserole, combine all ingredients. Cover. Microwave on HIGH 6 to 8 minutes or until hot and slightly thickened, stirring frequently. Let stand, covered, 2 minutes. Use as a barbecue sauce for chicken, beef or pork. Makes about 2 cups.



Edwards To Study Dams

Directors of the Edwards Underground Water District Tuesday morning approved selection of an engineering consulting firm to begin a feasibility study of recharge dams on Cibolo Creek.

The study contract was awarded to Espey, Huston and Associates, Inc., engineering and environmental consultants of Austin, upon recommendation of the board's executive committee.

The feasibility study on the Cibolo, which forms the northern and eastern boundary of Bexar County, is estimated to cost \$24,500. However, the board amended the current budget to add \$10,000 to the original \$25,000 budgeted for 1982 to serve as a contingency if needed.

The purpose of the project is to provide sufficient information to allow the board to decide whether recharge facilities on the creek are feasible.

In other business the 15-member board passed a resolution ordering the biennial election for one director from each of the district's five counties, setting the date for Saturday, Jan. 15, 1983. Directors whose term expires at the end of February are Henry Van DeWalle, Bexar; Oliver O. Haas, Comal; Robert Knispel, Hays; Charles W. Rothe, Medina; and Rodney E. Reagan, Uvalde.

Noting a request from the Nueces-Frio-Sabinal Soil and Water Conservation District, the directors approved an appropriation of \$5,000 to assist the S&WCD in paying for a


fence needed in the Leona Watershed project in Uvalde County in which the EUWD is a co-sponsor. The fence will be used during construction of recharge dams for flood control and incidental recharge.

The board also heard a report on the Seco Creek Recharge Dam in Medina County and on the district's regional water forums, first of which will be in New Braunfels Wednesday, July 21.

Medical Grads Stay In Bexar County

More than 300 physicians who trained or taught at The University of Texas Health Science Center's medical school now are providing health care for residents of Bexar County.

Dr. Marvin Forland, deputy chair for clinical activities in the department of medicine, collected the figures that reveal how many physicians who were associated with the medical school in its 15-year history have joined the local private sector.

The list of 302 "exes" includes men and women who were students, interns/residents or faculty, or some combination of the three roles. Twelve of the physicians were associated with the school in all three capacities.

"Physicians trained in San Antonio are making a significant contribution to the provision of quality health care in the community," Forland said. "They represent the initial fulfillment of the medical school's commitment to attract and train highly competent physicians."

Seventy-two physicians with training in internal medicine and its subspecialties (endocrinology, dermatology, neurology, etc.) comprise the largest category. Surgeons, including those with subspecialties (orthopaedics, cardiovascular, etc.), form the second largest group, with 47.

There are also 36 anesthesiologists, 34 psychiatrists, 32 pediatricians and 22 each in

obstetrics-gynecology and in family practice. Other specialties include pathology, radiology, ophthalmology and physical medicine & rehabilitation.

Forland noted that in addition to physicians now in the private sector, a number of former students and/or residents who trained at the medical school currently are on the faculty.

The next class of 200 medical students will enter Aug. 16.





Vocational Skills Needed

Today in Texas, more than one million students in 945 school districts and 67 two-year colleges are involved in vocational and technical training programs.

Recently, a group of industry representatives meeting at Texas State Technical Institute-Waco campus discussed the need for vocationally and technically trained employees.

"If industry is to grow, we must have the technically trained people to keep it abreast," said Gary Kellar, vice president of engineering with Elder Oil Tools, Inc. of Woktown.

Eight of 10 jobs today

require some technical skills like those gained in Texas' two-year vocational education programs, he added.

"If the high school graduates who don't go to a four-year university don't go to a technical school, they are not going to get the jobs," he said.

The popularity of technical education is evident at Texas State Technical Institute, which has campuses in Waco, Harlingen, Amarillo and Sweetwater. Official reports indicate TSTI's enrollment grew more than 10 percent in 1980-81, compared to a growth of less than four percent at state-supported senior colleges, universities

and community junior colleges. The "CB Report," published by the Coordinating Board of Texas Colleges and Universities predicts TSTI will grow by 30 percent by 1990, compared to nine percent for state-supported junior colleges and six percent at state senior colleges.

Texas State Technical Institute offers more than 70 one-and two-year programs from which students earn certificates of completion or associate of applied science degrees.

UTSA Offers Hebrew Course

A course on Beginning Hebrew will once again be taught at the University of Texas at San Antonio this fall.

Offered for the first time last year, the course adopts an integrated approach to the skills of reading, writing, hearing and speaking Hebrew and is designed for those with no prior knowledge of the language.

According to Dr. Steven Kellman, associate professor of foreign language and instructor for the course, emphasis will be placed on

mastering the language actually spoken by Jews, Moslems, and Christians in the contemporary State of Israel, but a foundation will also be provided for study of classical Hebrew texts.

"If nothing but the Bible and the Talmud had been written in Hebrew, it would still be the language of one of the most magnificent bodies of literature, religious or secular, imaginable," Dr. Kellman said.

In order to accommodate non-traditional students and those who are not able to

enroll in daytime classes, the course on Beginning Hebrew will meet two evenings a week, Mondays and Wednesdays, from 5:30 to 6:45 p.m.

Deadline for admission for fall semester at UTSA is Aug. 2. Applications and all necessary supporting materials must be on file in the Office of Admissions by that date. For more information about Beginning Hebrew, call the Division of Foreign Languages, 691-4373.


