George DeBord of Helotes, who became the world's 24th heart transplant patient, was featured in the August 2, issue of Life Magazine as "the first man in history to look at his own heart."

DeBord, a local contractor, was the sixth heart transplant patient of Dr. Denton Cooley of Houston.

A second picture showed Mr. and Mrs. DeBord and daughter Lynette visiting with Dr. Cooley.

## Mr. Woltersdorf Dies August 5

Following a brief illness, William Woltersdorf, 77, died Monday, August 5. Funeral services were held Wednesday with Rev. M. W. Applewhite officiating.

Mr. Woltersdorf, who had been retired from the San Antonio Police Force 18 years after 35 years of duty, had been in excellent health until the last ten days of his life. He and Mrs. Woltersdorf were residents of Helotes Park Estates and resided at 13010 Diamond K Trail.

He is survived by his wife, Lenora, a daughter, Mrs. Edward H. Rittiman, son, Charles Peck; a sister Mrs. Martha Klesel, one grandchild and three great grandchildren.

Sympathy is extended to his family in their loss.

## Bus Problem Being Studied

A transportation problem, involving local elementary school children, aroused citizens here last year, and with the approach of September 3 and back-to-school days, there is still no immediate solution. If the Legislature had remained in session, the results might have been different. However, local citizens are still seeking a special ruling.

Governor John Connally—in a letter to Patric McDonald—has promised to consider the problem faced by Helotes children living within the two-mile radius of the school. Mr. McDonald last year spearheaded an unsuccessful drive to continue bus service for these children because of unusual hazards. To get to school some of the 85 children involved must be privately transported or cross a narrow bridge on foot which has no foot-path. They must also walk along and cross a high-speed highway.

## Mr. Galm Elected

New officers of the fire department have been elected to serve a two-year term with Clarence Galm as president.

County Commissioner and Mrs. Ollie Wurzbach and Alex Garrig were among special guests at the annual general meeting recently of the Helotes Area Volunteer Fire Department, Inc. Officers, board members, volunteer fire fighters, and others contributing to the volunteer organization met at the fire station. A barbecue supper was also catered by Hickory Hut.

The nominating committee—Ralph Swift, Royce Cottrell and Albert (Bud) Payne presented a slate of officers. In addition to Mr. Galm, the following were elected and will serve until 1970.

Mrs. John Widner, secretary; and Harvey Mayfield and John Nelson, directors.

A vote of thanks was also offered to outgoing Fire Chief John Widner and the following officers leaving office: Charley Davis, president, Mrs. Ralph Swift, secretary; and Martin Terry and Chester McCarter, directors.

The general meeting was called June 28.

Mr. McDonald has continued to work for a solution throughout the 1967-68 school term and has asked citizens to join in to solve the problem "before one of these elementary school children is struck down by highway traffic."

Mr. Ed Cody, superintendent of the Northside Independent School District, said that the bus service for children within two miles of school cost the District \$41,000 in 1966-67. Because of this cost, the Helotes boys and girls—as well as those at other schools in the district—living near the school had to get there some way during 1967-68.

The majority in Helotes walked. Maximum speeds near the school and northbound approaches were reduced to approximately 35 or 40 miles from a range of 50 to 70 miles. Supervisors were posted during school transport time to reduce possibility of illegal speeding. The children came through the year without incident. Near other schools in the District—on Ingram Road, for instance, sidewalks are being added to cut down on hazards.

According to Mr. McDonald, Senator Joe Bernal and Representative Jim Nowlin had a bill ready to present to the special session of the Legislature—to get Helotes elementary school children on buses this coming September.

In his letter, Governor Connally on June 20 said that he will consider Mr. McDonald's recommendation "if the Legislature is able to complete consideration of the essential items already submitted to it in time."

Jimmy L. Elrod, president of the Board of Trustees of the Northside District, has also asked the Governor's aid to modify the two-mile limit law regarding bus-ing of school children with State support. Failing that, he asked that all unsafe conditions be plainly marked for the coming year.

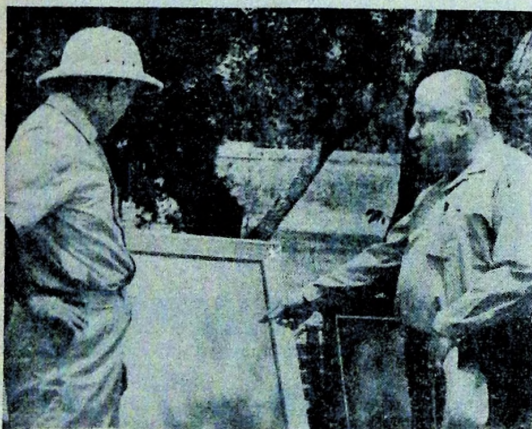
## Museum Planners To Meet August 12
