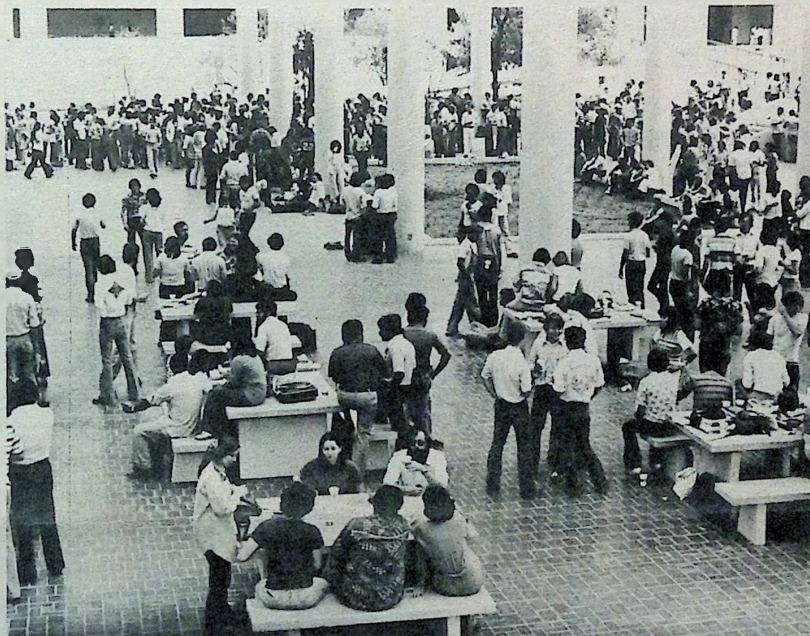

Decision Must

Wait For

1978

The bill to divide northwest Bexar County territory between Grey Forest Utilities and City Public Service was bottled up and died in the Texas Senate during the last few days of the legislative session which ended May 30.

It had passed the Texas House of Representatives during the preceding week after its introduction by Rep. Don Rains, whose district includes the Helotes area.

In the Senate the bill immediately was tagged by Sen. Frank Lombardino of San Antonio. Such a tag means that the member objects to it and holds up further action on the bill for 48 hours.

But at the expiration of 48 hours, the committee to which the bill had been assigned could not muster a quorum of committee members.

The bill would have reserved to Grey Forest Utilities all of Bexar County northwest of Loop 1604 and west of Interstate 10 for a period of six years. In the Loop 1604 area the natural gas lines of San Antonio's City Public Service are now being built in competition with Grey Forest Utilities lines already there.

Mayor Ed Faust of Grey Forest said he would try again during the next session of the Texas Legislature two years from now to get the bill passed.

World's Most Sophisticated Tactical Weapons Development Program

In what is probably the most sophisticated approach ever taken in the development of tactical weapons, a joint project of our Navy and Air Force is centered around a computer-monitored dogfight training system. It simulates and tests yet-to-be-built highly complex air-to-air missiles. Acceptance tests were recently completed at Nellis Air Force Base, Nevada.

The program's purpose is to help develop a common missile system to replace the Sidewinder in the 1980s.

The project is based on a computerized dogfight training system using four foot square color screens so that ground instructors can view and monitor every move made by a pilot flying at supersonic speeds.

The Navy F-14s and Air Force F-15s used in the project are modified using special electronic sensors on their wings to simulate the launch of the various missile concepts that are under consideration. F-5Es are designated "the enemy" and they simulate the aggressor aircraft. Designed and built by Cubic Corporation, the system monitors the mock aerial dogfights and identifies the aircraft "killed" during the engagement.

By simulating characteristics of a particular type of missile the instant the fighter crew pushes the "fire" button, the Cubic system produces a tabulated summary of effectiveness. A large number of missions are carried out so that the variations in aircraft and pilots can be discounted and a true weapon capability determined.

The system was originally designed to help train pilots to dogfight at speeds faster than sound. Trainees go through the motions of actual combat without firing live ammunition. The system permits eight aircraft

to engage in dogfight maneuvers at the same time. Known as ACMI, for Air Combat Maneuvering Instrumentation, the system will also monitor other aircraft which are in the air and are ready to begin training exercises when the eight land.

According to current estimates, the program will save the military nearly \$100 million annually for live missiles and target drones. Equally important, it will help the Navy and Air Force design future air-to-air missile configurations without actually going to the expense of building experimental weapons.

Being Replaced

The work of tearing down the old Helotes School began this week and was going rapidly at week's end.

This is the first step in building a new education complex on the Helotes campus that will include a new classroom building, new gym, and remodeling of the cafeteria building.

A contract was awarded Mesquite Construction Company on their bid of \$662,449 for the new Helotes buildings.

The complex is not to be completed until the beginning of the school year in 1978. For the coming school year beginning in September temporary classrooms will be used on the Helotes campus.

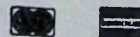

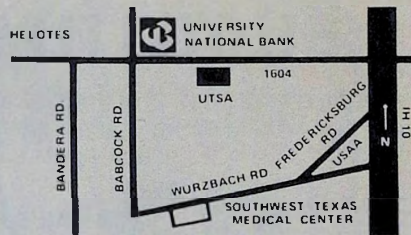

Aquifer Holds At Record Highs

The Edwards Underground Water District has reported that record levels of water in the Edwards Aquifer were

measured at the close of April in wells at Sabinal, Castroville and New Braunfels, and the well at San Antonio was only one foot short of its all-time high.

This was particularly unusual at this time of the year for San Antonio, a massive user of water from the aquifer.

Another record was set at the famed Comal Springs at New Braunfels, where a springflow of 550 cubic feet per second surpassed the old record of 534 cfs. Average is 281, but in the drought of the 1950s these large springs ceased flowing.

The April springflow at Comal was up 121 cfs. over the

March measurement.

San Marcos Springs, at 295 cfs. at month's end, were up 30 cfs. over the previous month. Average at San Marcos is 161, the previous recorded maximum was 310. The minimum has been 46.

Leona River Springs, near Uvalde, were up 8.0 cfs. at 69.2, not far under their all-time record of 77.9. Average is 11.6, with no flow at all during certain drought periods.

The report issued by the EUWD covered both the March and April readings. With the names of well sites followed in parentheses by all-time lows and highs, the measurements, expressed in altitudes in feet above mean sea level, were:

Uvalde (811.0; 885.4 established in February 1977). March: 885.5 (new record); April, 884.9 (down .06).

Sabinal (664.0; 831.1 est. in February 1977). March, 827.4; April, 832.2 (up 4.8 for new record).

Castroville (622.2; 734.2 est. February 1977). March 732.1; April 737.5 (up 5.4 for new record).

Hondo (662.3; 771.8, est. in February 1977). March, 767.1; April, 771.8, up 4.7 to tie the record.

San Antonio (612.5; 696.5). March, 690.4; April, 695.5, up 5.1 to within a foot of tying all-time record established in October of 1973.

New Braunfels (613.3; 629.8). March 629.4; April, 630.2, up 0.8 to surpass all-time record of October 1973.

Kyle (542.2; 593.8). March, 587.4; April 586.4, down 1.0. Here the all-time high was measured in March of 1968.

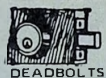

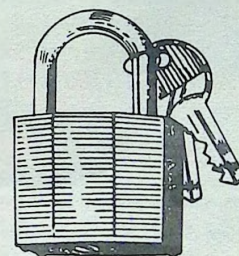
