Of special interest to Helotes area voters is the race for County Commissioner in Precinct 2. Fourteen candidates are running in the Democratic primary and four candidates in the Republican primary.

The "hottest" race county-wide is considered to be the race between

It's Cornyval time in Helotes. After a glittering Coronation ceremony Wednesday at which fifteen girls competed for the 'Miss Helotes' title, the three biggest days in Helotes are underway here.

This year's theme of the 19th spring festival is "Spring Echoes through Helotes."

The lavish celebration in Downtown Helotes will begin Friday night, May 4, and continue through Saturday and Sunday. The Old Bandera Highway will be closed off and the street lined with food and games booths. A carnival midway will be open and there will be two free street dances plus a third free dance on the Floore Country Store patio. Playing on the street will be the Levis and the Davenport Family, and on the patio will be Billy Mata.

A Cornyval '84 Parade will be staged Saturday, May 5, at 11 a.m. It will begin at Bandera Highway and Loop 1604 and move through Helotes to the Scenic Loop Road.

More than 80 floats, bands, horse riding groups and other entries will make up the three-mile parade.

On the street in Downtown Helotes on Saturday there will be entertainment by the Fleetweld Cowboys from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m., Los Reyes Nortenos from 5 to 7:30 p.m., the Sahawe Indian Dancers from 1 to 5 p.m., the Bexar County Gunslingers from 1 to 6 p.m., and contests including corn shucking, best beards, best-filled jeans, beer drinking and cow chip tossing beginning at 3:30 p.m. with KBUC personalities conducting the contests.

The food and game booths and carnival midway also will be open all afternoon and evening. Two free street dances will feature the Levis and Country Jam, and another free dance on the Floore Country Store patio will feature Sundown.

Most of the events and entertainment will continue on Sunday, May 6. Two free street dances will be held from 3 to 6 p.m. with Lucy Espinosa band and the Oompa Band, plus Whiskey Dreamin' on the Floore Country Store patio. Sunday afternoon's contests will include corn eating, ice cream eating, beer drink-

Incumbent Chick Kazen and former County Judge Albert Bustamante for the Democratic nomination to be U.S. Congressman from District 23.

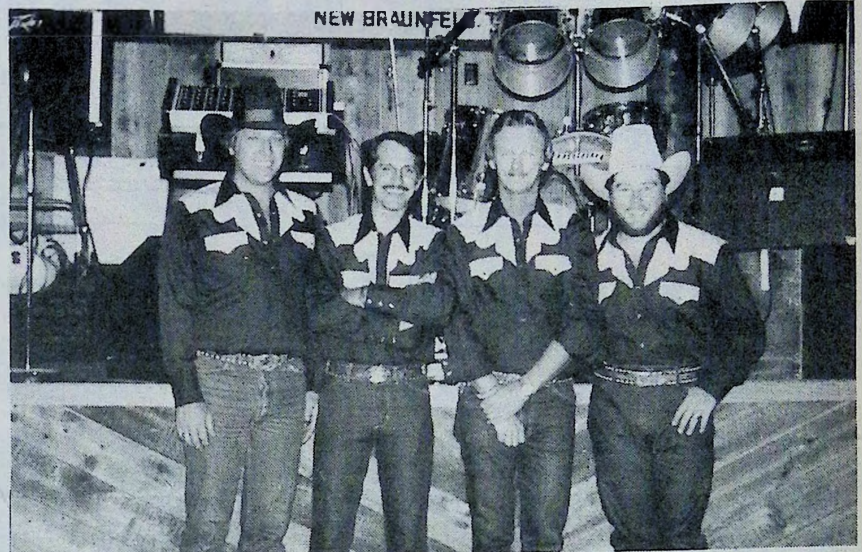

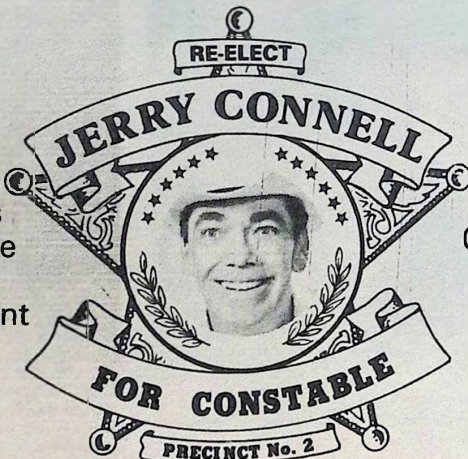

## Lack Of Rain Causing Wells To Head For Record Lows

Record lows in water well levels can be expected by September and spring flow may cease by summer if the present trend of reduced recharge and heavy seasonal pumpage continues, Tom Fox, general manager of the Edwards Underground Water District, has announced.

As the result of two years of below-average rainfall, water well levels throughout the five-county district are dropping rapidly, Fox said this week in a status report to district directors concerning the Edwards Aquifer.

Compounding the problem, the report said, is the fact the levels are declining earlier in the season than is normally the case.

In San Antonio, the district's index well on April 25 had dropped to 635 feet above mean sea level, the lowest point since the 628-foot reading in 1971, which occurred in June. The record low of 612.5 feet was set in 1956 near the end of a seven-year drought.

Noting that the lack of rain causes increased water demand and at the same time results in a reduction in recharge to the Edwards Aquifer, Fox pointed out: "Thus far this year the decline seems to be occurring faster and causing the levels to drop to lower depths. Water levels were lower at the start of the year, pumping demand is higher than normal for this time of year, and recharge is greatly reduced."

Fox said, "If the current rate of decline continues, record lows in water levels can be expected by the end of September. The flow from the springs in New Braunfels and San Marcos is dropping daily with a likely result that there will be no flow by summer." Only heavy rains could damage the down-trend, he pointed out.

The report noted that elimination of spring flow will have a serious economic and environmental effect in the New Braunfels and Guadalupe River areas as well as an adverse effect on some water purveyors in the district.

"The big unknown," Fox continued, "is the effect, if any, of the movement of the saline zone or 'bad water line' boundary of the aquifer."

Pointing out that the lowered water levels would have an unfavorable impact on both the urban and rural economy throughout the region, which consists of Uvalde, Medina, Bexar, Comal and Hays Counties, Fox reported:

"Of possibly greater and more lasting significance is the effect of lowered water levels and reasons that people want to live and work in this corridor is for the 'Quality of Life.' Water is a major ingredient in this quality of life."

With the elimination of the springs, Fox said a "perception or image of a lack of water may be circulated" among those interested in moving into the corridor. "It is difficult to image a corridor of people and industry between Austin and San Antonio if the middle is left out because we could not solve the water issues," he said.

In the report Fox stressed the need to begin serious water conservation for at least two reasons: The first

reason, he said, is to reduce the impact of the current situation, and the second is that "we do not know how long this lack of rain will last."

The district currently has several water conservation education projects under way. It is sponsoring a program on water conservation on KLRN (Channel 9) to be shown in May and a new water exhibit at the Institute of Texan Cultures in San Antonio.

The district also is working with several other entities to develop a low water demanding landscape

demonstration called "Xeriscape" planned to be located at the Botanical Center in San Antonio. In addition, the district is continuing a joint project with the City of San Antonio to develop the economic and environmental costs of various water resource alternatives.

The report itself stressed 15 conservation tips designed to reduce water usage:

1. Use water-saving devices on showerheads, toilets, and inside faucets.
2. Repair all leaking faucets and

toilets. Food coloring placed in the toilet tank, appearing in the toilet bowl, indicates a leak.

3. Avoid unnecessary flushing. don't use the toilet for a trash basket.

4. Load washing machines and dishwashers to capacity. When buying new models, look for those with water-saving features.

5. Insulate all hot water pipes.

6. Check your home for leaks by turning off all water outlets and checking your water meter. If it is still running, you have a leak.

7. Use native drought-resisting plants for landscaping.

8. Minimize watering during the first weeks of spring to encourage deeper rooting.

9. Minimize lawn watering and avoid runoff into streets, sidewalks and driveways.

10. Don't water during windy times and during the heat of the day.

11. Avoid fine spray watering by using a soaker hose or a sprinkler that throws large drops.

12. Let sod completely dry out before watering.

13. Keep grass fairly long. Taller grass holds moisture better.

14. Mulch flowers, vegetables and shrubs so they hold moisture.

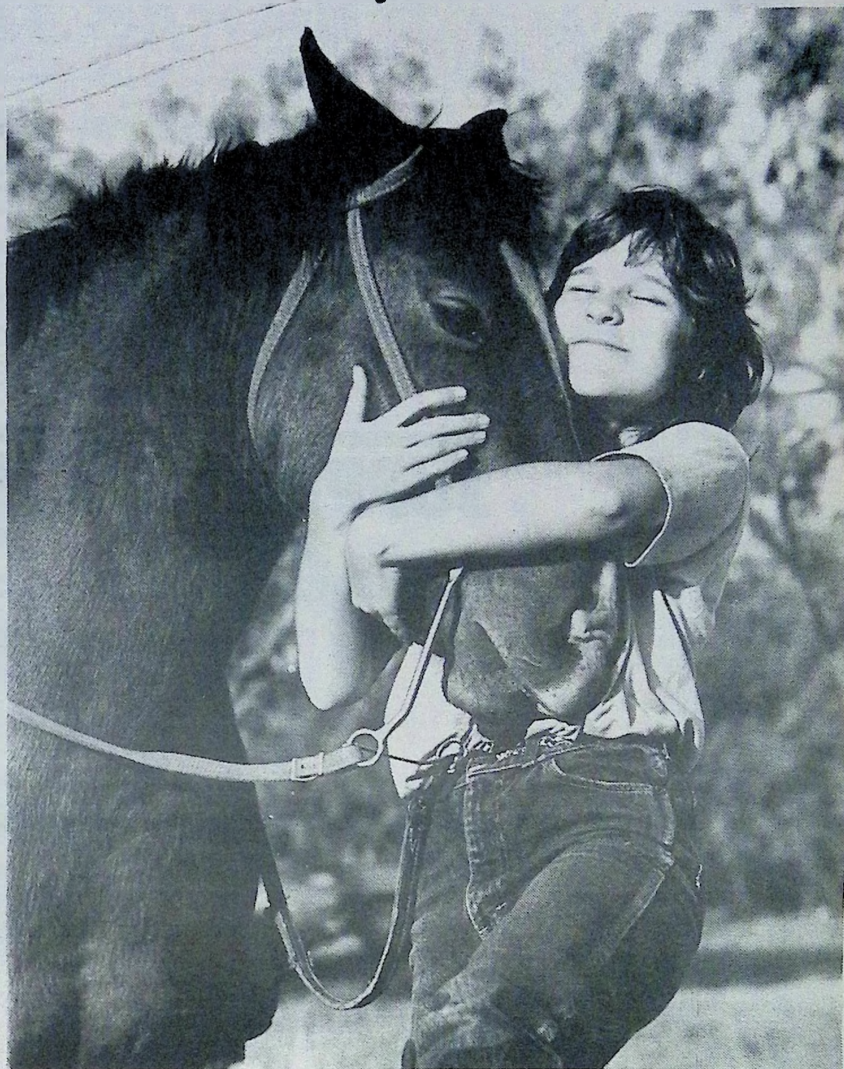

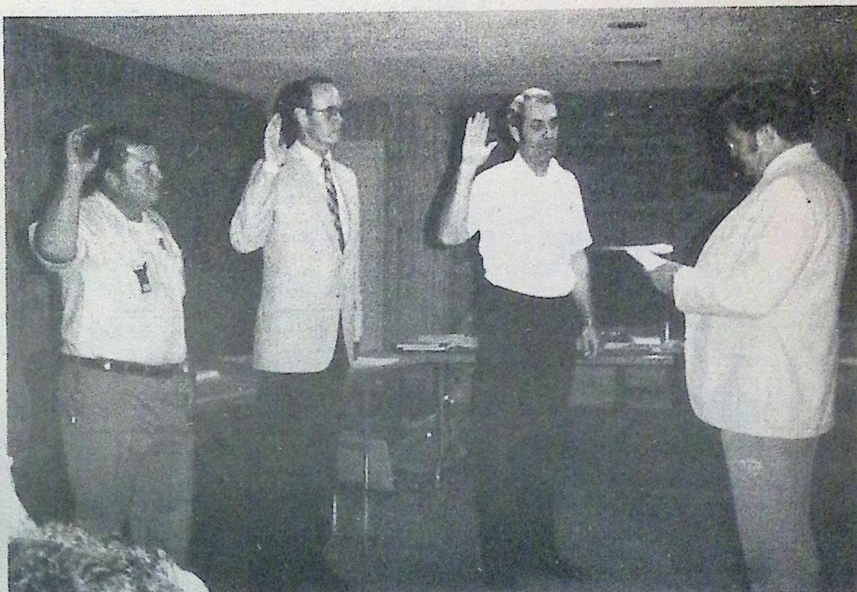


## Check Aids UTSA

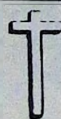

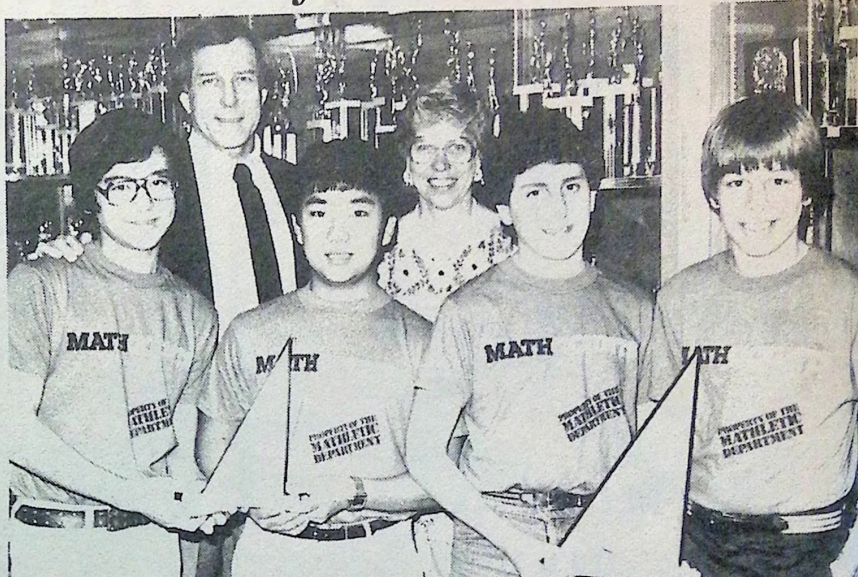

## Parade Of Homes To Run May 19-28—Rain Or Dry

The annual Parade of Homes sponsored by the Greater San Antonio Builders Association (GSABA) is quite a production. The Parade, which is set for May 19-28, always appears to run like a well-oiled machine but the fact is that occasionally cogs in the machine slip. No one knows that better than Allen Ghormley, this year's parade chairman and a GSABA member.

"The first Parade I was involved in was in 1980, when I worked at Denton Development. That Parade was at Encino Park and it happened that the Parade coincided with the opening of the subdivision. The subdivision's first family moved into their home the day before the Parade opened. They found a 300-foot tent in front of their house for the Home Products Show and saw more than 12,000 people troop through their front yard and into the Parade. They were good sports about the whole thing!"

Each year the GSABA learns something new about producing Parades; at Encino Park, the lesson was about parking. "We had what we thought was adequate parking," Ghormley continued. "Every year the Parade has become bigger and better" the Home Products Show has become almost an event in itself. Encino Park showed us how successful the Parade can be."

Ghormley's second Parade was in 1981 at River Oaks. "This was the Association's first garden home Parade," Ghormley said. "It was innovative, both locally and nationally. But what happened to us at River Oaks was the same thing that happened to Noah—the skies poured down rain." Rain is disastrous for a Parade, especially since the Association hosts its Preview Party the night before the Parade opens. The Preview Party is a buffet dinner, considered by some to be one of May's social events, which usually feeds about 1,500 people.

"It rained all day," Thormley continued, "and then right before the Preview Party opened, the clouds parted and we had a delightful evening. But as soon as everyone left the party, it poured!"

"In 1983 at Riverbend, the rain came again and was very nearly disastrous,"

Ghormley remembered. "We were expecting 1,500 people for the Preview Party and that day it rained four inches. Again the weather let up and we had a nice party but it rained all night after we left. The storm virtually blew away the Home Products Show."

"We thought about cancelling the Parade that day but instead, we held a massive clean-up. We had the GSABA president, engineers, salesmen—all kinds of people scooping up mud and garbage. When we opened at noon, the sun came out and we had a beautiful day."

Ghormley feels this year's Parade will surpass those of previous years, making the effort at Northwest Crossing one people will remember. "I think again we're seeing an upgrading in the quality of the Home Show in the type of exhibits, decorating and landscaping that will be featured. The Parade is really a state-of-the-art showing for many

facets of our industry," Ghormley said.

"People come to get decorating ideas, to see new furniture and new homes but they have no idea of the number of hours and sweat that goes into producing the show. This production is pulled off by amateurs who must become experts in traffic

control, first aid, clean up, etc. What goes on in a Parade is really amazing."

The Parade at Northwest Crossing will feature traditional homes, rather than garden homes, in an area Ghormley says has been extremely well-received by the buying public. Featured in the show will be

energy and water conservation techniques. Seminars in areas related to homebuying will be featured.

Ghormley sees the Parade of Homes as an opportunity for community involvement. His committees are tapping realtors, merchants, and anyone remotely interested for volunteers or donations.

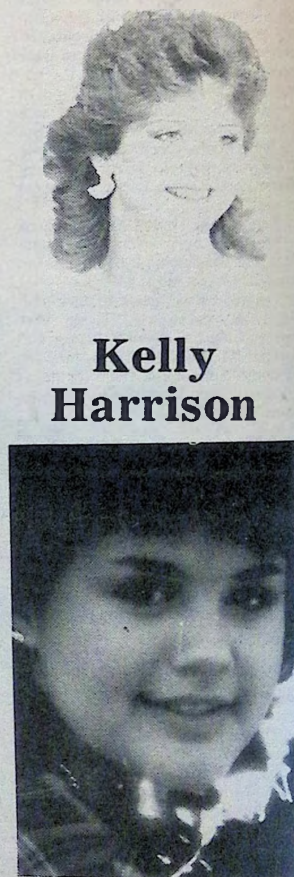

## Free Stickers To Aid Fire Rescues

Comal Springs at New Braunfels dropped 62 cfs in April to a flow of 125 cfs, compared to the longterm average of 299 cfs. Comal Springs stopped flowing on Aug. 2, 1956, during the seven-year drought of the early 1950s. The maximum flow recorded there was 550 cfs on April 20, 1977.

Following are the water well levels shown in altitude above mean sea level with the alltime record highs and lows in parentheses: Castroville: 658.6 feet, down 11.7 feet (737.8 and 664.0); Hondo: 678.2 feet, down 14.3 feet (773.8 and 662.3); San Antonio: 634.4 feet, down 11.6 feet (696.5 and 612.5).

## Medical Center Need Ailing Volunteers

## Zoo To Show First Koala

On June 3, San Antonio Zoo will begin exhibiting one male koala, on loan from San Diego Zoo for the month of June. This will be a first for the zoo and a first for Texas. Never before has a koala been exhibited in Texas. The animal will remain on view to the public through July 4.

Koalas are not bears. Like so many Australian mammals, they are marsupials—animals who carry their young in a pouch. In the United States they have, up to now, been kept and bred only in the San Diego and Los Angeles Zoos because they feed exclusively on eucalyptus leaves. The preferred species of eucalyptus are not hardy in San Antonio's climate, so Southwest Airlines has generously agreed to transport the necessary foliage on a twice-a-week schedule while the animal is in San Antonio.

In the near future San Antonio Zoo hopes to establish a permanent colony of koalas. Negotiations are underway with the zoo in Adelaide, South Australia, to supply animals for a San Antonio breeding group.

## Country Corn Meal Pudding

This pudding may suggest the American Frontier, or even a visit to an old-fashioned candy store. The ingredients — cinnamon, nutmeg, ginger, molasses and brown sugar combine into a basic self-

rising corn meal pudding that was a staple 200 years ago.

"Country Corn Meal Pudding" serves as a dessert or makes an interesting addition to a holiday buffet.

Baked slow, the pudding forms a custard, bubbling with the flavors of molasses and spice. Serve it warm with whipped topping, or allow it to cool.

If there's any left, refrigerate and serve the next day for breakfast, topped with fresh fruit.

Since "Country Corn Meal Pudding" is made from enriched self-rising corn meal and an array of other wholesome ingredients, it's a good source of protein, carbohydrate, the B-vitamins — thiamin, niacin, and riboflavin — plus the minerals, iron and calcium.

### COUNTRY CORN MEAL PUDDING (8 to 10 servings)

1 1/4 cups enriched self-rising corn meal  
4 cups milk  
1 cup brown sugar, packed  
1/4 cup butter

1/4 cup molasses  
1 teaspoon cinnamon  
1/2 teaspoon nutmeg  
1/2 teaspoon ground ginger  
3 eggs

Stir corn meal into 1 cup milk. Heat remaining 3 cups over medium heat until warm. Add corn meal-milk mixture, continue cooking over medium heat stirring constantly until mixture thickens slightly. Beat in remaining ingredients except eggs. Add the hot mixture, a little at a time to the eggs, until all is added. Pour into greased 2-quart glass baking dish and bake in preheated 275° F. oven about 1 1/2 hours or until knife inserted near center comes out clean. Serve warm with whipped topping.



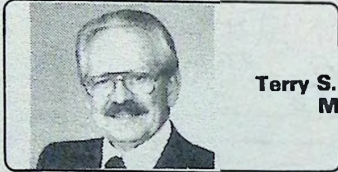

### DIAPER RASH DUE TO DIFFERENT CAUSES

Got an irritable baby whose bottom looks awful? Diagnosis: Diaper Rash. But what causes it? What to do about it? And how to keep it from coming back?

The basic causes of diaper rash are moisture, occlusion, friction, and infection with either yeast or bacteria. Sometimes allergy or individual susceptibility play a part, but basically it's a problem of wetness. After all, infants raised in primitive cultures without diapers don't have it. And it ends with toilet training. The most effective preventive — and cure — is to allow the diaper area to air-dry. Here's one instance where nude sunbathing is to be encouraged. Plastic covered diapers, particularly those with elastic about the legs, should be a no-no.

Uncomplicated primary irritant diaper rash presents with a red-den shiny, glazed appearance. It is most frequently associated with commercial paper diapers, particularly those with elastic edges. If you apply rubber or plastic pants over this, you're just asking for diaper rash.

Allergic or atopic diaper rash may look just like the irritant kind, but usually there are allergic lesions elsewhere, say on the cheeks, behind the knees, or in the bend of the arms. Local treatment can provide only temporary relief and the cause of the allergy must be sought out. This type easily becomes invaded by yeast.

A skin condition called seborrheic dermatitis afflicts the diaper area, too. The reddened base is covered with a yellow, greasy scaling. Similar involvement of the scalp or behind the ear helps in diagnosis. Treatment is different, requiring topical cortisone cream (not ointment and not flourinated).

Almost half of the cases involve yeast (*Candida albicans*) as either the primary cause or the reason for persistence. It can come from lots of sources. Yeast is often found normally in baby's intestinal tract or in skin folds outside the diaper area. Oral thrush, caused by the same yeast, or a contaminated pacifier or bottle nipple may contribute to recurrences. Mothers may have a vaginal yeast problem, and this is often an unwitting hand-to-baby source of yeast. The typical yeast diaper rash is intensely red with sharp borders, beyond which are numerous isolated reddened spots. When it's difficult to cure or recurs frequently, we've got to look for sources — and one of the first is the mother; she may have a problem of which she might not even be aware! Yeast responds dramatically to clotrimazole (Lotrimin or Mycelex).

Cornstarch is excellent for reducing friction, witness its use by world-class bicyclists and other athletes to prevent chafing. Talcum powder, though time-honored, may present a hazard because repeated inhalation can cause serious lung problems. Baking soda, another frequently used remedy, may be absorbed and upset the baby's acid/base balance. Complication by impetigo requires both oral and topical antibiotics. How about vaseline? or other ointments? They reduce friction, sure; but also trap moisture to further macerate the skin and promote the growth of *Candida albicans*.

The foundation of treatment, regardless of the cause, is to allow baby's bottom to air-dry at frequent and prolonged intervals, plus avoiding friction. If this doesn't clear it up, see your doctor to determine the cause and institute appropriate treatment. Toilet training, of course, will provide the final solution to this aggravating problem.

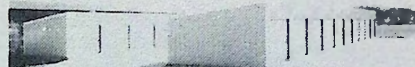

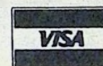

"Take two aspirin and call me in the morning" may be one of the most common forms of physician advice in the United States yet it may have more validity than most people realize.

The common aspirin is one of the safest, most effective anti-inflammatory agents and pain suppressors known to mankind.

Dr. Bill Watson, a pharmacologist on the Bexar County Hospital District medical staff, explains it is aspirin's ability to inhibit the breakdown of individual cells, through the inhibition of metabolism of lipids, or fats, in the cell which make it so effective.

"Aspirin is probably one of the most effective and proven analgesics on the market," he says, "and part of its widespread appeal is its safety. In appropriate doses aspirin can be taken by many people for extended periods of time with little adverse affect."

It is aspirin's analgesic—meaning pain suppressant—abilities which make it so popular for two common medical problems, headache and arthritis.

"It is even good for sunburn," says Dr. Watson, "if it is taken immediately after the burn and before the pain begins. That's where that cell breakdown is important, aspirin is effective in preventing some of the cell damage."

One of the newer uses for aspirin has been stroke prevention. Neurologists are examining aspirin as a possible anti-aggregate which would be used to reduce the ability of platelets in the blood stream to adhere to plaque on the walls of blood vessels.

This "sticky" quality of the platelets is one of the major factors in ischemic stroke.

So when your doctor says to take two aspirin, he or she may have more in mind than just a good night's sleep.
