First Traffic

Fatality

Justo Gallegos Valdez, 27, of Floore Drive, died almost instantly when he was struck by a car Saturday night, May 11, at 8:40 p.m. as he was crossing Bandera Road near the intersection of Floore Drive and Bandera Road.

The car was driven by Lonnie Eugene Graves of Grey Forest. He also is 27. He was accompanied by his wife, Donna.

No charges were placed against Graves and none are pending. The accident is still under investigation, as results of an autopsy on Valdez will not be known for about two weeks.

Valdez was buried in the Morales family cemetery Wednesday morning, May 15, 1985, following services at Our Lady of Guadalupe Church. A rosary was recited for him Tuesday night.

Justo is survived by his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Valdez, and several brothers and sisters. He had been working with his father as a stonemason for several years before contracting on his own.

Why the accident happened still is not known. The night was clear and the pavement was dry. There was quite a bit of traffic, but the Valdez brothers and sisters had been crossing safely at that intersection for several years. Why Justo stepped in front of the car is not known, witnesses said.

After the accident, Graves did not leave the scene, as was reported in a San Antonio daily newspaper. It was not a hit and run accident. Although almost in a state of shock, Graves remained at the scene and assisted with the investigation, including taking a breath test for alcohol, police said.

Valdez was taken to the Medical Center Hospital by an EMS ambulance, and was pronounced dead on arrival.

His death was the first traffic fatality in the city of Helotes since its incorporation four years ago.

Leon Springs Plans Street Celebration

Twelve hours of music by nine bands is the promised entertainment for the Annual Memorial Day Weekend Street Festival to be held in Leon Springs from noon to midnight Sunday, May 26.

Headlining the all-star, all-style musical cast will be "Asleep at the Wheel," plus Gary P. Nunn and his new band. A major recording star, Nunn is well known as the writer of

such hits as "London Homesick Blues" ("I Wanna Go Home With the Armadillo") and the Willie Nelson hit, "Last Thing I Needed First Thing This Morning".

Seven other top groups have been booked, all of which cut across the music picture today. There will be something for everyone.

The other groups include: Beto Y Los Fairlanes, Tennessee Valley

Authority, Steve Cicchetti, Tish Hinjosa, Smith Brother, Project X and Anarchist Convention.

In addition to the music and dancing, the festival will feature a fajita cookoff, a 5-kilometer run, horseshoe tournaments, kiddie and adult rides and games, food and drinks, and an arts and crafts show.

Honorary Grand Marshal is County Commissioner Andy Casias.

Admission is \$6 for adults, \$3 for youngsters 6-12, \$1 for children under 6, and babes in arms are admitted free. Advance adult tickets can be purchased for \$5 from the Leon Springs Cafe, Colonies North Handy Andy, Helotes Handy Andy, and Wonderland Handy Andy. Gates will be open from noon until midnight at Old Fredericksburg Road at the IH-10 turnoff in Leon Springs. Proceeds benefit the Leon Springs Volunteer Fire Department.

The 5-kilometer run beginning at Old Fredericksburg Road at the IH-10 Leon Springs exit will start at 8 a.m. Sunday. Entries have already been received from towns throughout the county. The first 300 place runners will receive commemorative T-shirts, with medals and trophies for class winners. The advance run entry fee of \$7 will cover admission to the dance and other events at the 12-hour festival. Late entries will be \$9.

Fiesta Gowns Return To Witte

Fiesta San Antonio may be over but it's certainly not forgotten.

The legacy of the ornate Fiesta gowns continues with "Coronation Close-Up," an exhibition of 20 royal costumes from this year's Court of Italian Renaissance that opens Thursday, May 23, at the Witte Museum, 3801 Broadway.

Made possible through the Order of the Alamo, the exhibit features the gowns and outfits worn by the Queen, the Princess, 14 Duchesses, two pages, and two members from the Order of the Alamo.

The gowns are designed by the Mistress of the Robes and the Court Artist to depict the court's theme and are hand-sewn and jeweled by San Antonio dressmakers, says

Cecilia Steinfeldt, Witte Museum senior curator and project director for "Coronation Close-Up."

A vast majority of the Witte's second floor has been transformed into a showcase for the almost two dozen elegantly embellished apparel. The San Antonio Museum Association began accepting Fiesta gowns in the 1930s, and currently has about 250 gowns in the permanent collection. Because of the costs associated with gown storage and preservation, the Association now accepts only three gowns a year. The gift of a gown to the Association must be accompanied by a \$5,000 donation.

"Coronation Close-Up" will continue throughout the summer and early fall at the Witte.

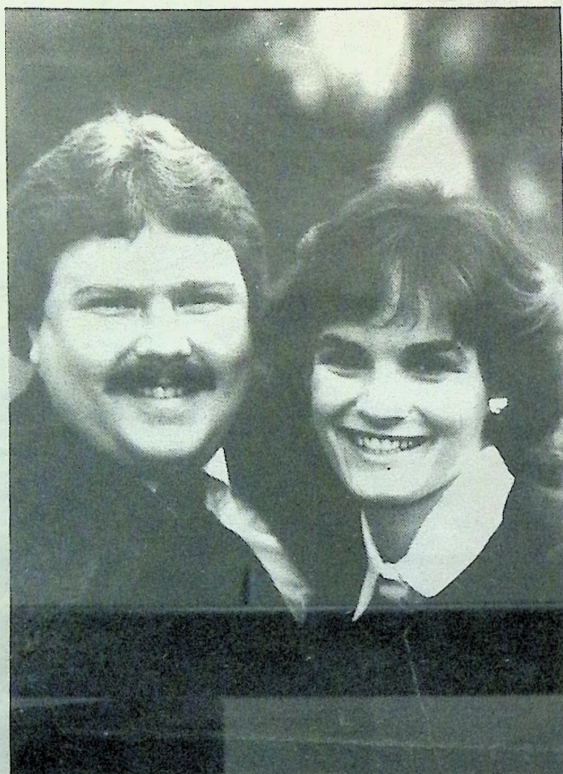

Frameable prints of wild flowers offered by A&M Press

COLLEGE STATION — If you would like to have the beauty of wild flowers year 'round, the Texas A&M University Press has "Wild Flowers" — a portfolio of frameable prints from photographs that have graced the pages of Texas Highways magazine.

The portfolio includes seven large full-color prints showing fields of wild flowers and enlargements of bluebonnets, pink evening primrose and yellow lotus. An Indian paintbrush close-up dominates the portfolio cover.

The photographs, which appeared in smaller sizes in Texas Highways, were taken by Jack Lewis, David Muench, John Suhrstedt and Greg White.

All of the prints, except for the one of the Indian paintbrush, measure 14 by 18 inches in outer dimensions, with an image size of 11 by 14, and are self-matted. The cover photo is 8 by 10 and also is frameable.

The \$25 portfolio is part of the Texas A&M University Press' Louise Lindsey Merrick Texas Environmental Series.

State Arts and Crafts Fair Set Memorial Day Weekend

KERRVILLE—Every year during the Memorial Day weekend, people from all over the country migrate to the heart of the Texas Hill Country—Kerrville. Here the refreshing ritual of spring is warmly celebrated in true Texas tradition.

Drawing thousands each year to the springtime celebration is the Texas State Arts and Crafts Fair, the state's only official arts and crafts festival. This year's fair will be held Memorial weekend, May 25-26, and again on June 1-2, from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m.

Sixteen acres on the campus of Schreiner College in Kerrville are transformed into fairgrounds, hosting over 240 carefully selected artists and craftsmen who will exhibit and sell a variety of hand-made works.

Included in the array of arts and crafts will be hand-painted fabrics; bronze, wood, stone and glass sculpture; oil, watercolor and pastel paintings; porcelain, clay and stone-ware pottery; hand-woven baskets; fine photography; ornamental leatherwork; custom-made toys; stained and etched glass; handmade candles; windchimes; musical instruments; jewelry and more. Along with the exhibits will be demonstrations of handcraft techniques.

Proceeds from this non-profit event will be utilized for the development and appreciation of Texas art and artists. The Texas Arts and Crafts Foundation, which sponsors the Fair, uses Fair proceeds to implement arts and crafts workshops across the state, and to give numerous scholarships to aspiring young artists.

Tickets are \$5 for adults and \$3 for children 6-12. Children under 6 years of age attend free.

Among the top contenders are Capt. Mike Burley, Rob Stull, Spec. 4 Dale Brynestad and Spec. 4 Laszlo Beres.

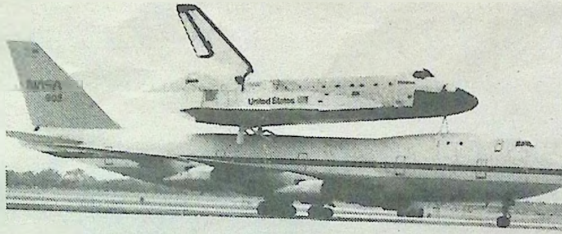
Presbyterians To Sponsor Library Program

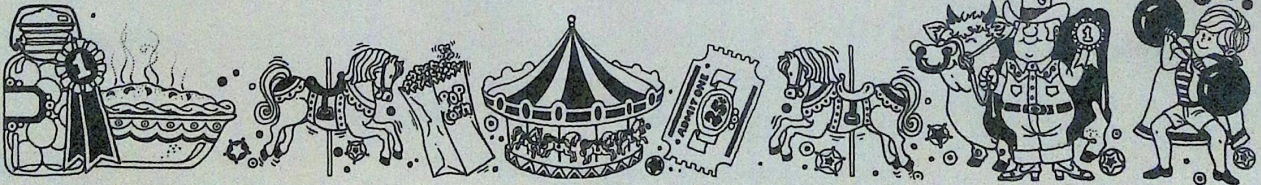

ARTIFICIAL SWEETENERS

Man has associated sweetness with delight and pleasure since the dawn of history, finding this gustatory treat only in natural sources until recently. Most if not all of the natural sweeteners are very high in caloric value, not at all good for diabetics or those afflicted with obesity. So a search began for something palatable, not harmful, and low in calories to replace sugar and other natural sweeteners. Saccharin, long known but little used, was revived with the diet drink fad of the early 1960s. Cyclamate was discovered a half-century ago but lay unknown until it bloomed as a dietetic sweetener about 1950, only to wither and be withdrawn from the market by a controversial FDA ruling in 1970. The latest artificial sweetener, aspartame, was born accidentally in 1960 and subjected to extremely rigorous testing before its release 15 years later.

Many things are sweeter than ordinary sugar. One African plant contains something called monellin, 2,500 times sweeter. Another contains thaumatin, besting sugar by 1,600 times. A whole bagful of things reach the 500 to 1,000 mark. But these have either been proven unsafe for human consumption or haven't yet been subjected to the \$10 million pre-market testing required by our Food and Drug Administration. Until then, we'll have to settle for saccharin or aspartame. Cyclamate, it is hoped, will be reintroduced to the market in the near future because of new research documenting safety. Let's look at these three:

CYCLAMATE is 30 times sweeter than sugar. Initially very popular in the soft drink industry, it fell from favor 15 years ago because of a still-controversial link between a concentrated mixture and bladder cancer in laboratory animals which caused an FDA ban. The study has been repeated recently and no link found, so cyclamate may soon be back in soft drinks and on the shelf.

SACCHARIN is absolutely antique, discovered in 1879 and used as an antiseptic for the next thirty years. Then someone found it made a pretty good sweetener, dissolved in cold drinks or sprinkled over food. It was not widely used because of its bitter aftertaste until it became the first sugar substitute used in canned vegetables and soft drinks, back about 1960.

There was...and still is...some cancer controversy about saccharin, too. There is an increased incidence of bladder cancer in second-generation male rats fed huge doses of this sweetener. Canada banned it as soon as this news broke in 1979 (and only aspartame is used in that country). But when our FDA started to ban saccharin in the USA, Congress intervened and kept it on the market, reasoning that the dose levels consumed by the general public offered only insignificant hazard of bladder cancer. Still, products containing it must bear a warning label stating that saccharin has been shown to produce cancer in rats. Is the FDA right? Or Congress? Well, humans aren't rats and don't consume several pounds of saccharin daily. And a link to human bladder cancer has not been found. Still, research indicates that it *might* be possible.

ASPARTAME (NutraSweet, Equal), 180 times sweeter than sugar, had its own pre-marketing problems. It breaks down in the body or after heating into its component chemicals: Methanol, phenylalanine, and aspartic acid. So each of these had to be studied separately from every aspect, including cancer.

Methanol, a good antifreeze or rubbing alcohol, is found normally in the body at very low levels. But high levels can cause blindness, deafness, and acidosis. So the NutraSweet-produced methanol came under close scrutiny. The results, translated, are interesting. Sit down and drink 70 cans of a diet soft drink sweetened with aspartame...all at one sitting! Your methanol blood level would barely exceed 10% of the minimum toxic level. Said another way, you'd have to chug-a-lug 600 cans of a diet soft drink...in one sitting!...to cause methanol damage to yourself. And, mothers, relax; there is no damage to the unborn baby from methanol, even if you gulp 600 cans of a diet soda.

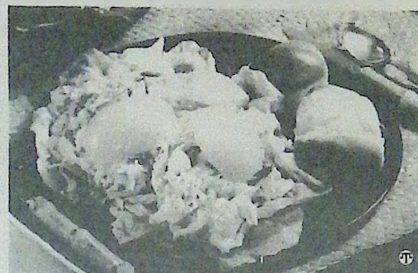
Phenylalanine has been suggested as a cause of mental retardation resembling that resulting from PKU. But even in walloping doses, that released by aspartame isn't enough to cause neurotoxicity. Again, pregnant women, relax. No harmful effects expected. However, PKU patients are advised to avoid aspartame on theoretical grounds.

The possibility of behavioral changes due to the phenylalanine released from aspartame breakdown has been researched to the nth degree. No evidence has been found to make it suspect. There seems to be no change in physical or mental development, either.

Aspartic acid, the last component of NutraSweet, was somehow suggested as a cause of tiny brain lesions, particularly when combined with monosodium glutamate, the preservative. Again laboratory testing by the pound and bucketful produced plasma levels far below any level associated with aspartic acid toxicity.

- 1/4 cup toasted sesame seeds

- 2 cups shredded cooked chicken*
- 1/2 cup diagonally sliced green onions

1/2 cup toasted slivered almonds

Core, rinse and drain lettuce; chill. Drain peaches, reserving 1/2 cup liquid. Combine reserved liquid with vinegar, oil, sugar, soy sauce and ginger; mix well. Stir in sesame seeds; set aside. Remove outer leaves of lettuce and use to line serving plates. Shred remaining lettuce and combine with chicken, green onions and almonds; mix well. Toss with sesame-ginger dressing. Spoon onto lettuce leaves. Top with peach halves that have been cut into halves. Makes 6 servings.

*Turkey may be substituted for chicken.

Bustamante Hits Closing Small Post Offices

The President's Private Sector Survey on Cost Control in Government, which was conducted by the Grace Commission, generally endorsed the wholesale closing of small post offices. The Grace Commission's rationale assumed that small rural post offices are unprofitable and should therefore be eliminated to encourage cost-efficiency. I believe the Grace Commission is wrong. Cost-efficiency should not be the sole measure of small post office closings.

Take for example the post office in the city of Quemado, which has been targeted for closing. Quemado is a town of approximately 750 inhabitants, located 35 miles from Del Rio, and 22 miles from Eagle Pass, the two nearest communities with postal service.

As I wrote the United States Postal Service Headquarters in opposition to this closing, it is not easy to analyze the budgetary implications of closing Quemado's rural post office, but I can avow that ending the service would mean a sizable inconvenience to the community's population.

For many of Quemado's citizens, a 22- or 35-mile drive to pick up mail or have special mail service is far from easy. For some communities like Quemado, the post office is the only government building they have. The post office is where 18 year old boys register for the draft. People receive their food coupons, obtain social security application cards, and find special income tax forms in such post offices.

Shouldn't these things be considered in the Grace Commission report?

Rural post offices in the cities of Natalia and LaCoste have also been singled out for closing. According to the Postmaster of LaCoste, some 2,400 people are serviced by rented boxes and routes. An average of \$10,000 food stamps are cashed each

month in the LaCoste Post Office.

The Postal Reorganization Act also supports my view and clearly states that no small post office shall be closed solely for operating at a deficit. Congress, in my opinion, intended that effective postal service be insured to residents of both urban and rural communities. The law also provides that any decision to discontinue a post office must be based on consideration of the effect on the community served

and on the employees of the post office.

As it happens, I have been appointed by Chairman Les Aspin of the Armed Services Committee to a position on a panel which will examine Grace Commission findings and recommendations. Should the opportunity present itself, I will not hesitate to voice these towns' annoyances. It is my concern that dispensing with small post offices is inappropriate.

WARRANTIES

Despite a great deal of effort expended to simplify the language used in automotive warranties in recent years, confusion still abounds. One of the factors that has contributed to this is the advent of "after-market" warranties.
