

Contract for widening of Highway 16 into a four-lane divided highway from Loop 410 to Scenic Loop Road in Helotes is expected to be let soon after Austin announces the funding, according to word from the Texas Highway Department here

versity gets underway. After work on Highway 16 begins, it should be completed in about 18 months, he said.

Ranch Town **Gets** Okay

The new town near Helotes on the Lytle Ranch moved another step toward reality this month when it was given final clearance by the Alamo Area Council of Government's executive commit-

tee. The developers of the new town may now apply to the U.S. De-partment of Housing and Urban Development for a loan guarantee. Estimated cost of the project is more than \$1 billion over the next 20 years.

The AACOG executive commit-tee approved the project with two requirements: (1) That thorough environmental impact studies, particularly the effect of storm water runoff on the Ed-wards Acquifer, and appropriate commitments be required by the Department of Housing and Ur-han Development: and (2) That ban Development; and (2) That the sanitary sewer system of the project be connected with and treated by the City of San An-tonio's regional waste water system.

San Antonio plans for a regional sewer system have not been announced. Press mention of it has been made only in connection with the development of the new

town. The new town—currently called "San Antonio Ranch"---would ex-tend from Bandera Road just west of Helotes to Culebra Road. The projected population is 68,000 persons. First unit of the new town is scheduled to be opened in May, 1973.

Friday, May 28, the riders have a lunch stop in Helotes before going on to their campsite at San Geronimo. This is also the night of the dance at Pete's Place with



Lions Pavilion **Honors** Parrigin

Scheduled to be completed in less than 30 days is a major civic center which will honor the late Alex Parrigin, who at the time of his death Feb. 22 was the oldest living active Lion's Club member in the United States. He had twice served as the local president of the service organization.

The pavilion-type center is be-ing financed by Club projects and donations from many friends and neighbors with the aid of a construction loan. The much-needed center will be located on Lion's Club property at Scenic Loop Road and Bandera Road, beside the present Club Building. Those wishing to contribute may address their checks to the Alex Parrigin Pavilion, Lion's Club, Helotes, Texas.

The Helotes Lions Club has awarded a contract to J & J Construction Company of San Antonio to build the Alex Parrigin Memorial Pavilion, which will accommodate about 600 per-sons at a gathering according to one estimate.

Jap Jones, president of the Club, said the contract to J & J amounted to \$3,368. Margo Valenzuela of Helotes was awarded the contract for the concrete foundation at a cost of about \$2,400. Electrical work will be donated by the Rev. Lion Collin Furr.

Total construction costs will be about \$7.500.

The pavilion will contain 2,400 square feet and will be open air. Jones said the building will be made of steel and will have a vinyl backed Deccapanel roof. Separate restrooms also will be housed in the structure, Jones said.

Lion George Bowman of Bowman Construction Co. is acting as overseer. Bowman also will donate his own equipment for landscaping and improving roads to the club facilities, Jones said. The loan was secured through Travis Savings and Loan Associ-
