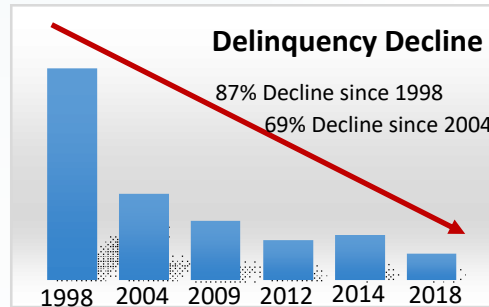


Summer Camps

87% Decline in delinquency since 1998

94% Decline in alcohol offenses Since 2002

59% Reduction in drug use 42% nationally

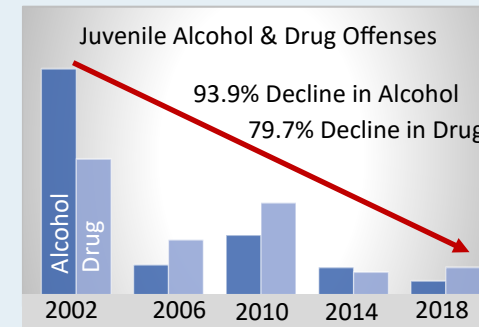

Recovering Youth Futures

In association with local community providers a substance use disorder treatment initiative is available for all youth under age 18 who reside in Midland County. The program provides evidence-based cognitive therapy and developmental asset building interventions that help at-risk youth manage their disorders.

Trauma Informed Supports

MKF supports programs that studies indicate can reduce physical, psychological and emotional stressors experienced by court youth who have suffered trauma. Dory, a therapy dog at the Juvenile Care Center, weighted blankets, and art projects are a few examples of programs that help participants navigate through their treatment.

Enhanced Youth Supports

The best place for children to change behavior is with their families at home. *MKF* collaborates with community partners to develop programs to help high-need, high-risk and emotionally disturbed youth stay with their families thereby diverting them from entry into the juvenile justice system.
