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01. ORDER BEFORE EXPANSION



**“Commit your work to the Lord,
and your plans will be
established.”
— Proverbs 16:3**

Throughout scripture, wealth followed *alignment*. Those entrusted with influence first operated under God’s order and understood that wealth was connected to responsibility, *not* comfort alone.

In today’s world, many pursue expansion first: more income, more investments, more opportunity, more acquisitions.

But without structure, clarity, and alignment, expansion can quickly create instability instead of freedom. Biblical stewardship teaches the opposite: establish the foundation first.

Noah built before the rain came.

Joseph organized before the famine arrived.

Nehemiah rebuilt the walls before the city could flourish.

Solomon established systems, leadership, and infrastructure before building one of the most prosperous kingdoms in history.

The principle is consistent throughout scripture: God often entrusts more to those who first demonstrate faithfulness, discipline, and order with what is already in front of them. “Whoever can be trusted with very little can also be trusted with much.” — Luke 16:10

02. INTENTIONAL PLANNING

In today's culture, wealth is often associated with speed — rapid growth, instant success, and constant expansion. But *enduring* wealth, especially generational wealth, is rarely built overnight. It is built patiently, strategically, and faithfully over time.
