For 30 years Aruna worked as a Counsellor/Therapist assisting families dealing with domestic violence.

Walter Eadie reports on items of interest from the meeting as follows:

- It was agreed that Vice President David Wentzell will be installed as our new President at the January membership meeting rather than waiting until the April AGM.
- Ray Mathews reported that we now have a nominee for each of the positions which will become vacant at the AGM.
- A financial Budget for 2020 was reviewed and approved. The Budget and the 2019 Financial Statement will be sent to members before the April AGM.
- An e-transfer facility has been set up and members will now be able to pay their membership fees by e-transfer to the Treasurer.
- Feedback and suggestions from the recent Christmas lunch were reviewed and passed on to the Committee for consideration.
- In January, we will experiment with introducing our new members just prior to the coffee break to maintain the continuity of the meeting.
- Walter and Anne Eadie will hold a "new member orientation" evening in January for all 2019 new members.
- The membership will be encouraged to suggest new Special interest Groups for 2020. e.g. a "beer tasting" group is being proposed.

Our Club financial year-end is December 31, 2019. Based on expenses and revenues, our total year revenues exceeded budget by approximately \$1,000. Total year expenses were in line with the approved budget. Our bank balance at the end of the year was in the order of \$3,700.

Your Management team has approved the budget for 2020 and are projecting our expenses will closely match revenues.



E-Transfers

We have been looking at ways to facilitate payment of membership renewal fees and have set up our bank account to accept e-transfers of funds from the membership.

If you are familiar with internet banking and e-transfers, you will now be able to send your payment electronically from your bank account to ours.

When you submit payment, you will need to identify, in the "Comments" section, the purpose of the transfer, i.e. "Membership Renewal" so that its purpose can be appropriately identified.

If this initiative is well received and utilized, we are considering extending it to Special Events and other areas where the membership makes payments to the club. This will facilitate the payment process and reduce the number of cheques being written and deposited. More on this extension in future communications.

Travel Insurance with JOHNSON INSURANCE





Did you know that, as a member of PROBUS Canada, you are entitled to stand-alone Group Travel Insurance with Johnson Insurance. Here are some of the particulars:

- It is with MEDOC (the group insurance used by teacher's and government employees).
- You can get either a 17-day or 35-day travel insurance policy, which will cover you for as-many-timesa-year-away within the policy year (or you can go for the 17- or 35-day period, return for 24 hours and start a brand-new 17- or 35-day insured period).
- There are three categories of insurance depending on your filling out a questionnaire, with rates set accordingly: Optimum Health Option, Preferred Health Option and Standard Health Option.
- Access to coverage regardless of health status (if you qualify for and are initially accepted for the Standard Health Option with existing conditions and multiple medications, after two years you are never asked to fill in another questionnaire and are automatically covered under the Standard Health Option).
- Supplemental insurance is available if your length of stay is over the 17- or 35-day limit.
- The plan includes \$5,000,000 emergency medical coverage, \$1,500 lost/stolen/damaged bags (\$3,000 for family), up to \$8,000 trip cancellation or delay benefits and up to \$500 for replacement of lost or stolen documentation (passport/driver's license/birth certificate).
- Other insurance offerings are also available; such as health insurance (for those who have retired without health benefits), car, or home.






Our Wine Club did not meet in December as our meeting date was too close to Christmas.


