Rob Green welcomed us in his native African language and asked for volunteers to help make the "Sounds of The Drum". He followed this by strumming and singing a song about lost freedoms and slavery (which was more lucrative than the buying and selling of spices and precious metals between 1501 and 1867). He then touched on the slave ships, the auctions, the beatings, the family separations and the arrival of Harriett Tubman, "the underground railway," and "safe houses".

The Underground Railway ended in Owen Sound and that was where Rob's family finally settled. Rob shared family photos and history through six generations from his great-great-great

grandfather to the present day. Many statues, a street and a park, in Owen Sound, are named after his ancestors.

It was a very educational and enlightening presentation and opened our eyes to past intolerance and current and future possibilities: such as, Barrack Obama as 44th President of the United States and James Brown's slogan "I'm Black and I'm Proud".

Rob was introduced by Peter Sneyd and thanked by Pat Sneyd.

This meeting March: Aruna Papp is a nationally and internationally recognized educator and advocate of human rights. Her focus is on women's rights in crosscultural perspectives. She has written extensively on the issues facing immigrant women in Canada, and culturally rooted gender-based violence.

She is also a survivor of 18 years of domestic violence. Her marriage was arranged when she lived in India and she came to Canada in 1972 with a 3rd grade education and two little girls. Aruna has since earned two Masters degrees, founded three agencies in Ontario to help immigrant women and their families, and volunteered on a number of boards and committees. For 30 years Aruna worked as a counsellor/therapist assisting families dealing with domestic violence.



Apr: "Woodstock Revisited - 50-Year Anniversary" - There are historical events that mark moments in our lives; such as, what we were doing when Kennedy was assassinated, where we were on 9/11 and what was happening in our lives when 500,000 people arrived at a farm in Woodstock for a music festival in 1969.

Well, we are pleased to have Daniel Aonso from Circles Enrichment with us this month to help us revisit this historic event of "three-days of peace and love." The Woodstock Festival still resonates throughout all music today: Joan Baez, Johnny Winter, Joe Cocker, and Jimi Hendrix - a festival of hippie culture, anti-Vietnam war, free love and rock 'n roll. This will be an educational and enlightening musical presentation.



May: What makes a commodity so special? Who assigns its value? What power could a pearl, a tea leaf, a grain of salt yield? How could the world be held hostage by these often-frivolous goods?

In this engaging presentation, award-winning presenter Lianne Harris will take a look at some of the top commodities in history and examine why they were coveted, what purpose they served, who was willing to pay the price for them, and who ended up suffering for it.

For over 20 years, Jan has given voice as a First Nations culture keeper, sharing stories not only locally, but globally as well.

Jan's Circle will include some integral information about treaties and reconciliation, worldview and relevant stories, and drum songs. This Circle will be interactive so come prepared to raise your voice in gratitude and celebration!

January - Robbie Burns Night


A celebration of Robbie Burns, a Scots poet of great reputation, took place at Martindale Gardens retirement home on January 25th.

Thank you to Marilyn and George Morita and Anna Marie and Tom Jones for sparing.


The Wee Jokers welcomed Bonnie Chapman to the group. She came so close to being a three-game winner. It came right down to the wire.




Many thanks to Brenda Morrow for hosting our February meeting.

The favorite of the night was a Malbec 2017 called Felino (Argentina is well known for its Malbecs), which averaged a score of 15.6 out of total maximum of 20. The Felino wine, that was tasted, is produced in the Mendoza Province, which produces almost 75% of Argentina wines.

Did you know Argentina is the largest wine producer in South America?

To enhance the evening, Darlene prepared foods from Argentina, including Asado (grilled) beef with Chimichurri sauce and Dulche de leche desserts.
