From our President:



"Keep Calm and"

As I write this, it is just a week after the Town of Milton shuttered public spaces, including our Probus Club meeting place at the Sports Centre. It is less than a week since my email was heating up with an active exchange of messages among Management Committee members about the implications of social distancing on our Club activities. In those deliberations, all of our club leaders expressed strong resolve not to descend into panic. Our decision to suspend group gatherings and activities was a prudent and responsible action in the face of a fast-changing scenario. In a short space of time, the headlines in our media have trended to "We are at War" references as the COVID-19 reality sets in. Thinking about my newsletter deadline a few days ago, the "Keep Calm and Carry On" slogan came to mind as a model to

guide us in these unusual times.

Originally developed in 1939 by the British Ministry of Information, "Keep Calm and Carry On", was a slogan developed for Home Publicity posters as the country braced for the onslaught of hostilities. I was intrigued to discover that this anti-panic message was actually not approved for public distribution in war-time Britain, even though 2.5 million copies were printed. The posters were held in reserve, to be used only in the event of serious air raids. Almost all of the posters were eventually pulped, never having been displayed. Yet today, the slogan and countless clever variations can be seen everywhere. How did the mothballed war-era poster become a 21st Century meme? That story starts with the discovery of a handful of original posters in a small bookshop in England in 2000. The originals were copied and sales were brisk. The slogan went "viral" and is ubiquitous today.

As we go through the days ahead, let's make a variation of the slogan our watchword:

"Keep Calm and Probus On".

How will we "Probus On" in the new world of social distancing? What will that look like? Here are some ideas:

- Keep a Journal These are interesting times to live through. Daily notes of your activities and thoughts as the situation around us develops will be the stuff of family stories in the years to come.
- Call a fellow Probus Member just to chat or catch up Hearing a friendly voice expressing care and support is a powerful tonic.
- Take on a Project Now is a perfect time to take on a task you have been putting off. Whether it is spring cleaning, home improvement or a crafting project, striking an item off your "To Do List" can be therapeutic.
- Get Outside Gain a head start on your gardening. As the days lengthen and warm up, nothing beats the smell of spring awakening.
- Maintain your Healthy Habits Exercise, listen to good music, read a classic book, these healthy habits will keep you vibrant and active.



Speaker



She was born in Northern India...the oldest of seven children. Her father was a well-known Seventh-Day Adventist pastor. She grew up in an environment where girls were often abused and not respected. At the age of 17, her marriage was arranged to an older man. The physical abuse continued. In 1972, Aruna came to Canada with a 3rd grade education and two little girls. By working at menial jobs, she supported



her family. She later divorced her abusive husband which was looked down upon by her community.

She went on to earn two Masters degrees and founded three agencies in Ontario to help immigrant women and their families. She received 23 awards for her community work and also spoke at the 57th session of the United Nations. 6000 women from around the world came together to discuss the challenges that women encounter globally.

For 35 years, Aruna has worked as a counsellor/therapist assisting families dealing with domestic violence. She is a nationally and internationally recognized educator and advocate of human rights. She has written extensively on the issues facing immigrant women in Canada, and culturally rooted gender-based violence.

Aruna was introduced by Clare Ganson-Bell and thanked by Pat McIntyre.


Member Experiences at March meeting:

There were no three game winners at the Bernardino's venue. Tom Jones and Brian Murphy each emerged as three-game winners at Meg's venue.


There were no fewer than twelve spares filling in for both venues. Thank you to all for taking up the slack.




Many thanks to our hostess this month, Susan Popp.

"How much for a Season Pass?"




